## SGA encouraging political action

Basketball season is over. What can you do for the rest of the semester? UK's Student Government Association has an idea.

SGA is sponsoring a program it hopes will help students become more active in local and national government.

"We try to get students out to meet their representing officials," said Melanie Cruz, associate director of SGA. "We want them to go out and vote and get involved, whether they like the candidate or not."

The Political Action-Reaction Project is designed to get local and federal officials to come to campus and talk about their accomplishments.

"We want to have the senators discuss what they have done," Cruz said, "rather than politicking toward their campaign."

The first politician in this series is U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Kentucky), who will be on campus from 1:30 p.m.-2:30 p.m. in 228 Student Center.

McConnell is chairman of the Senate Ethics Committee, the Foreign Operations Subcommittee, and the Nutrition Subcommittee.

For most state residents, McConnell's memberships in the agriculture, appropriations, environment and rules committees could be his most important affiliations.

McConnell's position within these committees could be a great advantage for Kentucky farmers, state environmentalists and numerous other citizens concerned about issues facing Kentucky in the future.

McConnell will hold an open forum during his appearance.

"Mitch McConnell wants mostly a question-and-answer session to address student issues," Cruz said.

The SGA hopes that, by addressing issues important to the state and to the campus, it will be able to interest more students in the political process.

"We've brought different officials to the campus for years," Cruz said. "But we're putting more pressure on because of the up-coming presidential election."

Second in the series will be Rep. Scotty Baesler.

The former Lexington mayor has been known to be involved in some conflicts.

Baesler was put on the spot and questioned about ethics violations around the time of his election as a U.S. representative from Kentucky.

The issues pertained to alleged illegal use of city workers in moving his personal furnishings. The matter was quietly resolved when Baesler paid the workers for their time and labor.

Baesler prides himself on taking a strong stand in favor of equality. While he was still mayor, he ordered the removal of a confederate flag from a local construction site when some local voters said the flag was offensive to them.

Baesler has more recently been criticized for his positions and actions concerning the tobacco industry. Many of the state's tobacco farmers believe Kentucky's main cash crop is in danger of being outlawed.

Baesler will be in Center Theater at 10 a.m. Wednesday.

Cruz hopes Baesler will also field questions from the audience.

### NATION Unabomber trail may lead to California

HELENA, Mont. — As federal agents searched for proof that Theodore Kaczynski left his Montana cabin to mail bombs, two people said yesterday they had seen the hermit in Sacramento, Calif. — in the area where the Unabomber mailed his last four bombs.

Frank Hensley, a desk clerk at the Royal Hotel, next door to the bus depot in downtown Sacramento, told the Associated Press he saw Kaczynski in the neighborhood or staying at the hotel almost annually during the past five years. He stayed at the hotel two or three times, usually in the late spring or summer, Hensley said.

"If it wasn't for all this, I'd be expecting to see him about now," Hensley said, referring to Kaczynski's recent arrest.

At a Burger King restaurant next to the Sacramento bus depot, manager Mike Singh said he saw Kaczynski a few times in recent years. On one occasion, Kaczynski was carrying an armload of books, Singh said.

"He said he was doing research and he had a breakfast sandwich," he said. "He looked like one of those bums who come in in the morning and have a sandwich and cup of coffee and walk out."

Donors must be 17 or older, weigh at least 160 pounds, and be in good general health. The CKBC said there is no chance of getting AIDS or any other infectious disease from giving blood. All materials are sterile and used for one donor only, then discarded.

