I am pleased to provide you with this fact booklet which contains a brief summary of the University of Kentucky's 1998-1999 Operating and Capital Budget; a profile of current facts about enrollment, tuition and fees, degrees conferred, faculty salaries, external support, the staffing complement, library collections, land and space, equipment, and the status of new facilities; and information about the many excellent programs underway at the University of Kentucky.

The past year has been one of the most exciting in UK's history. The opening of the \$58 million William T. Young Library is the cornerstone in moving the University of Kentucky toward becoming one of the top-20 public institutions of higher learning in the country. Along with the new library, another major accomplishment of the past year which helps to launch the University of Kentucky toward top-20 status among all public research universities in the country by the year 2020 is the authorization of a \$100 million Research Challenge Trust Fund by the General Assembly; UK will be eligible for two-thirds of these funds by raising matching funds. This funding is in addition to \$4 million in recurring research dollars made available by the state in 1997-98 and also matched by the University and a \$17.5 million research equipment bond pool available in 1999.


Following a year-long effort involving participation of faculty, staff and students from throughout the University, a new Strategic Plan for the University has been developed. This plan is a blueprint approved by the UK Board of Trustees in May that will clearly guide UK to meet pinpointed goals and objectives during 1998-2003. The University is launching a multi-million dollar fund-raising campaign to address the priorities in the Strategic Plan. Along these same lines, the Task Force on Research and Graduate Education identified university-wide areas of strength and targets of opportunity, led by UK faculty and administrators. This exhaustive study positions us well for the future as we seek to build upon those areas that are already distinguished and nationally competitive.

Because of the support of the state legislature and the generosity of University supporters in the private sector, the coming academic year will see a flurry of new construction. In the spring, construction will begin on the long-anticipated Mechanical Engineering Building. There will also be new construction for Phase II of the Aging/Allied Health Building, Phase I of the Animal

Science Research Center, the Agricultural Plant Sciences Facility, the expansion of Commonwealth Stadium, the Women's Cancer Center, a new Career Center, and two laboratory buildings at the Coldstream Research Campus.

As we move into the 2000-2002 biennium, it is critical that we maintain and build on the momentum achieved during the past year and work toward a sustained commitment from the state as well as continued significant private support to advance us toward our vision for the University - "enhancing the University's stature as one of the nation's great universities."

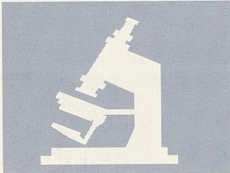
TEACHING

The Academic Quality of the University of Kentucky is Widely Recognized.

- ◆ UK receives high marks from national publications for the quality of its academic programs:
 - *U.S. News and World Report* ranks the UK College of Medicine 20th out of 125 in its ranking of best primary care medical colleges.
 - *U.S. News and World Report* ranks the College of Pharmacy third best in its 1997 "America's Best Graduate Schools" issue.
 - *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the UK Martin School of Public Policy and Administration 36th among 248 public affairs graduate programs.
 - *The Student Guide to America's 100 Best College Buys* includes UK and cites the university's liberal arts and engineering programs as strengths.
- ◆ The UK faculty is highly qualified with approximately 98 percent having the highest degree available in their fields.
- ◆ The quality of the fall 1998 freshman class on the Lexington Campus is outstanding. The top 25 percent scored 27 or higher on their ACT. The class, which had a record high school grade point average of 3.46, includes 74 National Merit Scholars, 127 Governor's Scholars and 103 high school valedictorians.
- ◆ The Graduate School awarded a record 1,365 degrees in 1997-98, including 232 doctoral degrees and 1,133 master's and specialist degrees.
- ◆ The Dental Laboratory Technology program at Lexington Community College is ranked 6th in the nation, based on the average score of graduates on the Recognized Graduate Examination.

Maximizing Access to Higher Education is a High Priority of the University of Kentucky.

- ◆ Total student enrollment was more than 30,500 in fall 1998, including 6,118 students at Lexington Community College.
- ◆ The fall 1998 enrollment of African American students at UK increased by five percent.
- ◆ Enrollment at Lexington Community College increased by 10 percent from fall 1997 to fall 1998, including a 25 percent increase in the enrollment of African American students.
- ◆ In fall 1998 UK enrolled students from every county in Kentucky, from 50 states, and from 118 countries, providing an educational environment rich in diversity.
- ◆ The new William T. Young Library opened on April 3, 1998, providing unsurpassed access to state-of-the-art information technology and services for citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- ◆ Now in its second year, the Robinson Scholars program has 277 participants. These potential first-generation college students from 29 eastern Kentucky counties will receive free tuition to the University of Kentucky or a community college upon successful completion of high school.
- ◆ Lexington Community College is directing an \$850,000 National Science Foundation grant project to set up an associate degree program in network systems administration at five community colleges.



