Little debating occurred during
the forum. The focus remained on
each candidate's characterization
of the ideal board member.

Greg Oerther, a social work
junior, said regardless of whether
he gets elected, he thinks the

forum will provide the winner with a compilation of new ideas to take to the board. Former Student Government Association President Scott Cros-bie said he thinks the board is already accessible enough to allow the University to enjoy great suc-cess.

"Currently, the students get representation from Benny Ray Bailey and advisory boards," he said. "We need a student trustee who can give them even more."
Candidates Andy Mayer, an undeclared arts and sciences junior, and Sean Rankin, a political science and English senior, disagreed and said that it takes a common student to get to the heart of all student concerns.

"I'm not into sound bytes,"
Rankin said. "I think I've proven myself to be an honest and worthy

candidate."

Mayer said it requires a common student who has been a proven leader to represent the interests of all of the students, not a public official.

"I am a common student," Mayer said.
"I am a people person. I've been a proven leader."

## **Officials** say student seat important one

Beth Thomas will not vote in the special election for the Board of Trustees student seat.

"What's the Board of Trustees?" asked the fine arts freshman. "I don't even know what it is. I am pretty sure I won't be voting in their election."

Thomas is not alone.

Jenny Hays, a mathematics senior, said her knowledge of the board's role is "Sketchy."

"They're just involved in policy decision-making," she said. "That's my best ideo of it."

Alumni trustee Warian Moore Sims said she takes her job of trustee very seriously. She said it bothers her that students are not more familiar with the board's role.

"I enjoy hearing what happens on campus and in the lives of students," Sims said. "It disheartens me that (students) don't always know what happens on a higher level."

"Ned" Breathitt, said it is important to have a student member on the board. He said students on campus should feel comfortable approaching their representative.

"Student members have been very important," Breathitt said. "They've been independent, and they represent the student views."

He cited several instances in the past where student trustes have taken stances that were different from the board and administration.

"On student issues, questions like tuition increases and student fees, (student trustees) have been pretty active," Breathit said.

Former student trustee T.A. Jones said being active is one of the most important roles of the student on the board.

## Other schools facing similar bike problems

The recently formed student bicycle committee is enlisting the help of both the UK community and 14 other benchmark universities in an attempt to solve campus bicycle woes.

The committee is addressing questions of bicycle registration, mandatory dismount zones and bicycle parking.

Officials at one benchmark institution, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, said their campus faces many of the same problems related to bicycles.

The whole bicycle issue was an ignored problem, said Ray Magyar, transportation planner at UN.

Like UK. Magyar said UNC does not require bicycle registration, which makes it difficult to determine how many bikes are on campus.

This in turn hinders the decision of how many racks the Carolina campus needs and where to place them, he said. Magyar added that enforcement becomes a problem for universities, as campus restrictions can conflict with those of the local community.

"I quietly suspended enforcement for a year," said Magyar.

### Students begin Big Blue Crush

"Usually we can do it in 30 minutes if we have nobody waiting, but when you have (students) waiting it takes about 45 minutes to do the whole process," he said. Matt Grunkemeyer, a chemistry sophomore, dropped by the Student Centre to aid the Crush cause. He said giving blood is his way of giving a little bit of hinself to someone in need of help.
"I think as college students, we should try to fulfill that need. If we are going to be the future leaders, we need to sacrifice a little bit for the community," he said.

### **WORLD Tropical storm** leaves 100 dead in Haiti

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — Heavy rains and flooding from Tropical Storm Gordon swept across Haiti yesterday, killing at least 100 people, triggering landslides and washing away makeshift homes in the slums of the capital.

Terrified people fled their homes in the early morning darkness as floodwaters poured in. Some spent the night huddled on their rooftops in the downpour. By the time the skies cleared, thousands of people were left homeless.

Bodies lay in the sun in some neighborhoods. Many of the victims lived in filmsy tin shacks on hillsides. Rescue workers said they expected the death toll to climb.

At the height of the storm, U.S. soldiers diverted traffic from unsafe bridges. As the weather improved, they cleared roads of muck and debris.

## **Many students** unfamiliar with role of trustees

What is the Board of Trustees, anyway?
As students prepare to vote to fill the empty student trustee chair on the University's board, many still do not understand the function of the group.
According to the UK Governing Regulations, the board is a body corporate with the usual corporate powers, and possesses all the immunities, rights, privileges, and franchises usually attaching to the governing bodies of educational institutions.
"There's a long history for the Board of Trustees," said Jack Blanton, UK vice chancellor for administration. "The whole idea of having a board to monitor universities has gone back to the founding of the first nine colonial colleges,"
Basically, the board is respon-

Basically, the board is responsible for implementing major policy decisions at UK, Blanton said.

ard, The trustees of the board) are the protectors and guardians of the assets of the University," he said.

The board is comprised of 16 members who are appointed by the governor, three UK faculty members and one student trustee. The members represent the Lexington Campus and the 14 community college campuses in the state.

in the state.

"Every single thing that happens at the University comes through the Board of Trustees," said Marian Moore Sims, an alumni member of the current board. "We should really touch the current progression of the current board."

alumn member of the current board. "We should really touch the entire commonwealth because as the University gets larger, we have to be able to serve everyone's needs."

