

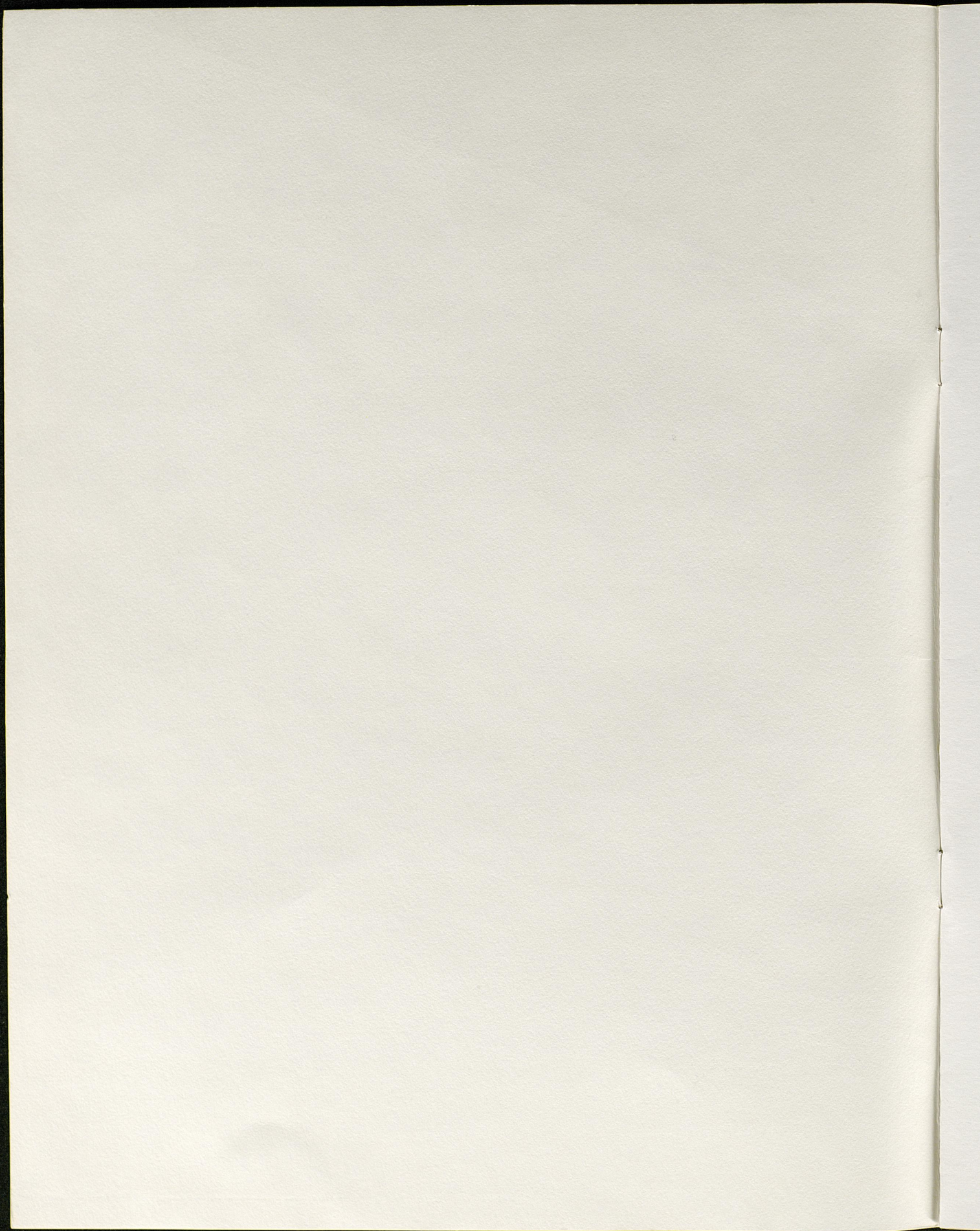

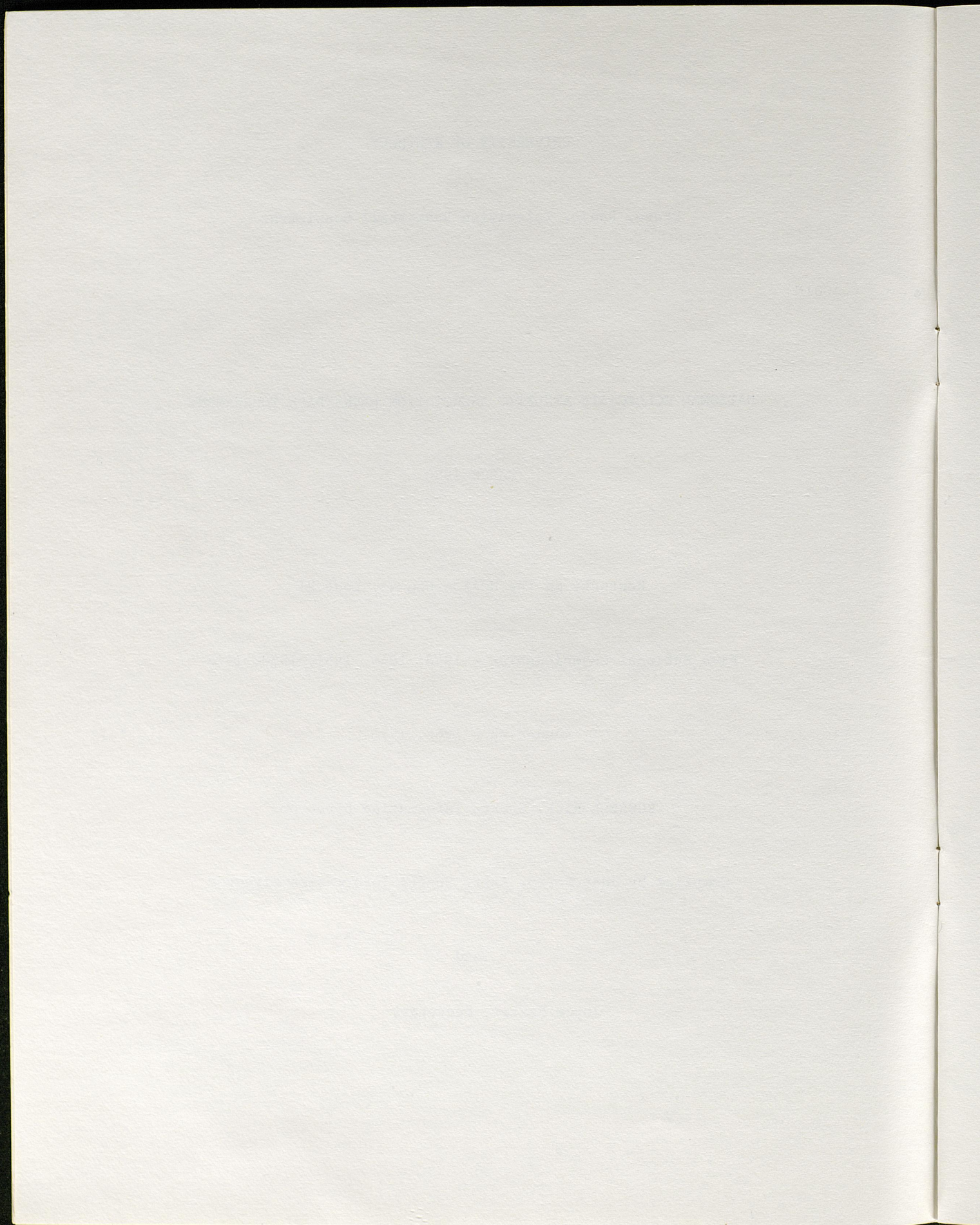

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

Athletics Department

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

JOE B. HALL — *Kentucky Head Coach*



Now in his eighth year at Kentucky, Joe B. Hall has turned in another masterful coaching job that brought the Wildcats to a 29-5 record and a No. 3 national ranking. Adding to an already glittering array of achievements, Hall's team won three championships this year—the Great Alaskan Shootout, the UKIT and Hall's fifth Southeastern Conference title.

Following a recruiting year that was judged "best in the nation," Hall worked his magic in blending talented youth with experienced upperclassmen and after trying six different starting lineups during the season, obviously found the formula of success for he is taking the Wildcats to a major post-season tournament for the seventh time in eight years.

The last time Hall had a great freshman group, he blended it with an outstanding senior class that went to the NCAA final game before losing to UCLA in 1975. That freshman group went on to win the 1978 NCAA championship.

Following Kentucky's, 70-67, win over a stubborn Ole Miss team in this year's SEC tournament, a writer asked Hall to evaluate his team's progress this season.

