

UK Parking spends \$73,000 on three SUVs

UK Parking and Transportation personnel are patrolling campus in three new 2004 Toyota Highlanders which cost a little more than \$24,000 to purchase.

While the money does not come from students' tuition, it does come from the money the department collects throughout the year, most of which comes from parking permits.

UK officials said that because of the types of jobs they do with their cars, they didn't have much leeway in selecting vehicles.

"Due to the nature of our work, I don't see what other options we have," said Don Thornton, director of parking and transportation services.

Over the summer, UK

bought the four-wheel-drive sport utility vehicles at \$24,358 each. The three SUVs replace a pair of nine-year-old vehicles — a Chevrolet Astro van and a Chevrolet S-10 pick-up truck — from the service fleet.

The department currently has eight other vehicles in service. The Highlanders — along with an Astro, a Chevrolet Blazer SUV, a GMC Sonoma truck and a Ford Explorer SUV — are equipped with four-wheel drive.

Two other GMC Sonoma trucks, another Chevrolet Astro and a Ford Ranger truck are equipped with standard two-wheel drive.

Though other SUVs, such as the Pontiac Vibe, were considered, Thornton said the deciding factor in the end were consumer reports.

tainly had a lot to do with it," Thornton said. "Once we looked at consumer reports versus other vehicles, it was easy to decide."

UK's purchasing department conducted a bid process with local car dealerships and ended up buying the Highlanders from the lowest bidder — Toyota South in Richmond, Ky.

One of the Highlanders is now in use by the parking and transportation supervisor. Other parking enforcement officers use the other two cars.

Thornton said UK also brought in the cars to help

UK comedian draws from 'bad words' of youth

Ross Duncliffe on ...

Ross Duncliffe said he discovered stand-up comedy by accident right along with a whole new interesting set of words.

"When I was about five years old, my dad bought a Billy Joel tape," recounted the communications junior and host of UK's Comedy Caravan shows. "But when he put it in the tape player, it wasn't Billy Joel; it was Eddie Murphy's 'Delirious' ... probably the most famous comedy routine that he's done."

And yes, Murphy used all kinds of words Billy Joel would surely never use.

That of course explains why Duncliffe kept the tape in "a secret hiding place" in the family basement.

"I was listening to it," Duncliffe said, "and I could tell that he was making people laugh, but I didn't know what standup comedy was."

"And I definitely knew that they were 'bad words,'" he said. "I was just shocked that somebody was actually allowed to say that. But that shaped my vocabulary from a young age."

Duncliffe's interest in comedy continued as he grew older, and in July 1998, seeing Chris Rock perform convinced him he had to try his hand at it.

"I was watching Chris Rock on television, and I just decided: I think I could do that," he said.

"The first time I got on stage was May of 2000, at the Comedy Caravan in Louisville," during open-mic sessions, Duncliffe said. "Then the second time, a week later, at Comedy Off Broadway in Lexington, I did a different five-minute bit, and I still made a lot of people laugh."


But then — the third time was horrible.

"I got onstage," he said, "and I tried ... a third different routine, and I completely bombed out! And for the next ten times on stage, once again, I wasn't getting anything. No laughs whatsoever."

"It took a while to get back on the horse," Duncliffe said. The laughs started coming back at about his eleventh try.

He learned he didn't have to say something new every time. Other comedians, he said, had spent probably five or six years developing their single routines and he was trying to do fully original comedy every time.

Since then, Duncliffe spent two

summers training at the Second City comedy club in Chicago and in 2002 was voted "The Funniest Man in Lexington" by Comedy Off Broadway.

"His prize was a job with us," said Tom Sobel, president of Comedy Caravan's parent company, TSM Artists. "Ross contacted me indicating that he'd like to see comedy as regular programming on UK campus, and I said, 'Great. Contact the people in the Student Activities Office.'"

