## Two days later, South Campus shooter still unknown

### UK police searching for leads

When a bullet came through her dorm room window early Sunday morning, Anna Campomanes had been asleep for almost an hour. She woke up to the startling sound of gunshots and quickly ran down the hall to the 12th floor lobby of Kirwan Tower.

"I saw a couple of police, but all the sudden there were 16 cop cars and I realized, this is really serious," the pre-nursing freshman said.

When she didn't see anyone get into the ambulance, she returned to her room and tried to go back to bed, but was having trouble sleeping when she noticed the blinds were messed up.

"I tried to fix it because I thought I had done it," she said. That was when she saw the bullet hole. "I was like 'Holy crap, is this a bullet hole? Oh my gosh.'"

The bullet that entered Campomanes' room was one of about 10 that police believe were fired at around 3:18 a.m. The police originally believed that about six shots were fired, but have since found more shell casings, said Maj. Joe Monroe.

About 100 people, both students and non-students, had gathered in the courtyard of the complex to watch what police believe to have been a fraternity-related step show when a verbal altercation between two individuals turned into a physical one, Monroe said.

Roscoe Dalton, who is not a UK student, was involved in the fight and was treated for cuts on his face and lip and an injury to the back of his head, Monroe said. Police do not know who else was involved in the fight or had any leads in the identity of the person who fired the gun, but they are reviewing "a lot" of

## Three file elections claims

Unlike last year, no violations alleged against prez candidates

Three elections violations claims are now under investigation after last week's relatively smooth Student Government elections.

Two claims accuse SG Senate candidates of hanging posters in unauthorized spots around campus. The final violation report claims that someone campaigned for presidential candidate Jonah Brown — who won the election — too close to the polls.

John Edwards, elections investigator for SG and outgoing general manager of WRFL-FM campus radio, said the claims didn't seem too serious overall.

"It was a relatively clean election, if this is all that's coming from it," Edwards said. "Some of these are simple mistakes."

Edwards said the violations wouldn't cause anything near the controversy that came last year after spending violations by presidential candidates sparked a dispute that didn't produce a clear winner until five months later, when a Fayette Circuit Court awarded the presidency to Becky Ellingsworth. UK initially appealed the ruling but later dropped its request.

Brittany Pauly a member of the SG Election Board of Supervisions that monitors the election, filed a claim against an unknown person campaigning for Brown in the classroom building.

Campaigns are not allowed to be conducted within 25 feet of the polls, and Pauly says she saw the person lobbying for Brown; at the time, however, she was working at a poll and couldn't investigate the incident.

"That one's going to take some time to figure out who exactly it was," Edwards said. He said he has established that the person wasn't Brown or his running mate, Mallory Jenkins.

Brown said he had not heard any specifics of claims but that he would cooperate if he needed.

"Those rules are important in monitoring the integrity of the election," Brown

## Republican leader DeLay decides to call it quits

WASHINGTON — Rep. Tom DeLay, R-Texas, a primary architect of the Republican majority who became one of the most powerful and feared leaders in Washington, told House allies last night he will give up his seat rather than face a re-election fight that appears increasingly unwinnable.

The decision came three days after his former deputy chief of staff, Tony C. Rudy, pleaded guilty to conspiracy and corruption charges, telling federal prosecutors of a criminal enterprise being run out of DeLay's leadership offices. Rudy's plea agreement did not implicate DeLay in any illegal activities, but by placing the influence-buying efforts of disgraced Republican lobbyist Jack Abramoff directly in DeLay's operation, the former aide may have made an already difficult re-election bid all but out of reach.

DeLay, who will turn 59 on Saturday, did not say precisely when he would step down, but under Texas law, he must either die, be convicted of a felony, or move out of his district to be removed from the November ballot. DeLay told Time magazine that he is likely to change his official residence to Alexandria, Va., by the end of May. He said he informed President Bush of his decision yesterday afternoon.

"This had become a referendum on me," he told Time in an article posted on the magazine's Web site. "So it's better for me to step aside and let it be a referendum on ideas, Republican values and what's important for this district."

"I'm a realist. I've been around awhile," he added. "I can evaluate political situations." Asked if he had done anything illegal or immoral in public office, DeLay replied: "No."