The following competitions and awards have been created for Pint Party '96:

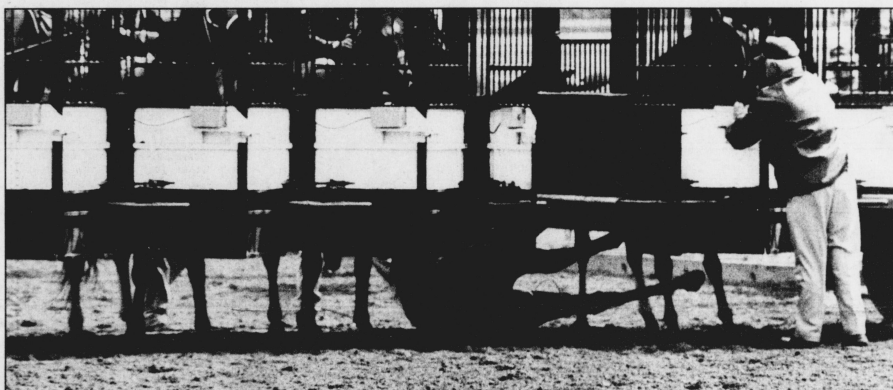

## Opening weekend chilling for racing fans

Crowds were down on the opening day of Keeneland's spring meet Friday, as cold weather and Easter weekend teamed up to keep some students away. Temperatures at post time were in the low 40s, chilling the crowd of 9,093.

Last year's opening day card drew around 10,400 fans.

"It's April," said Price Atkinson, a journalism junior. "It should be warm out here. Two days ago it was 70, now it's 30-something. Usually in April, it's not like this."

Atkinson, unlike many Keeneland regulars, attended all of his classes before hopping out to the thoroughbred track on Versailles Road. Atkinson arrived around 3:45 p.m. just before the seventh race, planning to place some bets and "look at the women."

Unfortunately for Atkinson and others, the biting wind had most of the richly adorned females hiding under multiple layers of clothes.

"(Keeneland) is fun — especially when it's warm," said Richie Creech, a finance sophomore. "All the girls are covered up today."

Creech and his group took shelter on an upper level concourse inside and out of the wind after spending a brief stint outside. Others, like Paul Gungelman, a political science and psychology senior, had the same idea.

"I'm not even wearing a jacket," said Gungelman, a Keeneland first-timer. "Now I need to drink more beer to warm up."

One would have thought that hot chocolate would've been the drink of choice on Friday, but Gungelman and others kept the Keeneland beer vendors busy.

"The beer window is the only sure thing at

Keeneland," said Shane Banks, a political science senior.

Beer and babe hunting attract some to Keeneland, but many students come to wager on the races. This meet, which runs through April 26, is the richest in Keeneland history, and big purses help ensure quality racing.

The signature race of the meet is Saturday's Toyota Blue Grass Stakes. The Grade II race, considered the final prep before the Kentucky Derby, has six horses already entered.

"I'm addicted to gambling," said Creech, who had a copy of the Daily Racing Form nearby. "I'm a gamble-aholic."

Creech plans to make two trips to Keeneland each week during the brief spring meet, but he doesn't plan to skip any classes.

"I'm doing bad," Creech said. "My teachers take attendance."

## Fraternity celebrates anniversary with campus activities

The week starts off with an open community service tonight. The events of the week are highlighted by fraternity members playing in a charity basketball game against crew members of the WKYT-TV station. The game will be held on tomorrow night at 7:30 in Memorial Coliseum.

The game is open to the public and tickets are \$3 each, with a portion of the proceeds going to the Robert H. Williams Cultural Center in downtown Lexington. Members of the UK men's basketball

team will be on hand and the Wildcat Danzers will perform at halftime.

"I just hope we have a good turnout," Johnson said. "Because usually the week is more directed toward the black students on campus, but we're going to try to get everyone involved."

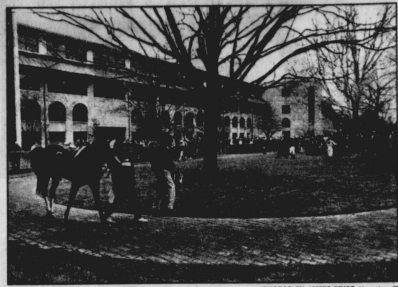
Another event being planned by the fraternity for the Celebration Week is a swim party at the Harry C. Lancaster Aquatic Center Wednesday night from 9 to midnight.

