## To The Press-Radio-TV

Here is your copy of the 1982 Kentucky Wildcats' Football Facts Book that we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U of K football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Information Office (606) 257-3838.

**WORKING TICKETS** — Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information window in Memorial Coliseum, except on game days, when they will be moved to the ticket window at Commonwealth Stadium.

**TELECOPIERS** — A Telecopier station equipped with dorm-type telephones that take only collect or credit card calls is provided in the press box for use of out-of-town writers. A fee of \$15 will be assessed for use of a telephone.

**PRESS BOX** — Limited to working personnel. Kentucky Sports Information will service play-by-play quarterly, half-time and final statistics, scoring summary, lineups and coaches' comments. Food is available in Commonwealth Stadium Press Box upon presentation of meal ticket.

**RADIO** — Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the UK Network. One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the UK Director of Broadcasting, John Henderson (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

**TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES** — Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used.

## INTERVIEWS

**PLAYERS** — It is requested that all player interviews be arranged through the sports information office, which will make every attempt to have the players call you at a designated time or be available for an interview on campus. Please make request at least a day in advance so we can arrange with the athletes at practice. On many class days it is impossible to get in touch with them until they show up for practice.

**HOME GAMES** — Coach Claiborne will meet the media in the Offensive Film Room near the UK locker room entrance in the Football Office complex of Commonwealth Stadium approximately 10 minutes after game. After the "cooling off" period recommended by the Football Writers Association of America and the NCAA Public Relations Committee, the players' locker room will be open to members of the press.

**TUESDAY PRESS LUNCHEON** — Coach Claiborne and Athletic Department officials will attend a weekly luncheon each Tuesday during the season in the President's Room near the Press Elevators at Commonwealth Stadium. Coach Claiborne will be available there from 11:45 a.m.-1:15 p.m. or upon completion of the interviews. Radio and TV interviews will be accommodated prior to and following the luncheons as requested. NOTE: for those requesting Tuesday player interviews, if classes do not conflict we will have the players available in the sports information office in Commonwealth Stadium at 1:30 p.m.

The best time to call Coach Claiborne other days of the week is: 11:30 a.m.

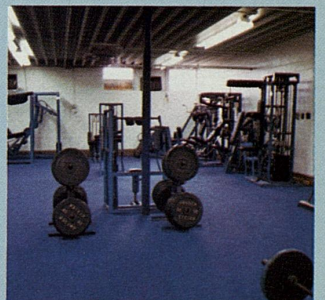
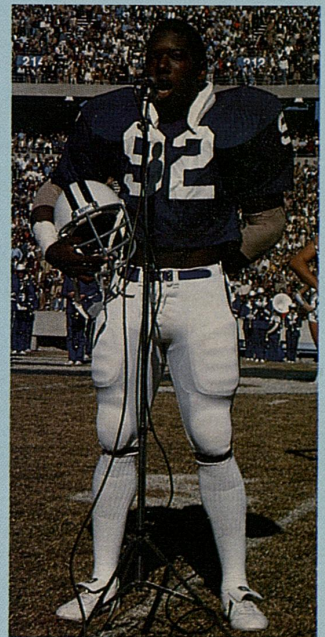

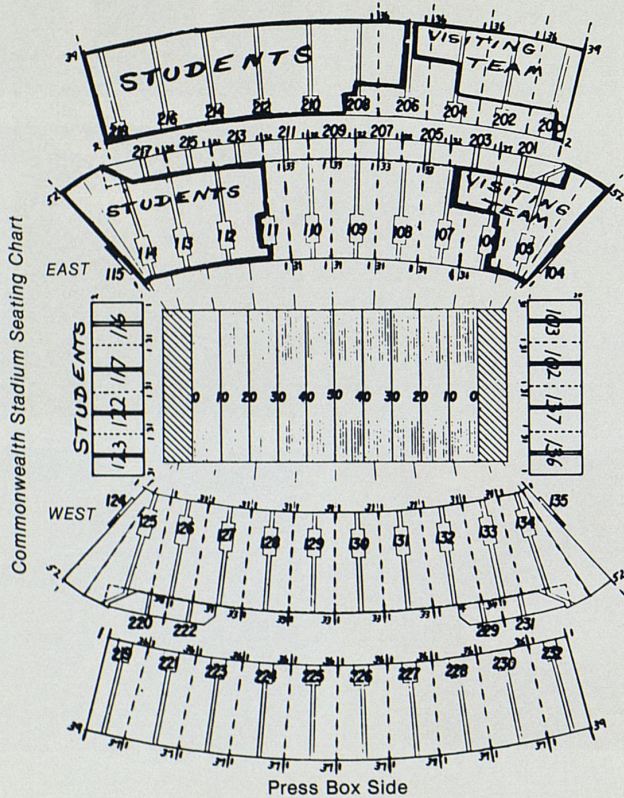

**COMMONWEALTH STADIUM FACTS**

- CONSTRUCTION BEGUN — July 23, 1972.
- OPENING GAME — Sept. 15, 1973, vs. Virginia Tech (UK 31, VPI 26).
- LOW BID — APPROXIMATELY \$12 million by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc.
- ENTIRE STADIUM AREA — 86 acres on Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road.
- IMMEDIATE AREA AROUND STADIUM — 720 square feet occupied by structure, field, end zones, immediate area and its walkways.
- STADIUM LENGTH — 360 feet at low point; fans out 40 feet. Upper deck stops at end zone line.
- STADIUM HEIGHT — 190 feet front to back on slope.
- CAPACITY — Approximately 50,000 sideline, 8,000 end zone bleachers.
- NUMBER OF ROWS — Lower level 50; upper level 39.
- SEATS — All-aluminum bench; some individual chair seats; some bench-back seats; 30 per cent of seating with some type of back.
- DESIGN — Concrete and steel with two cantilevered decks along each sideline.
- INTERESTING FEATURE — Lower section all pre-cast concrete; upper part all structural steel columns, beams, risers, etc. Each section independent of other. No connection between the two.
- PARKING — 6,000 places in four lots, with two lots blacktop, other two grass and gravel.
- PRESS BOX — From 30 to 30-yard line. Serviced by two elevators. Two VIP booths on each end; six booths for radio, scoreboard, timekeeper, coaches-to-field setup; two food-serving lounges; regular working space with approximately 105 seats; two Telecopier service areas; camera deck across entire front of box.



# Commonwealth Stadium

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972, and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium.

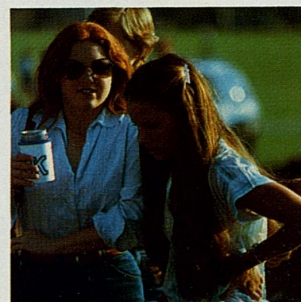
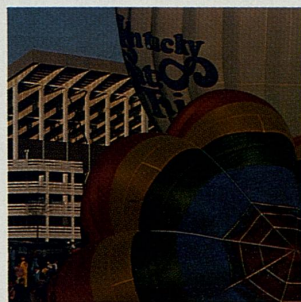
Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July 1973, and this was replaced with Bermuda in 1974. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles — Stoll Field and McLean Stadium — that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University. Soon after the first sections of the concrete stadium on Euclid Avenue were completed Sept. 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville Oct. 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium Nov. 1, 1924.







## JERRY CLAIBORNE Head Football Coach

After a total of 20 years as a head coach, first at Virginia Tech and then at Maryland, Jerry Claiborne returns to his alma mater, bringing home a winning record (138-76-5) that includes coaching his teams to nine post-season bowl games and earning "National Coach of the Year" honors (The Sporting News) in 1974.

Claiborne is a native of Hopkinsville, where he was a four-sport standout in high school, serving as captain of the football team and alternate captain of the basketball team and playing on an undefeated football team in 1943. At the University of Kentucky, he earned three football letters as an end on offense and a safety on defense. He set a school record with nine pass interceptions with the 1949 team that went 9-3, and played Santa Clara in the Orange Bowl. The Wildcats that year established and still hold NCAA records for most yards on interception returns in a single game with 240 against Mississippi on Oct. 1, 1949. They also set six records for total defense (153.8 yds. per game), rushing defense (71.6 YPG), most passes intercepted (29), most yards (719) intercep-

tion returns in a season and most interceptions returned for TDs. Claiborne was named "Outstanding Senior" by a secret vote of his teammates.

A mathematics major, he was one of the best students on the football team, graduating from UK with a 2.7 out of a possible 3.0 grade point average and being named the "Outstanding Senior" in the College of Education. He received the U.K. Alumni Association's "Achievement Award" in 1968.

Claiborne began his coaching career at Augusta Military Academy in Virginia, where the basketball team won the state prep title his first year there and the football team won the state title the following year. He returned to UK and served two years (1952, '53) as an assistant to Paul "Bear" Bryant, who had coached him at Lexington, and then moved with Bryant to Texas A&M as defensive coordinator. In three years, the Aggies won the Southwestern Conference championship and Coach Claiborne's defense led the league. In 1957 he joined the Missouri coaching staff as defensive coordinator with Frank Broyles and then rejoined Bryant at Alabama the following year

as an assistant head coach in charge of defense. In two of the next three years, Alabama played in the Liberty and Bluebonnet bowls.

As head coach at VPI, Claiborne compiled a 61-39-2 record, with two of his teams participating in Liberty Bowl games. In the third year, his Gobblers won the first Southern Conference championship in the history of the school. Claiborne was selected conference "Coach of the Year" in 1963 and District III "Coach of the Year" in 1966. He spent one year (1971) as an assistant coach at Colorado before taking over as head coach at Maryland, which had suffered seven consecutive losing seasons, including a winless season. In 10 years there, he compiled a 77-37-3 record, winning three ACC titles and ACC and District III "Coach of the Year" honors three times (1973, '75, '76). In one stretch, his teams won 21 straight games, a conference record. They also participated in seven bowl games.

In 1973, Jonathan Claiborne, the coach's son, joined the Maryland football program as a non-scholarship player, earning his scholarship the hard



way by excelling with the junior varsity. At 5-foot-10 and 170 pounds, he was the starting safety for Maryland's Cotton Bowl team of '76 and the Hall of Fame Classic team of '77. He was an ACC Honor Roll Student each year he was at Maryland and graduated with a 3.67 grade point average and was named to the SKOAL/HAPPY DAYS Academic All-American Football Team selected by the College Sports Information Directors. Jonathan also was recipient of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholarship and received a \$1,500 NCAA Scholar Athlete Award for post-graduate study. Coach Claiborne also developed two other Academic All-Americans with Kim Hoover honored in 1975 and Joe Muffler both in 1977 and '78. He had a total of approximately three dozen players on the All-ACC Academic Football Team.

Prior to his arrival in College Park, the Terps had five All-ACC players in seven years; since that time, they had 38 nam-

ed to the All-League team in his 10 years, including seven on the 1976 team. The last Maryland All-American had been Gary Collins as a first team selection in 1961, but Claiborne subsequently developed Paul Vellano, Randy White, Joe Campbell, Steve Mike-Mayer and Dale Castro as first-team selections. Second and third-team selections included Louis Carter, Ed Fulton, Mark Mangas, Steve Atkins and Charles Johnson. White also picked up such honors as the Outland Trophy, Lombardi Trophy, ACC "Player of the Year," UPI "Lineman of the Year," and had his jersey number (94) retired by the university.