"It's unbelievable so young a team has come so far," he replied. "To have two freshmen in the starting lineup and a total of four in our top eight players places a huge work load on everyone—the upperclassmen, the coaches and the freshmen themselves. They have improved steadily, but to reach the level they have is unrealistic for such a youthful team."

To say that Hall has done his job well is a massive understatement. One coach whose team fell to the Cats' prowess said, "Kentucky is a magnificent team. The only possible flaw I can see is that they are so well coached, they are at times predictable."

Predictable or not, only four teams have beaten the Cats this year and three of those have been avenged. The fourth, Duke, may meet UK in the NCAA tournament in Lexington.

Under Hall's guidance, the Wildcats have won SEC Championships in 1973, '75, '77, '78 and '80, the 1976 NIT championship and six UKIT titles.

In leading the Wildcats to a 29-5 record this year, Hall upped his eight-year UK record to 183-59 (75.6 win percentage), an average of 22.9 wins per season, to keep ahead of the pace set by his former coach, Adolph Rupp, who averaged 21.5 victories a season over a 41-season span to become the winningest collegiate basketball coach of all time.

Perhaps the best appraisal of the job Hall has been doing at the University came from Rupp, who died in 1977.

"A good coach," Rupp said, "is a person who can take good material and win with it. Joe has done that."

Judging from Hall's coaching honors, Rupp was as usual, right on target with his evaluation.

Hall has won such honors as Kellogg's 1978 National "Coach of the Year," three Southeastern Conference "Coach of the Year" awards (1973, '75, and '78) in seven years, and nomination for Kodak's 1975, '76, and '78 (finalist) "Coach of the Year" awards.

Other 1978 honors include the Rupp Cup (presented to SEC Coach of the Year by the Birmingham Tipoff Club) and Hall's most coveted personal award, the Dr. James Naismith "Peachbasket" award, which previously had been awarded to UCLA's John Wooden, Oklahoma State's Hank Iba, Kentucky's Adolph Rupp and the Boston Celtics' Red Auerbach.

However, his greatest satisfaction was adding the first national championship trophy to the University collection in two decades—years that included appearances in the NCAA final games in 1966 and 1975.

The 1978 champions, which had a 30-2 record, became the sixth Wildcat team to win 30 or more games, joining such illustrious company as the 1947 NIT runner-up (34-3), the 1948 Olympic Champions (36-3), the 1949 NCAA champions (32-2), the 1951 NCAA champions (32-2), and the 1966 NCAA runner-up (32-2).

Player honors during Hall's reign include four All-Americans (Kevin Grevey, Jack Givens, Rick Robey and Kyle Macy) selected a total of nine times, and six All-Southeastern Conference honorees (Jim Andrews, Grevey, Givens, Robey, Macy and Sam Bowie) selected a total of 13 times. In addition, Robey and Macy earned Gold Medals in the Pan-American Games.

Entering the tournament, Hall's 14-year career coaching record stood at 259-110, (excluding a 17-2 record on a 1974 Australian tour, a 7-0 record on a 1978 Japan tour, and six pre-season exhibition wins against foreign and domestic teams) and that record was compiled against nationally ranked non-conference teams and teams in a conference that fast is becoming recognized as among the toughest in the nation. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five-year mark at Regis, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 183-59 record at UK.

Hall began his tour as UK head coach in rather auspicious fashion, becoming, in 1973 the first rookie coach in the SEC to be designated Coach of the Year by his fellow coaches and by Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Gathering such honors has been one of Hall's trademarks during a coaching career that began at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School in 1956 and continued through Regis College and Central Missouri State College before he returned to UK July 1, 1965, as an assistant to his former coach, Adolph Rupp.

During Hall's two years at Shepherdsville, the Rams won a Mid-Kentucky Conference title and he was named "Coach of the Year" in 1958. He then served one year as freshman coach and five years as head basketball coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he was also athletic director and earned special recognition as coach of the champion independent team in the area.

His next move was to Central Missouri, where he coached the Mules (19-6) to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and their first Christmas Tournament title in history. He was named MIAA "Coach of the Year" (1964-65).

A three-letter winner and team captain in both sports in high school at Cynthiana, Ky., he played freshman basketball and one year of varsity basketball in the "Fabulous Five" era at the University before transferring to the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., where he set a school single game scoring record and was team captain. Coach Lon Varnell, upon retirement, rated Hall as No. 1 of the three best players he ever coached.