The Caravan's performances have been going since fall 2003, said Winn Stevens, former assistant director for student activities. "I don't know how Ross found me," Stevens said, "but he came by the office and said he was a comedian and that he had won the Comedy Off Broadway contest."

Stevens and Duncliffe decided he would emcee the shows and do his own stand-up routines. Duncliffe has been doing that since.

"I think he's been great."

Comedy Caravan grows after year at UK Cats Den

After two semesters of Tuesday night shows in the Cats Den of the Student Center, UK's Comedy Caravan is adding weekly Wednesday performances too.

"The series is going so well this year that the university is concerned, because they'd like to have every student be able to see it," said Tom Sobel, president of Comedy Caravan's parent company.

Too many students were coming to some of the Tuesday shows, Sobel said, which could violate fire codes.

Also, the popular Laugh Track Live performances at Two Keys Tavern were canceled recently, leaving another comedy void.

Attendance there had dwindled after passage of Lexington's smoking ban, said UK Comedy Caravan emcee and communications junior Ross Duncliffe.

Florida comedian Dale Jones is up next in the Cats Den, slated to do shows on both Tuesday and Wednesday at 8 p.m.

"It's paid for by the Student Center, and the shows are free to all students," Duncliffe said.

Sobel said they're interested in getting students to perform for each other.

"We'd like to identify students with interest in comedy, stand-up, improv, magic, anything," Sobel said. "We're interested in identifying and supporting young talent."

Amateur comedians can only hone their talents as if they were pros, Sobel said.

"A musician can learn and rehearse in a room by himself," he said. "But a comedian can only learn and work in a room with a live audience. Can we find who the funniest student is at UK?"

"Everybody wants to go where there's a crowd," Sobel said. "And later you can say, 'Yeah, I saw (a performer) on campus at Comedy Caravan before he became a star.'"

Feds: student conspired with 'shoe bomber'

WASHINGTON — Federal authorities on Monday accused a 25-year-old student already in custody in Britain of conspiring with "shoe bomber" Richard Reid to bring down a Paris-to-Miami flight, saying he may have had designs on destroying other aircraft and targets.

The seven-count indictment, unsealed Monday, in

Boston, accuses Sajid Mohammed Badat of attempted murder, trying to destroy an aircraft and aiding and abetting Reid.

Last month, he pleaded not guilty in a British court to charges of plotting to blow up aircraft. He is scheduled to go on trial there in February.

"We believe that it is appropriate that he face justice in the United States of America, and we will seek his ex-

tradition," U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft said at a news conference announcing the indictment.

The indictment alleges that in September 2001, Badat and Reid began communicating through a series of clandestine e-mail accounts — plotting shoe-bomb attacks against American interests "including but not limited to bombing American aircraft in flight."

transport essential personnel on campus during inclement weather, especially when Plan B — UK's bad weather protocol for employees to report to work — goes into effect.

The Highlanders will serve as substitutes for UK's regular bus fleet, he said.

"Especially with a large medical center, sometimes it's imperative to get people to work," Thornton said.

The ice storm in February 2003 has been the only implementation of Plan B in the past two years.

Political science professor Ernie Yanarella, also chairman of the University Senate, said that he doesn't agree with the purchase.

"I think it's a terrible symbol for the parking and transportation people to make this choice," he said. "SUVs do absolutely nothing to help the U.S. out in energy and independence. The University of Kentucky ought to be something of a role model."

Yanarella said that the university's priorities in purchasing vehicles should have been first and foremost, safety, with fuel economy being second and vehicles that are "not quite so ostentatious."

Officials at other universities — both UK benchmarks and in-state universities — said they are satisfied

with their own parking vehicles, usually utility pickup trucks or compact cars.

Sarah Blouch, director of parking and transportation at the Ohio State University, said OSU has experimented with adding Jeep Cherokees to its current force of Ford Taurus vehicles.

Blouch added that SUVs like the Toyota Highlander are not something they would consider too closely.

"I doubt we'd go to anything quite that nice," she said.

