






MANILA BAY AGAIN?

recent news story told of a German lines which passed too close to one of the United State's secret islands near Manila. The purpose of this island is to help fortify Manila harbor, and the equipment and defense mechanism is not open to inspection of the public.

The United States authorities in Manila have "cited" the Germans for their action, and have opened the topic to discussion. Acts similar to this are responsible for a great deal of hard feeling between nations. Accounts of such oc-currences tend to break friendly relations, and often lead its ways.

It is a deplorable fact that nations, such as It is a deplorable fact that nations, such as Germany, are continually warring or preparing to war, and that they will not cease annoying non-belligerene powers. The United States has no quarrel with Germany. Such defenses are known to be secret, and it behooves all nations to respect this right of secrecy. It is an evident fact that something is wrong with Europe that is not wrong with North Amer.

with Europe that is not wrong with North Amer-ica. The United States and Canada have thrived side by side, and as nations, never waged a bat-tle. They have kindred blood, but other reasons for such harmony must be present. The fore-most explanation is that the countries trust each

One of the outstanding difficulties in Europe coday is the lack of trust between the countries Greece recently desired to reopen the subject of repudiated war debts. This is taken as an indi-cation that they realize that denial of bills will lead to hard feelings, and that this is probably

and South America is taking shape. Such a plan is a healthy one, and should be successful. It is a strange procedure for the United States to get into an "American Court," after refusing to enter the World Court. We were kept out on the grounds that we did not want to take part in foreign affairs, and that in case of war we could stay out. We can stay out of European wars. The question is, "Will we?"

If European countries get too inquisitive, as in the case of Germany's liner ,'Reliance' last week, we may build up such a sentiment that war cannot be avoided. Canada has never been war cannot be avoided. Canada has never been accused of prying into our secret affairs. Europe could learn a lesson from her in this respect. Our friendship has been built on mutual re-spect. As long as this feeling exists there will be no war. Let us hope the "old countries" do not force us to lose our heads over insignificant in-

THERE MAY BE SOMETHING IN THE IDEA

Just 100 years ago the first organized attempt Just 100 years ago the first organized attempt to prevent the recurrence of a foreign war was made by a group of men in this country. Today a new kind of weapon to fight the same enemy is being employed by the college youth of the nation: RIDICULE.

The recent formation by college students of Veterans of Future Wars, Gold Star Mothers of Future Wars and later the International Order of Diplomats, Creators of Future Wars, while of Diplomats, Creators of Future Wars, while they may in their very aim, offend other re-spectable and worthwhile organizations, are striking at the problem from a new angle and with a new kind of weapon; and they may prove more effective against the old foe than have other and older weapons. Certainly, they cannot fail to do so well as have the others.

The newest of these organizations based upon ridicule, the I. O. of D., C. of F. W. has a slightto "making the next war as devastating as possible," omitting any mention of collecting bonsible," omitting any mention of collecting bon-uses and the like. It should be understood, of course, that the V. F. W. has no serious inten-tion of trying to collect future bonuses. It is merely part of the scheme to make war busi-ness as ridiculous as possible.

One thing that the V. F. W. and the other or-ganizations may have not intended to

ganizations may have or have not intended to do is now becoming apparent and may prove to the best premise in the entire symposium. We refer to the dissociation of pacifistic groups with the radical element. Many people have in the past attributed peace movements with socialispast attributed, peace movements with socialis-tic or liberal organizations and have been hesi-tant to declare themselves. Now it may be rea-lized that such is not the case and that a group of above average Americans such as our coll-legiate student bodies are, is ample evidence that a cross section of such a group cannot and is not attached to any kind of radical or socialis-tic overalization. tic organization.

When the storm which has greeted the appearances of these new clubs clears away, it may be found that they are contributing some worth-while ideas to the cause of world peace. 
