"TOGETHER -GAY AND PROUD"

IN LEXINGTON: While appearing on WLEX-TU's "Your Government" the state chairperson of the Kentucky Republican Party said he did not welcome gays in party leadership and did not personally wish to associate with them. Leitchfield attorney Joe Whittle said he would not want the National Republican Party to form a political arm for gays as the National Democratic Party plans to do. Whittle said he would not discourage gays from joining the Kentucky GOP, provided "they had interests other than sex".

His concern, Whittle said, was that gays would try to use their party membership only to further their own concerns about sexual freedom.

Several local gay Republicans expressed outrage at Whittle's statement but did not wish to be identified publicly. The Co-Chair of the Gay Lesbian Democrats of Kentucky, Keith Elston, in a Letter to the Editor of the Lexington Herald Leader responded (in part): "These remarks show a clear insensitivity and ignorance of the issues raised by Gay Rights leaders such as the right to fair employment and housing practices and the opportunity to serve their country in the armed forces. Concerns about 'sexual freedom' have not been at issue. What is at issue is that gays and lesbians are citizens of the United States and therefore are entitled to the same rights, responsibilities and privileges that Chairman Whittle is entitled to, including political opportunities such as leadership positions within the Party. Whittle's remark that he would not discourage gays from joining the Kentucky GOP, provided 'they had interests other than sex', is one of the most disgusting statements I have ever heard. Gay people have no more or less interest in sex than anyone else. Gay and lesbian citizens should

join a political party because 1) they have interests in the policies and philosophies that party espouses, and 2) they are made to feel welcome and encouraged to participate in Party affairs. Apparently, the Republican Party is only interested in the gay voters as long as they keep quiet and do not try to get involved in the system."

IN OKLAHOMA: The United States Court of Appeals, Tenth Circuit, in a major legal victory for the gay and lesbian community, has reversed the ruling of a lower court and struck down the main part of an Oklahoma law which permitted the firing of teachers for speaking in favor of gay and lesbian civil rights.

IN HOLLYWOOD: Showtime, the nations second largest pay cable television service, will have the premiere of "Brothers" on July 13th. This half-hour sitcom, produced by Paramount, will become the first opiginal weekly services original weekly series with homosexual hero. Six additional episodes will run weekly starting on August 16th. "Brothers" is a comedy about three brother, two of whom are shocked when the third announces that he is gay. If you have Showtime, why not invite someone who doesn't over to see the premier?

IN WASHINGTON D.C.: A group of politically conservative homosexuals within the republican party have launched a national group, The Concerned Americans For Individual Rights, to offset the influence of the Party's New Right faction on the homosexual issue and to counter the dominant liberal leadership of The Gay Movement. National William Greener, for spokesperson the Republican National Committee, said, "the party will wait and see what it is that actually is proposed before we put ourselves in the position of reacting favorably or unfavorably, but there are not plans now to set up any special unit within the party to as liaison with the Gay Community".

Participants say the group includes middle-and upper-income professionals as well as political activists and campaign workers for prominent Republican politicians. "There's a tremendous frustration out there of moderate-to-conservative gays who have had to sit on the sidelines and watch a more liberal element of the community being presented as their the representative" said one GOP



The results of GSO's recent telephone survey are in. Approximately 10% of the local names on the newsletter mailing list were called. Participation was excellent and none of the people contacted refused to take the survey. A summary of the results are as follows:

- 1. AGE 18-25 10% 26-35 65% 36-45 8% 56-65 8%
- 39% have attended at least one general business meeting (11% said they attend regularly).
 61% have never attended a general business meeting.
- 54% said they thought general business meetings would get better attendance if they were well structured and included social time following the meeting.
 46% thought they would not.
- 40% said they are paid voting members.
 39% said they are "friends of GSO".
 21% said they are neither.
- 5. Discounts for voting members:

55% said they should receive a discount at 650 social events.

45% did not.

"Friends of GSO":

30% said paid GSO voting members should receive a discount at social events.

70% did not.

Of the total respondents:

42% felt paid voting members should receive a discount.