In addition to coaching at Maryland and serving as president of the Football Coaches Association (1980), Claiborne found time to participate in coaching activities from Ramstein, Germany to Tokyo, Japan. While at VPI, he served on the staff of the Blue-Gray and Coaches All-American games and while at Maryland he coached the East-West Shrine,

Coaches All-American, Hula and Japan Bowl games. He has conducted clinics in Europe (Alconbury, England, and Ramstein for the USAF), participated in the NCAA College Football Press Day, the ABC-NCAA College Football Preview and on the Football Rules Committee.

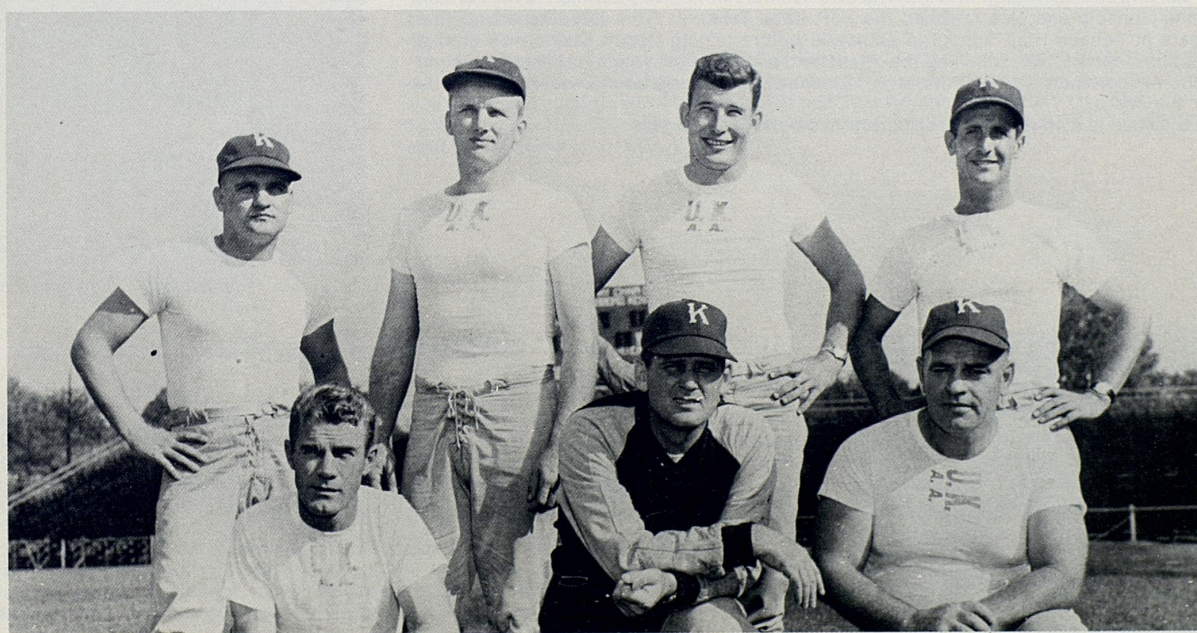
He has contributed his support to many charity drives, serving in Maryland as Chairman of the Prince George's County Cancer Crusade and while at VPI State Chairman of the Cancer Crusade in Virginia which raised more than one million dollars for the first time. He is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and has served as a deacon in the Baptist Church. He is honorary chairman for fund raising for the Kentucky Diabetes Foundation for 1982-83.

Mrs. Claiborne, the former Faye Hooks of Hopkinsville, is also a UK graduate. The Claibornes have two sons, David and Jonathan, and two daughters, Katie and Eileen. Claiborne was born August 26, 1928.

## Assistant Coaches



**JOHN DEVLIN — West Chester (1959)**  
Linebackers

A native of Norristown, Pa., Coach Devlin began his football career at St. Matthews High in nearby Conshohocken and went on to West Chester State College, where he achieved all-conference honors as a tackle and was the weight man on the track team.

His 1958 team at West Chester was called the best ever coached by Glenn Killinger, the Rams' coach for 25 years. In 1979, Devlin was honored by West Chester with a "Distinguished Alumnus Award," becoming the first athlete to receive the honor.

Devlin began his coaching career at Waynesboro High and then coached the Fourth Army team while serving in Germany. He joined Paul Dietzel at West Point for three years before moving to Virginia Tech, where he served with Coach Claiborne from 1966 through 1970. He was defensive line coach at Florida State for two years before joining Claiborne at Maryland in 1973.

Devlin works with the group that Claiborne has often mentioned as the key to the success of the wide tackle six defense. Maryland linebackers led the team in tackles the last four years.

While in Germany, Devlin married the former Irma Kleemann of Regensburg, Germany. They have four children, John, who as a freshman was quarterback of the U.S. Military Academy jayvee team last season at West Point; Elizabeth, William and Michael.

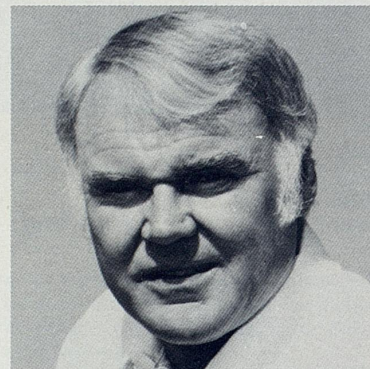
**JERRY EISAMAN — Kentucky (1960)**  
Quarterbacks

Coach Eisaman is glad to be back at his alma mater once again. It took 20 years to return, but he is now looking forward to coaching and developing his quarterback crop for the 1982 fall season.

While at Kentucky, Eisaman was recognized as the All-SEC Sophomore Quarterback in 1958 and was selected co-captain with Lloyd Hodge his senior year, when he played in the Blue-Gray Game. Academically, he received the Sam Huey award for maintaining the highest scholastic standing among members of the football team. He also was a member of the Scabbard and Blade Society.

Serving as an officer in the Army, he coached the First Calvary Division to the Far East Championship and also coached the Fort Knox Tankers. From there he spent three years at Seneca High School in Louisville before joining Coach Claiborne's staff at Virginia Tech in 1966, coaching the offensive backs for three years. He served as the offensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati three years before rejoining Claiborne at Maryland.

Eisaman is a 45-year-old bachelor. Native of Bethel Park, Pa.

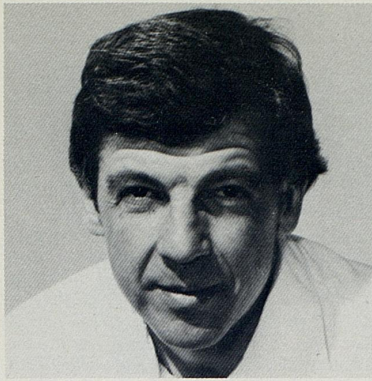


**GEORGE "Chip" GARBER — Maryland (1978)**  
Wide Receivers

A native of Winchester, Va., Garber was an All-District and All-Regional defensive back and quarterback, a basketball player and runner-up in the state championship pole vault his senior year. He went to Maryland on a track scholarship, walked on in football and earned a football scholarship his second year there. He became a second-year starter and earned three letters; during his five years at Maryland, the Terps went to five bowl games.

He spent one year as group sales director in the Promotions Office at SMU and joined the Mustang football coaching staff in the spring of 1980, coaching defensive ends. SMU went to the Holiday Bowl that year and was Southwest Conference champions last season, when the defensive secondary he coached led the nation in pass interceptions with 31.





**BILL GLASER — Bellarmine (1965)**  
Defensive Guards

A native of Louisville, Coach Glaser came to UK in 1977 from Morehead State University, where he was defensive coordinator. He played offensive guard and linebacker at St. Xavier High School in Louisville and returned to St. X as an assistant coach after graduating from Bellarmine College. Received his M.A. degree at Morehead in 1977.

He became head coach at St. Xavier in 1974, guiding his teams to the state AAA crown in 1974 and the state AAAA title in 1975. He was named Courier-Journal "Coach of the Year" in 1974, and in 1975 was selected to a similar honor by the Kentucky High School Coaches Association. St. Xavier teams were undefeated during his two years there.

In addition to his duties with the defensive ends during the past four years, he also was in charge of the kicking game the past two years. Andy Molls finished fifth in the nation in punt returns last year. And the Wildcats were fifth nationally in that category. Glaser's charges set a UK record when they blocked two field goals against South Carolina, with end Don Roe returning one for a touchdown.

Glaser is married to the former Mary Ann Jensen. They have three children, Angie, David and Clare.

**JOHN "Jake" HALLUM — Newberry (1960)**  
Offensive Line

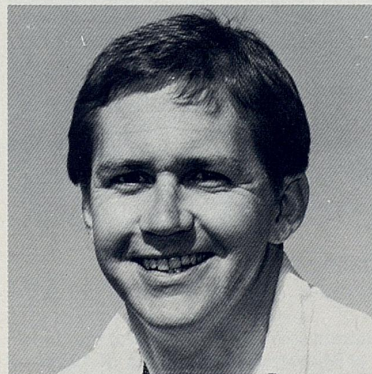
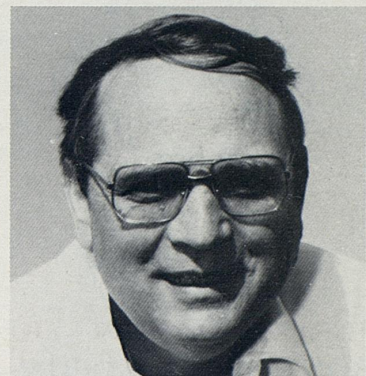
Coach Hallum played four years of collegiate football at Newberry, receiving his B.S. Degree in 1960. He received his Master's from Murray State in 1965.

He began his coaching career as head baseball coach and an assistant coach in football and basketball at Pickens High in South Carolina. He moved to Hopkinsville High School in Kentucky, again as an assistant in football and basketball and head baseball coach, remaining there four years before moving to Paul G. Blazer High in Ashland, Ky., in 1966 as head football and track coach.

His football teams there recorded a two-year record of 20-6-0, with the '66 squad capturing the district championship and the '67 squad winning the state title. His track team placed third in the state in 1967. He was named "Coach of the Year" by the Lexington Herald-Leader and the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, and the "Outstanding Young Man" in the Ashland and Boyd County area in 1967.

He moved to Morehead State University as assistant football coach in April 1968; two months later, he was named head football coach and assistant professor, serving in that capacity until moving to Maryland to join Coach Claiborne. He left Morehead with a 7-3 record in 1971 and a 22-17-1 record over a four-year period.

Hallum was born in Liberty, S.C., Nov. 2, 1938. His wife Mable is a native of Greenwood, S.C. They have two sons, Todd Jacob and Bart Jeffrey.



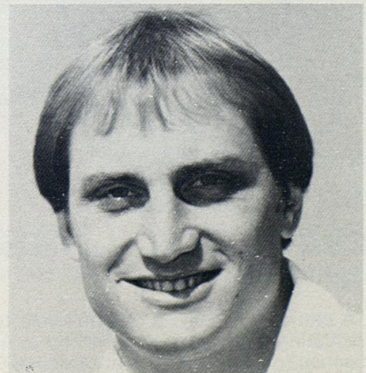
**DAVID LIKINS — Centre (1980)**  
Defensive Ends

An honor student in both high school and college, Likins earned letters in football and track at Henderson City High. He earned two letters as a defensive end at Centre and was defensive co-ordinator and linebacker coach at Georgetown College in 1980 as the Tigers had the No. 1 total defense in the Heartland Conference. He joined the Wildcat staff in the summer of 1981.

