



After 20 seasons as the head coach at Maryland and Virginia Tech, Jerry Claiborne finally achieved his dream of being the head football coach at Kentucky. Wildcat football fortunes have already reaped the benefits.

Kentucky's unexpected success last year earned Claiborne the 1983 SEC Co-Coach-of-the-Year award. He has now been awarded a total of five Coach-of-the-Year honors in three different conferences. Claiborne's Wildcats gave Kentucky fans only their seventh winning season in the last 26 years.

Somehow, it seems very appropriate that Jerry Claiborne would be the coach to lead the Cats to such a dramatic upswing and their first bowl bid in seven seasons. As a senior in 1949, Claiborne was a defensive back on Kentucky's Orange Bowl team. The trip to the Orange Bowl was the first major bowl invitation in Kentucky history.

During his three-year varsity career, Kentucky was 21-9-2 after three straight losing seasons before he arrived on campus. In fact, Claiborne's senior class kicked off the most successful 11-year period in Kentucky

football history.



Jerry Claiborne was a defensive back under Bear Bryant at Kentucky. Once Claiborne began his coaching career, he remained very close to Bryant who is college football's all-time winningest coach.

Claiborne's success at restoring dormant teams can be traced all the way back to his playing days under the legendary Bear Bryant at Kentucky. Claiborne has carried that trademark of success with him to each coaching job he has ever undertaken and it is especially obvious in his 22 years as a head coach at Virginia Tech, Maryland, and Kentucky.

Kentucky's 31st head football coach has an overall coaching record of 144-91-7. Claiborne's record has made him a fixture in the top-twenty most winning active coaches poll. But, that road has never been an easy one.

In his first head coaching job at Virginia Tech, Claiborne inherited a program with no national reputation and very little tradition. However, ten years later, he had made the Hokies a winner. He guided VPI to two bowl games and a record of 61-39-2. Claiborne was named the Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1963.

However, his next head coaching assignment was even more amazing as he totally altered the fortunes of the football program at the University of Maryland. When Claiborne arrived in College Park, the Terps had suffered through seven straight losing seasons. However, he once again turned a struggling program into a success story. By the time Claiborne left Maryland to return to Kentucky, the Terps were among the national powers. He amassed a 77-37-2 record at Maryland, took the Terps to seven bowl games, and won three Atlantic Coast Conference Championships. He was named the ACC Coach-of-the-Year in 1973, 1975, and 1976. He was also the National Coach-of-the-Year in 1974 according to the Sporting News when he guided Maryland to an 8-4 record and a berth in the Liberty Bowl.

It is easy to see why Kentucky has one of the most respected collegiate coaches in America. Through his quiet, hard-working, persevering style that he has passed on to his players, Jerry Claiborne has built winners everywhere he has gone. Last season, the University of Kentucky was given a first hand look at what football coaches around the country already knew, Jerry Claiborne equals success.



Campus Leaders



Otis Singletary **President**

Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Ken-

tucky's eighth president in August 1969.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a 'people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 15 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky

has grown in enrollment to about 23,000 students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community col-

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, MS, Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children, Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.



Cliff Hagan **Athletics** Director

In his ten-year reign as the athletics director at Kentucky, Cliff Hagan has produced an enviable record in improv-

ing the overall athletics program, modernizing the facilities, and increasing attendance at Wildcat athletic events.

Last season, Kentucky was the only school in the country to have both the football team earn a bowl bid and the basketball team reach the NCAA Final

Under Hagan, a 1954 Kentucky graduate of high distinction and one of the greatest basketball players ever at UK, 1984-85 will be a very busy year for athletic construction. On tap is a \$5 million dollar natatorium, improvements at Commonwealth Stadium, new dressing facilities for women's athletics at Shively Center, and the renovation of Memorial Gymnasium.

In the next two seasons, the University will host the 1985 NCAA men's basketball Final Four and the 1986 NCAA women's basketball Final Four.

An Owensboro, KY, native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton, also of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington; Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of Lexington; Mrs. Ron "Amy" Burdette of Decatur, GA; and Kip, a junior member of the Transylvania University basketball and tennis teams.

Dr. Art Gallaher

Dr. Art Gallaher, who is entering his 21st year at the University of Kentucky, is the chancellor for the Lexington campus in the

University of Kentucky system. He assumed the role as chancellor in 1982 during the major reorganization of the University. Prior to being named chancellor, Gallaher had served as the vice president for academic affairs for two years beginning in 1980. From 1972 to 1980, he was the dean of the Kentucky College of Arts and Sciences.

Gallaher came to the University of Kentucky in 1963 after holding tenured positions at both the University of Houston and the University of Nebraska. He was chairman of the Kentucky anthropology department plus acting director and deputy director of the University Center for Developmental Change.

Dr. Gallaher, a native of Oklahoma, and his wife, Dixie, have two children.



Dr. Peter Bosomworth

Dr. Peter Bosomworth, who is now in his 22nd year at the University of Kentucky, is the chancellor of the Albert B. Chandler Med-

ical Center. He assumed the position in 1982

Prior to being named the chancellor, Bosomworth had served as the vice president of the medical center since 1970. During his long career at the University of Kentucky, Bosomworth has served on numerous medical boards and councils throughout Kentucky and the United States. He has also been the associate dean for clinical affairs in the UK College of Medicine and acting administrator of University Hospital in his years at Kentucky.