Diane Brown, a University of Michigan spokeswoman, said their nine Ford Taurus vehicles work well for them, despite Michigan's reputation for inclement winter weather.

"We're very satisfied with their use and flexibility," Brown said.

"Cars are perfectly satisfactory for our parking enforcement use," said Mark Jozefowicz, director of public safety at Eastern Kentucky University. Although ECU does most of its parking enforcement on foot or in two older-model Ford Ranger pickup trucks, he said other factors dictate what vehicles to use.

"It all depends on what your needs are," he said. "Some students don't agree with UK's purchase."

"I can understand somewhat, but they don't need to buy that expensive of a four-by-four," said David Schulz, a psychology sophomore.



Stevens said, "He's got such a passion about comedy and being a comedian ... Ross's real tribute has been: A) he's a very funny comedian, and B) that he's been doing so well promoting the program."



'Fable': A true Xbox fairy tale

Fable, the long awaited and much debated offering from Peter Molyneux's Lionhead Studios Ltd., was finally released this month, and I'm thoroughly pleased with the results. It stands as the epitome of the action-RPG genre with simple, intuitive controls, a small — but effective — cadre of magic spells and a tried-and-true story with a nice sense of humor.

Fable takes your generic young hero and pitches him face-first into the realm of Albion where he must take up the role of a knight. There the heroic do-gooder or the essence of corruption.

Essentially, every action you take affects your alignment in some way; you receive evil and good points for each deed and those in turn determine your alignment.

Personally, I loved the changes my character went through on his way to becoming a true champion of the deprived, slowly changing from a fairly normal-looking youth into a horned beastman with glowing red eyes and cloven feet.

The Hero (initially referred to as Chicken Chaser) is also judged based on renown (how well known you are), attractiveness (hey, baby

— look at me) and scariness (oogie-boogie-boo). All of this affects how the non-player characters within the game react to you, whether they fall immediately in love with Chicken Chaser, mock him mercilessly or run screaming in the opposite direction at the slightest provocation.

There are many things to do to while away your time in Albion, as opposed to actually completing quests to further the game.

You can buy and rent out property, shoplift from the local stores, consume alcohol until you vomit, get married, eat until obesity, kill abstract villagers, cross-dress and fart yourself mindless (yes, you have the ability to fart and the truly vile can fly the bird, curse and perform vulgar crotch thrusts).

True, most of this is juvenile, but it is highly amusing. The gameplay works wonderfully. Combat and interactions are streamlined and allow you to go from hacking at a foe's head with your obsidian greataxe to frying him with a lightning blast with amazing ease.

The selection of magic is rather small, but each spell serves its purpose well and has four different levels of



power. Weapon selection is fairly decent, with the two basic categories of ranged and melee and several different types within those, including mace, axe, katana, greatsword, longbow and crossbow and different material types within those categories.

Clothing and armor options are also quite extensive with items ranging from simple villager trousers to dress gloves to dark chainmail boots (to crush flowers underfoot).

The game is flexible enough to allow for a couple of different styles of play. You can go with either a straight melee-based character or opt to play a will (read: magic) using character, or you can mix and match to your heart's content.

Fable is graphically stunning. Everything is well-rendered and colorful, with amazing lighting and water

effects. I did experience some major slow-down at times, which is strange for an Xbox game.

Aside from slow-downs, the only major gripe I have is the game's length. Some may find it too short — if you simply play the quests out and don't bother with the extraneous details, you can blast through it in about 13 or 14 hours. That's a far cry from the 80-plus involved with most *Final Fantasy* games.

Overall, *Fable* is an amazing game. It combines the best elements of games like *The Legend of Zelda* and *Grand Theft Auto: Vice City* and somehow manages to add even more. Length and slow-down notwithstanding, *Fable* is a must-own Xbox game and belongs in your library with *Halo*, *Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time* and *Star Wars: Knights of the Old Republic*.