**GREG NORD — Kentucky (1979)**  
Offensive Backs

Greg joined the Wildcat staff after completing his college eligibility in 1978. He lettered in 1975, '77, '78, starting in the center position and finishing as a tight end. His first collegiate reception was a 43-yard pass against Mississippi State in 1977. He caught two more for 27 yards that season. His lone reception in his senior season was a 14-yard TD vs. Baylor.

Nord assisted with the offensive line last season. He and his wife Donna have a daughter.





**TERRY STROCK — Virginia Tech (1962)**  
Defensive Backs

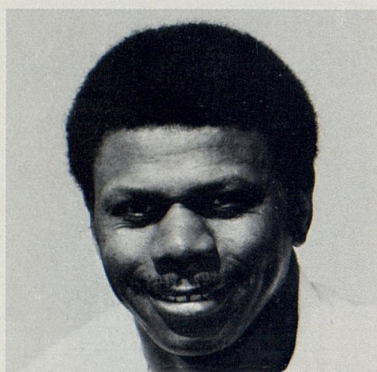
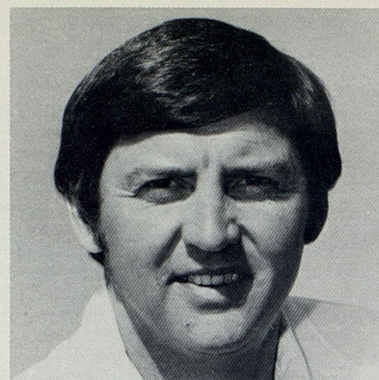
After graduating from South Hagerstown High School in Maryland, Terry was in the defensive secondary at Virginia Tech, serving as Co-Captain of Coach Claiborne's first team there. He received his B.S. degree in Business Administration there in 1962. He also played baseball for the Gobblers.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Colonial Heights High in Virginia and a year later was named head coach at Culpepper, Va.

In 1966 he returned to Virginia Tech, where he coached the offensive receivers for two years and the defensive backs for three years under Claiborne. He rejoined Claiborne at Maryland in 1972.

In 15 years of college coaching, Strock has participated in nine post-season bowl games.

He and his wife Cynthia have two children, Cheryl Lee and Christl Lynn.



**ROD SHARPLESS — Maryland (1975)**  
Defensive Tackles

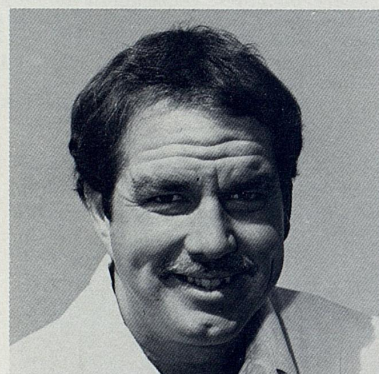
After earning All-State honors as a tailback at Jacksonville High School in North Carolina, Coach Sharpless lettered as an outside linebacker for Coach Claiborne in 1973 and 1974. The Terrapins were 8-4 each of those seasons, participating in the Peach and Liberty bowl games.

He coached two years as an assistant in football and track at Willingboro High in New Jersey before joining Claiborne at his alma mater from 1977 until 1980, when the Terrapins had a combined record of 32-15, including three bowl appearances.

Coach Sharpless rejoins Claiborne at UK after coaching the outside linebackers one year at the University of Richmond. He is a 31-year-old Air Force veteran.

**RONAYNE WALDRON — Virginia Tech (1981)**  
Centers

After earning three letters and All-State honors as a center/defensive tackle at Northwood HS in his native Baltimore, Md., "Ro" was a three-starter at Virginia Tech, earning All-Metro Conference honors, the Frank O. Moseley Award for outstanding leadership in spring drills, Outstanding Offensive Lineman in 1980, eight game balls, and ranking twice among the top 10 linemen in the state. He was a graduate assistant working with the offensive line at Tech last season.



**FARRELL SHERIDAN — Minnesota (1973)**  
Offensive Line

A native of Rutherford, NJ, Farrell earned two letters as a defensive back at the University of Minnesota. He joined Coach Claiborne at Maryland in the spring of 1979 and helped coach LBs while working with the junior varsity. He worked with the TEs on the 1980 Terrapin Tangarine Bowl team and then coached the DEs for Claiborne last season.

After receiving his B.A. in history, he played semi-pro football for the Hartford Knights in Connecticut and then coached two years at St. Mary's High School in Rutherford, NY, and four years at DePaul High School in New Jersey.

His brother Phil Jr. was captain of the 1965 Notre Dame football team; his brothers Jimmy and Mike played for Boston College; his father Phil Sr. also played for Notre Dame.

**JOHN AUDINO — Notre Dame (1975)**  
Tight Ends

A native of Albany, NY, John came to UK in July from Columbia University, where he was backfield coach five years. After graduating from Vincentian Institute in Albany, he was an offensive back and wide receiver at Notre Dame (1971-75). He taught and coached football and track at Christian Brothers Academy and then coached defensive backs one year at Albany State.

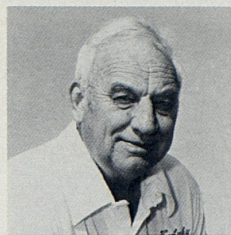
### DICK REDDING — Springfield (1940) Administrative Assistant to Coach Claiborne

Redding has been associated with Coach Claiborne 20 years, 10 each at VPI and Maryland. He was at VPI a total of 18 years before joining Claiborne at College Park.

A native of Auburn, Maine, he began his coaching career at Vermont Junior College, serving as athletics director and head coach of football, basketball and track. He is married to the former Elva Hedley. They have a son Dick.

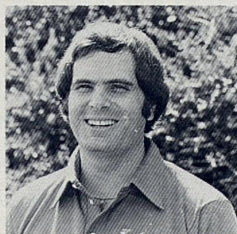


### JANETTA OWENS Administrative Assistant to Coach Claiborne

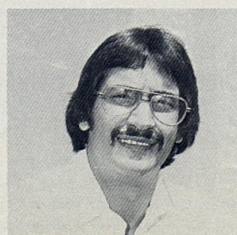


### AL GREEN Head Trainer

## DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

### President, University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary, the eighth president of the University of Kentucky, assumed that office in August 1969. He had previously served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of

the major research institutions in the country.

Great strides toward academic excellence have been made during Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. Two professional schools — dentistry and pharmacy — have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK Library now ranks among the best in the Southeast, and a large portion of the world-wide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Under Dr. Singletary's guidance, strong efforts have been made to meet the needs of minority groups including the establishment of an office of vice president for minority affairs.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award — an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary has been actively involved in a number of professional organizations and has served as president of the Southern Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities, vice president of the American Council on Education and Vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board.

Among his many awards and honors, he most recently received the Department of Army's Outstanding Service Medal.

He entered higher education in 1954 as a member of the history faculty at the University of Texas and twice was awarded the University Student Association's Teaching Excellence Award.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

### Athletics At Kentucky

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in 20 different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Seventeen other members, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Director of Athletics Cliff Hagan.

## CLIFFORD O. HAGAN

### Athletics Director

The hiring of new football coach Jerry Claiborne and presentation of a record budget of \$6,397,685 to the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors are two more recent developments in the career of Cliff Hagan, now in his eighth year as Wildcat athletics director and 11th year with the Athletics Department.

Accompanying Hagan's budget report was a statement by UK president Dr. Otis A. Singletary stressing the need for a first-rate swimming facility and a fieldhouse, which were long-range goals for the department.

In other related news, Hagan said the University is free to televise all its December basketball games on a live basis and that the possibility exists to televise UK's road conference football games provided the telecasts don't do "appreciable damage" to other games within a 125-mile limit.

Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been a hallmark of Hagan's seven-year reign as Wildcat athletics director, with fine attendance at football and basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

Recent physical improvements include a new baseball grandstand behind home plate, a new office area for the academic advisory staff, new locker rooms in the football dressing rooms and construction of a new equipment shed for track.

On the institutional side of the ledger, the University was host to both the men's and women's Southeastern Conference basketball tournaments earlier this year and will host the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985, along with renewal of the UK Relays in 1980.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

A few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics under Hagan include;

- Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful players' lounge at Shively Sports Center.
- New food service equipment in the press box at Commonwealth Stadium.
- New basketball offices in Memorial Coliseum for both the men and women.
- Re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a complete revamping of the track facilities at Shively Sports Center.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best

records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

The wrestling team repeated as conference champion the following year, the basketball team finished with a 26-4 record and the football team won seven of 11 regular season games and defeated North Carolina in the Peach Bowl. It was the best UK football record in 23 years and the Wildcats' first post-season appearance since the 1952 Cotton Bowl. The next year, the football team finished 10-1 (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) and the basketball team won the NCAA championship.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Offices in Memorial Coliseum have been modernized and Hagan is looking forward to the day when he can put on the drawing board an Olympic swimming pool, and plans for the expansion of Commonwealth Stadium.

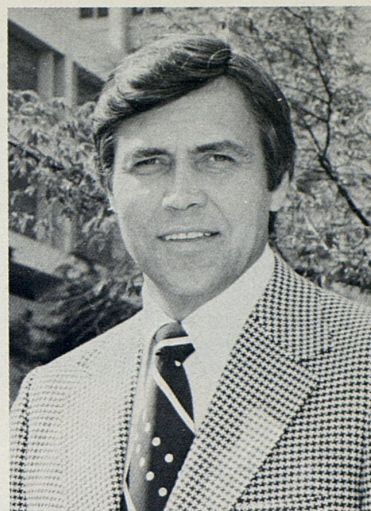
Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led



the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington.





**FRANK HAM**  
**Assistant Director of Athletics**

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1968 as administrative assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the athletic director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Mich., and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1956 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Mich. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, N.C., and Craig, a U.S. Army Major, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Cassopolis, Mich., and Jennifer, who graduated from UK in 1978 and received her master's the following year.

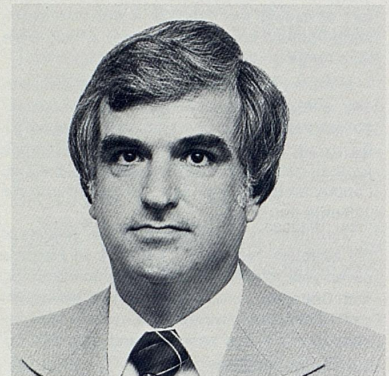
Ham is a son of Mrs. Albert B. Ham and the late Mr. Ham of Edwardsburg, Michigan.