Bosomworth received the faculty scientific achievement award of the Kentucky Medical Association in 1969. He also was awarded the medal of honor by the National Cheng-Kung University of Taiwan.

Dr. Bosomworth and his wife are the parents of four children.



Dr. Charles Wethington

Dr. Charles Wethington, who is entering his 20th year at the University of Kentucky, is the chancellor of the ever growing Univer-

sity of Kentucky Community College System.

Prior to being named chancellor in 1982, Wethington was the vice president of the UK Community College System for two years beginning in 1980. He had been the assistant vice president since 1971. His promotions within the system came after he had been the first director of the Maysville Community College in 1967 and the acting director of UK's Lexington Technical Institute in 1966.

Wethington, who is a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges and of Phi Delta Kappa honorary education society, began his career at the University of Kentucky in 1964 as an instructor of educational psychology.

Dr. Wethington and his wife have two children.



Jerry Eisaman, a 1960 Kentucky graduate, returned to his alma mater in 1982 after being on Jerry Claiborne's staff at VPI and Maryland. Eisaman, who also spent three years as the offensive coordinator at the University of Cincin-

nati, is UK's quarterback coach. The native of Bethel Park, PA, was an All-SEC quarterback



Chip Garber is in his third season working with defensive backs at Kentucky after holding a similar position at SMU for two years. The Mustangs led the nation in interceptions and won the SWC title in 1981. The native of Winchester,

VA, graduated from Maryland in 1978 and was a two-year starter in the defensive secondary after walking on the team as a freshman.



Bill Glaser is in his eighth season at Kentucky as the defensive guard coach. A native of Louisville, Glaser came to UK from Morehead State where he was the defensive coordinator. Before going to Morehead, the 1965 graduate of

Bellarmine College was the head coach at St. Xavier High School in Louisville for two years and guided the school to consecutive state titles and undefeated seasons.



Jake Hallum is in his 13th season as an assistant with Jerry Claiborne. The 1960 graduate of Newberry (SC) College joined Claiborne in 1972 at Maryland and came to Kentucky in 1982. The Liberty, SC, native is Kentucky's

offensive guard coach. Prior to coaching at Maryland, he was 22-17-1 in four years as the head coach at Morehead State.



Dave Likins is in his fourth year at Kentucky and coaches the defensive ends. The 1980 Centre College graduate came to Kentucky after being the defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at George town College in 1980. That sea-

son, the Tigers led the Heartland Conference in total defense. The native of Henderson, KY, was an honor student in high school and college.



Greg Nord, a three-year foot-ball letterman at Kentucky, has been a member of the Wildcat coaching staff since finishing his eligibility in 1978. Now in his sixth year on the staff, Nord coaches the Kentucky offensive backs.

The native of Louisville played center and tight end during his career from 1975-1978.



Dick Redding is in his 22nd year with Jerry Claiborne. The two have been together for all but one season since Claiborne took over as head coach at VPI in 1961. The native of Auburn, ME, is the football administrative assistant who

coordinates the Kentucky recruiting effort. The 1940 graduate of Springfield College coached at VPI for eight seasons before Claiborne took over as head coach.



Rod Sharpless, a former player under Jerry Claiborne at Maryland, is entering his third year on the staff at Kentucky. The 1974 Maryland graduate coaches the defensive tackles. Sharpless, a native of Jacksonville, NC, was an

assistant coach at the University of Richmond in 1981 and coached at Maryland from 1977 to 1980.




Farrell Sheridan has been with Jerry Claiborne since 1979 and is in his third season at Kentucky. The native of Rutherford, NJ, coaches the Kentucky offensive tackles and kickers. Since joining Claiborne's staff, the 1973 gradu-

ate of the University of Minnesota has coached linebackers, tight ends, and defensive ends.



Terry Strock is in his third season at Kentucky. Strock was the co-captain of Claiborne's first team at VPI and has coached at VPI, Maryland, and is the linebacker coach at Kentucky. The 1962 graduate of VPI began his 18-year coach-

ing association with Claiborne at VPI in 1966. Strock is a native of Hagerstown, MD.

As Kickoff Approaches

The Battle of the Unbeatens



Jeff Wickersham is one of the best passers in LSU history.

The legendary Alfred Hitchcock never made one of his macabre thrillers about college football. But, if he had, the master of suspense would have used the 1984 LSU Tiger football team as a model.

Not only have the Bengals taken delight in physically beating opponents this year, they have also enjoyed mentally tormenting opponent coaches the week of the game.

The plot for the movie would be quite simple. The opposing coaches would wake up screaming from nightmares about Wickershams, Hilliards, James, Martins, and Brooks. Then, in horror, the coaches would watch their most horrible nightmares come true on Saturday.

A horror classic in the true Hitch-cock tradition.

To say that the Kentucky Wildcats have their hands full today is an understatement of cosmic proportions. The battered and bruised Wildcats face LSU, a team with perhaps a chance to become one of the most awesome squads in Southeastern Conference history.

"LSU combines an explosive offense with one of the best defensive squads we've ever seen," said offensive line coach Farrell Sheridan. "Every one of their players is big, strong, and has exceptional speed. Their offense is very balanced with outstanding skill position players. LSU's defense hits very hard and doesn't give up much yardage."

