The University Senate yester-day approved a policy that will allow the College of Business and Economics to raise its admission standards this fall.


The policy assures admission into the college's upper division program for students who have completed 80 semester hours with a cumulative 3.0 grade point average.

Muskie raises questions about Iran-contra affair

Tower Commission member Edmund Muskie told UK students last night that although the Tower Commission completed its report on the Iran-contra affair in February, questions remain. About 200 people came to the UK Center for the Arts to hear the lecture by the former secretary of studenting the Carter administration. However, by the time Muskie concluded his 90-minute talk, only about 100 people remained. Much of what Muskie said during his speech was outlined in the commission's report that was released in February. The obstacles Muskie said the commission ran against during its investigation was in covering all the ground of the Iran-contra affair. "Thirty to 45 days couldn't con-

"Thirty to 45 days couldn't con-ceivably (have) been sufficient time to do what he was asking us to do," he said.

However, he said the commission was still able to issue a report because of the "capable young people" within the government, who were eager to get to the bottom of the situation.

The former senator from Maine stressed that although much has been learned about the Iran-contra affair, there is still the need for more investigation into the situation, especially about alleged dealings with the Nicaraguan rebeis, known as contras.

"After that," he said, "it depends on what the special prosecutor and Congressional committee thee."

Before his talk, Muskie held a press conference in which he told reporters that the major flaw of the Iran-contra affair was the Reagan tion's executive branch.

"When you hold it too closely," he said, "you are deprived of input from the bureaucracy."

Muskie said that there are "all type of people" within the Reagan administration who are to blame for the Iran-contra affair. However, "it's not for us, as a commission, to point out who should be fired."

The ordinance that stirred the debate, passed last week, prohibits certain bars from admitting minors.

Under the new ordinance, beginning July 1, bars that do not have licensed dance floors of at least 200 square feet or derive at least 30 percent of their revenue from food services will not be permitted to admit people under 21.


