### A NEW ERA IN EDUCATION

A NEW ERA IN EDUCATION

American colleges and universities are now entering a new era in educational methods, an era that
didison Hibbard, dean of the College of Liberal Arts
at the University of North Carolina, designates as
the third in history of the world. The first period,
which he describes as "that marked by education in
the dispersion of the college of Liberal Arts