The board is affiliated with Council on Higher Education, said Gary Cox, who submitted appointment recommendations to Gov. Brereton Jones. "While the council has nothing to do with the internal budget and (the board and the council) have their own specific resources," said Cox, "interaction between the two leads to better work together."

Cox, former executive director and current member of the CHE, said the council and the board

said the council and the board had "reinforcing relationships but distinct responsibilities under the law."

Current trustee chairman and former Gov. Edward Breathitt said when he was chairman of the

board from 1963-67, members were sometimes chosen based on their party affiliation.
"Some members of the board were appointed because they gave large contributions to political campaigns," he said, "A lot of the time they were just people who wanted on the board for prestige, so it would look good on their obituaries and they could get good basketball tickets." The most critical issue for the board to deal with during Breathitt's time as chairman involved the integration of the Southeastern Conference, he said.

Southeastern said.

"UK gave the first scholarship to a black athlete in the SEC," he said. "There was a lot of interest in the civil rights movement on campus."

But Breathitt said the most important duty the board has is selecting the University president. "It's critical that the board does a responsible job selecting the president," he said.

Blanton also said he felt that the trustees had an enormous responsibility in choosing the president, because of the importance the president has to the entire University.

"(The board) has never had to fire a president," Blanton said.

"Which I think is both an excelent and unusual thing."

Blanton said that originally the board had no faculty or stume went by, the faculty and then the students were allotted seats for representation.
"It's really unusual to have faculty members voting on the board," he said, "And the students

ulty members voting on the board," he said. "And the student representatives have done what they were supposed to do; they've voiced the opinions of the stu-

they were supposed to do; they've voiced the opinions of the students."

Sims, who is a fourth generation graduate of UK, said that she never dreamed she would be on the board.

"I'm not a political person," she said. "I'm a teacher, so the whole educational aspect of the University is what I'm most concerned with."

Sims, whose 86-year old mother reads the minutes at board meetings, said the recent decision by the board to purchase the Pinoak real estate in Versailles really impressed its importance on her.

"It good to be able to do something that masters so much," she said. "Everything (the board) does touches me."

## **Sandford reinstated** for board elections

The Student Government Association Supreme Court ruled last night that Clayton Sandford could be reinstated on the ballot for the student Board of Trustee

could be reinstated on the ballot for the student Board of Trustee seat.

Sandford, who is a homeless veteran, was disqualified from the race because he did not attend a mandatory trustee candidate's meeting.

Sandford said he filed the claim — his third against SGA in 30 days — because he was not given a fair, "constitutionally mandated" hearing by the Election Board of Claims.

"It's hard to prove something without a hearing," Sandford said. "Whether a hearing, "Sandford said. "Whether a hearing, would change the outcome, we'll never know because we've never been given the chance to know."

Jay Ingle, chief justice of the SGA Supreme Court, said the court felt Sandford never got a chance to represent himself.

"We made our decision because we feel no candidate should not be placed on the ballot or have a claim or charge filed against him without an opportunity to speak on his own behalf," Ingle said.

Ingle said it is not a ruling on whether Sandford should be disqualified, but whether the Elections Board of Claims followed proper procedure.

On Wednesday, the SGA Election

On Wednesday, the SGA Elections Board of Claims ruled Sand-ford was disqualified from the spe-

cial election for the student trustee

cial election for the student trustee seat.

"At the bottom of the application (for the election) that Mr. Sandford signed, it says if you miss the meeting you are automatically disqualified," said Matthew Thomas, chairman of the SGA Board of Claims, last night. "I'e's not like it's a conspiracy or something, he just broke the rules."

Thomas said Sandford was "never even a certified candidate because he did not attend a mandatory meeting."

"When it says on the bottom of this sheet that not attending automatically equals disqualification, and all of the other 10 candidates showed, I do not see why Mr. Sandford should get any different treatment," Thomas said.

He also said he was never charged with a felony, thus he cannot be disqualified from the trustee race.

The SGA Constitution defines

The SGA Constitution defines a felony as anything that can severely affect the outcome of the election, and a misdemeanor as anything that is not a felony.

"Unless it can be shown a candidates' meeting can severely effect the outcome of the election, than I am innocent," Sandford said.

## African art shown at UK museum

A new exhibit at the UK Art Museum highlights African art, a subject that museum education coordinator Kerry Zack said is not often appreciated by western cul-ture.

coordinator Kerry Zack said is not free appreciated by western culture.

"The more research I did, the more I realized how little we know," said Zack, who organized the exhibit "Transforming Power Masks from Sub-Sahara Africa."

The exhibit features eight masks and one free-standing sculpture from various ethnic groups in Africa. Six of the pieces were donated by sculptor Richard Hunt, whose sculpture, "Pass-Thru," stands on the side of the museum facing Avenue of Champions. The other three were donated by the family of UK professor Thomas von Unrug.

Because of American audiences' relative unfamiliarity with African art, there were special concerns when putting the exhibit together that a curator of a Eurocentric exhibit might not face, Zack said.

In fact, during Smith's years at Trinity High School in Louisville, the standout receiver, free safety and kick return specialist played on three undefeated Shamrock squads while garnering numerous individual awards including consensus first team All-State. But times change, and Smith, unior split end on the UK football team, is now no stranger to the woes of a program which considers a .500 season to be a banner year.
