Pitino: Not my arena

Of the 12 men's basketball teams in the Southeastern Conference, UK is the only one with an off-campus arena.

He said UK President Charles Wethington, Athleites Director C.M. Newton and Larry lay, senior associate director of athleites, are the principle figures in the proposed arena project.

"The motive for this arena ... started two years ago when there were a lot of complications and problems with the agreement," he said. "There's only one reason for the talk of this. It's not because Rupp is not adequate; we know that's not true. It's a financial decision based on the interests of the University of Kentucky; I won't even have my name on the door in this new arena.

But Pitino said he wants to have input on the design of a new arena. He estimated a new arena would cost between \$80 and \$100 million, with construction lasting approximately two years. A decision to build a new facility, he said, will be made no later than Jan. I.

On the amount of time it will take to get the necessary funding, Pitino said, "You can't imagine how short it will be."



The UK football team needs to be careful when it travels to Baton Rouge, La., tomorrow to face Louisiana State in a 7 p.m. kickoff in "Death Valley."

The Cats (1-5 overall, 0-3 in the Southeastern Conference) will have to face a fired-up group of Tigers (4-1, 2-1) who are looking to vent a little anger. LSU is coming off a tough 56-13 loss to No.1-ranked Florida — a loss in which the Gators racked up 635 yards of offense, including 327 yards passing.

"I don't think anybody should


be deceived by the last score," he said. "I really think that going into Florida right now is going to be real tough for anybody. I said that a few weeks ago and that seems to be the case.

Lee said in a released statement, "We wanted to continue the spirit of self-reliance and self-empowerment. This was a low-budget movie and the idea was, If we can't raise two and a half million dollars amongst ourselves and our brothers, then we need to give up."

The first track, a film excerpt in which the actors perform "Shabooyah (Roll Call)," on its own makes the album worth purchasing. Guru powerful rap single "Destiny Is Calling" grees the compilation an urban attitude necessary to balance out the sleek R&B tunes. Curtis Mayfield's timeless, soothing, mellow sounds

are ever-present in the mid-album track "New World Order." Perhaps the most interesting cut is Stevie Wonder's cover of Bob Marley's classie "Redemption Song," Although not quite as cap-tivating as the original, Wonder's own distinct head-swaying style is successful.

The problem with most sound-tracks is that it's hard to find 14 different performers one person can appreciate. Get on the Bus manages to maintain a pleasant listening quality throughout, even if you're not a big fan of all the artists. The only automatic skip on the album comes from the evange-listic gospel song "My Life is in Your Hands" by God's Property, which goes a little too far with the 'Jesus is great' theme.

At a time when it's rare to find good soundtracks to genuinely good movies, Get on the Bus stands out as a notable achievement.



success.

Many of the participants and presenters at the conference agree on what it takes to develop writing skills without losing that personal

skills without losing that personal tone.

Colette Inex, author of Getting Under Way, advised writers to focus on their own personal experient to suggest their own personal experient to suggest their own personal of their own personal officers, "November of their own personal dreams," she said.

Almost as necessary as recording personal actions and emotions is making sure you have experiences worth writing about.

"Nourish your life as much as you can with art and music, dance things that make you feel alive."

Other presenters at the conference agreed that the key to good writing is making time to write about the things that matter most to the author.

"The thing that helped me most is actually making time to write," said Molly Peacock, author of Take Heart. "I schedule it in, just as if it were a class. I'm pur-

Busy schedules can make it nearly impossible to write somest thing personal every day, but it's important not to let writing take the back seat to the other tasks, Peacock said.