RESEARCH

UK is One of the Major Research Institutions in the United States.

- ◆ The Carnegie Foundation has designated UK as a Research University of the First Class, one of only 59 public universities so ranked.
- ◆ UK faculty and staff attracted a record \$131.4 million in outside grants, contracts and gifts in 1997-98, representing a 34 percent increase over the last five years.
- ◆ UK is ranked 46th among public research universities, according to the most recent results of the National Science Foundation (NSF) survey of research and development expenditures.
- ◆ The UK Center on Drug and Alcohol Research received funding for a six-year extension of a cooperative project titled, "AIDS Prevention for Drug Injectors in Kentucky."
- ◆ A new supercomputer recently installed at UK handles 49 billion calculations per second and places UK in the front ranks of universities in the area of computation-based research. Examples of such projects include:
 - *Research in astrophysics that has brought in about \$1.5 million in grants since 1992.*
 - *The use of computer simulations to study complex fluid flow, generating more than \$250,000 in grants since last year.*
 - *The use of supercomputers to analyze the plaques and certain lipoproteins that physicians may be able to use to identify weakened blood vessels.*

PUBLIC SERVICE

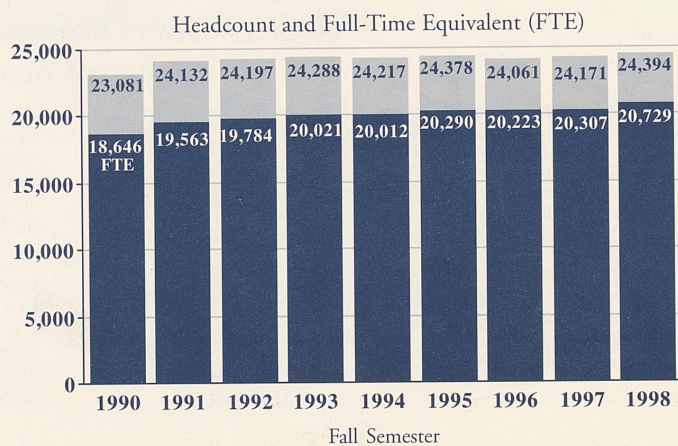
The University of Kentucky's Public Service Programs Reach Out into Every County in the Commonwealth and Beyond.

- ◆ The UK Cooperative Extension Service makes more than 5 million service contacts every year, extending to each of Kentucky's 120 counties.
- ◆ Lexington Community College dental hygiene students provided free check-ups and dental hygiene education to nearly 170 children during the pediatric clinic week in February.
- ◆ Faculty at UK are working with South Africans in a 10-year program designed to fight the HIV/AIDS epidemic. Using an educational model designed for graduate studies in social work, they are training professionals who will eventually work in the towns and villages of South Africa.
- ◆ Approximately 105 pharmacy students and faculty participated in numerous public service activities during the last year -- from staffing a "Life Adventure" camp for at-risk children to conducting medication information programs for senior citizens. Such activities are part of the growing service learning culture in the College and the University.
- ◆ Plans are underway in the UK College of Medicine to develop the Linda and Jack Gill Heart Institute, which will provide the highest level of excellence in patient care, research, education and prevention of cardiovascular disease. The vision of the institute includes serving as a catalyst for efforts to reduce the death rate from cardiovascular disease in Kentucky, which ranks fifth worst in the nation in coronary disease.