After touring Europe with the Globetrotters in 1951, Hall returned to U.K. in 1955 to complete requirements for his B.A. and later (1964) received his M.A. at Colorado State University.

Returning to U.K. again in 1965 as assistant coach and head recruiter, he was instrumental in adopting a running-conditioning program which obviously paid huge dividends as the Wildcats capitalized on speed and endurance to offset a lack of size and advance to the championship game of the NCAA Finals. Hall then successfully recruited six prep All-Americans, including all-time U.K. scoring leader Dan Issel, to form the nucleus of a varsity team that won three straight conference championships and was followed by a team that won three more consecutive SEC titles.

Hall became No. 1 varsity assistant and head freshman Coach to Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969. His record with the freshmen was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshman Champions by the Basketball News.

During his first season as head coach, the Wildcats won their last nine conference games to sew up the SEC title.

International Flavor

Hall's basketball renown has attracted world-wide attention in international circles and has catapulted him into a much sought-after clinician and guest speaker.

He has taken Wildcat teams on tours of Australia and Japan, where he conducted clinics and shared his basketball philosophy. Following a 1978 summer tour of Japan, the Japanese were so taken with Hall's approach they sent two coaches to study the "Kentucky Way"—Mototaka Kohama in 1979 and Suehiro Nishio in 1980.

Hall was instrumental in landing an invitation to the University of Alabama for a '79 summer tour of Japan and later accepted an invitation to join the Bama delegation.

Two weeks after returning to the U.S., the Japan National Team arrived in Lexington, where Hall, serving in an advisory role, put them through the same conditioning and practice routines that have kept the Wildcats at the top of the collegiate world.

Hall's efforts never shone more brightly when the Japanese team placed 11th at the 33 team World University Games in Mexico City this summer after finishing 25th the year before. The Japanese credited Hall and the month they spent in Lexington for their dramatic climb up the International ladder of success.

In 1978, Hall coached the United States All-Stars, a group of collegians

that included five of his own players, to the first World Invitational Tournament championship with wins over Cuba, Yugoslavia and Russia. Later that summer, he conducted a series of clinics in Holland, Belgium, Yugoslavia, Israel, Greece and England.

Hall was a busy man in off-season 1979 as well, coaching the victorious East team in the East-West College All-Star game at Salt Lake City, and the Southeastern All-Stars in the Shoney Classic at Charlotte, N.C. And last Sept., he again was called upon to conduct clinics in Warsaw, Copenhagen and London.

Hall considers one of his major coaching honors came when he was named guest lecturer for the World Basketball Coaches Congress in the Canary Islands, July 1977, before some 400 coaches from the international set.

He was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee, and in 1972 served under Hank Iba in the Olympic Trials at the Air Force Academy.

While at Regis in Denver, he also coached the Capital Federal host team in the 1964 AAU tournament and was selected as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic trials at Jamaica, N.Y.

In addition to the Globetrotters, and the Australian and Japan tours with the Wildcats, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U.S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County, Ky. They have three children—Mrs. Rick Derrickson and Steve of Lexington, and Mrs. Mike Summers of Greenville, S.C.



WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

philosophy. A native of Gastonia, N. C., he lettered three years in football and twice in basketball. An outstanding collegiate player, he starred at Gaston Community College in Dallas, N. C., and at University of Tennessee-Martin. He is married to the former Claudette Hale. They have a son, Lenny, 7.

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

La., he attended Baton Rouge High School where he earned letters in basketball and football. In addition to regular coaching duties with the Wildcats, Dean's primary responsibilities will be recruiting and scouting. He is married to the former Ellen Elizabeth Anger of Jackson, Miss.

1979-80 KENTUCKY BASKETBALL SEASON SUMMARY

While expectations were high following a bumper recruiting year, the youthful, fuzzy-cheeked Kentucky Wildcats quickly grew into manhood with a typically tough Kentucky schedule, but even so, not even the crystal-ball gazers could predict the Wildcats would win three championships during regular season play and go into the NCAA Regional finals with a 29-5 record and a No. 3 national ranking.

Following a season opening overtime loss to then No. 1 ranked Duke, 82-76, the Wildcats reeled off 12 consecutive victories, including championships in the Great Alaskan Shootout and the Cats own Christmas tournament, the UKIT.

Their third championship was the toughest and it took the Cats to their last regular season game, one on the road at Louisiana State, before finally subduing the Tigers in overtime to win Kentucky's 32nd Southeastern Conference championship with a 15-3 record.

