The information presented in this bulletin deals with the financial support, financial ability and inequalities still existing in the various school districts of the State. This bulletin follows purposely a pattern similar to others released in April, 1939, January, 1941, April, 1943, May, 1945, and April, 1947. This plan was followed in order that the earlier issues may be used in connection with this bulletin for purposes of comparison.

This bulletin was prepared by Mr. Earl E. Garrison, Assistant Director of Finance, and Mr. Shelby Kash, State Supervisor of Local School District Finance under the supervision of Mr. W. D. Chilton, Director, Division of Finance, Department of Education.

It is believed that this publication will aid interested patrons and school officials by making available, data which will acquaint them with present financial difficulties and thus enable them to make further progress toward meeting the minimum standards for an adequate school program.

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FINANCIAL SUPORT, FINANCIAL ABILITY, AND FINAN-CIAL INEQUALITIES AMONG THE VARIOUS PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN KENTUCKY

Introduction

This bulletin is published for the purpose of revealing certain financial data pertaining to the various school districts in Kentucky in the belief that the information contained herein will in a manner provide a basis for a more informed citizenry; to encourage a sympathetic understanding by the general public of problems affecting the schools of the State; and to emphasize the idea that even though all men are born equal, they do not remain equal. Due to financial inequalities existing in Kentucky some children are deprived of their inalienable right to obtain sufficient education to enable them to assume a proper place in society as a whole.

The data of this bulletin is classified into four major parts. Part 1 deals with the distribution of annual salaries of teachers, showing the number of teachers and the median salary for each teaching level, group, and race, in Tables I to VII inclusive.

Part II displays the alphabetical list of county school districts; independent school districts, except cities of the first four classes; and independent city school districts of the first four classes showing respectively in Table VIII, IX and X, the frequency distributions of teachers salaries for each district in each of these groups.

Part III relates to the local tax support of the common schools in the State for 1948-49, as indicated by assessment of corporate and non-corporate property subject to taxation for school purposes, shown in Tables XI, XII, XIII, and XIV.

Part IV concerns miscellaneous factors pertinent to school finance such as, (1) Distribution of tax rates for general school purposes; (2) Length of elementary school terms; (3) Percentage of revenue receipts derived from various sources; (4) Percentage of current expenditures by major classification, and (5) State Per Capita, Local Revenue Receipts, Total Teachers' Salaries, Number of Teachers and Mean Average Teachers' Salaries in Kentucky from 1933-34 to 1947-48 inclusive. Data relating to these factors are shown in Tables XV to XIX, inclusive.

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PART I

The data used in the tables in Part I were obtained from the approved salary schedules for the various school districts of the State now on file in the office of the Department of Education. These schedules include positions and salaries of all full-time teachers, principals and supervisors. The median salary was calculated with respect to teaching level, race, and types of districts.

According to the approved salary schedules for 1948-49, there were 18,899 full-time teachers, principals, and supervisors employed in the common schools of Kentucky. These 18,899 positions are distributed as follows: county school districts, 12,822; independent school districts, except cities of the first four classes, 929; and independent school districts classified as cities of the first four classes, 5,148. In 1940-41 there were 18,877 such positions; in 1942-43, there were 18,180; in 1944-45, there were 17,710; and in 1946-47, there were 18,164.

For the purpose of this bulletin, the word "teachers" is used to include all instructional personnel, namely, teachers, principals, and supervisors.

There are 9,453 white elembentary teachers in the 120 counties whose median annual salary is \$1,197; 2,927 white high school teachers whose median salary is \$1,766; 384 colored elementary teachers with a median salary of \$1,343; 58 colored high school teachers, whose median salary is \$1,771. The median salary of the total of 12,822 full-time county teachers is \$1,297.

TABLE II

The median annual salary of 511 white elementary teachers in independent school districts, except cities of the first four classes is \$1,452; for 339 white high school teachers, \$1,692; for 44 colored elementary teachers, \$1,480; for 35 colored high school teachers, \$1,650. The median annual salary for all these 929 teachers is \$1,545.

TABLE III

The median annual salary for all of the 5,148 teachers in cities of the first four classes is \$2,230. Of these, there are 2,445 white elementary teachers whose median salary is \$2,052; 1,896 white high school teachers whose median salary is \$2,625; 453 colored elementary teachers whose median salary is \$2,178; and 354 colored high school teachers whose median salary is \$2,467.

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The median annual salary for all 18,899 teachers in all the 244 districts existing in 1948-49, is \$1,509. Of these, 12,409 are white elementary teachers with a median salary of \$1,310; 5,162 white high school teachers with a median salary of \$1,961; 881 colored elementary teachers with a median salary of \$1,692, and 447 colored high school teachers with a median annual salary of \$2,138.

TABLE V

Of the 18,899 full-time teachers in Kentucky, 17,571 are white, with a median annual salary of \$1,485; and 1,328 are colored, with a median annual salary of \$1,827.

TABLE VI

Further, these 18,899 teachers are classified as to teaching levels. There are 13,290 white and colored elementary teachers, whose median annual salary is \$1,331; and 5,609 white and colored high school teachers whose median annual salary is \$1,972.

TABLE VII

This table is a summary of median annual salaries of all fulltime teachers in Kentucky for alternate years beginning with 1942-43, showing classification as to type of district, teaching level, and race.

It will be noted from this table that the median annual salary of the colored teachers is much higher than that of the white teachers. The reasons advanced for this apparent inequality are as follows: (1) The colored population is concentrated in the metropolitan areas, and (2), the supply of well trained colored teachers has exceeded the demand, whereas a critical shortage of well trained white teachers exists.