## When the going gets turf

Grounds crew works daily to maintain all of UK's athletic fields

The plate on his desk reads "Til the Battle is Won," the motto of the UK athletic department.

But for Donnie Mefford, UK's sports turf manager, that battle is always being waged.

In more ways than not, Mefford is the man behind the magic for most of the major sports teams at UK.

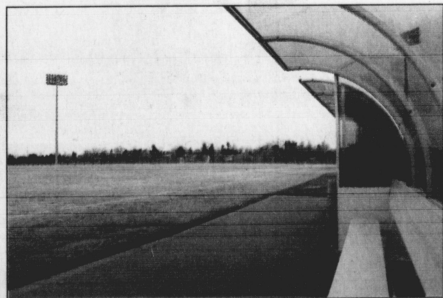
"I work specifically with the athletic department on all of the fields here at UK," Mefford said. "My crew is responsible for the day-to-day maintenance and game preparation of six different sports fields."

His territory includes Commonwealth Stadium, Shively Field (baseball), the soccer and softball complexes and outdoor facilities for tennis and track and field. His maintenance crew works year-round to help with the upkeep and appearance of each of the playing fields, a task that requires work that never seems finished.

Put simply at any given point in the year, there is some team playing on some field at UK. Mefford is responsible for those fields.

"We don't have down time," Mefford said. "Schedules are always expanding."

## Katie Couric set to leave NBC's 'Today' show

NBC executives expect Katie Couric to leave the "Today" show and accept an offer from CBS to become the first woman to anchor an evening newscast on her own, with an announcement of her departure likely as early as this week, according to well-placed sources at both networks and others familiar with the negotiations.

The tentative plan is for a two-step process in which Couric first announces her departure from NBC, which would like to give her a warm send-off after a decade in which she helped make "Today" the top-rated morning program. Meredith Vieira, co-host of ABC's "The View" and host of the syndicated "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire," has been offered the job of replacing Couric and is seriously considering it, some of these sources say.

An announcement that Couric will succeed Bob Schieffer as anchor of the "CBS Evening News" will come later, in part because the final contractual details — which will include a regular spot on "60 Minutes" — have not been worked out, the sources say. They spoke on condition of anonymity because the contract talks have not been completed.

Couric's pending departure has been the focus of intense media speculation, both because of her celebrity and the historic nature of the move. Three women — Barbara Walters at ABC, Connie Chung at CBS and Elizabeth Vargas, who was elevated in January at ABC's "World News Tonight" — have co-anchored alongside men. But Couric would be the first woman in broadcast network history to fly solo at 6:30 p.m. Couric's spokesman declined to comment Monday, as did the press offices at NBC and CBS.

**When cell phone rage turns deadly**

WASHINGTON — To paraphrase the Marine Corps Rifleman's creed: This is my cellphone. There are many like it, but this one is mine. My cellphone and myself know that what counts is not the calls we make or the cuteness of our ring tone. We know that it is the hits that count. We will hit.

Hit: Rep. Cynthia McKinney, D-Ga., is accused of "stabbing" or "jabbing" a Capitol Hill policeman with her cellphone Wednesday. The office wants to press charges against her, according to Capitol police sources.

Hit: Handcuffed supermodel Naomi Campbell was led away from her Park Avenue apartment Thursday and arraigned on second-degree assault charges after she allegedly hit her housekeeper's head with a cellphone, according to the New York Post. This is the third Naomi Campbell phone assault reported since 1998. It is my life.

The Post quoted a "law enforcement source" saying, "She's another Russell Crowe."

Hit: Actor Crowe, you recall, was arrested last June for assaulting a New York Times staffer with a telephone, and booked for "fourth-degree criminal possession of a weapon," which was the phone.

