GLSO Discussion Group Winding Down



Female to Male: Making the Transition Continued

During this edition of the GLSO Newsletter, we compelte our interview with local artist Jack Cofer about his transformation from female to male.

Editor: What issues, if any, do you encounter on a daily basis that you must overcome?

JC: At first I want to say that the issues become less and less the more I progress in my transition - but that's false. The issues become different. In the beginning when I was simply binding, I just appeared to most folks like a flat chested lesbian (especially when accompanied by my female partner) and on the phone people assumed I was female because of my voice. I had already adopted my male name, so folks were constantly asking if it was short for "Jacquie" and when I would say "No, it's actually Jackson," it was like begging the question and in an instant I would be wrapped up in a line of guestioning whether I liked it or not. And I do like talking about it but it's hard to be an educator 100% of the time...like when you're buying groceries. Since hormone therapy and the inevitable "passing" as male, new problems have included 1) public bathroom use: there isn't always a stall door or one that locks in multiple stall men's rooms. 2) being limited to my binding in public at all times: before I had facial hair I at least had the option to not bind if I wanted to go swimming in a public pool or even if it was simply 90 degrees outside and I was uncomfortable. 3)readjusting to mannerisms and speaking habits: I used to be able to tell a guy if he smelled good or looked good,

etc but now I have to limit that to super close male friends or gay men so as to limit the risk of getting my ass kicked. Also, you may not always think of it but in general, woman can make a lot of comments about other women or women as a whole and no be misconstrued as being a male chauvinist. I am a lot more aware of what I'm saying now more than ever (which is a good thing) 4) Everyone assuming I'm a straight male when with my partner: I'm still fighting the good fight and it's hard to be out as queer when the signs are not obvious. My "Nobody knows I'm a Transexual" t-shirt is in the mail right now. And for the sake of this article we'll stop the list here

Editor: What advice do you have for a young adult who is struggling to gender-identify?

JC: First of all, I believe everyone should question gender - especially their own. For all the vastness in the universe and the depth of the human heart there is no way there is only 2. You can argue procreation all you want but in an age where anyone can do that no matter their circumstances, now more than ever we need to be breaking abstract bonds with societal constructs and look inward. Be you and do not be afraid. Those who do not understand are the ones who are afraid. If you have questions about anything, the best thing to do is to reach out. Find a book, find a person, find a resource. We're out here, and we're not going to leave you behind.

Lexington Events Raise More Than \$10,000 for Crisis Hotline

More than \$10,000 was raised for a national suicide crisis hotline for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender youths at two charity events Friday.

Donations were taken at a candlelight vigil in Phoenix Park, followed by a charity toast at Soundbar, a bar and dance club on South Limestone Street.

The vigil, held in honor of teens and young adults who have committed suicide because of bullying, raised about \$140. That was matched by the Gay and Lesbian Service Organization, totalling \$280, GLSO events director Orvis Kean said.

Around \$10,000 was raised at the toast, according to Isaac Kurs, co-owner of

Soundbar.

The toast drew several notable guests including Fayette Circuit Court Judge Ernesto Scorsone, Urban County Councilwoman Diane Lawless and Mayorelect Jim Gray, Kurs said.

The money was given Tuesday to The Trevor Project, the national hotline for youths in crisis.

New Jersey Senator Introduces College Anti-bullying Law

(Trenton, NJ) New Jersey Sen. Frank Lautenberg has introduced legislation to require colleges to adopt a code of conduct that prohibits bullying and harassment.

The Tyler Clementi Higher Education Anti-Harassment Act is named for the 18-year-old Rutgers University freshman who committed suicide in September after his gay sexual encounter in his dorm room was broadcast online.

The measure introduced Thursday by Lautenberg, a Democrat, would require colleges that receive federal money to adopt policies that prohibit harassment based on a student's sexual orientation,

race, gender and other factors.

It also would provide funding for schools to establish or expand programs to prevent harassment of students.

U.S. Rep. Rush Holt, a fellow New Jersey Democrat, introduced identical legislation in the House of Representatives.

Harvard Pres: ROTC Return If Gays Can Serve Openly

(Cambridge, Mass.) Harvard University's president says the school will resume a long-banned Reserve Officer Training Corps program when federal law allows gays to serve openly in the military.

President Drew Gilpin Faust has spoken before about bringing the ROTC back pending repeal of the 1993 law known as "don't ask, don't tell." She emphasized her position Wednesday in introducing Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Adm. Mike Mullen before he spoke at the Ivy League school.

Faust says Harvard is prepared to "fully" recognize the ROTC when all students have "the privilege and honor of military service" without having to lie.

Her comments first were reported by The Harvard Crimson student newspaper. They come as talk of a repeal increases in Washington.

Harvard banned the ROTC in 1969 amid Vietnam War dissent. Its ROTC students train at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.