In addition, LSU has a revenge motive for this afternoon's game. Last season, Kentucky upset the Tigers in Baton Rouge, 21-13. LSU was on its way to a 4-7 season overall and an 0-6 record in the SEC. Undoubtedly, the Tigers remember.

"Last season, when we went into Baton Rouge, I think they were down a little and we were fortunate to come out with a win," said Sheridan. "I'm sure LSU will have a revenge motive against us because its very unusual for a team to go into Baton Rouge on a Saturday night and come out with a win"

The added attraction to the game is the fact that Kentucky and LSU are the only remaining unbeaten teams in the SEC. LSU is ranked in the top-ten while the Wildcats have cracked the top-twenty for the first time in years.

The clash of the unbeatens will feature many interesting matchups.

First of all, Kentucky's defensive secondary will be squaring off against the record setting passing combination of quarterback Jeff Wickersham and All-American split end Eric Martin.

Wickersham is the catalyst for the Tiger attack that is averaging 30.4 points per game. Martin, a senior speedster is always a deep threat. However, after Martin, Wickersham can look to flanker Herman Fontenot and tight end Mitch Andrews who are equally dangerous. Furthermore, Wickersham likes to throw to his running backs Garry James and Dalton

Hilliard quite often.

"They have great athletes on offense, but the three key players for them are Wickersham, Martin, and Hilliard," said Sheridan. "Martin is without question a first round NFL draft pick and one of the best receivers I've ever seen. They mix up their plays very well. We expect them to throw quite a bit, but when you have a back as talented as Hilliard, you have to put the ball in his hands and they can get the ball to him by either handing off or throwing to him."

Meanwhile, Kentucky's defensive secondary has picked off nine opponent passes this season and has benefited from an improved pass rush. Senior All-SEC candidate Paul Calhoun has picked off four passes this year including two last week against Mississippi State. The addition of Maurice Douglass has been a boost for Kentucky's secondary that has already seen 174 opponent pass attempts this season.

SERIES HISTORY

The Tigers have dominated the series between Kentucky and LSU and hold a 24-9-1 advantage. However, last season, Kentucky won 21-13 in Baton Rouge. The win snapped a fivegame LSU win streak over the Wildcats and was only the third win ever for Kentucky in Baton Rouge. Kentucky's win last year was only the fourth time in 20 years that the Wildcats had beaten LSU. The Tigers are 10-6 against Kentucky in Lexington.

With LSU's ability to hit the back coming out of the backfield, Kentucky's linebackers will once again be put in a difficult situation. To compound the problem, Larry Smith injured his knee against Mississippi State which means that Cam Jacobs will now team with Don Yarano at linebacker.

Kentucky quarterback Bill Ransdell's battle with LSU's Playboy All-America free safety Liffort Hobley will be equally interesting. Ransdell has thrown for 775 yards and four touchdowns this season. His 56-yard touchdown pass to Cisco Bryant enabled the Wildcats to come-from-behind to beat Mississippi State, 17-13, last week. It was the first time Kentucky had won an SEC opener on the road since 1978.

On the other side, Hobley has been busy creating chaos in the secondary for opposing quarterbacks. He has picked off three opponent passes to lead the LSU defense which, like Kentucky, has nine interceptions on the season.

Kentucky's banged-up offensive line will also have a serious challenge with LSU's talented linebacker corps.

"Their linebackers are exceptionally mobile," said Sheridan. "However, their weak side linebacker, Michael Brooks, seems to make 80% of their tackles. It's going to be a challenge to come up with plays and blocking schemes to neutralize his ability to pursue the ball."

Michael Brooks leads the LSU linebackers, but he receives ample help from veterans Shawn Burk, Ricky Chatman, and Gregg Dubroc.

Across the ball, Kentucky's offensive line has Wildcat head trainer Al Green doing a M*A*S*H imitation. No less than three starting offensive linemen were put out of the game against Mississippi State. Jim Reichwein, Ken Pietrowiak, and Vernon Johnson suffered injuries against the Bulldogs along with tight end Oliver White. Their ability to bounce back against the Tigers will have a big bearing on the outcome of the game.

Defensively, the Wildcats are keeping Green and his staff just as busy. Defensive tackle Jeff Smith has missed the last two games and his brother,



Larry, probably won't play today either. Other defensive linemen who suffered injuries against Mississippi State were Jerry Reese and Jon Dumbauld.

Whoever lines up on the defensive line for Kentucky will face one of the most experienced offensive lines in the Southeastern Conference. Playboy All-American Lance Smith and Kevin Langford anchor a front wall that is incredibly efficient. With running backs like Hilliard and James, it doesn't take a big hole to produce a big play.

Kentucky's offense has also had a knack for producing big plays this year. George Adams ripped off a 55-yard run against Mississippi State, freshman Mark Higgs turned on the jets for a 76-yard touchdown jaunt against Rutgers, and Ransdell has come up with some big completions to many different receivers.

In the process, the Cats have rolled up 1,301 yards rushing, 793 yards passing, and accumulated 22 touchdowns. Adams leads the Wildcats in rushing and receiving, but is increasingly finding himself a marked man. Against Mississippi State, Adams' string of four consecutive 100-yard rushing performances was snapped. However, he is still third in the SEC in rushing.

Football Is No Joke To Phillips



Phillips is a dangerous open field runner.

