Bush, McCain battle in Michigan

SAGINAW, Mich. — Pointing toward today's GOP presidential primary clashes in Michigan and Arizona, John McCain accused George W. Bush yesterday of waging a campaign of "character assassination." Bush, the front-runner, aimed his public barbs at President Clinton and Vice President Gore. McCain has said even if he loses in Michigan, he'll stay in the race at least until March 7. That's when California, New York, Ohio and many other states vote in the biggest night of the primary season.

Nader in presidential race

Ralph Nader announced his candidacy for president Monday on the Green Party ticket. Nader, who turns 66 this month, has pressed for campaign finance overhaul, environmental protection, workers rights and trade-law changes, employing a network of nonprofit organizations. Nader often shows disdain for the political process and has suggested that the Republicans and Democrats leave voters with a choice between "Tweedle-Dum and Tweedle-Dee." He hinks third parties offer voters an alternative.

Shuttle finishes mapping

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Their mapping of Earth completed, space shuttle Endeavour's astronauts pulled in their 197-foot radar antenna mast and latched it down for the trip home. The astronauts surveyed three-quarters of the Earth's terrain, yielding data that will be used to produce 3-D maps of the planet. The shuttle was scheduled to return to Cape Canaveral tomorrow, but NASA said the landing may be switched to Edwards Air Force Base in California because of clouds and high wind forcests at Canaverae.

Iran reformers win key seats

TEHRAN, Iran — Reformists led in voting for most of Tehran's parliament seats Monday and looked set to sweep there - a victory that would guarantee them a parliamentary majority with dozens of other seats still left to be decided nationwide. The results sent a clear message to the hard-line clerety that frantas are fed up with their 21-year restrictive rule that dictates day-today lives.

President Mohamed Khatami, who has advocated dismantling many social and political restrictions since he came to power in 1897.

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Ehud Barak outlined his post-withdrawal strategy from Lebanon for the first time yesterday, and he threatened that the Israeli army will retaliate harshly if Lebanese guerrillas attack after the towithdraw through an agreement with Syria. However, he repeated his pledge to withdraw from Lebanon by July, with or without an agreement.

Journalist Clifton Daniel dies

NEW YORK — Clifton Daniel, who served as managing editor of The New York Times (1964-69) after working as a foreign correspondent, died yesterday at 87. He died at home in New York of a stroke and heart disease, the Times said on its Web site, quoting his wife, Margaret Truman Daniel, the daughter of former President Harry Truman.

NEW YORK — Most European and Asian stocks fell Monday amid concerns that higher interest rates in the United States would hurt corporate profits. U.S. markets were closed for Presidents Day.

Letterman is back at work

NEW YORK — David Letterman, on his first show back after quintuple bypass surgery, fought back tears as he thanked the doctors and nurses who "saved my life." The show, taped on Friday, was to air last night. Letterman, who brought his xi doctors and two nurses onstage, looked thinner, but otherwise healthy five weeks after his operation. He joked about the surgery, and, as expected, a variety of other topics.



This past Saturday, as voters turned out in large numbers determined to change the future via the South Carolina presidential primaries, many were reminded of a not-so-distant past.

Many voters ready to cast their ballots showed up at their official polling sites only to find the sites closed.

South Carolina's Republican Party promised last week that all state-designated polling places would be open for its primary in the tightly contested running between George W. Bush and John McCain. However, by late Thursday afternoon, it was decided 300 of the polling locations would not be open on Saturday morning. This despite a federal court order made the previous Monday that ruled that the exact opposite should take place.

As a result of the problems arising from these closings and consolidations of polling sites around the state. Sen. McCain is demanding a "full investigation" by the national Republican Party leadership. McCain is completely right to do so.

Whether Gore, Bush, Bradley, McCain or anyone else was affected negatively by the inability of voters to get to their designated polling spot to begin with.


