Fire flares at **Holmes Hall**

Residents of Holmes Hall stood out in sub-freezing temperatures for almost an hour Tuesday night as police and firefighters responded to a small fire on the fourth floor of the dormtiory.

The men's hall, which houses approximately 300 students, was evacuated around 10 pm. Five firefurcks, two fire safety Jeeps, three police cars and one ambulance surrounded the hall while firefighers broke into a fourth floor window and doused the flames with water.

Police closed off the block of Euclid Avenue between Martin Luther King Boulevard and South Limestone. Water from the hoses covered the surrounding street, sidewalks and lawn.

At press time, the cause of the fire was started at 11 pm. according to Battallion Chief Steven Sea.

After extinguishing the flames, officials cleaned the bottom three floors of the dorm first, and then set to work on the fourth floor. Residents were allowed to reenter at 10:50 pm.

"The only two that won't be able to use their room are the two with the fire," said Lloyd Axelrod, UK director of public relations.

Even though it's not directly related to UK students, Dr. Panos Zavos, believes reproduction is everybody's business.

"We are all reproductive biologists," he said.
That's why Zavos, a professor of reproductive physiology and andrology, encourages anyone with concerns about reproduction to attend Thursday's lecture on recent advances in assisted reproductive technologies, given by guest speaker Professor Severino Antinori, a reproductive specialist visiting from Rome, Italy, where he is the director of the International Associated Research institute for Human Reproduction Infertility Unit.

Antinori works to develop new methods to improve the treatment possibilities available to infertile couples. Zavos said Antinori was a revolutionary infertility specialist, as well as pioneer to several techniques dealing with the treatment of postmenopausal women, in which he successfully man-

aged to establish pregnancy for women as old as 60.
Antinori and Zavos work as colleagues, discussing clinical research to develop technology to allow men without sperm in their ejaculate to achieve normal fertilization. On Thursday, they will reveal some of their accomplishments and plans for future control of their accomplishments and plans for future.

WASHINGTON — Abortion protesters
marching on the capital promised legislative
fights and cheered President Bush's first major
action in office — overruling an abortion-friend
ty policy by his predecessor. The president of the
National Organization for Women said Bush had
removed the "moderate mask that he wore during the election" by ruling out U.S. cooperation
with many family-planning organizations
abroad. Bush imposed strict restrictions Monday
on U.S. funds to international family-planning
groups involved in abortion, even counseling
people about it or lobbying governments about it.
The order was similar to a policy of Bush's president father, which President Clinton had overturned when he took office in 1983.

Britain legalizes cloning

Britain legalizes cloning
LONDON — The House of Lords approved a proposed change to government regulations Monday that makes Britain the first country to effectively legalize the creation of cloned human embryos. The measure is aimed at allowing research on so-called stem cells — the unprogrammed master cells found in early stage embryos that can turn into nearly every cell type in the body. Like all other embryos used in research, the clones created under the new regulations would have to be destroyed after 14 days, and the creation of babies by cloning would remain outlawed. The change passed late Monday

TOKYO — Japanese scientists have found
3.54 meteorites in Antarctica during a threeweek search, a collection that could yield clues
about the rest of our solar system, a government
official said Tuesday. The finds were made
around the Yamato mountain range about 186
miles from Japan's base on the rim of Antarctica,
said Shigeru Kure of Japan's science ministry. A
meteorite is a meteor that survives the destructive effects of a flight through the atmosphere
and falls to the ground whole or in pieces. Six
members of the Japanese observation team took
part in the latest search conducted between Nov.
19 and Jan. 10, Kure said. "Such a large number
of meteorites discovered may include some rance
ones that could help in finding the origin of the
solar system." Kure said.

The lone contender







Newly-elected President Lee Todd addressed students, faculty, alumni and board members during a news conference held Tuesday. Todd will succeed President Charles Wethington as UK's 11th president. Wethington will remain in office until July 1.

Just as the race for the UK presidency was drawing to a close, doors began to open for Lee Todd.

The first door opened when candidate Gregory Geoffroy, withdrew Monday night to accept the position of president at lowa State University.

Geoffroy, who holds a doctorate in chemistry and has been published in scientific Journals, said that as a scientist, lowa State was the best choice because of its strengths in the sciences and technology. "It's a great institution and it just felt right," Geoffroy's reasons for withdrawing concerned an-andidate Jom Whitmore withdrew his name. While Geoffroy's reasons for withdrawing concerned another position. Whitmore said his were 'personal."

He also said the decision had nothing to do with anything he experienced while visiting campus last week.

"This (withdrawing) is certainly no reflection on

"This (withdrawing) is certainly no reflection on

what I saw when I visited," Whitmore said.
Whitmore called UK a "good place" and said he
could see the University moving ahead.
"I look forward to seeing that happen, but it will
be from a distance," he said.
Whitmore will continue to serve as the provost
at the University of Iowa.
"There are plenty of good things to do here (in
Iowa) as well."
And that's exactly what Jim Rodgers thinks
about UK, too, Rodgers, the acting chair of the theater department, said Whitmore's withdrawal did
not surprise him. He said it seemed "fairly typical"
because media reports made it sound like members
of the Board of Trustees favored Todd over
Whitmore.

"I know that people want to keep control of their careers, and it looks far better to say I withdrew then to say I didn't get it." Rodgers said.
Rodgers said he supported all of the candidates selected as finalists for the position. He also said he was "cestatic" about the board's decision to appoint

Todd as president. Rodgers said that initially he didn't think he would like Todd but after hearing him speak during the faculty session Friday his thoughts were changed.

"He got a lot of hardballs thrown at him, and I thought he handled the questions extremely well," Rodgers said. "I think he is smart and he knows his limitations."

And one limitation Rodgers hopes to see remedied under Todd's presidency is the lack of financial support for the fine arts. But Rodgers said he believes Todd will support the arts. While Todd was on campus last Friday, Rodgers met with his wife, Patricia. Rodgers said the Todd's are very interested in the arts.