There was a small problem whenever Joe Phillips Sr. and Joe Phillips Jr. got together. Joe had a grandfather named Joe. Joe had a grandson named Joe. Whenever anyone called one Joe, they got both.

How do you solve the confusion? Easy. Nickname one "Joker." That's

what grandfather Joe did for grandson Joe.

Now, the grandson, Joe "Joker" Phillips, is making a name for himself as one of UK's top receivers. But make no mistake, Joker is no joker on or off the field.

'I don't like to joke around too much," Phillips said. "If you try to be loud, they'll label you as a joker. I tend to be more quiet. But I can't hold back all the time," he admitted. Just what is funny to a Joker? "The only thing funny on the field is

watching one of your teammates knock somebody down," Phillips said.

Phillips' statistics on the field hardly tickle the funny bone of opponents. Phillips was UK's third-leading receiver in '83 with 22 catches for 255 yards and three touchdowns. And this year he's keeping pace with those stats.

Phillips wasn't always a receiver. He

was a quarterback in high school. But, when he came to UK, Phillips, an option quarterback, found himself on a passing team. So he moved to receiver. But not without a rude awakening.

In his first start as a freshman against Georgia, Phillips cut across the middle on one particular play. Phillips sums up the play simply, "The defender cleaned my clock good." His teammates welcomed him to the SEC with smiles all around.

Phillips held on for an 18-yard gain that play against Georgia. Now a senior, he's collected a lot of knowledge about receiving since then.

If you run a good route through the middle and come to the ball instead of drifting away, you'll be okay," Phillips said. "You also have to know where the quarterback is always. Sometimes I'll cut my routes short when I feel he's in trouble."

At just under 5-10 and 187 pounds, Phillips appears small compared to the others on the field. But, Phillips feels differently.

'I'm an oversized receiver," Phillips said. "I'm just as strong as the defensive back. If they try to shut me off, I can give it back to them.'

Phillips regrets that his father never saw him "give it back" to opponents. Phillips' father wanted to play college ball and he always wanted Joker to play, too. But Joker's dad died before his son put on the pads.

Sometimes I sit and think how he'd feel about me playing college ball," Phillips said. "Mom said he'd be proud."


Mom's proud. That's for sure. She watched Joker play every high school game, from state championship to state championship. She makes most UK home games. "The first thing I do is make sure I see her in the stands,' Phillips said.

In his first two seasons, Phillips' mom usually witnessed a losing UK team. But not anymore.

The turnaround is believing in Coach Claiborne. The first year the things he preached didn't sink in. Now, we have discipline and it's helping us win games," said Phillips.

I think it's realistic to be in the top 20 at the end of the year," Phillips said. "We've got to pull off the upsets to get there. Now we say that we're not leaving the stadium losers."

And that's no joke.

Kentucky Football — The Cradle of Coaches

As the Trivial Pursuit craze has swept the country, participants have come dangerously close to an all expense paid trip to the rubber room trying to figure out the tantalizing questions.

However, if this question were to ever appear, any Kentucky football fan could smugly look around the room and answer easily, forestalling, if only momentarily, the mental anguish of the game.

Ready?

What do the winningest coach in college football history, the coach of the 1983 national championship football team, and the head coach of twotime Super Bowl champion Miami Dolphins have in common?

Okay, look smug because you know the answer.

Kentucky football, of course.

Bear Bryant coached at Kentucky, Howard Schnellenberger played and coached at Kentucky, and Don Shula was an assistant coach at Kentucky.

Some people outside the circle of Kentucky football fans would be surprised by this fact. However, the truth is, Kentucky has made a tradition of sending former coaches and players to coaching greatness.

After Bryant left Kentucky to take over at Texas A&M, Blanton Collier was named the Wildcat head coach. Collier enjoyed a successful stint in Lexington before moving on to the Cleveland Browns of the NFL where

he won several titles.

"I had the good fortune of getting to work under Coach Bryant and Coach Collier," said Howard Schnellenberger, who played and coached under both men. "It was their influence that made me want to be a coach. I always had a great relationship with my coaches at Kentucky because they were the type of hard working people I enjoy being around.'

Two coaches who were at Kentucky

during the Bryant-Collier era are the head coaches in tonight's ball game. Kentucky's Jerry Claiborne played and coached under Bryant at Kentucky. LSU's Bill Arnsparger was an assistant coach under Collier and later was a highly successful coach with the Baltimore Colts, Miami Dolphins, and New York Giants.

In addition to Jerry Claiborne, Bear Bryant, Howard Schnellenberger, and Bill Arnsparger, the college ranks have seen the likes of Charlie McClendon who led LSU to 14 bowl appearances in 27 years. Tom Harper was the head coach at Wake Forest and is the assistant head coach at Clemson University. Harper devised the defense that paced the Tigers to the 1981 national championship.

Furthermore, Phil Cutchin was the long-time head coach at Oklahoma State and Ray Callahan was the head coach at Cincinnati. Paul Dietzel, after leaving Kentucky, was the head coach at Army, LSU, and South Carolina.

'Throughout my playing career, I was raised to respect my coaches and learn from them," said Clemson's Tom Harper. "I benefited quite a lot from my experience at Kentucky and now I use that in my coaching. I'm a better coach than I was a player.'

In addition to Shula, Arnsparger, Schnellenberger, and Collier, there have been many other Kentucky products to grace the sidelines in the NFL.