Furthermore, it is noted from this table, that a striking difference still exists between the median annual salary of the elementary teachers, and the median annual salary of the high school teachers. This difference is believed to have resulted from the existence of the following conditions:

(1) High school teachers have more training. A recent study completed by the staff of the Division of Teacher Education and Certification, Department of Education, reveals that the median level of training for elementary teachers employed in Kentucky for 1948-49, is 85 semester hours college training, and that the median of high school teachers is college graduation. It appears essential to state here that the minimum standard for certification for high school teachers is four years college training, whereas the minimum standard certification for elementary teachers is only two years training.

- (2) Difference in length of school term. Approximately one half of the teachers in Kentucky are employed in elementary positions in county school districts. In these districts, the average length of the elementary school terms is 8.53 months, while in the same districts, the average length of the high school terms is 9 months.
- (3) Local school administrators have a tendency to assign high school teachers "extra services" for which they are paid.

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PART II

Part II shows in detail the distribution of the salaries of all full-time teachers in each school district with respect to (1) the 120 county districts; (2) 63 independent school districts, except cities of the first four classes; and (3) 61 independent school districts classified as cities of the first four classes. Each of these groups is treated in Tables VIII, IX and X respectively. The purpose of these tables is to present the data for each district, so that any one interested in comparing one district with adjoining districts, or one section with different sections of the state, may do so by calculating the respective medians and comparing with other medians of annual salaries.

TABLE VIII

This table lists each county school district and shows the distribution of salaries of its white and colored teachers. No attempt has been made to calculate the median for each of these school districts, but the data are presented for anyone who may be interested in making more detailed studies.

TABLE IX

This table gives the same details as Table VIII, except they are for independent school districts other than those of the first four classes of cities.

PART III

This part of the bulletin consists of tables XI, XII, XIII, and XIV, which relate to the ability of the local districts to support the common schools for the year 1948-49. The data shown were taken from the General Budgets which were prepared by the local school officials in a majority of cases prior to the final certification of the assessments by the Kentucky State Tax Commission, and may vary from the certified assessment in some cases. It is realized that a person using these tables will not be able to accurately determine the gross recurring revenue per child for each school district, but since the greater portion of the state school fund is distributed on a census-pupil basis, with some calculation, one may be able to determine approximately the ability of certain districts to support an educational program.

TABLE XI

This table presents statistical information concerning the county school districts of the state pertaining to, (1) assessed valuations of local corporate and non-corporate property; (2) tax rates; (3) school census for 1948; and (4) the ratio of gross assessment per pupil. It will be noted that the per pupil assessment for corporate and non-corporate property for all counties of the state is \$2,429.19.

TABLE XII

This table displays similar data for the 64 independent school districts, which have been classified as cities other than the first four classes. The per pupil assessment of corporate and non-corporate property for this group of districts is \$3,091.47.

TABLE XIII

This table deals with data for the 61 independent school districts, which have been classified as cities of the first four classes. The per pupil assessment of corporate and non-corporate property for this group of districts is \$5,326.46.

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TABLE XIV

This table is the summary of the frequency distributions of the assessments of corporate and non-corporate property for school purposes per census child in all districts of the state for 1948-49. The glaring inequality of the ability of the various districts to support an adequate educational program, will be observed from this table. This emphasizes the need of an adequate state equalization fund.

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PART IV

Part IV consists of Tables XV through XIX presenting data on miscellaneous factors of interest to students of public school finance.

TABLE XV

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This table presents the frequency distribution of tax rates for the county and independent school districts of the state for the three years after the enactment in 1946 of Section 160.475 KRS which permits any public school district in the state to fix its tax rate not to exceed \$1.50 for general school purposes. Prior to the enactment of this law, the maximum rate for county school districts was \$.75. During the first year after passage of this law, 52 county districts of the state levied a rate of \$1.00 or more; during the second year, 102 county districts levied a rate of \$1.00 or more, and in 1948-49, 109 of the 120 county districts levied a rate of \$1.00 or more. The median county tax rate for general school purposes in 1946-47 was \$.8875, in 1947-48 it was \$1.288, and in 1948-49, it is \$1.35. In 1946-47 the median tax rate for general purposes for independent school districts was \$1.269, and it was increased to \$1.50 for each of the succeding fiscal years.

TABLE XVI

An examination of this table will reveal that the length of the elementary school term is being increased from year to year in both county and independent districts. More than 50 per cent of the county school districts are making it possible for the elementary children to attend school at least nine months during the year, and only one independent district operates its elementary schools for a term of less than nine months.

TABLE XVII

This table shows the public school receipts, classified by source, for the year 1947-48, as reported in the Annual Financial Reports submitted by the various school districts to the State Department of Education. Also it shows the percentage of revenue derived from each source for alternating years since 1941-42, and the mean average per cent for these four years.

TABLE XVIII

Table XVIII is a breakdown of general fund expenditures for 1947-48 by major classifications and shows the percentage in each classification. For comparative purposes, the percentages are given for 1941-42, 1943-44, and 1945-46.

TABLE XIX

This table consists of miscellaneous financial data covering a period of fifteen years, which has been tabulated from Annual Sta-

tistical and Financial Reports submitted by the various local school districts, and are now on file in the office of the Department of Education. A study of this table will portray significant trends with reference to the financial program of education in Kentucky.

It will be noted that the total amount spent annually for teachers' salaries for each of the years from 1933-34 through 1944-45 has increased each year approximately the same amount that the state per capita fund has increased. The annual amount spent for teachers' salaries in 1945-46 was increased by approximately 7½ million dollars whereas the state per capita fund was increased by slightly less than four million dollars. It is obvious that this difference of more than \$3,000,000.00 was obtained from local revenue which was made possible by the enabling act of the 1946 Legislature which provided a maximum tax levy of \$1.50 instead of the old maximum rate of \$.75 for county districts.