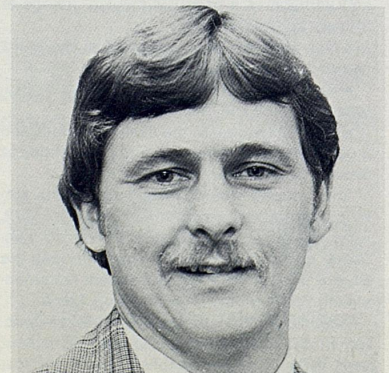

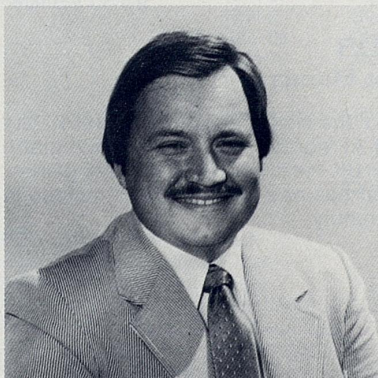




## **RUSSELL RICE**

# 1982 Wildcat Football Outlook

Entering his first season as head coach of his alma mater, Jerry Claiborne inherits a team that has a few known strengths, an equal number of weaknesses that must be shorn up, and a schedule that ranks among the toughest in the nation.

After opening against three Big 8 teams — Kansas State, Oklahoma and Kansas — on consecutive weekends, the Wildcats will meet national champion Clemson on the road and then travel to Auburn to begin the Southeastern Conference portion of the schedule.

Claiborne will build his team around 40 returning lettermen, including a fine stable of runningbacks, but he will be looking for help in other areas, especially for back-ups at the quarterback position, which returns veteran junior Randy Jenkins and sophomore Doug Martin, who earned his letter by holding for kickers last season.

Jenkins, who led the team in passing last season with 84 completions in 170 attempts for 1,079 yards, six touchdowns and eight interceptions, was the No. 1 QB in spring drills, but Martin came on strong to lead the Blues to victory over Jenkins' Whites, hitting 12 of 20 for 140 yards and one TD while Jenkins was hitting 10 of 20 for 134 yards, in the annual spring game.

Senior Terry Henry, moved to runningback after having played QB most of his UK career, joins a group that will be missing only Henry Parks (43 rushes for 109 yds.) from last year's squad. Returnees include leading rusher Lawrence "Choo Choo" Lee (78 for 275 yds., one TD), Richard Abraham (69 for 93, one TD), John Gay (41 for 157, one TD), Pete Venable (69 for 157, 2 TDs), Rod Francis (30 for 117), George Adams (34 for 80) and Shawn Donigan (27 for 79).

Leading candidates for the "I" slot are Lee, who gained 79 yards in 10 carries for the Blues, and Gay, who carried 18 times for 107 yards and two TDs, also for the Blues. A tough battle looms at FB between Abraham, Donigan and sophomore Curt Cochran, who had a fine spring.

Hardest hit by graduation was the offensive line, which lost starters Steve Hricenak, center; Dave Bond, guard, and Jim Campbell, TE. Seniors Gerald Smyth and Steve Williams, both returning interior starters, played well in the spring, while sophomore Doug Williams

missed a few sessions after having some wisdom teeth pulled and did not have a good spring. Senior John Maddox nailed down the starting center position after being switched from guard. Seniors Rob Mangas and Todd Shadowen have earned two letters each at TE.

Returning receivers are led by junior Rick Massie, a team-leading 29 catches for 448 yards and one TD last season, and senior Allan Watson, who had 11 catches for 132 yards in eight games. Sophomore Joe Phillips caught nine for 206 yards in '81. Leading the runningbacks in receiving was Adams, who caught 10 for 82 yards in seven games.

The defense will be anchored by All-Southeastern Conference safety Andy Molls, a senior who was the team's third leading tackler with 70 solos and 42 assists. He returned 33 punts 420 yards last season to beat the old UK yardage record of 419 set by Dicky Lyons in 1966. Molls ranked fifth in the nation with an average of 12.7 yards per return.

He also intercepted two passes (49 yds. returned) to tie fellow senior Tom Petty for third behind graduated Greg Long and junior Kerry Baird, who had four interceptions each. Long had three of his interceptions against North Texas State, tying a UK record held by three other Wildcats, and setting a new school record by returning them for 155 yards.

Petty led the team in kickoff returns with six trips for 144 yards, which would have tied for 13 in the nation if he had totaled enough returns. Ty Richmond, who returned two kickoffs 25 yards, and Ben Johnson lettered as much-used reserves in the secondary.

Although junior linebackers John Grimsley (89&64) and Kevin McClelland (79&62) finished as the two top tacklers on the team, they still are not considered seasoned veterans since McClelland played sparingly at LB in 1980 while Grimsley was a reserve defensive back that season. Sophomore Tony Czack also played sparingly as a freshman. The good news should be the return of Scott Schroeder, a junior who led the team in tackles in 1980 and missed last season with a knee injury received in the spring game.

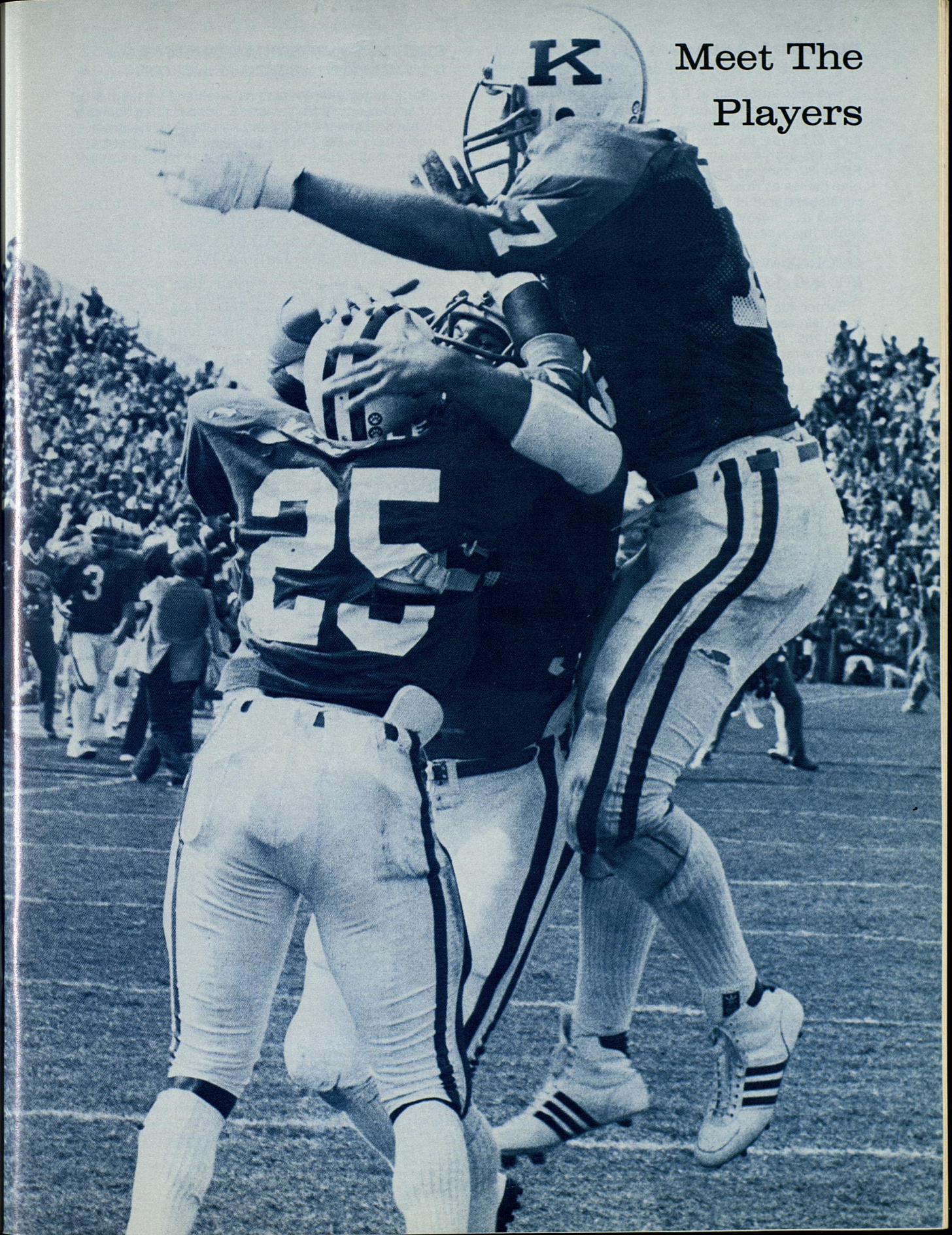
Also returning to action will be sophomore defensive end Steve Willis, who missed last season with a knee injury received in the spring. As a freshman, he logged more than 250 plays, finishing with 15 tackles, 14 assists, two TBLs and a fumble recovery. He will be expected to fill the shoes of Don Fielder, the team's fourth-leading tackler in 1981. Senior Dave Lyons was a starter on the other end of the line last season while senior Don Roe and sophomore Stacey Burrell lettered as reserves.

Juniors Jeff Smith (59&33) and Keith Martin (53&37) return as starters, while sophomore Cam Jacobs earned the tackle spot opposite Smith. Senior guard Effley Brooks (35&16 with team-high nine TBLs and eight QB sacks) again will be backed by sophomores John McVeigh and Tim McDonald.

Both punters — Randy Jenkins (37.7 avg.) and Paul Calhoun (32.8) — return, but the Wildcats lost placekickers Tom Griggs and Rick Strein. Griggs led the team in scoring last season with 32 points (six of nine FGs, 14 of 14 extra pts.) and holds the school record of 41 consecutive extra points. Strein kicked a 52-yard field goal against Kansas to tie a record set by John Pierce vs. Florida in 1974 and tied by Joe Bryant vs. VPI three years later.