58% did not.

ACQUIRED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY SYNDROME

What you know about it may save your life.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF AIDS?

Many of the AIDS symptoms are subtle and may only indicate simple, everyday ailments; therefore, you should be alerted but not alarmed if you have one or more of the following symptoms:

- Weight loss of more than ten pounds during a period of less than two months that is not related to diet or increased activity; prolonged loss of appetite
- Unexplained, persistent or recurrent fevers or night sweats
- Swollen glands (lymph nodes found in the neck, armpits, and groin) which persist and are unexplained by other illness
- Profound fatigue that is not transient or explainable by physical activity, substance abuse, or a psychological disorder
- Persistent and unexplained diarrhea or bloody stools
- A persistent, whitish coating (or spotting) on the tongue or in the throat which may be accompanied by soreness or difficulty in swallowing
- A heavy, persistent, dry cough that is not due to smoking and has lasted too long to be explained by a cold or flu
- Easy bruising or unexplained bleeding from any orifice
- Skin rashes or discolorations of the skin
- Blurred vision and/or persistent, severe head-

Kaposi's sarcoma patients may have any of the above symptoms and/or might develop slowly enlarging purplish or discolored nodules, plaques, lumps, or other new growths on top of or beneath the skin or on the mucous membranes (inside the mouth, nasal passages, anus, or underneath the eyelids). These lesions do not disappear and may get larger, and cannot be attributed to explanations such as bruises, blood blisters, insect bites, or pimples.



BEING GAY IS MORE THAN A PREFERENCE From "Pieces of Eight" by Sydney J. Harris.

Penmanship is the only skill I can perform with my right hand. For everything else--cutting, throwing a ball, dealing cards, swinging a tennis racquet--I use my left hand. That is just the way I am.

It is not a preference of mine. In fact, this anomaly is often uncomfortable in a right-handed world. But there is nothing I can do about it, and I must conform to the world more than it caters to me.

I mention these dull facts by way of drawing an analogy with the current controversy about homosexual rights. There has lately been, as we know, an intense backlash in many cities relating to the rights of homosexuals to teach and engage in other public activities.

What has happened, I think, is that the gay liberation movement and its affiliates have begun to claim too much for their anomaly. They are right in insisting that their condition is neither a vice nor an illness. But they are wrong, in my opinion, in designating it as merely a "sexual preference."

Homosexuality, in almost all cases, is no more a matter of sexual preference than my left-handedness is a matter of manual preference. I have little choice in the matter, and they have little choice. Ours is a condition or a state, not a preference.

People who would punish or penalize them for this condition have no more justification than to punish me for left-handedness. Society has a high and severe obligation to assure all minorities--whether they be racial, religious, sexual, manual, or what have you--all their rights as human beings.

Beyond this, there is little we can do to eliminate the disadvantages of "lefts" in a largely right-handed world. I have as much right to play the violin as the next man, but on the other hand (to make a bad pun), a symphony orchestra would scarcely hire me to play in the violin section. My handedness is a disability in a manually dexterous society, and I must live with it.

Certainly, in my view, gays are no more "immoral" nor "sicker" than anyone else simply by virtue of their condition; but just as certainly, their condition is bound to have specific disadvantages in a heterosexual society. They should demand, and receive, equal treatment; but equal treatment, after all, does not mean identical treatment.

If we opt to be different, or even if we can't help it, we have to pay the price of that difference; and part of that price is to be looked upon slightly askance by the others. Since it costs a premium to declare and live by a difference, it becomes even more important that moralities of any kind be protected form added discrimination.

The following poem appeared in the December 1979 <u>Gayzette</u> (the GSD Newsletter in a prior incarnation). It was written by Joe Lincoln.

Only three hours to be ready before I have to go out. Hope I can make it in time. My nails are clipped, I've shaved, my beard is trimmed.

Oh, God, didn't I use the last of the conditioner this morning! I think there's enough left.

Let's see, guess I'll get my shower. . . maybe think of what I'm going to wear while I'm in there.