Liberty Film Festival parodies Michael Moore

WEST HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — U.N. weapons inspector Hans Blix: "Booooo." Former ambassador and CIA spouse Joe Wilson: "Traitor!" Al Gore: "Uggghh." And the scariest size XXXL bogyman of all, Michael Moore, whose every appearance sets this partisan crowd into hissing fits.

Billed as Hollywood's first conservative film festival, the three-day Liberty Film Festival showcased comic shorts, one about the "ultimate minority" in Tinseltown (*Greg Wolfe: Republican Jew*), an epic homage to Ronald Reagan and his battle against Soviet communism (*In the Face of Evil*) and a snappy doc on tart-tongued commentator Ann Coulter (*Is It True*

What They Say About Ann?).

But there is a law in physics that for every action there is a reaction, and the festival played out like an anguished and earnest rebuttal to the fantabulous success (and, according to these conservative filmmakers, lies) of Michael Moore and his (\$200 million in international box office and climbing) anti-Bush assault *Fahrenheit 9/11*.

Moore played a starring role in four of the documentaries screened to several hundred attendees: In *Michael Moore Hates America*, described by filmmaker Mike Wilson as his "devastating expose of real people exploited by Moore to make a buck." In *Celsius 41.1*, or "the temperature at which the brain begins to die," directed by David Bossie

of the conservative advocacy group Citizens United. In talk show host Larry Elder's *Michael & Me*, about the benefits of gun ownership. And finally, in *Confronting Iraq* by Roger Aronoff of the group Accuracy in Media, which used a PowerPoint-like construction in its attempt to deflate Moore and "the bitter left" peaceniks and Kerry's "cut and run" presidential candidacy.

The festival was organized by husband-wife duo Jason Apuzzo and Govindini Murty, and underwritten by the Foundation for Free Markets, which likes privatizing Social Security, cutting taxes and issuing school vouchers.

The foundation's leader, Paul Harberger, applauded the "courage and conviction" of Apuzzo and Murty and an-

nounced the birth of conservative film as "the front lines in the battle for the hearts and minds" of Americans.

Murty said Hollywood is infested by liberal goo-gos who despise "mainstream American values" and refuse to give over their studio budgets to films from the conservative perspective, "the family-friendly fare for middle America."

The message of Hollywood's liberal bias was not universally embraced by attendees. Victor Elizalde, a Sony Pictures executive who is running as a Republican challenger against Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., appeared on the panel "Conservative Filmmaking 101" and sought to explain that what makes Hollywood run is not so much ideology as money.



Cats' Martirosyan close to qualifying for ITA tourney

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — UK senior Tigran Martirosyan defeated San Diego State's Daniel Jung 6-2, 6-2 Monday in the opening-round qualifier of the ITA All-American Championships.

Martirosyan will face Cameron Marshall of Michigan State Tuesday. He must win singles matches Tuesday and Wednesday to qualify for the main draw.

UK junior Nate Emge lost 6-7 (4), 6-3, 7-5 to Clayton Almeida of Winthrop Monday.

Women's tennis claims three singles titles

In two All-UK singles finals, sophomores Joelle Schwenk and Kim Coventry defeated their teammates, and senior Aibika Kalsarjeva defended her top-flight title Sunday at the Kentucky Fall Invitational.

Schwenk defeated junior Danielle Petrisko 6-2, 6-2. Coventry defeated sophomore Christine Simpson 6-0, 6-1.

Kalsarjeva, ranked No. 9 in the country, defeated No. 15 Megan Muth, of William & Mary 6-1, 6-4.

Men's soccer team bounces back against Buffalo

BUFFALO, N.Y. — On his 23rd birthday, senior midfielder Jamal Shteiwi netted two goals to carry the UK men's soccer team to a 3-0 victory over Buffalo on Sunday afternoon at RAC Field.

Shteiwi provided an early spark for the Cats by scoring in the ninth minute. He scored from eight yards out after being fed by Anthony Peters and Riley O'Neill.