Meanwhile, the "cellphone bandit," Candice Martinez, stuck up four Virginia banks last year while talking on a cellphone. 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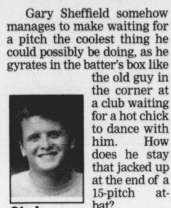
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## In a fast-paced world, baseball ultimate relaxant

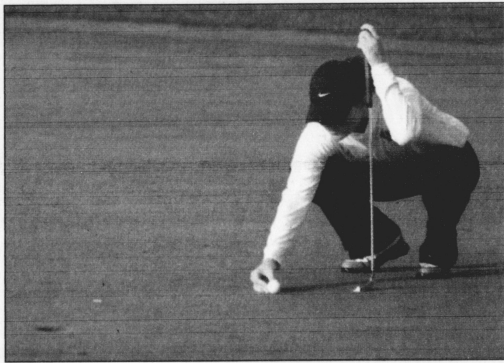

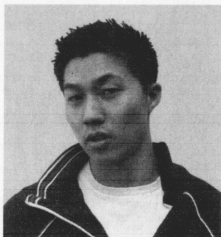
**NIEVES Fernando, New York, NY**

**DANIELSON Zack, Atlanta, GA**

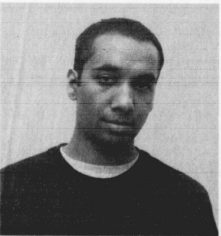

**KUMAR Bharat, Jacksonville, FL**

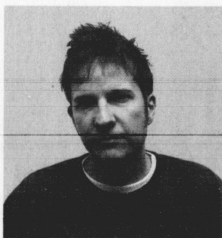

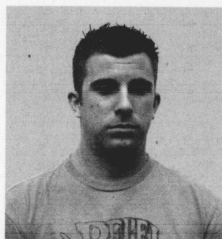


**FOX Jon, London, UK**

Well, like the title of the article in a recent *BusinessWeek* magazine suggests, "You Are What You Post."

Facebook.com and other online personal information networks, such as blogs, have haunted people (including students) in just about every facet. Pictures and profiles, linked to any individual, have had the capability of leading to such things as alcohol-related citations and even athletic team

reprimands, dependent on the nature of content.

And now, for you future job seekers, beware of an additional threat.

Because of its rising popularity, everyone is in on it. That means even potential employers.

videotape from different dormitory surveillance cameras, Monroe said.

While police are still gathering additional information from witnesses, they don't have any "good, strong leads" on the shooting, he said.

"Somebody out there saw what happened, and we need them to come forward," Monroe said.

Carrie McDonald, a finance freshman, said she originally called the police

to complain about the loud noise coming from outside that had woken her up. Though she didn't see the incident, she said she heard gunshots and thought people were shooting off fireworks.

After going outside to see what was happening, McDonald said she realized that wasn't the case.

"We thought, 'Oh no, they're not fireworks,'" she said. "Everyone was scattering and panicking."

Wayne Centers, Kirwan's hall director, said police were present when he went outside to see what was happening.

"There was a bit of confusion ... people were scattering a lot," Centers said.

Brian Williams, hall director for Kirwan Tower, declined comment about the

incident when reached last night.

Informational fliers about the incident have been posted in Kirwan Tower, Campomanes said. She added that she's not really shaken by the incident.

"I come from a metropolitan area [near Washington, D.C.] where this stuff happens," she said. "I was initially shaken up because there was a bullet in my bedroom. I'm as safe as I was before, I feel."

"It wasn't directed at me," she said. "Someone was just being really, really stupid. I would assume that it's a one-time thing."

said, adding that it's also important for SG to move on from the election and have a smooth transition into next year.

"I think it's crucial this year in particular, just because of the scrutiny we're (SG) under," Brown said.

Another claim was filed by law student Justin Hykes, who was not affiliated with any campaign. Candidates, as well as any other students, can file violation

claims. Hykes' claim states that Tom Rauf, who won election to become the senator for the College of Law, hung a poster inside the polling area in the Law Building.

A final claim was filed by Brad Harstock, a food science freshman. His claim alleges that senatorial candidate Meredith Marcum, who finished second in the race for College of Agriculture senator, hung a poster on glass in the Agriculture Building. Posters are not allowed to be hung on glass.

Edwards is currently investigating each claim to see if it carries merit or not. He will then issue preliminary judgments on all claims before the SG Supreme

Court, which will meet Thursday at 5 p.m. in room 211 of the Student Center.