John North, a former assistant at Kentucky, was head coach of the New Orleans Saints. Leeman Bennett led the Atlanta Falcons to three NFL playoff appearances, the only playoff appearances in the franchise's history. Chuck Knox, has held many head coaching jobs in the NFL and is now the head coach of the Seattle Seahawks. Finally, Ermal Allen, who played and coached at Kentucky, was Tom Landry's top assistant coach in the Dallas Cowboy organization for many years before retiring recently.

But, without question, the former Wildcat coach who had the biggest in-

fluence on football was the man who compiled a 60-23-5 record at Kentucky for eight years.

The Bear.

"After he left Kentucky, Coach Bryant became a legend," said Tom Harper. "But while he was at Kentucky, we knew him as a perfectionist who expected nothing but the best from every coach and every player. He never had to say much. You just felt his presense. He was a great teacher and I hope I have some of his ability to motivate."

The Wildcat players and coaches have gone their seperate ways over the years. But, they never forget Kentuckv.

Schnellenberger remembers vividly his touchdown catch to beat Tennessee in the final game of the 1953 sea-



Howard Schnellenberger gets a victory ride after Miami's 1984 Orange Bowl victory.


son. McClendon especially recalls the 1950 Sugar Bowl victory over Oklahoma and his return appearances to Kentucky as LSU's head coach.

"They used to really get after my back side," laughed McClendon, who is now the executive director of the American Football Coaches Association. "I'd always hear everybody say, 'Hey, this is a Kentucky boy, let's give him a warm welcome.' But, come Saturday, they'd do their best to destroy you," he chuckled.

"When I returned to Lexington with

"When I returned to Lexington with Clemson in 1981, it made my heart beat a lot faster when I heard the Kentucky fight song for the first time," Tom Harper recalls. "But, now I pull for the sideline I'm working for. Still, all the memories came back."

Kentucky has sent many prominent coaches out into the football world, but they never forget their roots even if more than one finds himself on the opposite sideline now.

Coaches Behind The Scenes

Kentucky's Offensive Line Architects

As the 1984 season approached, many experts predicted that the Kentucky offensive line would be a major stumbling block for the Wildcats. Four starters had graduated and only one starter returned.

But an amazing thing happened. The Wildcat offensive line has opened gaping holes and protected quarter-back Bill Ransdell with armored car efficiency.


The chief architects of Kentucky's front wall, assistant coaches Jake Hallum and Farrell Sheridan, knew that the offensive line was unproven.

However, the potential was there.

"The players were young in the aspect that they weren't starters, but every one of them had played a lot last year," said Sheridan. "They were in the game atmosphere which makes a big difference and helps them adapt when they become starters."

"The thing that people don't realize," added Hallum, "is that we had gained in strength and made excellent progress in spring practice. But, the biggest thing is we've got a great attitude and a bunch of guys that want to do well"

However, building offensive lines has been a trademark of both Sheridan and Hallum in their long association with Jerry Claiborne at Maryland

and now Kentucky. Maryland established a tradition of sending many linemen to the NFL and Kentucky has already scored nearly 20 rushing touchdowns this year.

Sheridan is a New Jersey native and comes from a football family. His brother, Phil, was the captain of the 1965 Notre Dame team, his father played for Notre Dame, and two other brothers played for Boston College.

"Ever since I was a kid, I wanted to play football at Notre Dame," said Sheridan. "But, when I visited South Bend, Coach Parseghian wanted me to sign right then which was legal at the time. But, I wanted to enjoy the rest of my visits before I signed. The next week I went to Minnesota and really enjoyed myself and decided to go there."

Hallum, on the other hand, grew up in rural upstate South Carolina and had ambitions to attend Clemson. However, instead, he wound up at Newberry College in South Carolina as a 170-pound offensive lineman. But, Newberry turned out to be a boost to his coaching career.

"I wanted to go to Clemson, but I was too small and they didn't offer me a scholarship," said Hallum. "So I went to Newberry instead and since then things just seemed to work out for me. Years later when I was coaching at Maryland, we were playing at Clemson and beat them. When it was obvious we were going to win, one of my offensive linemen, who is now in the pros, stood up at midfield and yelled, 'That's for not giving Coach Hallum a scholarship,' recalled Hallum with a grin.

Hallum was a high school coach in Pickens, SC, before moving to the Bluegrass State to coach at Hopkins-ville and Ashland. He then became the head coach at Morehead State before moving on to Maryland as Claiborne's assistant.

"I met Coach Claiborne when I was an assistant coach at Hopkinsville,"

said Hallum. "I remember after I first met him, I told my wife Coach Claiborne was the type of man I would really want to work for. When I was at Morehead, the opportunity came up for me to go to Maryland and I took it."

Sheridan, after graduating from Minnesota in 1973, coached high school football in New Jersey at East Rutherford High School and then moved to DePaul High School, one of the top football factories in the state.

"When I was at DePaul, we sent prospects everywhere," said Sheridan. "So, I was fortunate to get to know Coach Claiborne. Plus, Coach Claiborne and Coach Hallum had recruited my older brother and had been in my house when I was in high school. So, when there was an opening at Maryland, I was fortunate to get the job."

Fortunately for Kentucky, Jerry Claiborne has surrounded himself with people like Jake Hallum and Farrell Sheridan who have helped put the Wildcat program back on the right track.