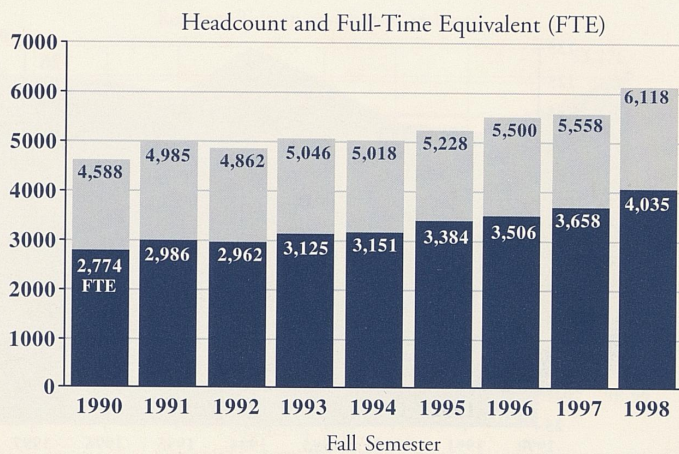

ENROLLMENT - Lexington Community College



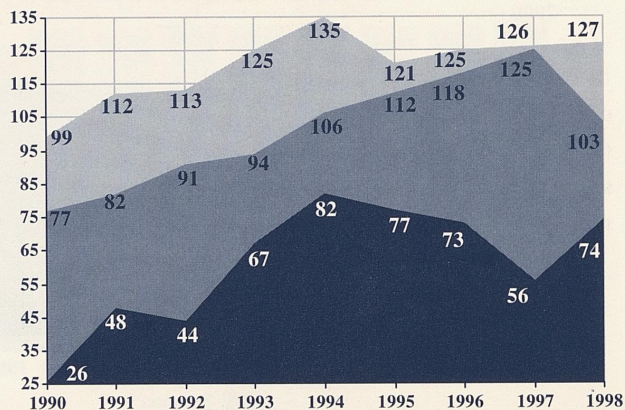
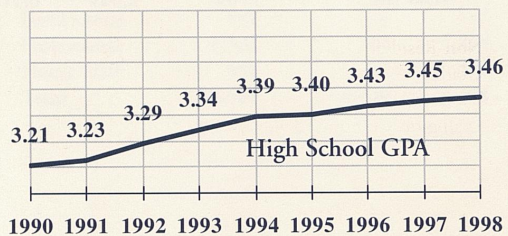
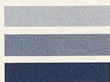

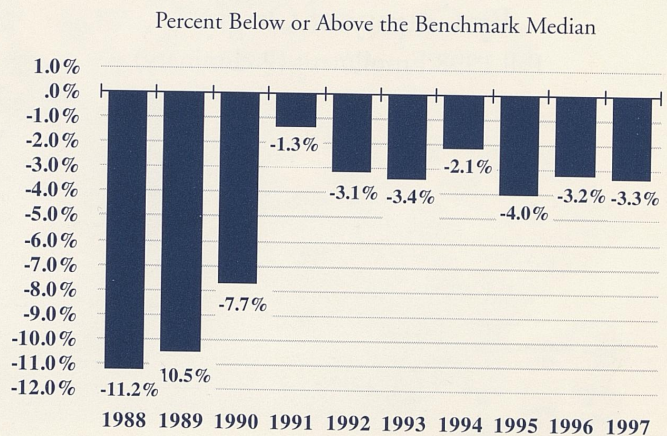
By County of Residence *

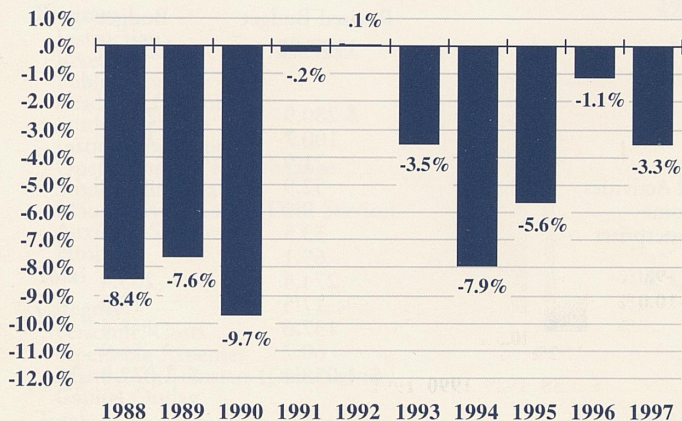

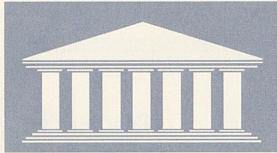
FACULTY SALARIES - Lexington Community College