The court will read over each claim, hear arguments and make a formal decision at a second hearing, to be determined at the first meeting. Penalties for claims that are ruled "not valid" could range from a fine to being taken out of office, depending on the severity of the action.

This is the first time this system of handling will be used after SG reform ed it earlier this school year. The former system involved the Elections Board of Claims, which has been abolished.

game needs to be delayed or canceled due to inclement weather - as was the case three seasons ago when severe thunderstorms and torrential rain delayed the UK-University of Louisville football game.

"Three years ago, I had to make that decision to hold the game," Mefford said. "It can be nerve-racking, especially with 70,000 people in a stadium with aluminum stands."

"Their meteorology department is just remarkable," John Cohen, the men's baseball head coach, said on the turf team as weather watchers.

"Weather affects everything we do," Mefford added. "We have a live radar that monitors everything from rain to lightning."

"The turf management department's work is necessary for all the outdoor field play that is done at UK. With the efforts of turf management consistent day in and day out, players know what to expect when they step onto the field."

"The beauty of home-field advantage is you practice on it every day and you know what it's like," said Matt McAlpine,

a junior midfielder on the men's soccer team.

Cohen said it's important for a team to know what kind of field it's playing on.

"We're constantly working together," Cohen said of his relationship with the field crews. "We explain what kind of surfaces, thick or thin, we want."

Field surface in a sport like baseball is particularly important. Cohen said a fast field surface, where the turf is cut short and thin in order for the ball to bounce more and not get slowed down in higher grass, has done wonders for his team this season.

"That's right - he's talking the height of the blades of grass, a science Mefford knows all about."

"It allows the ballpark to model itself on what we as a team do best," Cohen said. His team is quick, and a field that is cut to be fast really helps them build on that characteristic, he said.

Cohen said multiple factors where the turf has helped.

"A faster surface means you don't have to adjust as much to road fields," Cohen said. Having to practice and play on a field that is naturally fast means the team is already adapted to a tougher and more fast-paced style of play. Heading to fields on the road that are slower and with thicker turf surfaces means the team holds the advantage of getting to the ball faster and holds a strategic ad-

vantage.

"We need to come in and make the field play the way our players like it," Mefford said.

"It's important when you have home-field advantage," McAlpine said. "When you have the home advantage, you know what the field is going to be like."

"The slightest mistake in grass level could mess up a play or lead to injury," he said.

McAlpine said when it comes to the soccer field, the team will tear it up and it's easy to take large chunks out of turf, especially when it rains.

"But they'll be out there just a few hours (afterward), and in a matter of two weeks, the place will be spotless and we'll be able to use that area again," he said.

For the most part, the work of Mefford and his turf management team goes almost unnoticed and is taken almost for granted.

But for Mefford, that's just fine. "Someone once told me the biggest compliment is when people don't say anything at all," Mefford said. "And that's true in the turf business."

"When people come out and don't talk about the field and are focused on the game, that's a huge compliment for us."

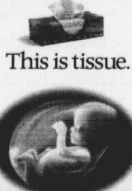

### Get informed about mayoral election

Over the weekend, two of the four Lexington mayoral candidates visited campus as part of their campaigns for the May primary.

Both Bill Farmer Jr. and Jim Newberry emphasized the importance of a connection between the city and campus, and they're right. There must be better communication and cooperation between City Hall and campus. And as repetitive as it is to say it, that can begin with more student voting.

UK students represent a large bloc of voters — that is, potential voters, because most don't take the time to do so.

Students complain about issues like the Party Plan and other local ordinances, but the only way to work to change them — yes, there's a pattern here — is voting.

Farmer and Newberry came to campus as part of a campaign fair sponsored by the UK College Democrats and the UK College Republicans, and those groups deserve credit for trying to bring the issues to campus so students can get involved.

There has been talk of a Student Government-sponsored debate for the mayoral candidates later this month, and that talk should become reality. A debate on campus would help add to the discussion and perhaps inspire more student interest.

In the past, SG has taken a lead role in trying to register

students to vote — although that drive has not always yielded results. SG should continue to keep trying to increase student involvement in local issues, especially as President-elect Jonah Brown ran on a campaign of promising a stronger student voice in Lexington affairs. He can start making good on that promise by continuing to urge students to register and speak out.