Two minutes later, UK freshman midfielder Michael D'Agostino buried a shot from 18 yards out for a 2-0 lead.

Shteiwi's second goal came in the 73rd minute.

UK (7-3-1, 3-0 Mid-American) won its ninth consecutive conference game, dating back to the beginning of the 2003 season.

UK junior goalkeeper Andy Gruenebaum recorded his third shutout of the season.

The Cats host second-ranked and defending national champion Indiana at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at the UK Soccer Complex.

Auburn snaps Cats' streak

No. 20 Auburn snapped UK's six-game unbeaten streak by defeating the Cats 3-0 Sunday at the UK Soccer Complex.

UK (5-5-1, 2-1-1 Southeastern Conference) outshot Auburn (8-2-1, 3-0-1 SEC) by a 14-9 count, but the Tigers' All-SEC goalkeeper Megan Rivera used six saves to preserve her fifth shutout.

The Tigers got on the board in the 15th minute when Chrissy Culver scored.

In the 20th minute, UK head coach Warren Lipka received a red card and an automatic ejection after disputing a no-call of a possible defensive handball in the penalty box. The call would have given the Cats a penalty kick.

The Tigers added goals in 35th and 78th minutes to lock up the victory.

Friday, the Cats defeated Alabama 1-0, thanks to an 80th-minute goal from junior defender Kristin Moyer. It was the ninth career shutout for UK junior goalkeeper Liz

Butler, her third in four matches.

UK hosts No. 8 Florida at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the UK Soccer Complex.

Women's golf finishes fourth

Led by freshmen Elizabeth Dotson and Beth Felts, the UK women's golf team finished fourth in the UK Wildcat Fall Invitational at the University Club of Kentucky.

The UK Blue team finished ahead of eight teams in the three-round event.

Dotson finished the tournament tied for seventh with a three-day score of 228 (77-72-79), while Felts finished in 18th place, firing a 234 (76-81-77).

With a final round 75, junior Ali Kicklighter finished tied for 15th individually and helped the UK White team to an eighth place finish.

Mississippi State won the invitational with a 34-over-par total of 898, finishing 30 shots ahead of second-place finisher Miami.

The Cats' next tournament is the University of Tennessee Mercedes-Benz Collegiate Championship, which begins Friday. The three-day tournament will conclude Sunday, Oct. 10.

Cats struggle against No. 20 Tennessee

The UK volleyball team fell to No. 20 Tennessee Sunday afternoon at the Stokely Athletics Center in Knoxville, Tenn.

The Lady Vols claimed a 3-0 victory over UK, which fell to 10-5 on the season and 1-3 in Southeastern Conference play. In its best start since 1973, UT is 14-1 overall and 4-0 in the SEC.



Watts shirked duties on referendum issue

In a Student Government meeting last Wednesday, SG President Rachel Watts dealt with an important and controversial issue regarding the future of the Student Activities Board and its leadership by refusing to take a stand.

The proposal by SG, which called for amending the SAB constitution and the election of SAB officers, stems from a referendum that was approved by a vast majority of the students who voted in April's SG election.

SAB officers are currently appointed by a board of directors and have been since the organization's inception.

This bickering between SG, SAB and the administration has gone on much too long, and the primary reason is Watts' refusal to act as a leader, stand up to SG senators and take a position on the matter.

Despite a written opinion by Vice President of Student Affairs Pat Terrell stating the SG Supreme Court's decision directing the SAB to amend its constitution is outside the court's jurisdiction, the SG Senate pursued the measure anyway.

Terrell was sent to Wednesday's meeting by UK President Lee Todd to offer this decision orally but was refused the opportunity to speak by SG, as were members of SAB.

Watts could have brought about a swift conclusion to the referendum debacle by taking a stand and demanding accountability.

The result of this meeting and the way it was conducted is mounting animosity between SG and SAB over a subject that was already driving a wedge between the two organizations.