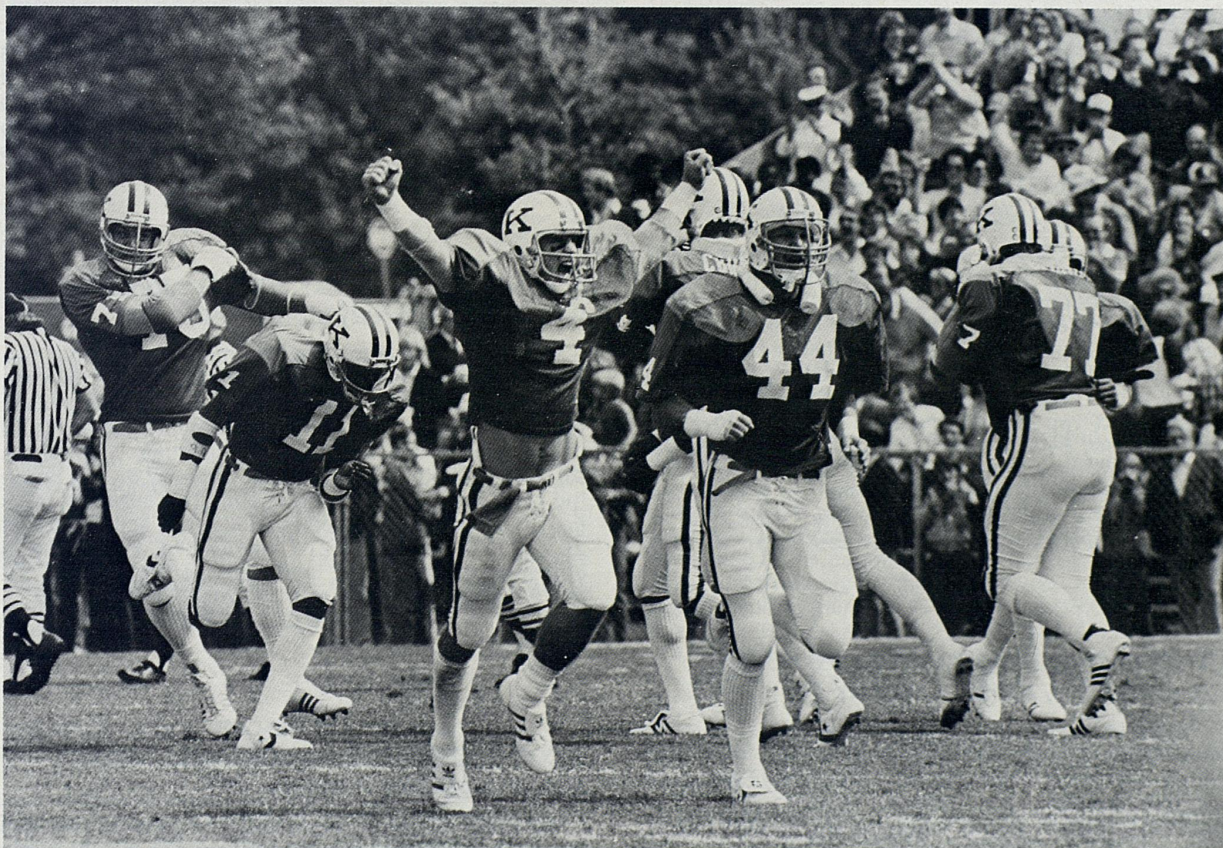

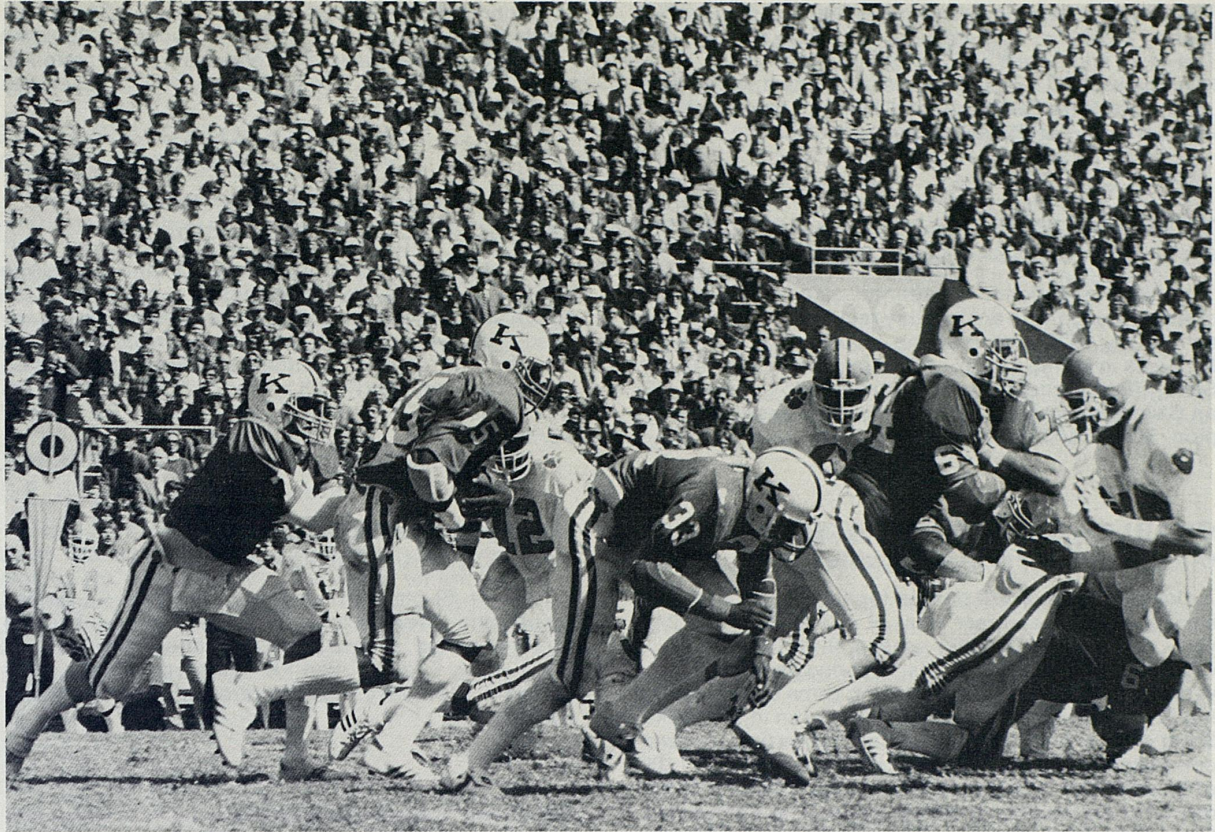

## Memorial

Kentucky's athletic complex off Cooper Drive was named "The Bernie A. Shively Sports Center" in April, 1969, in memory of the distinguished Wildcat director of athletics who died of a heart attack at his home December 10, 1967.

Shively joined the Kentucky staff in 1927 as football line coach, following a brilliant athletic career at Illinois. An All-American as a blocking guard for Red Grange, he also was Big Ten heavy-weight wrestling champion and a track standout. He was named to the Helms Hall of Fame in 1972.

In 1933, he was appointed head of the UK Physical Education Department, and five years later became director of athletics. He continued coaching until 1946, handling football, track and baseball at various times. Among other honors, he was inducted into the Kentucky Hall of Fame.

# K-Men's Association: A Thriving Organization

Seeds for the dream that was to become the "K-Men's Association" were sown in May, 1961, in a conversation at Paintsville, Ky., between Frank Seale and Robert Montgomery, who were football teammates at the University of Kentucky in the early 1930s.

- The theme they discussed was one that would:
- ✓ promote and develop fellowship among UK varsity lettermen.
  - ✓ aid and assist UK in its athletics program consistent with the SEC and NCAA.
  - ✓ equip, furnish and maintain a K-Men's Room on the UK campus.
  - ✓ feature an annual "K-Day" at some varsity event.

The thought received a fine reception from UK athletics director Bernie A. Shively, resulting in a "dutch treat" luncheon among a small group of UK lettermen in June 1961.

Plans were discussed, ideas exchanged, and in August of that year Shively directed a letter to all K-Men for whom addresses could be obtained, announcing that the Kentucky-Florida State football game Nov. 4, 1961, had been designated by the University as "K-Day."

The second "K-Day" was Sept. 22, 1962 (UK vs. Florida State). University president Dr. Frank G. Dickey and Shively welcomed K-Men in attendance at a luncheon session. Wildcat football coach Charlie Bradshaw, a K-man himself, was the guest speaker.

After the luncheon, the K-Men went into executive session and formally adopted a constitution for an organization to be known as the "K-Men's Association." Seale was elected president, Harry Ulinski vice president, Dick Rushing, secretary, and Carl Combs, treasurer. The third "K-Day" was set for Sept. 21, 1963 (UK vs. VPI, which was coached by K-Man Jerry Claiborne).

The constitution was so constructed that lettermen of all sports at UK could become members of the organization.

In 1963, the Board of Directors inaugurated a "K-Man of the Year" award. That same year, more than \$2,000 was received from K-Men to furnish a "K-Room" in the



new Helen I. King Alumni House.

A "Dollars for Scholars" program, whereby the organization sponsored a UK freshman football game and a basketball game to help some worthy student gain an education, and an annual "K-Day Golf Tournament" at Paintsville also were started that year.

The scholarship program began with \$900 per year for four years (\$3,600) being awarded to the first recipient, beginning June 1, 1964. The program remained in force for several years before being changed to sponsorship of the annual Blue-White football game and an early basketball scrimmage. The K-Men's portion of monies received from these games is used to carry on the organization's activities. The scholarships are now financed by donations from private K-Men.

The guiding light behind the K-Day festivities at Paintsville is Dr. Paul B. Hall, who lettered in baseball for the Wildcats in the 1920s. K-Men from all over the U.S. meet in the beautiful Paintsville Country Club setting for two days of fellowship and golf. Members of the club furnish the carts and play golf with the K-Men. Bob Mullins and the "Moonliters" work diligently to furnish refreshments at Hole No. 6 and an outdoor picnic at Tee No. 11. The elaborate cookout of steak, lobster and trimmings "up the holler" is well known to those who have attended.

A "K-House," which had been a goal of the organization for some time, was realized when a plot of ground near Commonwealth Stadium was obtained from the University and a concerted drive started to raise \$100,000 from K-members and friends. Ground for the new K-House was broken Nov. 12, 1976. The building was in use in the fall of the following year.

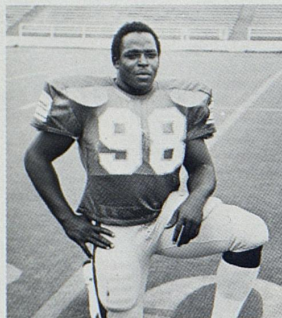

### OUTLOOK

Coach Jim Dickey returns 26 starters at the 22 offensive and defensive spots, including at least one everywhere except SE, ST and at a DE, with experienced veterans existing even at those three positions. The impressive numbers resulted from the redshirting of 10 lettermen a year ago, including eight senior starters and KSU lost only eight lettermen (including four starters) via graduation. Leading the offense is three-year starter QB Darrell Dickey, protected up front by such veteran linemen as Doug Hoppock (6-4, 262), Damian Johnson (6-5 265), Amos Donaldson (6-2, 2-5) and Tom Menas (6-3, 255). On defense, the front four — Reggie Singletary (6-7, 258), Mike Simeta (6-5, 260), Wade Wentling (6-7, 245), and Kyle Clawson (6-5, 242) could rate among the nation's best. In short, KSU is loaded on all fronts.

### SERIES HISTORY

In the first meeting between UK and KSU Oct. 15, 1961, at Lexington, UK ran up a 21-0 halftime score and turned most of the second half over to reserves, winning 21-8. The Blue Grass Wildcats stayed on the ground for their first touchdown, which was scored when halfback Gary Steward plunged over from the one with less than six minutes gone. Sophomore fullback Perky Bryant got the second TD on an eight-yard run near the end of the first quarter and All-America end candidate Tom Hutchinson got the other on a 10-yard pass from QB Jerry Woolum after time had run out at halftime. Kansas State's only score came on a 93-yard punt return by halfback Joe Searles with only 3:47 left in the game. Kentucky won, 16-3, in 1971 for a 2-0-0 lead in the series.

### LAST MEETING

Sept. 19, 1971 (Lexington) UK 16, KSU 3 — Thirteenth-ranked KSU took a 3-0 lead in the first half on a 32-yard field goal by Max Arreguin, but UK's defense, led by tackle Dave Roller, smothered Heisman Trophy candidate Lynn Dickey in the early going and limited the KSU running game to -91 yards. Kentucky knotted the score with 8:55 left in the third quarter when Bob Jones hit a field goal from 31 yards out. Arvel Carroll intercepted a pass on the K-State 20 late in the third quarter on one of the game's key plays, returning it to the seven. Cecil Bowens scored his second TD of the season on a run from the two. After an interception by Wilber Hackett, Wildcat QB Stan Forston banged over from the seven.

