Officials discuss Haney's

Lexington Police, state government officials mull over conflicting stories

Police and state government officials met yesterday to discuss the ongoing investigation of Haney's Tavern, a bar that UK athletes frequently visit.

The investigation — involving Lexington-Fayette Urban County Police, Pulaski County Sheriff's Department, the state Alcohol Beverage Control department and the County Attorney's Office—began after the Nov. 15 accident that killed UK football transfer Arthur Steinmetz, 19, and Eastern Kentucky University student Christopher Scott Brock, 21.

UK football player Jason Watts, 21, lost control of his pickup truck while driving the three to a Pulaski County farm, where they were going to hunt. Watts was seriously injured. All three were legally drunk, police said.

James Haney Jr. and his wife, Helen, told media sources conflicting stories about whether the three had been at the bar and in their home — which adjoins the bar — that night, said Asst. Chief Fran Root of the Lexington Police.

"The Haneys made a statement in the press that the people had been there prior to (their accident). Right on its face, there's something wrong there," he said.

Root also cited the death of UK stu-dent Chad Clore, 19, just nine days before the accident as another reason for the in-vestigation.

Clore had been at Haney's home with Watts and several others and was killed when he stumbled in front of a passing train. Blood tests show that he was drunk, and police have ruled his death an

U.S. urges Israel to enforce accord WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration dismissed new Israeli conditions for a pullback on the West Bank and demanded yesterday that the Wye accord with the Palestinians "should be implemented as signed." At the same time, the U.S. spokesman condemned an attack on an Israeli soldier he said "is clearly the kind of violence that has no place in the peace process." The Israeli government said yesterday it is suspending further troop withdrawals until Palestinians publicly abandon plans to declare a state in May and acknowledge that Israel did not agree to release Palestinian prisoners who have committed acts against Israel. The government said its decision was prompted in part by the attack.

WASHINGTON — Neither party wasted any time sending their staff members to the Justice Department yesterday to read fund-raising memojust unsealed by a federal judge in impeachment hearings against President Clinton. U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson ruled that it was in the public interest for one Republican and one Democratic member of the Judiciary Committee staff to see the memos. Republican chief investigator David Schippers went for the Republicans and staff member Kevin Simpson for the Democrats.

Indonesia govt. meets with students

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Indonesia's student leaders met with senior government officials yesterday, after about 1,500 students converged outside the presidential palace. After an hour of negotiations, student leaders held talks with President B. J. Habbile's millitary secretary, two-starv leaders leaders held talks with President B. J. Habbile's millitary secretary, two-starv leaders half with the students demanded that military chief Gen. Wiranto be held accountable for the Nov. 13 deaths of the nine students and said former President Suharto should be investigated for corruption and sent to trial before a general election next June.



U.S. declassifies Pinochet files

SANTIAGO, Chile — Chile's foreign minister yesterday praised a U.S. decision to declassify some secret files on abuses during Gen. Augusto Pinochet's 1973-90 dictorship. "I wish they would declassify all the documents so we could learn much more about things that happened in Chile during those years," Jose Miguel Insulza said. The more-secret U.S. intelligence files provide evidence linking Pinochet and his military regime to alleged crimes in the repression of dissidents, including assassinations.

Bad weather may halt launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Bad weather forecast on both sides of the Atlantic threatened to delay the liftoff tomorrow of NASA's first space station construction flight. Clouds and rain were expected to move ashore. That could force NASA to scrub space shuttle Endeavour's predawn launch with the first American-built piece of the international space station. What's more, cloudy skies and fog were forecast for the emergency landing sites in Spain and Morocco. NASA will not launch unless at least one of those sites is usable.

Classes are almost over, and everyone knows what that means: students no longer need their text-books. Student Government

Student Government Association is offering a service that provides a good deal for both buyers and sellers of textbooks. SGA got together with a book swap sponsored by university solutions com, adding a link on its web page to the company's site. There, students can post their books for sale or look for books to buy.

"Students should realize that by selling their books in this way (through the book swap), they're nelping other students and 23 books.

only helping themselves, they're helping other students," said Nate Brown, SGA president.

Students looking for books can search by course type, book title, book author, even book identification number. Or they can perform a general search of all books at a given university. Sellers are contacted by potential buyers via e-mail, or by phone, if they choose to give out their number.

UK policies to be examined

SGA, academic ombud take close look at dead week, cheating and plagiarism guidelines

The Student Government Association is looking at proposals to improve dead week policy SGA representatives said.

Last week, SGA met to discuss provisions of the current dead week policy and to discuss the cheating and plagiarism problems among the UK students.

The current dead week policy does not allow for enough study time before finals, the representatives said.

tives said.

While dead week should be used purely for study time, it often becomes the due dates for class assignments, they said. Possible solutions discussed were to add extra study days, to restrict assignments due that week or to lengthen the finals week to two weeks.