As SG president, Watts should have foreseen this predicament months ago and made a conscious effort to fix it.

She didn't, then, and it appears she has no intention to now. After Wednesday's meeting, Watts echoed a line she has been repeating for months; that this issue is not her responsibility and doesn't belong on her desk to begin with.

By declining to form her own opinion and asking that the matter be "taken off her desk," Watts has failed the UK students she was elected to represent.

In a question and answer session with the Kernel last month, Watts said one of her top three priorities for her second term was to hold people "accountable to promises they made to students."

How can Watts ask that others in her organization be held accountable for decisions they make when she won't even go as far as to make a decision in the first place?

A president elected to represent the UK student body should display leadership in difficult situations and work with other campus leaders to find answers to difficult questions.

In this case, Watts has failed to meet those standards.

Q&A with Michael Powell

WRFL General Manager

Opinions editor Andrew Martin sat down with WRFL General Manager Michael Powell to talk about UK's student radio station and other related issues.

Q. What is the mission of WRFL?

A. There's really no one clear-cut mission. It's sort of a public/college radio station that serves not the UK campus but also the community since we broadcast to all of Lexington.

Our format is really an alternative variety. We try to push music, news, commentary and things you wouldn't hear on any other radio station.

The idea is to fill a niche of something that's missing in Lexington radio and we try to do that in a variety of our programming and make it as comprehensive as possible.

Q. What type of programming does WRFL carry?

A. We carry music and news for the most part. Our music is everything from indie rock to hip-hop to bluegrass to death metal, we have an Indian music program. Anything that is interesting, innovative and different is what we broadcast.

We broadcast Democracy Now twice a week, which is an award-winning progressive news program broadcast out of New York City.

We also have Campus Voices, which is a news program produced by JCU 304 and some of the telecommunications students as well. And they just tackle a variety of issues that are a concern to UK students as well as members of the community.

It's really all-encompassing; if we have done our job correctly, there should be something for everybody at some point in the week.

Q. What do you think about Referendum One, which Student Government passed last Spring?

A. First of all, I plan to spend a lot of the year helping out and supporting Student Activities Board. I think any effect that it has on them would really affect the campus as a whole.

WRFL was thrown out of the referendum last year by the decision of the Supreme Court for some sort of technicality concerning student activity fees. So I assume that's something I don't have to worry about this year.

Referendum One in some ways was a good idea but the approach to it was very poor. I didn't like the way the Student Government handled it.

It was very secretive. None of the parties involved found out about it until roughly 5 or 5:30 the night before it was going to be placed on the ballot.

We found out about it from Kernel reporters; we didn't find out from any member of Student Government.

I don't think necessarily that elections make everybody more accountable to students than not having elections, particularly with non-governmental bodies.

Anybody that wants to change something in SAB or WRFL can join the organization and voice their opinion and get involved and achieve an executive position by getting involved, being qualified and trying hard.

That's the nature of democracy more than anything else, getting involved and getting your voice out there and achieving policy through deliberation. That's how SAB and WRFL work.

So I don't necessarily agree that elections would make anybody more accountable to students or the university but I do commend Student Government for at least trying to make that a

concern because that is a concern. It is important to have checks and balances on everybody. But it has to be done right, it has to be done professionally and done fairly. And I don't think Referendum One was any of those.

Q. Do you feel WRFL should have popularly elected officers or should they be appointed?

A. I think it's bizarre to elect a general manager of a radio station. I guess it goes to the fact that we do receive money from student fees just the same as Student Government and how come our leaders aren't elected?

Well, there's a lot of people on campus whose salaries come from student fees and from student tuition, so under that same logic we'd have to elect a number of different people that are accountable to different students.

This includes the chairs or deans of each college. Their salaries and budget comes from university and public money. So under the same logic a lot of different people would have to be elected.

WRFL is not a governmental body. It's a radio station with highly-specialized positions. It would really just complicate things that are otherwise done very easily.

If Student Government and the administration feels that's the best thing then fine.