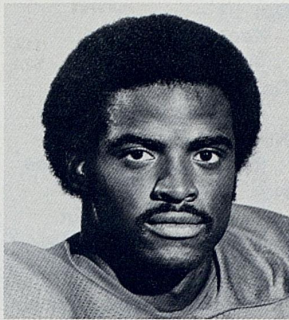

## OUTLOOK

Coach Barry Switzer is seeking to improve on defense, rebuild his offensive line, find some depth at quarterback and rearrange his offensive backfield. Defensively, OU returns 10 of 11 players who started against Houston in the Sun Bowl game while on offense they have such proven performers as Stanley Wilson, Fred Sims and Chet Winters. Wilson is an All-Big Eight back who rushed for 1,008 yards, averaging 6.5 per try. He missed the opportunity to break the all-time, single-season rushing standard for fullbacks when a rib injury forced him to miss the finale against Oklahoma State. Kelly Phelps, a senior, was the starting quarterback at the beginning of the 1981 season until laming an ankle late in the first half of the fifth game.

## SERIES HISTORY

In the first of only two meetings between the two schools, Oklahoma was ranked No. 1 and riding a 31-game winning streak and a heavy favorite to capture the 1951 Sugar Bowl championship. However, UK's defensive lineup, which at times featured four tackles, upset the precision of the Sooner split-T attack centered around QB Claude Arnold as the Wildcats pulled off a 13-7, upset. Walt Yowarsky, named the game's most outstanding player, set up the first Wildcat TD-pass from Babe Parilli to Wilbur Jamerson — by forcing and recovering a fumble by Arnold on the Sooner 22 less than three minutes after the kickoff. Jamerson scored again in that half, plunging over from the one-foot line after a 40-yard pass from Parilli to Al Bruno. The Sooners, after being stopped on first and goal on the UK four-yard-line in the third quarter, finally got on the board early in the fourth quarter, scoring on an 80-yard drive that utilized 12 plays and ended with Billy Vessels completing a TD pass to Merrill Green. Oklahoma evened the series at one each by defeating the Wildcats, 29-7, in 1980 at Norman.

## LAST MEETING

Sept. 13, 1980 (Norman) UK 7, Oklahoma 29 — The Wildcats led the fourth-ranked Sooners, 7-0, for 2½ quarters and were tied, 7-7, early in the final period. The Wildcats scored their touchdown on an eight-yard pass from Terry Henry to Jim Campbell after moving from their own 18-yard line to the Oklahoma 11 late in the second quarter. The Sooners tied the game when Chet Winters went in from the 13-yard line with 7:49 remaining in the third quarter. The Sooners got their big break when UK's Terry Henry fumbled a center snap and Sherdeill Breathett recovered for OU. Four plays later, QB J. C. Watts pitched the ball to David Overstreet and the senior halfback scooted three yards around right end into the end zone for a 13-7 OU lead. Oklahoma scored a safety, a 12-yard TD on a run by Watts and a 74-yard TD on a pass from Watts to Bobby Grayson.

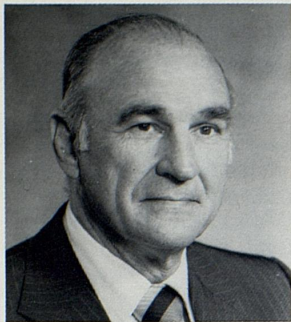

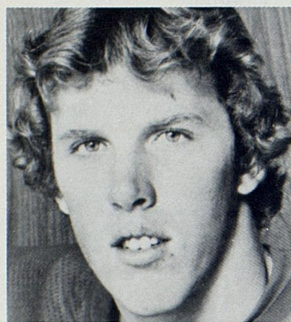

## OUTLOOK

The Jayhawks return 14 starters, nine on offense, along with a returning punter and placekicker. The backfield returns with junior QB Frank Seurer at the controls. Talent runs deep in the line, where only a new center and offensive right guard are sought. All of the receivers return, including all-league pass catcher Wayne Capers. Along with all the starting backs, the Jayhawks also will have the services of all-conference tailback Kerwin Bell, who missed the bulk of the 1981 season with knee surgery. The story is not so bright on defense, where six starters are gone, including both LBs and the NG. All-conference and All-America candidate Bucky Scribner is one of the nation's premier punters. Kansas comes off an 8-4 season and third place in the tough Big Eight Conference. The Jayhawks expect to improve on that mark.

## SERIES HISTORY

Kentucky and Kansas met for the first time on the gridiron in 1975, with the Jayhawks capitalizing on three crucial Wildcat mistakes to take home a 14-10 victory. Kansas had scored first in the first half after Eric Franklin got off an electrifying 77-yard run, fifth longest in Jayhawk history, before being brought down by tackle Jerry Blanton. Nolan Cromwell scored from the seven. The Cats launched a second half comeback, erasing the 7-0 deficit on a 47-yard field goal by John Pierce and a four-yard touchdown by Derrick Ramsey with 11:09 left. Kentucky had possession, third and seven on its own 41-yard-line when Ramsey was hit at the point of exchange on a tight end reverse to Vin Hoover and fumbled. Chris Golub recovered for Kansas. Five plays and two critical penalties later, the Jayhawks scored as Laverne Smith went 16 unmolested yards around the Jayhawk right end. The following year, Kansas won, 37-6, on a sweltering day in Lawrence and then defeated UK, 21-16, last year in Lawrence to take a 3-0-0 lead in the series.

## LAST MEETING

Sept. 26, 1981 (Lawrence) UK 16, Kansas 21 — The Jayhawks lost Kerwin Bell — winner in 1980 of both the Newcomer and Offensive Player of the Year awards in the Big Eight Conference — to a knee injury with seven minutes left in the first half. Meanwhile, UK defenders made nine hits behind the line for 57 negative yards and permitted only nine completions in 19 tries for 57 yards. With 8:55 left, Kansas was trailing, 16-8, and had managed 162 yards of total offense. The UK offense also was lethargic, gaining 84 net yards in 40 rushing attempts and producing points only because of an inspired effort by QB Randy Jenkins, who completed 14 passes for 160 yards to seven different receivers. He hit TE Jim Campbell with an 18-yard touchdown pass with 9:07 to go in the second quarter to expand a 3-2 lead to 10-2. Tom Griggs kicked field goals of 24 and 32 yards while Rick Strein tied a school record with a 52-yard FG to make the score 13-8 just before halftime. Garfield Taylor, a sophomore subbing for Bell, slowly began to dominate the game, leading a 65-yard, seven-play march for the winning TD on Walter Mack's two-yard plunge in the final minute.

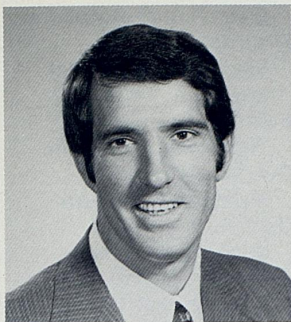

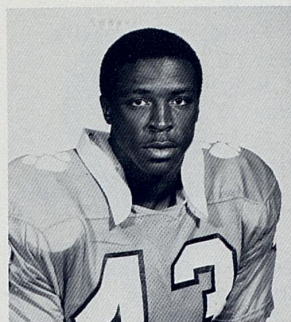

## OUTLOOK

The national champion Tigers return 22 lettermen, including six starters, on offense, but must replace 80 percent of the line. The backfield is in better shape, returning seven backs with a collective total of 16 letters. Leading the offense is All-America candidate Homer Jordan, who hit 107 of 196 attempts last year for 1,630 yds. to lead the ACC in passing. Also returning is Cliff Austin, who led Tiger rushers with 824 yds. The defense returns 28 lettermen, including seven starters, led by All-America FS Terry Kinard. The front five may be the Tigers' best all-around area on defense. Dan Benish is the top returning player. Returning to stop up the middle are the "bruise brothers" — William Perry (6-3, 300) and William Devane (6-2, 250), alternating at MG. Clemson has the best sophomore kicking combo in Dale Hatcher, who led the ACC in punting with a 43.4 average, and Donald Igwebuike, who hit 10 of 17 FGs in '81. Bob Pauling, who set a Clemson record for consecutive extra points in '81, handles the short kicks.

## SERIES HISTORY

Clemson teams of the past apparently liked to visit the Heart of the Blue Grass, although for the most part they were not satisfied with the results. The first six games between the Wildcats and the Tigers were played in Lexington, with the invaders notching only one victory, a 14-0 shutout in 1938. The series was begun in 1925, with Coach Fred J. Murphy's Wildcats winning, 19-6, en route to a 6-3 season. Captain of that team was A. D. (AB) Kirwan, who later became Wildcat coach, dean of men and president of the University. Four years later, the Wildcats defeated the Tigers, 44-6, for their fifth win in a row for Coach Harry Gamage. Up to that time, no team had crossed the Wildcat goal line and Gamage's forces had scored a total of 151 points. The Wildcats lost to Alabama, defeated VMI and tied Tennessee for a fine 6-1-1 record. Clemson returned to Lexington again in 1934 and was on the short end of a 7-0 score; the Wildcats that season under Chet Wynne had a 5-5 record. Two years later, Wynne's forces won, 7-6, over the Tigers. Another two years elapsed before Clemson returned to town and blanked Kirwan's forces, 14-0. Clemson lost to Bear Bryant's Wildcats, 27-14, in 1952 at Lexington and to John Ray's 1971 team, 13-10, at Clemson. In the latter game, UK's sophomore Doug Kotar took the opening kickoff and ran 98 yards to paydirt. Kentucky needed field goals of 34 and 27 yards from Tom Kirk to win that game. After Clemson won last year in Lexington, the series stood at 6-2-0 UK.

## LAST MEETING

Oct. 3, 1982 (Lexington) UK 3, Clemson 21 — The Cats marched 47 yards in 11 plays midway of the first quarter and got on the board with a 40-yard field goal by Tom Griggs. They held a 3-0 lead until early in the third quarter, when Clemson took the second-half kickoff and marched 83 yards in 13 plays, with Kevin Mack scoring from the 11. On their next possession, which came after a Richard Abraham fumble was recovered on the UK 21, the Tigers scored in six plays, with Homer Jordan plunging over from the three. 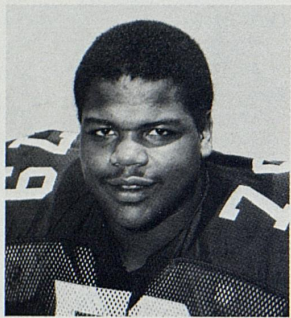

## OUTLOOK

The Tigers' strength begins on defense with Donnie Humphrey, 6-foot-2, 276, senior tackle, an honorable All-America in 1981. Chris Martin leads a fine LB corps while Auburn also feels good about its secondary. The biggest problem could be the offensive backfield, where Coach Pat Dye must settle on a QB, an RB and a FB. Soph. Clayton Beauford will battle Ken Hobby, Randy Campbell and John Murphy. He played QB and RB last season, averaged 21.6 yds. on 18 kickoff returns, gained 134 yards on 42 carries and directed Auburn on a 63-yard TD drive against Florida. Dye also seeks consistent play from his split ends, a problem Mike Edwards may solve. The Tigers have one thing going: they play their first six games at home, two straight on the road, two at home and close against Alabama at Birmingham.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Wildcats and Tigers first got together on the football field in Lexington in 1934 — the year after the SEC was organized — and played another game the following year at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 game, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision for UK. Games between the two since have been fraught with frustration. Kentucky walked away with a memorable 14-12 upset victory in 1961 on the Tigers' home ground, where no Auburn eleven had been beaten in 30 straight games. Prior to that victory, UK had been able to score only once in five years on the stingy Plainsmen. Before the series was interrupted in 1971, the Tigers had won five straight games by impressive margins, outscoring the Wildcats 151 to 32. The 31-13 Auburn victory in 1974 and a 18-9 victory in 1975 gave the Tigers a 16-5-1 edge over the Wildcats.