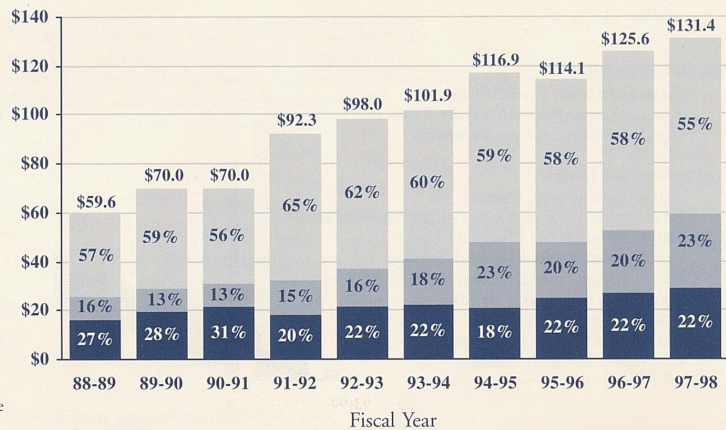

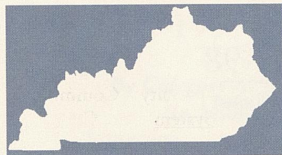

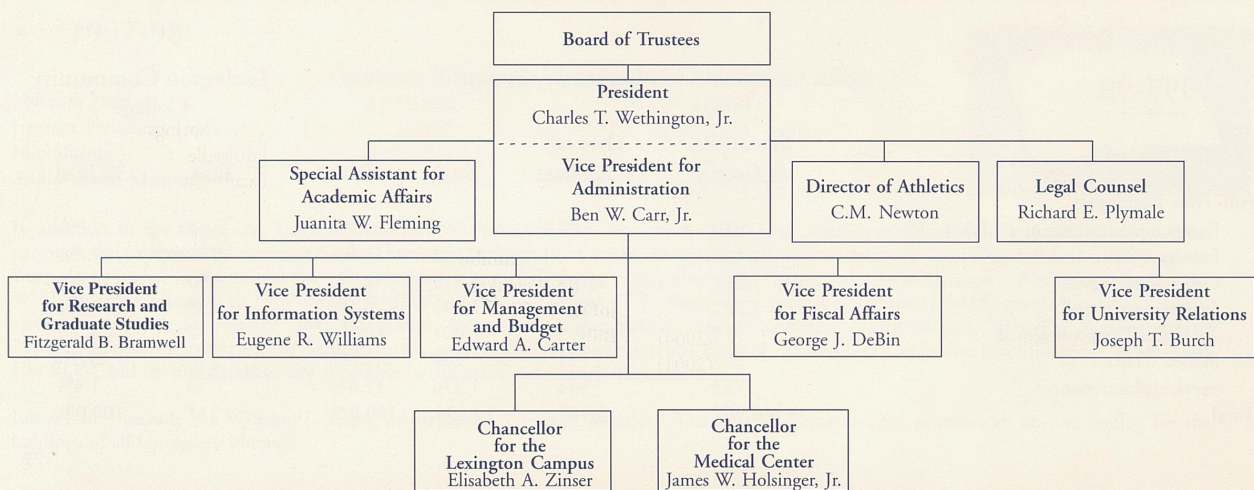
In addition to the above, the Library's collections include 240,647 maps; over 5,320 Oral History program interviews; 284 current state, national, and international newspapers; the University Archives and Records Program; Audio-Visual Archives; the Modern Political Archives; the Bert T. Combs Appalachian Collection, including the Appalachian Regional Commission Archives; and the W. Hugh Peal Collection of 19th century English and related literature. The library is a regional depository for U.S. government publications and is also a depository for European Economic Community and Canadian publications, British Parliamentary Papers, Kentucky government publications, and technical reports from federal agencies, all selectively collected. Numerous CD ROM and on-line databases are accessible in the main and branch libraries.

Library sites include the William T. Young Library and 12 branch libraries. The NOTIS library system provides an on-line catalog for the holdings of all University libraries.

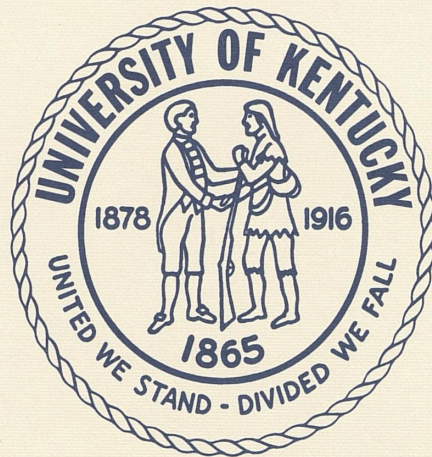