**Aja extends deadline for SGA executive positions**

Although newly-elected Student Government Association President Alan Aja received 10 applications for positions in his cabinet, he decided to extend the filing deadline from Friday until tomorrow at 4 p.m.  
 "My administration wants to see a lot of people apply," Aja said. "The more that apply, the better chance we'll have to improve diversity on our staff."  
 Aja said that interviews for legislative positions will take place on Monday and Tuesday nights,

along with those for the positions of Senate clerks, comptroller and parliamentarian.  
 "We can't have a Senate meeting without those positions," he said, referring to the upcoming SGA meeting where he will be sworn in, along with Vice President-elect Chrissy Guyer.  
 "We'll be holding off on appointing people for other positions."  
 Aja was referring to the deadline for committee head positions, which is not until April 16 at 4 p.m.  
 He said he wanted newly-appointed executive directors to

help select committee heads, since they would be working hand-in-hand all next year.  
 "They (executive directors) need to sit in on interviews for committee head positions," he said.  
 Aja suggested that people applying for legislative positions speak with former executive directors before their interview, so they can get an idea of what types of daily duties they will need to perform throughout the year.  
 Also, he suggested that candidates bring a written proposal to their interview with innovative ideas and plans for new things

they wish to accomplish as committee heads.  
 "We need people who are willing to work and get things done," Aja said.  
 "We also need people who can have a good working relationship with other people in SGA as well as people in other campus organizations."  
 Aja said the panel performing the interviews would consist of current and former SGA senators, a Residence Hall Association member, a Student Activities Board member and current SGA President Shea Chaney and Vice President Heather Hennel.

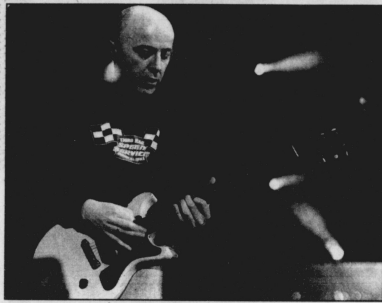

## Bush gives memorable show at Rupp

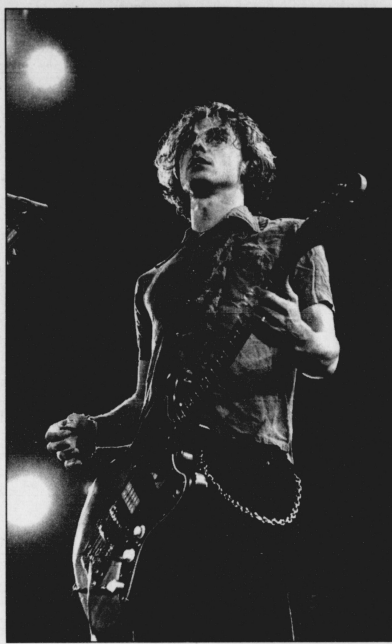

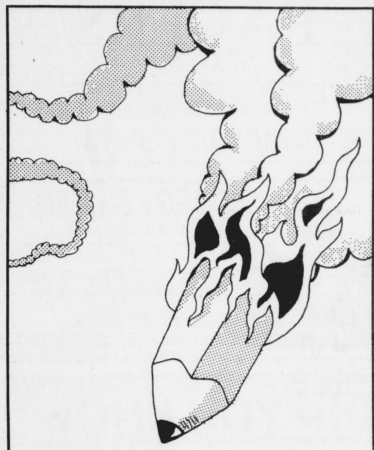

# Red Hot release features trip-hop

The Red Hot foundation, in its quest for AIDS awareness, has released numerous albums embracing popular musical genres.

In the past, the Red Hot series has focused on genres like country, dance, jazz, hip-hop and indie rock.

This album, *Offbeat*, focuses on the purely '90s genre known as trip-hop.

Trip-hop most likely began in the early '80s, when pro-

grammable sequencers like the Fairlight became more commercially available.

The first trip-hop albums were arguably the Talking Heads' *Remain In Light*, the David Byrne/Brian Eno collaboration *My Life in the Bush of Ghosts*, and Jerry Harrison's transient space-junk album *The Red and the Black*.

Those first records nabbed found sounds and looped them over African-inspired polyrhythmic music, creating a trance-fusion with mind-expanding overtones.

