Russell Mumper, a UK chemistry junior, was one of 12 students selected nationwide for a fellowship to study nuclear chemistry at San Jose University in California this summer.

"All the hard work I put into it has paid off." Mumper said of the fellowship sponsored by the American Chemical Society Division of Nuclear Chemistry.
"I've always been trying for things like this," Mumper said.
"I've been applying for them for the past two years."
The award came as a surprise, he said, "but it's a reward for my desire to go a little bit beyond what a normal student does, to work harder."

Mumper's fellowship will pay travel, tuttion and living expenses during his seven-week stay in California beginning July

6. The fellowship also covers the cost of a one-week break "to see all the sites," he said.
"Tve never been any further west than Paducah or St. Louis," Mumper said, adding that he hopes to visit San Francisco during his break.
The trip "will be a major factor in determining what I'll do for a career," he said.

Mumper works in radiopharmaceutics, which he described as "a pharmacist's use of radiation to synthesize and test drugs."

Candidate proposes statewide lottery

FRANKFORT — Democrat Wal-lace Wilkinson proposed yesterday to "deregulate" Kentucky schools if elected governor, with cash rewards for schools that improve each year, and he said he supported a state lot-tery to help fund education.

"We will eliminate any law or reg-ulation which constrains the ability of schools to make the changes nec-essary to improve the academic achievement of schools," Wilkinson said in a new sonference to release his education platform.

"The focus of this plan is on ed tion and not on the administration the educational system," he said.

The complaint he hears most often is that schools are tied up in the red tape of state administrative regulations, Wilkinson said.

"I want to remove any obstacle that could be identified as truly restrictive on school improvement," he said. "I'm not saying we're going to wipe out every regulation. We're going to remove that as an excuse not to perform."

Regulations for elementary and secondary education are established by the Kentucky State Board of Education, whose members are appointed by the governor. Wilkinson said a commitment to deregulation would be a condition of his appointments.

He also pledged to "do everything n my power" as governor to get a ottery bill passed and placed on the allot, since it would require an mendment of the Kentucky Consti-

Numerous lottery bills have been introduced in past legislative sessions, but none has come close to passing. In 1986, a lottery bill introduced in the House won committee approval, but never came to a floor vote.

Despite that, Wilkinson said: "The people of Kentucky want a lottery and they want funds from that lot-ery designated for education."

He estimated, based on Florida's He estimated, based on Florida's lottery, that net proceeds from a lottery in Kentucky would be \$70 mil-lion per year. It would be split three ways the first year among a Vietnam veterans bonus, programs for senior citizens and education. Miller will be departing for Europe May 14 and will present to London audiences a program that consists of some of her favorite pianoworks. She will return to the United States in July.



Scientists develop scale measuring cancer risk

WASHINGTON — Scientists have developed a scale for ranking the potential hazard to humans in natural and man-made chemicals that cause cancer in animals, a measure they say takes into account real-life exposure to the substances. Researchers at the University of California at Berkeley said yesterday that their system — which, for example, rates a daily glass of beer as a greater cancer hazard thansome pesticide pollution — is designed to help people assess the dangers of the many reports whear about.

"Our purpose is not to scare people about an occasional raw mushroom or beer, but to help them markers of the many reports they see about this or that causing cancer in animals," Dr. Bruce N. Ames, the principal researcher, said in a telephone interview.

WASHINGTON — Progress in the mation's fight against cancer has been much more limited than suggested by federal statistics, says a congressional report released yesterday.

FCC cracks down on indecency

WASHINGTON - The Federal Communications Com-

WASHINGTON — The Federal Communications Commission, in actions against three radio stations and an amateur broadcaster yesterday, put broadcasters across the country on notice that it will impose a broader definition of indecency over the airwaves.

The commission asked the Justice Department to consider prosecuting a California radio station for broadcasting an allegedly obscene program and issued warnings to two other stations — including one airing controversial morning-show personality Howard Stern.

The FCC also warned all broadcasters it would no long-

The FCC also warned all broadcasters it would no longer limit its definition of indecency to the "seven dirty words" broadcast in a George Carlin monologue of the same name, which led to a Supreme Court decision. The agency also said broadcasting after 10 p.m. was no longer safe bazhor.

Shultz briefs president on missile proposal

PEASE AIR FORCE BASE, N.H. — Predicting a prompt decision by the NATO allies, Secretary of State George P. Shultz flew home yesterday to brief President Reagan on a Soviet proposal to unilaterally remove an entre category of nuclear missiles from Europe.

It would mean the elimination of about 50 shorterrange Soviet nuclear missiles in East Germany and Czechoslovakia, and could also involve the dismantling of about 85 other Scaleboard and Spider missiles in the Soviet Union

Shoplifting manual aids New York youths

NEWARK, N.J. — A "charismatic" shoplifting mastermind organized about 75 New York City boys into a gang of thieves and gave them a manual that targets expensive designer clothing at suburban malls in four states, authorities said yesterday.

New Jersey and New York City police said children from a Brooklyn neighborhood made weekend trips to shoplift up to \$800 worth of clothes apiece in exchange for money and drugs from the ringleader.

Police would not say whether they had identified the leader, but likened him to Charles Dickens' villain Fagin, who controls young pickpockets in the novel "Oliver Twist."

The major, Ernesto Barreiro, took refuge in Regiment 14 late Wedhesday in defiance of federal judges seeking his testimony in connection with the abductions, tortures and disappearances of suspected leftists from 1976-83 at La Perla detention camp.

"There is nothing to negotiate. The Argentine democra-