There's really nothing wrong with the current method in which leaders are appointed.

Q. Is the station planning anything for the upcoming election?

A. Yeah. We're working with the Kernel on a congressional representative debate, which is scheduled for Oct. 13 at the Radisson. We wanted to hold it at an on-campus venue, but

we cannot have any type of political event on campus without the involvement of SG for whatever reason.

We chose to be independent of them, and we decided to hold it at the Radisson. I'm not sure what we're planning to do about transportation. But we want to get a lot of students out to the Radisson.

Also, we're broadcasting encore presentations of our news programming over the weekend. So people that can't listen during the week can catch it again on the weekend. So we're trying to casually promote advocacy with our audience right now.

Q. If students are interested in hosting a radio show, what would they do?

A. They would come into 104 Student Center anytime during our regular business hours between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., fill out an application and talk to one of us. It's sometimes tricky to get a radio program just because we only have so many hours per week to grant to different people.

I do my best to fit everybody on the schedule that wants to be in and fill some sort of programming niche. Programming choices are sometimes difficult to do because you're accountable to not only the students but members of the radio station.

And you're accountable to the community because there are certain programs that just stay because they're really popular and the community would be outraged if something happened to their programs.

It's a variety of availability, split timing and the type of programming you're presenting. But just about everybody has a pretty good chance of getting on at some time. Just come in and talk to us. Bug us. Make yourself stand out.

Substance must be criteria for judging Kerry's performance

In the initial aftermath of last Thursday's Bush v. Kerry debate, pundits portrayed it as a "draw" between the two candidates. But now, five days and several dozen news polls later, we're all supposed to believe Kerry won the debate.

Yes, Kerry was better in style. But we should also remember that the fact that Kerry's personality somehow suddenly became charismatically unlike a sequoia tree does not mean he was suddenly presidential. Sure he can be a good public speaker. My question is: Kerry speaking the truth?

And I don't just mean Kerry's contradictory statements or misstatements of fact. Instead, in a perfect debate aftermath, Kerry's beliefs and assumptions should succeed or fail based on their rightness, not the manner in which he spoke them.

Behold a quick jump to a parallel universe, where a quicker-witted Bush picks up on Kerry's innermost errors: Kerry (actual statement): "The president always has the right, and always has had the right, for preemptive strike. That was a great doctrine throughout the Cold War. ... But if and when you do it, Jim, you have to do it in a way that passes the test, that passes the global test ... and you can prove to the world that you did it for legitimate reasons."

Bush: "Don't be absurd. First of all, you disagreed with that 'right' mightily during the Cold War and opposed President Reagan on nearly every policy or weapons system he used to defeat Soviet totalitarianism. Jim, why don't you ask him about that Senate record?"

"But worst of all, Senator, you're assuming that there's a single 'globe' that offers us this 'test.' Last time I checked the globe was made up of dozens of separate nations, each one of whom has its own best interests at heart. Why should we go by what they say? We don't expect them to ask us before they defend themselves. Furthermore, we're morally superior to most of them."

Kerry (verbatim): "I made a mistake in how I talk about the war. But the president made a mistake in invading Iraq. Which is worse?"

Bush: "No, you didn't just talk about the war. You also originally suggested targeting Iraq, then voted for the use of force while knowing full well what it was about, and then you praised the way we got rid of the Saddam regime that quickly. Then you opposed the war, saying it had nothing to do with the war on terror. Then you referred to it as being part of 'the war on terror.' Then you said you still would have voted for it. Well which one is it, Senator?"

"I'm also afraid you've assumed too often that war is wrong — meaning it wouldn't matter if no U.S. soldiers died or we didn't find banned weapons, war is still always wrong because by definition people die, even if they're evildoers. Yes, that's sad, but sometimes it has to happen. Do you agree?"