Today's trip-hop is simpler and less "arty," taking the hip-hop

trance hypnosis and melding it with perception-altering beat changes and out-of-nowhere psychedelic imagery.

A trip to the record store will reveal multiple compilations of trip-hop, and maybe even a trip-hop section loaded with groups like DJ Krush and Portishead.

What leads *Offbeat* away from the newly-trodden path is the scope and focus of the record.

While a person might imagine that the content of an AIDS benefit record would be preachy, none of the songs directly scream, "Use a condom!" (although the album

insert does).

Part of the gist of the Red Hot group is AIDS awareness through popular culture. In this case, it's a pop subversion.

If you dig through the liner notes, you'll find a condom hieroglyph in the background. Reading on, there are links to the Beat Generation.

Eh? The Beat Generation? What's that got to do with how out-of-sorts '90s kids are supposed to be?

Musically, Beat poetry and trip-hop aren't that far apart. The Beat poets used some bongos and

"cool jazz" to support their mind-twisters. Trip hop utilizes the beat and nihilistic statements. The link between the two generations is really in the attitudes.

The Beat Generation was one of the first groups to move en masse towards a general dissatisfaction and begin experimentation with sex and drugs. As the lack of anything more than a superficial identity develops in the '90s, it's interesting to look back at a recent period of dissent.

*Offbeat* subtly encourages a

search for parallels and alternate outcomes in the two generations.

Amiri Bakara does a very Beat-esque rant. Latika and Soul Coughing present dadaist ramblings about jackalopes, feces, and forks.

The crown jewel of the album is trip-hop godfather David Byrne reciting a Jack Kerouac piece entitled "It Goes Back," reminding us to rewind and take a look.

Overall, *Offbeat* is an interesting listen for a worthwhile cause.

Some of the connections and intentions are inconsistent, but the concept is relatively clear.

## New movie requires more editing

On top of the poster for *The White Balloon*, it says (without attribution) "The Most Celebrated Foreign Film of the Year!" While I do consider *The White Balloon* an incredibly well-made film, giving it such extreme praise might be going a bit too far.

*The White Balloon* tells the story of Razieh (Aida Mohammadkhani), a little girl who only wants to buy a fat white goldfish during the big New Year's Day celebration.

It sounds simple enough, but poor Razieh goes through more struggle than Odysseus to get her treasured fish.

After a long battle with her mother to get the money to buy the fish, Razieh finally begins her journey.

However, several obstacles lie between her and that golden hoop.

The first, and most pointless in the film, is when Razieh comes across a group of Dervish snake charmers looking for handouts. They mistakenly take Razieh's 500-toman note away from her and then continue to taunt the innocent girl.

Although sometimes humorous, this scene soon becomes annoying, as it doesn't seem to have an ending.

After finally retrieving her money, the girl makes her way toward the fish store, but soon realizes that she lost the 500-toman note somewhere along the way.

The journey begins all over again.

The problem with *The White Balloon* is that this movie could have been cut in half and been

absolutely perfect.

Instead, some of the best scenes drag on so long that you cannot wait for them to be over.

The addition of several characters who really add nothing to the development of the film also contribute to the unnecessary length.

There are some magical moments in this film, however.

The interaction between Razieh and her brother bring to life a feeling of childhood innocence.


The scenes in which Razieh talks about how great the fish is, or when she cries when she thinks she won't get the fish, communicate tremendous emotion.

*The White Balloon* is full of spirit and heart, and if you can get past the lengthy scenes, you'll find a good movie here.

If you're the type of person that can't sit through less-than-great scenes to get to the magical moments, you just might have to settle for something else.

# Amy Arena is Not a Normal Girl

*Editor's note: Before Amy Arena's show at Krazy Jax, she had the chance to tell me why she's not a 'normal girl'.*

**Q:** It seems that a lot of people have made you the champion of feminism. How accurate is that label?

**A.A.:** Amy Arena: ... I don't consider myself a feminist and/or a speaker of feminism. I'm an individual with many different points of view. This album touches on just a few of the million that everybody has — I don't think I'm unique in that way. I think everybody has lots of different rules that they live by and many different opinions. Sometimes they overlap and sometimes they contradict. Of course, everybody changes their mind, so I'm speaking as an individual. I think people interpret it into what works for them, and that's fine, because everyone interprets life into what works for them, so I'm not disturbed by that at all. On the same token, I don't consider myself to be a feminist.