George Adams 6-1, 225, TB Lexington, KY

George Adams has meant so much to Kentucky football over the last three years that it is very hard to list all of his contributions. For openers, he is leading the Wildcats in rushing for the third consecutive season and has established himself

as the best all-around running back in the SEC. But, off the field, he provides the leadership that is so vital to a

young team like Kentucky.

This season, he leads the Cats in rushing, scoring, and receiving. He ranks among the national leaders in rushing and scoring as well. Already many experts are predicting Adams will be a first round NFL draft choice. He is averaging well over 100-yards per game rushing and could become Kentucky's first All-SEC running back since Sonny Collins in 1975. Through five games, he is on pace to eclipse Collins' single season rushing record at Kentucky. The native of Lexington will finish this year among the Kentucky career leaders in rushing and all-purpose yardage.



Don Sabatino 5-11, 194, TB Lyndhurst, OH

Don Sabatino has proved his worth to Kentucky football time after time. Since walking on the team as a freshman, he has been one of those players coaches enjoy working with and his dedication has made him one of Kentucky's top

special team players despite his small stature. Sabatino has performed in every phase of the game when he has

Against Kent State, he rushed for 38 yards on only six carries for an average of 6.3 yards per carry which is second best on the Kentucky squad. Included in that total was an 11-yard carry, the longest of his career. As a junior, he gained eight yards against Kansas State and picked up three yards rushing as a sophomore. He also caught a five-yard pass that year.

In addition, Sabatino has seen action in virtually every game as a special teams player. This season, his alert play recovered a Rutgers squib kick and he has been in on countless special team tackles throughout his career.



Gardner is a quick, speedy back who earned a scholarship despite a knee injury that sidelined him for vir-



As "Sleepy" Jim Crowley, one of the Notre Dame Four Horsemen, simply said, "This Hall of Fame is not in the telling or talking about, it's in the seeing."

Galbreath Field



Every aspect of the play-off is under the administration of the NCAA Division III Football Committee.

Galbreath Field is a 10,000-seat stadium located immediately adjacent to the College Football Hall of Fame at Kings Island, Ohio. The first intercollegiate game was played at Galbreath Field on September 12, 1981, between Ashland College and the University of Dayton.

A Glance at...

Louisiana State University



James Wharton Chancellor

Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College is the state of Louisiana's only comprehensive university and is one of the few landgrant and seagrant institutions in the coun-

try. It is the largest and the oldest center for higher education in Louisiana and sits at the apex of the statewide LSU system.

The University was founded in 1860 at Pineville as the Louisiana State Seminary and Military Academy. The school moved to Baton Rouge following a fire in 1869, which destroyed the Seminary building. In 1870, it was named Louisiana State University, and in 1877 merged with the Agricultural and Mechanical College of New Orleans. The University moved to its present location in 1925 and 1926.

The permanent campus was officially dedicated on April 30, 1926.

In the 1930s and 1940s, LSU experienced major growth. The increases in the student body, curricula, and services prompted the expansion of LSU to a statewide "system" of higher education in the early 1960s. The system serves the entire state with eight institutions on ten campuses in five cities. Other components of the sys-



tem on the Baton Rouge campus include the LSU Agricultural Center and the Herbert Law Center.



The University's 1,250 faculty members and the 3,200 staff work to fulfill LSU's mission as the comprehensive university of the state.

The University offers bachelor's degrees in 133 fields, master's

degrees in 77 major fields, and doctoral degrees in 49 major fields. Student enrollment at LSU hovers around the 30,000 mark, which makes LSU by itself, with staff and faculty, the ninth largest city in the state of Louisiana.

LSU's commitment to research is evidenced by the 1,300 research projects underway on the campus. Virtually every department at LSU engages in research. In addition, more than 20 institutes, centers for advanced studies and other special units are also headquartered at LSU. Plus, 25 state and federal government units maintain offices and research laboratories on the LSU campus.

An important factor in quality research is an institution's library. LSU ranks 43rd in the nation in university library holdings, which total over 2 million.

Lousiana State University also serves the citizens of Louisiana. The division of Continuing Education provides an outreach program of instruction which helps over 59,000 participants from professional, technical, and educational fields each year. In addition, to the extramural teaching, correspondence study, short courses and conferences, and other special training outreach programs, LSU offers night courses and special programs for adults.



Head Coach

Bill Arnsparger

As he entered his first season as the head coach at LSU, Bill Arnsparger was a man with a mission. The native of Paris, KY, had one goal which was to return LSU's football program to the lofty

national acclaim it had enjoyed for so many years under another Kentucky product, Charlie McClendon.

To say that the former Kentucky assistant coach has set the Tigers on the right track only five games into the season is an understatement. Arnsparger has LSU in an excellent position to win an SEC crown in his first year at the program's helm. However, anyone who has ever been associated with LSU's 26th head coach knows that winning championships has become an Arnsparger tradition. Everywhere he has coached, success has followed.

Arnsparger came to LSU after being the Assistant Head Coach and

Defensive Coordinator of the Miami Dolphins under Head Coach Don Shula. The mastermind of the Miami defense for 10 of the last 13 years, Arnsparger has earned the reputation of having one of the game's most brilliant and innovative minds. He first joined Don Shula's Baltimore Colt staff in 1964 and remained with Shula until he was named Head Coach of the New York Giants from 1974 until 1976 when he rejoined the Dolphins.