## LAST MEETING

Oct. 11, 1975 (Lexington) UK 9, Auburn 15 — Fourth-quarter fumbles on kickoff returns by UK's two premier running backs allowed Auburn to score two TDs and stun the Wildcats, 15-9. The Cats went into the final seven minutes with a 9-0 lead on three field goals by John Pierce from several yards out. Auburn then scored its first passing TD of the year when QB Phil Gargis found split end Jeff Gilligan over the middle for a 73-yard play. The Tigers kicked off to Sonny Collins, who brought the ball back 22 yards before fumbling on the UK 23. Two plays later, on a third and four situation, FB Kenny Burks zipped through a hole in the middle and scored a 17-yard TD as a stunned crowd of 59,696 watched in disbelief. A two-point conversion pass from Gargis to TE Ed Butler put the Tigers in front, 15-9. Steve Campassi returned the kickoff 14 yards before he was hit. The ball squirted from his arms and was caught in mid-air by Auburn's Terry Fuller, and the Tigers were again inside the 20. UK held that time.

## OUTLOOK

Returning for the Tigers are 45 lettermen, including 10 starters on offense and 12 on defense, and sr. CB James Britt, who has earned three letters, but was held out on "hardship" after receiving a broken arm last season. Catalyst for the offense will be sr. QB Alan Risher, who completed 150 of 238 passes for .630%, second best in the nation. A critical area is the receiving corps, which lost Orlando McDaniel, who caught 41 passes. Defense will be spearheaded by LBs Albert Richardson and Lawrence Williams. Kicker David Johnston, whose 47 points led the Tigers, has departed but there should be depth there with James Wagner returning, along with a couple fine freshman prospects.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Wildcats started the series with shutout victories at Baton Rouge in 1949 and Lexington the following year. The teams played on a pretty even keel until LSU took command with a 21-0 victory at Lexington in 1957, won the next two in a row, lost to UK, 3-0, and then won 13 in a row until the 1974 squad won, 20-13, in Lexington. The Tigers bounced back, 17-14, the following year at Baton Rouge. Kentucky won the next two games and has lost the past four games. In the 1981 meeting, UK got inside the LSU 10-yard line three times without scoring a touchdown. The score was tied after UK drove 35 yards for a TD midway of the final quarter, but LSU took the kickoff and marched 80 yards in 13 plays and then kicked the extra point for a 17-10 victory. The Tigers' win at Baton Rouge last season gave them a 23-8-1 lead in the series.

## LAST MEETING

Oct. 7, 1981 (Baton Rouge) UK 10, LSU 24 — The Tigers took the opening kickoff and never trailed as the Wildcats, starting Terry Henry at QB for the first time in four games, could muster only a field goal and one TD despite its best running attack of the season. The Cats gained 203 yards on the ground and had their three longest runs of the season, with a 62-yard dash by Henry Parks bringing them to within seven points (17-10) with 2:53 remaining in the third quarter. LSU countered immediately when freshman Eric Martin fielded an ensuing kickoff two yards deep in the end zone and returned it 100 yards for a TD. Kentucky didn't threaten again, mustering only three first downs in the final quarter.

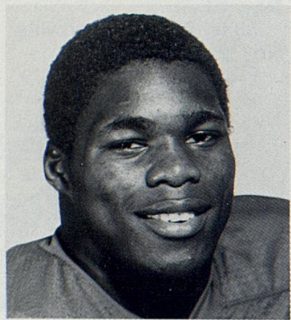

## OUTLOOK

With two consecutive SEC championships tucked away and a combined record of 22-2 the past two years, Georgia's Bulldogs are looking toward an unprecedented third straight league title in 1982. "We will be without a quarterback with any game experience and without a premier receiver," says Head Coach Vince Dooley. "Buck Belue (3-year QB starter) and Lindsay Scott (4-year FLK starter) are two of the three players most instrumental in our success the past two years. We are in a very critical situation." The offensive unit returns seven starters, the hub of which will be two-time consensus All-America tailback Herschel Walker. The defense returns eight starters and will be led by All-America candidate Jimmy Payne at DT, DE Freddie Gilbert, and CB Ronnie Harris. The kicking game returns intact with All-SEC PK Kevin Butler who set two SEC records last year and Punter Jim Broadway.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Wildcats broke a seven-year drought by defeating the Bulldogs, 12-7, at Athens in 1973 and then lost three in a row before coming back with a convincing 33-0 win at Athens in 1977. The two schools have met almost annually since 1939, with Georgia leading 24-7-2. During the 22 years that Wally Butts coached the Bulldogs, Georgia won nine of 14 games; however, Butts' four SEC champions managed an average win of only 11 points over UK. Led by All-American Herschel Walker, the Bulldogs defeated the Wildcats the past two years for four consecutive wins. Kentucky's defense "held" heralded freshman Walker to 131 yards on 31 carries in 1980, but the eventual national champions had too much offensive balance and defensive strength for the 'Cats.

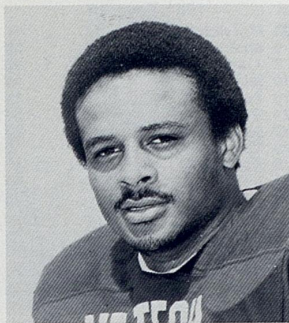
## LAST MEETING

Oct. 24, 1981 (Athens) UK 0, UG 21 — For the second year in a row, UK's defense hung tough, holding the sixth-ranked Bulldogs scoreless over the game's final 23 minutes. Georgia managed its second-lowest point total of 1981, scoring 10 points below its per-game average and coming up 55 yards shy to its total-offense average. The Bulldogs got their first 10 points the easy way, parlaying a recovered UK fumble and an intercepted pass into a field goal by freshman Kevin Butler and a TD by Herschel Walker. The Bulldogs scored a clinching third-quarter TD only after a bizarre play on which a Georgia punt nicked the helmet of a UK player. Walker netted 129 yards in 33 carries. The Wildcats didn't put anything together until Randy Jenkins, who replaced Terry Henry on the first play of the fourth quarter, teamed with TB Henry Parks on a 46-yard pass play. A sack ended that march, but Jenkins, hitting Parks for 19 yards and TE Jim Campbell for 15 and 17, later drove UK from its own 20 to the Georgia two. The drive ended when a second down fumble by Richard Abraham was recovered by CB Steve Kelly.

## OUTLOOK

Cyrus Lawrence, one of the country's premier running backs, and 14 other starters return as Tech shoots for another winning season. The big trouble spot is at quarterback, where Coach Bill Dooley must find a replacement for Steve Casey, who passed for 1,083 yards and scored six TDs last season. His chief backups, Jeff Bolton and Eddie Otey, also graduated. Meanwhile, Lawrence enters his senior year with impressive credentials, rushing for 1,403 yards last year for a three-year total of 3,415 yds. Other bonafide all-star candidates at Tech are sr. DT Padro Phillips, jr. LB Ashley Lee, sr. DT Wally Browne and sr. SE Mike Giacalone. The two leading kicking specialists also return. Don Wade led the team in scoring with 62 points while making 13 of 18 FGs while punter Bill Renner averaged 39.5 per kick.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Wildcats hold a 9-4-2 edge in a series that began Oct. 30, 1926, with a 13-13 tie on old Stoll Field. Led by John (Shipwreck) Kelly, UK won 20-6 the following year and did not play Tech again until five years later. The series was resumed in the war years with UK winning, 37-14, at Louisville, and then settling for a tie, 21-21, at Roanoke. After a 21-year absence, the series resumed with UK winning, 33-14, in Lexington. Coach Jerry Claiborne, a UK alumnus, brought his team to Lexington in 1966 to beat a UK team that was coached by his old teammate and friend, Charlie Bradshaw. The Gobblers won, 24-14, the following year to tie the series. Tech's 29-3 victory last year at Lexington ended a seven-game UK win streak.

## LAST MEETING

Oct. 31, 1981 (Lexington) UK 3, VPI 29 — Virginia Tech scored in every quarter while holding the Wildcats to a 40-yard field goal by Tom Griggs in the second quarter before a homecoming crowd in Commonwealth Stadium. Wingback Billy Hite started the onslaught by skirting right end on a pitchout on a 32-yard scoring drive that started after Jeremiah Thomas recovered a Randy Jenkins' fumble at the UK 32 late in the first quarter. On their next series, the Gobblers marched 26 yards and settled for a 37-yard field goal by Don Wade after John Ludlow returned a UK punt 34 yards. Wade scored another field goal after the Gobblers marched 60 yards in 11 plays midway of the second quarter. Early in the third quarter, UK's fate was sealed after Bill Renner recovered a fumbled punt by UK's Andy Molls on the UK 13 and Larry Lawrence plunged over from the one two plays later.

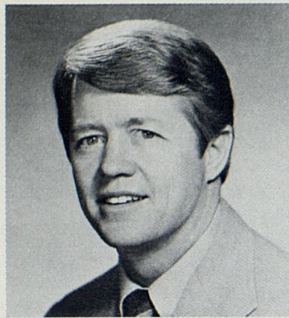

## OUTLOOK

The Commodores return 46 of 57 lettermen, including six offensive starters, seven defensive regulars and consensus All-SEC punter Jim Arnold. Gone from last year's team are both starting DTs and three OL regulars, including All-SEC performer Ken Hammond. The good news is that QB Whit Taylor is back along with three players who caught 42 or more passes last year. Taylor completed 209 of 357 passes for 2,318 yds. and 15 TDs last season. His targets include Allama Matthews, 50 receptions for 704 yards and four TDs, and TB Norman Jordan, who led the SEC with 49 receptions for 454 yds. and three TDs. Fullback Ernie Goolsby caught 42 passes for 359 yards while rushing 75 times for 310 yards and four TDs, including three against Tennessee. The defense must find a replacement for standout MLB Andrew Coleman. Leading tackler Joe Staley is back at LB while the secondary returns three of four starters.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Wildcats and Commodores first met on the gridiron in 1896 in a series that is one of the South's oldest from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. The record stood solidly in the Commodores' favor in the early going as they shut out the Wildcats the first 11 games, winning 10 of those games and settling for a scoreless tie in the other. They won the next six games, registering two more shutouts in the process, before UK finally won, 21-13, in 1939 at Nashville. The teams tied, 7-7, the following year before Vandy lost three in a row to the Wildcats. The Wildcats started dominating the series in the early 1960s and have won 17 of the last 22 games, with one ending in a tie. Their victory last season gave them six in a row and cut the Vandy lead to 27-23-4.