Kerry: "This president, I regret to say has secured less nuclear material in the last two years since 9/11 than we did in the two years preceding 9/11. ... Right now the president is spending hundreds of millions of dollars to research bunker-busting nuclear weapons. The United States is pursuing a new set of nuclear weapons. It doesn't make sense."

Bush: "Wait a minute. Remember, we're morally superior to the evildoers. If you're going to oppose 'nuclear proliferation,' does that mean theirs, ours or everyone's? If it's everyone's, you've just made the same flawed assumption you did when you backed 'nuclear-freeze' proposals with the Soviets. You assume that will work. Well, we'd like to it, but the evildoers will lie because they're bad. You have to oppose them, and sometimes that requires having better weapons than they do. You, on the other hand, think you can just talk them out of it. I fear you'll wilt in the face of evil."

Kerry: "I have no intention of witting. I've never willed in my life. And I've never wavered in my life."

Bush: "Ha ha! How ridiculous. Keep saying it, pal, say it much stronger than you believe it, and maybe we'll believe it."



He entered the game on UK's first possession in the second quarter, and returned with less than five minutes left in the game.

"This is still Shane's squad," Woodson said. "He's the leader and we follow his examples."

Boyd threw for 118 yards on 12-of-25 passing with two interceptions, but he was better than those numbers indicate.

"I honestly don't think he

had a rough night," Woodson said. "A lot of passes were dropped."

Leading up to the game, Brooks told Woodson he would play at least one series. But he never imagined he would take his first collegiate snaps in a blowout loss to a team from the Mid-American Conference.

"I didn't think I was going to be going in with us down like that," Woodson said. "But things always happen in football you don't know what things are going to become. When they told me to go in, I'm up to it."

After Boyd torched Ohio for four touchdowns last season, Bobcat head coach Brian Knorr put an emphasis on stopping him.

"That was our number one goal — to stop Shane Boyd," Knorr said. "All of our focus was on him. I don't know if he is a little banged up but when he is healthy he is as good as they get."

After UK's lackadaisical performance, Boyd said everything, from the team's rotation to its approach, needs to be mixed up.

"We got to change up some things and find that chemistry," Boyd said. "It's not the end of the world."

Boyd's injury limited Cats' gameplan against Bobcats

UK offensive coordinator Ron Hudson said he had to alter his strategy because of Boyd's sore left shoulder. Boyd rushed nine times for a loss of 15 yards — including the 24-yard loss on a deflected lateral pass.

On the few plays where Boyd ran out of the pocket, he rushed to his left to avoid taking a hit on his left shoulder.

"That's not the reason we lost the game," Hudson said. "It takes away a little of your

effectiveness and how you attack people."

With 49 attempts on the season, Boyd has been the Cats' most used rusher, taking more than one-third of the team's 134 carries.

After Boyd torched Ohio for four touchdowns last season, Bobcat head coach Brian Knorr put an emphasis on stopping him.

"That was our number one goal — to stop Shane Boyd," Knorr said. "All of our focus was on him. I don't know if he is a little banged up but when he is healthy he is as good as they get."

Injury updates

Junior running back Draak Davis left the field dangling his right arm after taking a leveling hit on a kickoff return. He suffered a concussion on the play.

Junior safety Muhammad Abdullah also suffered a slight concussion, but was back at practice Monday.

Sophomore linebacker Durrell White was hit in the right side of his face during the game. His jaw is kind of loose, he said.

"But the biggest injury is to our mental psyche," Brooks said.

Injuries have taken away UK's best cornerback and linebacker in juniors Bo Smith and Dustin Williams. "We don't have Bo. We don't have Dustin," Archer said. "Vincent is a leader but he's only one person. Somebody has got to step up."

However, senior end Ellery Moore said players can't just flip a switch and all of a sudden become a leader. "You can't be a fake leader," Moore said. "If you are a leader people are going to follow you."

There are leaders on this team, he said. But their voices aren't being heard for one reason or another.

"Once we figure out our virus," Moore said, "and once we get that weeded out, we'll be all right."