Shula and Arnsparger developed



a close friendship while they were both assistant coaches at the University of Kentucky. Arnsparger coached at Kentucky from 1954-1961 under the legendary Blanton Collier. Prior to coming to Kentucky, Arnsparger was an assistant at Miami of Ohio, where he graduated in 1950, and at Ohio State from 1951-1953 under Woody Hayes. Arnsparger played offensive tackle for Hayes at Miami of Ohio. After leaving Kentucky following the 1961 season, he was an assistant at Tulane for the 1962 and 1963 seasons before moving on to the NFL.

Scouting the Opponent

The Stuff Nightmares Are Made Of

Last season, LSU suffered through a nightmarish season. The Tigers were 4-7 overall and 0-6 in the SEC. To make matters worse, the club had to endure a difficult coaching change.

However, this season, it's LSU's opponents who are living the night-mares.

As is the case with many of Kentucky's opponents this season, what a difference a year can make.

Under first-year head coach Bill Arnsparger, LSU is playing with a new sense of purpose. The Tigers are well-prepared and all business. The result finds LSU with an explosive, multifaceted offense and a dominating defense.

Arnsparger inherited 16 returning starters and 39 returning lettermen and he wasted little time getting the Tigers ready for the season.

In his first game, Arnsparger took his team to Florida and earned a 21-21 tie that made many people sit up and take notice. After wins over Wichita State and Arizona in Baton Rouge, LSU went to Los Angeles and completely dominated Southern Cal. Last weekend, LSU whipped Vanderbilt, 34-27, in a game that was not nearly

as close as the score indicates. The win was LSU's first SEC victory since 1982.

The Tiger offense is, in a word, awesome. Eight starters returned this season. LSU has so many weapons, it's hard to know where to begin. The most logical place is at quarterback.

Although only a junior, Jeff Wickersham already ranks with such great LSU quarterbacks as Bert Jones, Y.A. Tittle, David Woodley, and Alan Risher. Last year, Wickersham became the first quarterback in LSU history to throw for over 2,000 yards in a single season.

In his career, he has connected on 286 passes for 3,569 yards and will end his career as the all-time leading passer in LSU history. He holds seven LSU school records including the single game passing record which he set against Mississippi State with a 368-yard performance. In the first quarter against Vanderbilt last week, the native of Merritt Island, FL, was 10-of-11 for 135 yards as LSU scored on its first five possessions.

When Wickersham looks to throw, his favorite target is All-American Eric Martin. He is LSU's career leader in

catches and yardage. Before his career is over, the converted tailback could pass Carlos Alvarez as the SEC's all-time receiving yardage leader.

If Wickersham decides to hand off, look out for the Dalton-James Gang. Dalton Hilliard and Garry James are probably the most effective rushing tandem in the country. The two have combined for 961 yards already this season.

Hilliard is second in the SEC in rushing with 617 yards and is already third on the all-time LSU career rushing list. He picked up 152 yards against Vanderbilt which was the 12th time in his career he has rushed for over 100 yards. Furthermore, he returned the first two kickoffs of his career against Vanderbilt and uncorked an 80-yard return against the outmanned Commodores.

The amazing thing about all the publicity surrounding the LSU offense is that some people forget how good LSU's defense is.

To begin with the Tigers have one of the top defensive minds in football as a head coach. Secondly, eight start-

ers returned. Finally, there is plenty of talent to go around.

LSU's defense has stymied every

opponent this year. Opponents are averaging barely 100 yards per game rushing against the Tigers and that includes Southern Cal. LSU held USC to three points and contained Vanderbilt until the outcome was no longer in doubt.

As with the offense, it is difficult to pinpoint one particular strength as the Tigers excell in all areas.

The secondary is led by Playboy All-America free safety Liffort Hobley who will definitely by on everybody's all-star list at the end of the season. Hobley teams with strong safety Jeffery Dale to give LSU one of the top safety tandems in the country.

The linebackers are a seasoned group led by Michael Brooks, who was named the Chevrolet Player-of-the-Game against Vanderbilt as he was constantly harassing Kurt Page and putting the clamps on the Commodore rushing attack. Brooks also has two interceptions this season. However, before anyone thinks he is the only player to stop, take a look at Shawn Burks, Gregg Dubroc, and Ricky Chatman. All three are very aggressive and effective.

Finally, we are at the defensive line.



The defensive ends are Tommy Clapp, who is only 6-4, 260, and Karl Wilson, who measures in at 6-5, 250. The nose guard is Henry Thomas who is 6-2, 255, and very difficult to move out of the middle.

In addition, the Tigers have an outstanding kick returner in Norman Jefferson. The elusive sophomore put on a spectacular show against Vanderbilt.

Juan Betanzos, a native of Mexico City, handles the placekicking chores. He is 9-of-13 in field goals and 13-of-15 in extra points. Clay Parker is LSU's punter and is averaging 38.6 yards per punt.

Out-of-the-Past

Kentucky Spoils McClendon's Homecoming

Kentucky gobbled the Virginia Tech Gobblers, 38-7, and hosed the Indiana Hoosiers, 28-22. The Wildcats possessed a top-notch defense and two of the top rushers in the SEC.

That's the good news. The bad news — three losses.