There are more than 25,000 students at UK. If students register locally and vote with a unified voice, they can have a serious effect on this November's elections for the council seat for the Third District, which contains the campus and surrounding residential areas, as well as the at-large council seats — and even the mayoral election.

In the end, the only thing that matters is whether students vote.

So, here is another not-so-subtle reminder to register and then vote.

There you can check your voting registration status in a matter of seconds.

If you're not registered, you can call 859-255-VOTE to do so. Again, this is painless — just squeeze in a couple of minutes between browsing Facebook.com and checking your e-mail.

### Event helped raise awareness of safety issues

The UK community isn't as apathetic as we thought.

More than 200 students and Lexingtonians attended Wednesday's "Take Back the Night" rally. The march from Memorial Coliseum to Memorial Hall was followed by a "Speak Out" session on the steps of Memorial Hall, led by volunteers from UK's Women's Place and survivors of rape and domestic violence.

The rally, the first of its kind on UK's campus, was meant to raise awareness and offer support to victims, and we laud both the efforts of the event organizers and everyone who showed up to support the cause.

When he addressed the crowd, recently sworn-in UK Police Chief McDonald Vick showed he's committed to increasing women's safety on cam-

pus, which has been a major concern since a 2004 study found that 36.5 percent of the 1,010 undergraduate and graduate females surveyed had experienced victimization, including physical assault and stalking, in their time at UK.

"I feel strongly about your efforts here," Vick said Wednesday in one of his first official appearances as police chief. "I want you to know I'm one of your defenders, and that we will be here for you no matter what."

It's well past time for the campus community to unite in raising awareness about violence against women. The creation of Women's Place, "Take Back the Night" and full support from UK's police department are fantastic starting points — we only hope such efforts continue.

## Lab-grown bladder transplants show promise

Researchers said yesterday that they have grown complete urinary bladders in a laboratory and transplanted them into patients, improving their health and achieving a Holy Grail of medicine: the first cultivation of working replacements for failing solid organs in people.

The "neo-bladders," each one grown in a small laboratory container from a pinch of a patient's own cells, have been working in seven young patients for an average of almost four years, according to a report released Monday by the British journal *The Lancet*. The organs have remained free of the many complications that bedevil the conventional practice of surgically constructing bladders from other tissues.

If ongoing studies continue apace, the researchers said, they hope someday to offer patients more than a dozen other homegrown organs, includ-

ing blood vessel complexes, partial kidneys and perhaps hearts.

"It was really uncharted territory in terms of how you do these things," said Anthony Atala of Wake Forest University School of Medicine in Winston-Salem, N.C., who led the work with Alan Retik at Children's Hospital and Harvard Medical School in Boston. "We're very pleased with how well they're functioning."

Experts applauded the work as a coming-of-age for the long-struggling field of tissue engineering and as a possible way to bypass some of the controversy over embryonic stem cells.

Those versatile cells stir political trouble because obtaining them requires the destruction of human embryos. Although they remain the most versatile biological building blocks, it now appears that at least some tissues, and even whole organs, can be generated without using embryonic cells.

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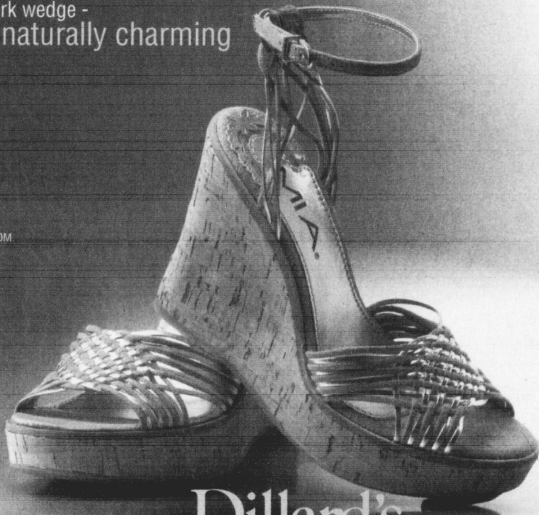
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