**Q:** Do you get sick of being compared to and grouped in with other female performers such as Alanis Morissette?

**A.A.:** Somebody did a review on the album today and said I had many similarities with Alanis Morissette, which kind of blew me away. I thought he must not have listened to the album. I figured he just looked at it and saw that I was a girl with brown hair, with an individual name and not a band name. I don't think he listened to it — no offense. Personally I don't think I'm anything like Morissette and being compared to her ...

This album was finished about two years ago, so, you know — sure, she got signed first with a huge label that can promote her and back her and make her a big star really fast. I don't have that, so it seems that I'm coming up after her. But I'm not. I don't think I'm anything like her except that I'm a girl with brown hair.

**Q:** What made you decide to work with spoken word instead of singing?

**A.A.:** That was actually the idea of the producer. I was performing in a coffee house and this guy saw me. I don't know if I was singing with an acoustic guitar and if he would have wanted to have me as a singer, but he saw me as a poet or spoken-word artist. He really got a kick out of it and thought he

could have some fun with it, so that's how this whole thing got started. It wasn't my decision.

**Q:** What made you get involved with performing in the first place?

**A.A.:** I like art, especially performance art. I like to draw and write, so I like visual art, too. I go through any channel to perform. This is just one of them.

**Q:** What's been your strangest experience in tour?

**A.A.:** I signed some guy's chest the other night, which I thought that was a little odd. What else ... My camera got stolen from a maid in a hotel and they won't give me the money for it.

**Q:** There seems to be a lot of lyrics on the album that at first seem funny but at the same time are really deep.

**A.A.:** I'm afraid of being too serious ... No I'm not. I think it's funny that people take it too seriously. I had one reviewer talk about how I was anti-women because of "Proud To Be a Woman." She said I was anti-women and pro-male domination and anti-homosexuals and I was just like: "Wow, you're a trip." So some people definitely take it too seriously, but it doesn't scare me. I get a kick out of it.

**Q:** What's your favorite song on the album?

**A.A.:** "Proud To Be a Woman," because of that woman ... I thought it was funny and then this woman came off with this

single, "Excuse Me," turned out alright, but most of her songs were reduced to disconnected snatches of lyrics tumbling through the blur. Maybe she ought to go acoustic.

When she wasn't verbally exposing her innards, she was tackling religion.

Having lost faith in the old one, she says in "New Religion," she proposes to replace it with one based solely on doing good deeds. Sounds wonderful, simple and easy, but someone is going to have to decide what's "good" and what isn't, leading straight back to the same problems as before.

She cracked on the Muslim practice of praying toward Mecca five times a day as being a waste of time. What's it to you, Amy? That's their thing, so leave

## Offense sputters; Wildcats lose 4-1

The UK baseball team was looking to take the rubber match of a three-game tilt against Alabama yesterday at Cliff Hagan Stadium. Nevertheless, on Easter Sunday, the Cats' offense laid an egg, losing 4-1.

Alabama's starting pitcher Tim Young was dominant, pitching seven and two-thirds innings while giving up only seven hits and a run. Young also struck out nine Wildcats, a career high. His previous best was seven strikeouts against Centenary Feb. 16.

"I give (Young) a lot of credit," UK head coach Keith Madison said. "I thought he pitched a heck of a game, but when you're in a three-to-one ball game, you're just a hit or two away from making a run for the game, and we didn't do it."

Young upped his record to 5-2 with the win, while the Tide's Skip Ames picked up his seventh save of the season.

UK's lone run came in the bottom of the third. With two outs, UK's Paul Blandford took a 2-2 pitch into left field for a single, scoring Kenny Miller.

While the Tide received a solid performance from its starting pitcher, UK (18-15, 6-9) was not without its own solid pitching performance.