"Of course, the majority of instructors respect the idea of a true 'dead week,' but there is a group which do give due dates on papers during this week as well as have quizzes." said 'vincent Fields, the SGA senator who brought up the topic. "I believe that an improved policy can deter this behavior to have a dead week that is actually dead." Under a new dead week policy, students could use extra study time to make better grades on their finals, UK Academic Ombud Jeff Dembo said. But adding extra days would mean UK would have to either extend its calendar year or take days away from breaks. If finals were extended to two weeks, students' exam schedules could be even more spread out than now, he said.

Cheating and plagiarism

problems are also under discussion by SGA. The current minimum punishment for cheating and plagiarism in class is an E on the final transcript without the repeat option. There is no indication on the transcript why a student that cheated received the E. SGA members decided last week that the transcripts should be marked in some way so that the student is punished when trying to get into graduate schools or find jobs.

Some SGA members thought this plan might be too harsh, and another idea was introduced as a compromise. The idea was to leave the marking on the student's transcript for three years. This would give freshman and some sophomores room to learn from past mistakes, but would still punish juniors and seniors who should know better.



Hyped No. 6 Kansas no match for Cats' firsthalf intensity; loss is Williams' worst in nine years as head coach of storied program

Even against a highly regarded Jayhawks squad, the Cats found time to give some key minutes to reserves.

UK coach Tubby Smith said those minutes were key to UK's ability to fight off a Kurally in the final minutes.

"(Tayshaun Prince) and Jules (Camara), and also Saul (Smith), have done a good job of stepping up and making me feel confident that I can leave (the starters) on the bench for a little longer rest," the head coach said. All three contributed in the rout. Prince was 44fo-9 from the field with 10 points and three assists. Camara tossed in four points, four rebounds and two huge blocks in seven minutes. And Smith, who relieved a benched with fouls Wayne Turner most of the first half, added seven points and six rebounds. Tubby Smith said it was those minutes that helped Turner return in the second half and lead all scorers with 14 points.
"I think that's one reason

turn in the second half and lead all scorers with 14 points.
"I think that's one reason why Wayne plays so well down the stretch of every game," the coach said. "He's always well-rested. That's why he's one of the best point guards in the country. He's definitely the leader of this team."

Senior Heshimu Evans said there are no starters and reserves on this team, everyone is equal.

reserves on this team, everyone is equal.

"Everyone on this team accepts everyone else, and that makes everybody feel confident that they can step up and do their jobs," he said. "Tonight, we felt like we had to come out as a starting five and set a standard. And then the guys running in off the bench matched that standard."

Many of Turner's 14 points came from the free throw line, a place he has struggled from in his last three years at UK. He was 6 of 8 from the line – a whopping 12 of 16 in the last three games. Smith said it gives him confidence knowing that Turner can hold up under

pressure in tighter games.

But Turner seemed most impressed with his ability to cruise past defenders into the lane and make easy layups.

"I noticed a lot of open driving lanes, and I exploited that right off the bat," the senior said. "My eves just get bigger and bigger when I see that. Any time I see a lane, I'm going to try to get in there and create. Great things happen for us with me doing that."

When he discovered that the Cats held Kansas to 45 points, coach Roy Williams' lowest point total in his 10-plus years as coach at KU, he was caught off guard.

"Oh, wow," he said.

Down, not out

Another senior captain, Scott Padgett, continued to struggle from the field. He shot just 3 of 6 and scored eight points in the game.

When asked if it is a mental, not so much a technique problem. Padgett agreed. He said when he gets the ball, a need to be mentally ready to shoot.

"When I get the ball, I need to be mentally ready to shoot it," he said. "I think if I can just do that, I'll eliminate a lot of my problem. What I have to do is keep playing hard, focus on defense and rebounding, and I'll turn things around."

Despite shooting woes, Padgett had plenty to say about the Bulls locker room where the Cats hung out before and after the game. While in their practice locker room, Padgett noticed that both Michael Jordan's and Scottle Pippen's lockers were the only ones locked. "We were trying to break it open and stuff." he said. "We wanted to see what he was hiding in there. He and Pippen were like the only ones with those locks. Rodman just had all his stuff hanging out of there. He didn't care who saw it. When asked what Rodman had left "hanging out," Padgett replied, jokingly, "You know, feather boas and stuff."



In fact, it's going to make the rest of the houses in surrounding areas look like a bunch of horse barns. It might even serve as a swift kick in the rear for all other fraternities to come up with similar housing or face a declining number of pledges.

It might even lead to the quicker declaration of certain housing as unfit for living (can you say "Sigma Chi"?). This is a problem that will soon face many more Greek houses unless improvements start being made.

In a recent appeal to the state committee that oversees capital building projects, George DeBin. UK's vice president for Fiscal Affairs, successfully lobbied to have the project scope increased to \$7.5 million, up from the previous scope of about \$6 million.

Before you get all worked up about the state giv-ing SAE another \$1.5 million, understand that this only means the state gave its approval to the in-creased donations from other sources, such as

Wouldn't you be ticked off if UK gave a significant chunk of money to a small group of individuals who were recently punted from campus for hazing pleages? Well, they have, and, well, we're ticked.

It strikes us as more than a bit odd that UK, which has received shrinking financial support from the state, has a microscopic endowment fund compared with benchmark institutions, and recently implemented an enormous tuition increase that affects all students.