In that 1974 season, Kentucky had just lost to Auburn, 31-13. Then to make matters worse, the following week Kentucky had to tame a Tiger of another kind, the LSU Bengals.

Charlie McClendon, LSU's head coach, a former UK player and coach, was seeking his 100th win and hoped to get it against his alma mater.

Kentucky hadn't beaten LSU since 1960 and LSU led the game series 18-5-1. McClendon had a 12-0 record against UK and wanted that lucky number 13. A record crowd of 57,000 fans filled Commonwealth Stadium on that mid-October evening.

The stage was set for a tough scratch and claw contest.

The defenses for both teams held firm in the first period. However, an LSU fumble gave UK the ball in Tiger territory. Three plays later, John Pierce split the uprights on a 37-yard field goal with 1:52 left in the first period.

After a stalled LSU drive, an errant snap over the head of the LSU punter gave Kentucky another chance to put some more points on the board.

But, quarterback Mike Fanuzzi fumbled a pitchout attempt into the arms of LSU tackle, A.J. Duhe, who now stars for the Miami Dolphins. Two punts later, LSU drove within field goal range and scored on a 29-yarder with 3:19 left in the half.

UK mounted a drive, but still couldn't manage the first touchdown of the game. Instead, to the roar of the fans, Pierce trotted onto the field once again. This time, his field goal attempt was a 48-yarder. No Wildcat kicker had ever made one that long.

Pierce did.

His record-breaking kick put UK ahead with less than two minutes in

the half. But, Kentucky still wasn't ready for the locker room.

UK caused LSU's fifth fumble of the first half and headed downfield. With three seconds left in the half, Fanuzzi hit Dallas Owens with a 35-yard strike to give Kentucky a 13-3 lead at the half.

In the second half, LSU began picking up steam as UK's defense slacked. A 35-yard field goal and a 36-yard touchdown run knotted the score at 13. After a few punts, UK took over on LSU's 42. A pass got the ball to the 17. On the fifth rush, a one-yarder by back Sonny Collins, UK pulled ahead 20-13 with just over three minutes left in the game.

"We felt at the half that we could beat LSU and that last drive was the ball game. We just had to have it," said All-American offensive lineman Warren Bryant.

Then came the big play for UK's defense, which had caused six LSU

fumbles, recovering three, and forced eight punts.

The Tigers were driving downfield. A 22-yard pass and a few runs put LSU on the UK 49. With seconds ticking away, UK's Pat Donley batted down an LSU third-and-one pass. Then came the clincher.


"Out of the corner of my eye, I could see the runner coming through the hole," said guard Tom Ranieri. "By now, I had my momentum up and I cracked him at the line."

Ranieri led the charge and was quickly joined by his teammates. The defense had held.

Kentucky ran out the clock, winning the cat fight, 20-13.

"That's the best Kentucky defense I've seen. I couldn't believe how quick they were," commented running back Sonny Collins after witnessing the horde of defenders dismantle the LSU offense.

The win catapulted Kentucky to its first winning season in nine years.



First Aid — The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side, Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two golf cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.


Cardiac Care — In cooperation with the University Medical Services, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus.

Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since


their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 side-line seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000.

This is Kentucky's 12th season at Commonwealth. The Wildcats beat Virginia Tech 31-26 in the first game in their new facility on September 15, 1973.



Kentucky Marching Band







Tennessee, Mississippi State, Ole Miss and Alabama all have two conference losses and no team has ever captured an SEC title with two losses. In fact, only six times since the league was founded has a team won the championship with one loss.

So today's Kentucky-LSU and Georgia-Vanderbilt matchups have to be considered the key games in conference play. Should Kentucky upset LSU, the Cats could align themselves quite nicely for the stretch run. If Georgia defeats Vanderbilt today, Dooley's Dawgs move atop the league's standings ready to take on all challengers.

"Travel abroad allows a person to become truly educated rather than just well-trained," says Jay Brumfield, director of the UK National Alumni Association when discussing the

group's travel program.

'Most Americans think buildings 200 years old are most unique. In Europe you see churches, homes and public buildings dating back to the 12th and 13th centuries. It's an awesome feeling to be surrounded by such history.

"And, there is so much to see in the world that can only be seen in Europe and Asia, particularly art, royal jewels. architecture and excavations of early civilizations. There's only one Egypt, one Greece, one Jerusalem.

Brumfield cites Association tours to Russia as perhaps the most interesting and at times humorous.

In a sense, Russians are always playing games with you. They refuse to acknowledge facts. I recall standing in Red Square at the Lenin Mausoleum with the burial crypts just behind. The guide was telling us about the significance of the Square. You could see the lines, people constantly streaming by the tomb. I asked if Mr. Stalin

was also buried there. The guide asked, 'What?', so I repeated my question. Then hesitantly she said, 'Well, I believe he is.' So I thought I'd try again and ask about the burial of a foreigner there. Her reply was 'Oh, uhh, perhaps so.' The foreigner is an American, John Reed, a New York Times correspondent whose story was told in the movie, "Reds."

Another experience Brumfield claims he will never forget is a cab ride in Greece. "Wild is the only word for it. The traffic jams were huge and our driver was determined to beat the pattern. He went the wrong way on one-way streets and up on the sidewalk, blowing his horn. I never thought we'd get to the restaurant. There was a brush with a car or pedestrian at every intersection.'