In his first ever Southeastern Conference start, freshman Omar Henry (2-2) picked up the loss. However, Henry pitched five and

two-thirds innings and gave up three runs. Another freshman, Eric Bishop, relieved Henry and gave up one run in two and a third innings.

"They really stepped up today," Madison said. "They gave us a quality job and they put us in a position to win."

UK came out of the weekend with one win.

It came Saturday as the Cats' Blandford hit an RBI single to right center in the bottom of the ninth to give UK a 3-2 victory.

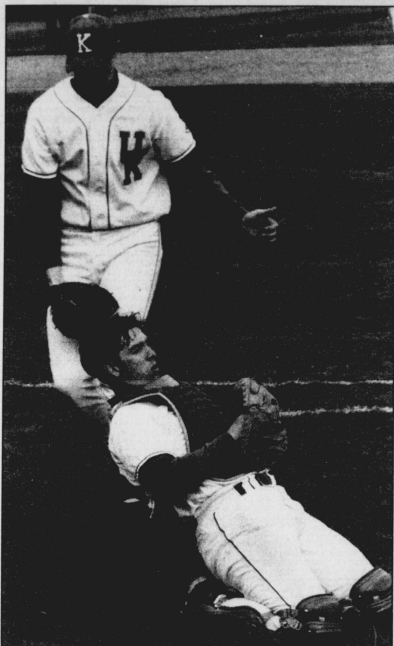
The Cats also received a solid pitching performance in the game from Scott Downs. The sophomore left-hander pitched a complete game while giving up six hits and no earned runs for his first victory of the season.

While Alabama (26-11, 10-5) drilled the Cats on Friday 17-4, the close loss yesterday makes the weekend frustrating for UK.

"Knowing that this is the No. 5 team in the nation (Alabama is really the nation's No. 12 team) or whatever, we could have taken this series," Blandford said. "It just slipped away."

"I guess my overall assessment of the weekend is a major disappointment," Madison said. "We were in a position to win two out of three at home and we didn't take advantage of it."

Next up for the Cats is a rematch with Marshall tomorrow night at Hagan Stadium. The teams played on March 27, with UK pulling off a 15-1 victory in Huntington, W.Va.

## Blandford extends streak to 20 games

UK's Paul Blandford extended his hitting streak to 20 games, with a bunt single in the first inning against Alabama yesterday.

The streak is something that Blandford does not think about. In fact, talk of the hitting streak is fairly new to him.

## UK's Napsolski earns Olympic spot in women's air rifle

UK rifle team member Nancy Napsolski earned a spot on the U.S. Olympic air rifle team Friday at the trials in Atlanta. Napsolski, a senior from Downers Grove, Ill., edged Elizabeth Bourland 1,386.7-1,386.

Only the top two competitors advance to Olympic competition. "It's overwhelming," Napsolski said Sunday. "I didn't think I would be crying afterwards but I was."

Napsolski said she has competed head to head with Bourland 20 or so times in a lengthy shooting career.

Before Friday, Napsolski had only defeated Bourland once, at the nationals last summer.

"She's been down the last couple of months score wise," UK coach Harry Mullins said. "It was

just a matter of everything coming together. I'm very excited about her prospects in the Olympics."

Mullins believes Napsolski to be UK's first Olympian in the shooting events. The first medal to be awarded at the Atlanta games will be in women's air rifle on July 20.

Napsolski will be joined at the Olympics by her fiancée, Josh Lakatos, who made the men's trap team. Lakatos, a California native, lives in Colorado Springs, Colo.,

where he is training for the summer games at the Olympic training center.

The two met at the 1994 World Championships in Italy and have maintained a long distance relationship.

Napsolski and Lakatos plan to travel together to Germany and Italy to compete before going on to Atlanta in July.

"We'll be seeing a lot of each other," Napsolski said.

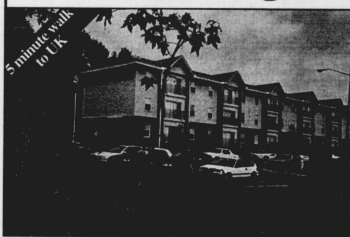