## LAST MEETING

Nov. 7, 1981 (Nashville) UK 17, VU 10 — Despite a fine performance by record-setting VU quarterback Whit Taylor, who hit 26 of 44 attempts for 230 yards and a touchdown, the Commodores fell to UK's new "I" formation, which sent little-used sophomore "Choo Choo" Lee out of the tailback slot for 83 yards. However, the star of the game was free safety Andy Molls, who returned six punts 195 yards, including an 87-yard TD return that broke a 10-10 tie and gave UK the victory with 5:29 remaining in the game. Vandy had taken possession on the UK 30 after Pete Venable fumbled on UK's second play after the opening kickoff. The Commodores scored seven plays later on a four-yard Taylor-to-Allama Matthews pass. The Commodores made it 10-0 with a 23-yard field goal by Mike Woodard. Kentucky cut the margin to 10-7 early in the first quarter on a 10-yard run by frosh John Gay and then tied it with a third-quarter, 35-yard FG by Griggs.

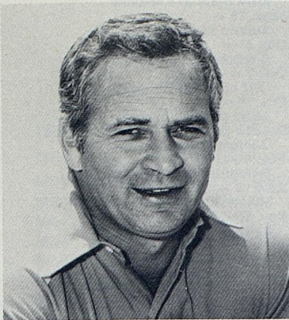

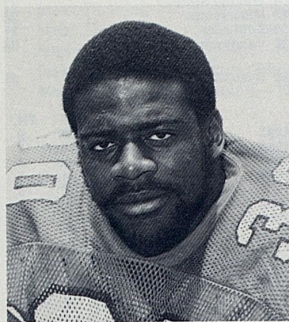

### OUTLOOK

Florida returns 52 lettermen, including a majority of the unit that led the SEC in a total defense last season. Gone are All-America tackle David Galloway and nose-guard Robin Fisher, but lettermen juniors Roy Harris and Glenn Meyers, along with sophomores Alton Jones and Tim Newton will be joined by senior tackle John Whittaker, who returns after a hardship redshirt season. All of the 1981 offensive linemen return, including seniors Dan Fike, Ryan Fraser, Dan Plonk and John Redmond, juniors Russell Gallon, John Hunt, Buddy Schultheis, John Moyle and Andy Smith and sophs Phil Bromley, Lomas Brown and Ricky Williams. Top returning runningback is All-SEC James Jones. Other lettermen at that position are seniors Johnell Brown and Steve Miller and soph Lorenzo Hampton. The Gators' main problem is replacing senior punter Joe Borajkiewicz and record-setting placekicker Brian Clark.

### SERIES HISTORY

Gator victories the last two seasons evened at 16-16-0 a series that began with a 52-0 UK victory at Lexington in 1917. Kentucky held a 12-4 advantage through 1956, with Florida managing only a pair of victories prior to 1952. An unusual moment occurred in 1955 when Delmar Hughes, Wildcat QB sidelined earlier in the game with a broken nose, came off the bench and kicked a 20-yard field goal to give UK a 10-7 decision. A year later, Lou Michaels kicked a rain-soaked ball 34 yards with two seconds remaining in the first half to put the Wildcats ahead to stay. Since 1956, Florida has defeated UK 12 out of 17 games. The 1974 Wildcats defeated the Sugar-Bowl-bound Gators, 41-24, in a game that included a school-record 52-yard field goal by UK's John Pierce. The Wildcats lost at Gainesville in 1975, won two in a row, split two games and then lost to the Gators the past two years.

### LAST MEETING

Nov 14, 1981 (Gainesville) UK 12-33 — After Rick Strein missed a 41-yard field goal attempt on UK's first possession, the Gators marched 76 yards in 11 plays with James Jones scoring from the two. Early in the second half, nose-guard Robin Fisher recovered a Tom Boyle fumble on the UK three; Jones took it in on the next play. On UK's next series, Ivory Curry intercepted a Boyle pass on the UK 33 and returned it to the UF 43. A 39-yard Wayne Peace to Dwayne Dixon pass carried to the one, where Lorenzo Hampton plunged for the score. Florida scored on its next possession as Peace connected with Bee Lang on a 24-yard TD pass. The first half ended with Kerry Baird intercepting a Peace pass in UK territory. Kentucky got on the board late in the third quarter, capitalizing on a UF fumble that Tim McDonald recovered on the UF 21. Randy Jenkins hit Henry parks from the one. Florida had scored a safety just before that play.

## OUTLOOK

The Vols entered yet another season with a big question mark hovering over the quarterback position. Coach Johnny Majors is placing a lot of hope on Alan Cockrell, a sophomore who was promoted to starting QB three games into last season, led the Vols to a win over Colorado and then received a knee injury against Auburn. A key man in the offense is Willie Gault, a premier receiver and returner of punts and kickoffs. Doug Furnas, a junior college recruit from Oklahoma, was a pleasant discovery at FB last year. The defense is led by Reggie White, an outstanding junior tackle. The Vols have great hopes for Rickie Holt at defensive end and Carl Zander at LB. The defensive backfield returns intact, led by Daryl Harper and Bill Bates.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Vols hold a 46-22-9 edge in a series that is among the oldest football rivalries in the nation, dating back to a 56-0 Wildcat victory Oct. 21, 1893, in Knoxville. Except for three war years (1917-18, 1943), the schools have met annually on the gridiron. The Wildcats pretty well held their own in the early games, but the tide began to turn after the 1925 season, when the best UK could do was tie UT twice in the next nine games. After UK won, 27-0, in 1935, Tennessee put together 12 straight victories, fought UK to a 0-0 tie and then won three more and tied one before UK also won three in a row in 1957-58-59 and tied UT in 1960, but the Vols won 13 of the next 15 before UK won in 1976 and 1977. Tennessee won three more in a row before UK broke the string last season.

## LAST MEETING

Nov. 21, 1982 (Lexington) UK 21, UT 10 — The Wildcats fell behind, 10-0, as UT got on the board with a 23-yard field goal by Fuad Reveiz and a 65-yard TD pass from Steve Alatorre to Anthony Hancock with 7:55 remaining in the second quarter. Operating out of an "I" formation featuring "Choo Choo" Lee, the Wildcats, starting at their own 20, sent Richard Abraham for 26. A Randy Jenkins to Rick Massie pass was good for 58 yards to the UK one. Lee plunged for the score. After Don Fielder recovered a Hancock fumble at the UT 23, UK drove to the 10, where Jenkins hit Pete Venable for the go-ahead score. An eight-yard Jenkins to Massie pass early in the third quarter completed the scoring.

**University of Kentucky Radio**

The U.K. Sports Network, a division of the Kentucky Network, is in its third year of a three-year contract to broadcast UK sports. The network was expanded last year to 81 markets with more than 100 stations in Kentucky and across the country. Fans in more than 40 states hear the games on the network's two 50,000 watt stations — WHAS-Louisville and WCKY-Cincinnati.

Co-ordinator of the network is D. J. Everett, a 1969 graduate of the University. The "Voice of the Wildcats" is Cawood Ledford, now in his 30th year of covering Wildcat sports. Assisting Ledford is Ralph Hacker, president and general manager of radio station WVLK-Lexington, who is in his 11th year as color commentator. Tom Stevens mans the network's wireless microphone on the sidelines while Tom Devine is technical director for the broadcasts.

In the network studios, Harvey Combs, Stan Cook, Steve Bowles and Jerry Snapp are on hand to handle engineering, production and scoring.

**Kentucky Television Network**

The Wildcat Television Network, in its fifth year, will present via delayed telecasts, all home games on the 1982 Wildcat schedule.

Rob Bromley, WKYT-TV news director, is in his third year on play-by-play. Charlie McCullers, a former UK assistant coach, is in his second year as color commentator.

WKYT-TV Vice President Ralph Gabbard said there will be no live game coverage by his station this fall. In addition to its delayed game coverage, WKYT will air the annual Coach's Show, which was the property of WTVQ-TV last season.

Footnote A — Although numerical scoring had not yet been introduced in Rugby football, either here or in Great Britain, when Kentucky and Transylvania (then known as Kentucky University) played their series in 1881, persons in charge of the games obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning values to the various scoring plays. Records never existed and men who played in the games are now deceased. All we can do is accept the scores printed in the newspapers and surmise that a touchdown perhaps counted ¼ point and that a goal or an end-kick (a punt into the modern end zone) counted 1. That seems logical, since in the ratio scoring of that day, a touchdown was worth one-quarter of a goal. The end-kick, a British heritage, undoubtedly was introduced because all realized that green players would score few goals, if any.

Footnote B — The football rules took no official position on the score of a forfeited game until 1908 when it was pegged at 1-0 to make it different from any other score possible in the game. By common consent, forfeited games prior to that were entered into the records as victories by 6-0 for the offended team — everywhere, that is, except in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, predecessor of the Southern Conference and the Southeastern Conference. In the S.I.A.A., the 6-0 practice was followed unless the offended team had a greater number of points. In that case, the offended team won by the greater score to nothing. Thus, Kentucky's forfeiture to Central University in 1900 is 6-0, since Kentucky led by 11-0 at the time. Kentucky led Cumberland by 12-11 in 1905 when the Tennesseans forfeited. The Blue and White, under S.I.A.A. rules, gets credit for a 12-0 victory.

## DEPARTMENT ADDS NEW ACADEMIC LEARNING CENTER

In keeping with the continued emphasis that athletics director Cliff Hagan has placed on the academic life of its student-athletes, the University of Kentucky Department of Athletics this fall opened its new Academic Learning Center in Memorial Coliseum.

The Center contains a large study area, a casual reading lounge, an individualized reading aids center, graduate assistant offices, a career center and several tutoring rooms.

Bob Bradley, assistant to the athletics director for academic affairs, said the Center provides many services to the student-athlete, foremost of which is a diversified reading program that covers everything from a complete diagnosis of reading development for students to courses in critical reading, reading study skills and speed reading.

"Athletics has acquired the assistance of a professor in UK's graduate reading program to coordinate what should be the best reading clinic available to athletes,

comparable to any in the nation," Bradley said.

He said Hagan has always taken a special interest in his department and has gone the "extra mile" to ensure that UK athletes graduate. "There is no doubt in my mind that Mr. Hagan has the student-athlete's best interest at heart," he said. "The new Academic Learning Center is a prime example of his concern."

In addition to Hagan, Bradley said the project has the wholehearted support of Jerry Claiborne, who "believes in his players graduating."

"Coach Claiborne was an excellent student himself," Bradley said. "He majored in mathematics and he knows the importance of the college degree. He has an individual meeting with each player at the beginning of every semester and stresses academics, career and life goals.

"He really makes the players toe the line academically and whenever a coach takes on that responsibility, it helps us attain our goal for the student-athlete, which is GRADUATION!"





## Social, Cultural and Recreational

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. 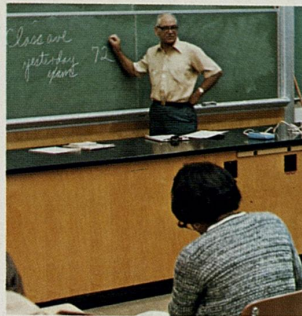
There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.
