University of Kentucky Acquires LS/2000

The University of Kentucky has acquired an OCLC LS/2000 local library system for the Margaret I. King Library and Medical Center Library on the University's campus at Lexington and ultimately, the 12 community colleges that comprise the University of Kentucky Community College System.

First ARL Library

The University of Kentucky is the first Association of Research Libraries institution to acquire an LS/2000 system. The system being installed initially includes a Data General MV 10,000 minicomputer and 22 terminals for circulation, bibliographic and authority control, and limited public access Later phases will include terminals for increased public access.

Paul A. Willis, Director of Libraries at the University of Kentucky, said: "The LS/2000 integrated automation package will allow us to better serve faculty and students while at the same time permit us to make more efficient use of personnel and other resources. In terms of size, the University of Kentucky is about the median ARL institution, so our requirements are substantial. The LS/2000 system is compatible with the OCLC centralized systems that we have been using

since 1975, and we anticipate that this compatibility will be an increasing asset for our local library system."

State-wide

Mr. Willis said that the University of Kentucky Libraries serve 22,000 students and 1,500 faculty members in Lexington, including 12 main campus branch libraries. Moreover, there are an additional 22,000 students served in 12 community colleges located throughout the state which are part of the University of Kentucky Community College System. "LS/2000 will support an ideal blending of local database needs with access to and support from the major national bibliographic utility," he said. "And, the new M300 Workstation available from OCLC gives us flexibility in extending local and national automated services to a number of locations with a minimal number of terminals. At our agricultural library, for example, we intend to install an M300 for access to LS/2000 as well as OCLC's central online system."

Libraries involved in the initial phase of LS/2000 include the Medical Center Library and the Margaret I. King Library (the main library) as well as the law and agriculture

branch libraries. Plans call for the system to be expanded to other libraries within the University system.

Medical Center

"We are looking forward to expanding our present cataloging and interlibrary loan activities through the LS/2000 system," said Omer Hamlin, Jr., Director of the Medical Center Library. "The Medical Center will be the first library on campus to have an online public access catalog, and we will have the capability of checking holdings in the entire university system."

In preparation for the database load, which is scheduled to begin in August 1984, OCLC will extract the University's bibliographic records from OCLC archive tapes, consolidate them, and convert headings to the proper AACK2 form using the current Library of Congress Name-Authority File.

The University of Kennucky Libraries have 1.8 million volumes and approximately 35,000 current serials.

Under terms of the agreement, CCLC will provide the University of Kentucky with LS/2000 hardware, software and support services — training, profiling, installation, and maintenance.