It was a season that saw the Wildcats play brilliantly in December and falter in January and then come thundering down the stretch with the poise and drive of a Secretariat.

The Cats outdueled Iona (top 20) in the finals of the Alaskan tournament, as Kyle Macy and Fred Cowan were named to the All-Tournament team. The Cats returned home for their first game in Rupp Arena and a frenzied crowd turned out for the debut of UK's prized freshmen and witnessed an 80-46 thumping of outmanned Baylor. Two days later, the Cats blitzed South Carolina, 126-81, handing Carolina coach Frank McGuire his worst ever defeat. McGuire said following the game he "had never seen a team play better than Kentucky tonight."

The Wildcats sudden prowess almost was their undoing, for two nights later, they narrowly eked out a 57-56 win at Kansas that left coach Joe B. Hall less than happy, for No. 1 ranked and unbeaten Indiana was coming to Lexington in three days.

But Hall got his youth corps back to reality and upset the Hoosiers, 69-58, after trailing by 13 points in the first half. The Wildcats bench, while filled with freshmen, paid off as subs contributed 30 points.

The Cats got into early SEC play with a rousing, 95-69, romp over Georgia at the Omni in Atlanta and then won the UKIT with a 78-52 win over California and a squeaking 61-60 win over No. 7 ranked Purdue, as Macy won MVP honors and was joined for the second time on an All-Tournament team by Cowan.

Following the UKIT, super-soph Dwight Anderson left Kentucky for personal reasons and then one day later, Hall suspended freshmen Sam Bowie and Dirk Minniefield for the Notre Dame game for violation of "long standing training rules".

The Wildcats regrouped after the sudden loss of talent and showed the world their bench was for real when they whipped Notre Dame (which was 6-0 and ranked No. 3), 86-80, on national television as freshman Derrick Hord got his first start and pulled down 11 rebounds. But the big gun, as usual, was "cool Kyle," who scored 21 points and for the second time in three years was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Entering the SEC schedule, the Cats went into their "annual slump" and after Macy beat Auburn, 67-65, with a last second shot, played a lacklustre game at Tennessee, which was without suspended seniors Reggie Johnson and Chuck Treeths, and lost 49-47. They won at tough Ole Miss, 79-73, and then returned home to absorb their worst defeat in Rupp Arena, a 78-64 loss to Alabama. But the Cats resurged, winning four in a row over Florida, Vandy, Mississippi State and Georgia before dropping a 65-60 game to LSU at Rupp Arena to throw the SEC into a tie between Kentucky, LSU, and Tennessee.

That stinging loss to LSU served as a springboard for a Kentucky surge as the Wildcats rolled off seven straight SEC wins and a 74-69 win over Las Vegas on national TV before winning the SEC title at LSU.

At the SEC tournament, it was a Kentucky-LSU rematch in the finals and this time, the Tigers upended UK by a 80-78 margin for the tournament championship.

While Macy was the catalyst for the season, Bowie's improved play and that of Fred Cowan, the team's most improved player, propelled the Wildcats back into the national picture. Macy (third time) and Bowie were named All-SEC and to the SEC All-Tournament team, while Macy was named All-American for the second time.

KENTUCKY VS. FLORIDA STATE IN THE MIDEAST FIRST ROUND - BOWLING GREEN, KY.

The Wildcats powered their way into the Regional finals at Rupp Arena in Lexington with a 97-78 thrashing of Metro Conference tournament runner-up Florida State Sunday before a Kentucky dominated crowd of 12,100 screaming fans in the E. A. Diddle Arena at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green.

FSU opened scoring on a jumper by Elvis Rolle, but the Wildcats ran off 10-consecutive points and that set the tone of the game as UK continued the blitz to lead 49-27 at halftime. UK's All-American Kyle Macy scored 14-first half points, while 7-1 freshman Sam Bowie controlled the boards with nine. UK outrebounded the Seminoles by a whopping 34-13 margin but shot a cool 42.5 per cent from the field.

Both teams lost two players each on personal fouls and were further hampered when FSU had three and UK with two players with four each. Kentucky's bench strength was never more evident when the Wildcat subs outscored FSU's bench by a 38-8 margin. UK placed five in double-figures - Macy 16, Fred Cowan and LaVon Williams 14, Bowie 13 and Jay Shidler 10, while Charles Hurt, Derrick Hord and Chuck Verderber had eight, Tom Heitz 4 and Dirk Minniefield 2.

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
