Ernie Yanarella, chairman of the University Senate, said UK has not made much progress in recent years regarding faculty pay but that this year's raises showed promise. The Top-20 Business Plan, unveiled in December, calls for sev-eral years of 5.5 percent salary pool in-creases or moc

creases or more.

"UK has, over the last couple years, moved from the bottom of our benchmarks in terms of salary to next to the bottom," said Yanarella, a political science perfector.

marks in terms or suary to next to un-bottom," said Vanarella, a political sci-ence professor.
"I certainly applaud it (the salary raise), and I think other faculty members agree with me that this is a very impor-tant issue in the context of the Top-20 Business Plan," he said.

Yanarella said since faculty salaries are judged on a local level, it was "not surprising to me that there should be this differential." He also said he knows many staff members who are un-derpaid and merit higher pay.
Williams said UK staff salaries are "clearly" not what the local market would pay in fact, staff salaries overall are at 87 percent of the local market, he said.

Todd said the 5.5 percent increase was needed to catch up to UK's benchmark competition, and he reiterated that he's also committed to keeping staff pay competitive.

"We'll need a 5.5 (percent) increase in the faculty for a few years in order to catch up with the median of our benchmarks, which we're committed to, "Todd said.

With the rise of popularity of AllofMP3's service, there has been an ever-intensifying debate about the legality of the service. No worries, though. AllofMP3 has signed agreements with the Russian equivalent of the Recording Industry Association of America, so to purchase an album from AllofMP3 from within Russia is guaranteed to be legal.

Inited States import laws also allow importing of compact discs and non-restricted data from a foreign country for personal use. Therefore, one is essentially buying the music in Russia and importing it to the United States over the Internet.

AllofMP3 has been spared investigation in Russia, but doubters claim that the reason for this is that AllofMP3 has Russian mob connections. While this claim may never be validated, the Web site itself does not take your credit card number—the transactions are done through an escrow service, so you won't have to worry about your credit card number falling into the hands of Russian mobsters, should the site have mob connections.

If you're looking for a way to get your music legally, 80.02 a megabyte is a very inexpensive way to go legal, For one, the music is easier to find, and also because there is no risk of getting busted by the university, or worse, getting a lawsuit from the music industry.

Nor'easter dumps serious snow on Northeast

NEW YORK — A Nor'easter snowstorm rumbled over New York City and New England over the weekend, dumping record quantities of snow and bringing this densest of urban corridors to a silent stop.

The snow totals acquired a prodigious quality as one weather station after another weighed in yesterday afternoon. Central Park stood at an all-time record 26.9 inches, Hartford at 21 inches, Boston at 20 inches and the falling flakes still thick and accompanied by the rare peel of "thunder snow."

Airports closed from New York to Maine, turnpikes posted 35 mph speed limits, and winds howled and blizzard whiteouts descended for hours at a time from Brunswick VI for hours at a time from Brunswick, N.J., to the Hamptons to Rhode Island, Cape Cod and Maine. Nantucket recorded wind gusts of more than 60 mph and hundreds of thousands of people lost power from New Jersey to

Massachusetts.

"This is a good, intense, classic Nor'easter," said Bill Simpson, at the National Weather Service's of fice in Taunton, Mass., outside Boston, But, despite its ferocity, he said the storm was not of historic proportions.

"It's unusual but nothing record-breaking," he said.
Nor'easters are legendary monsters that move up the East Coast and draw their howling power from the comparative warmth of the winter Atlantic. Over the centuries hundreds of fishermen in Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island have died in these storms, which can toss up 50-foot waves. Al-Jafaari retains post as Iraqi prime minister in close vote

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq's interim prime minister, a mild-manimered religious scholar accused by critics of lacking charisma and effectiveness, narrowly fended off a challenge within his coalition yesterday and appears certain to retain his post in the country's first permanent government since the fall of Saddam Hussein.

Ibrahim al-Jaafar1, a Shitte Muslim physician who has been leading Iraq's government since April, defeated economist Adel Abdul-Mahdi by one vote after weeks of unsuccessful attempts within the alliance to come up with a unanimous candidate.

The nomination battle took place within the 128-member legislative bloc of the Shitte-dominated United Iraqi Alliance, the largest political group in the 27-seat parliament still must choose a presidential council, which will approve the prime minister and his Cabinet, a process that will take weeks.

said, standing with Abdul-Mahdi
and other alliance figures at a
news conference. "The victory of

the United Iraqi Alliance is by its unity and equanimity."
Al-Jaafari's nomination solidifies the dominance of the Shiite alliance, which many of its rivals had hoped would fall apart over the leadership battle. 



Downloading enforcement helps protect students

Last week, The Kernel reported that UK administrators are now able to itentify students who are engaging in illegal file sharing and downloading on the campus network. In addition to being able to see who was using the network to obtain and share files by means of peer-to-peer programs and the like university officials also revealed that, given their ability to identify individuals who are sharing or downloading illegal files, disciplinary action would be taken against violators.

Students who are found to be engaging in illegal downloading activities will first be given a warning and told to delete all illegal files and their file-sharing programs, and to refrain from any future illegal file sharing or downloading. A second offense will bring about a meeting with the dean of student

Don't oversimplify Iran issue

In the Feb. 9 Kernel, Brenton Kenkel discussed the Iranian nuclear weapons program and possible U.S. responses to it. While I believe that the intent of his article was to foster a dialogue on possible ways to peacefully curb (or halt) the Iranian weapons program, throughout the piece the author demonstrates a poor knowledge of the foreign policies of Middle East states and thus offers an unlikely solution to the current nuclear dilemma that states in this region must face. Kenkel claimed that "beads of state lin

pourcies of Middle Last states and thus offers an unlikely solution to the current nuclear dilemma that states in this region must face.

At one point, Kenkel claimed that "heads of state [in the Middle East] often act on religious motivations rather than rational ones." This is, to put it bluntly, completely incorrect. While some Middle Eastern rulers may use religion as a form of regime legitimacy, seldom does faith dictate foreign policy. What actually guides foreign policy decision-making in the Middle East is a theory known as omni-balancing, popularly espoused by Raymond Hinnebusch and Anoushiravan Etnesham in "The Foreign Policies of Middle East States." This theory takes into account hree main factors as the basis of policy: 1) Domestic challenges, including threats to regime legitimacy, 2) external threats and pressures emanating from both the regional and global level; and 3) economic concerns. Policy is to nease the other dynamic forces acting upon the leaders who actually develop the policy.

However, in Kenkel's proposed solution to the Iranian nuclear crisis, he seems to take these factors into account. He argues that the West should corece Israel into reducing its nuclear arsenal, which would give Iran the incentive to halt its own nuclear program. In addition, the United Nations should propose sanctions against Iran, should it not wish to cooperate. This solution (regardless of its likell-hood) assumes that Iran would take into account both external threats and economic considerations in deciding the

appropriate course of action, yet says nothing about how religion might influence the Iranian leadership.

I admire Renkel's solution, but it simply will not work. Israel is not going to give up its nuclear arsenal, and even if it were to do so, it likely would not have any effect on Iran's decision to continue its own program. Iran sees nuclear capabilities as a way to heighten its own position in relation to the rest of the Middle East and the global community at large, and it will take more than "amateur" suggestions to divert them from this course.

I recommend that he read the history of Jerusalem to learn that during the Islamic reign, no churches or synagogues were dismantled on British nur Karen Armstrong. And if he doesn't know of any churches in Saudi Arabia, I don't know of any mosques or synagogues in the Vatican City.
