Six employees whose positions will be eliminated July 1 pleaded with top administrators Friday to find them new jobs — even if those jobs are outside UK or unrelated to their field of expertise.

The employees, all from the Design and Construction Division, met with UK President Charles Weth-ington and Vice President for Ad-ministration Donald Clapp Friday to see what could be done about

finding new jobs.

"The employees) asked if there were some other things we could do to assist them both outside and inside the University and look for other kinds of jobs." Clapp said. The president simply assured them that we would do whatever we could in assisting them by looking at any position that became available."

### Profs: RU 486 research needed

The idea of chemically induced abortions frightens some. But two UK associate professors say it's important that people learn more about new medications that reduce health risks for women.

health risks for women.

One of those drugs is the controversial French pill RU 486, formerly banned in the United States.
President Clinton lifted the ban last month, paving the way for government research on the medication.

The drug also has been called the "morning-after pill" and the "French abortion pill." However, its correct generic name is mifepristone, and its scientific name comes from the French company, Roussel Uclaf, which produces the drug.

"RU 486 is a drug that has less risks to women than medications currently being used (in surgical abortions)," said Norman Pedigo, associate professor of pharmacolo-gy in the College of Medicine. It affects a key hormone involved

n menstruation and pregnancy mown as progesterone, he said. Important to success in reproduc-

important to success in reproduc-tion, progesterone increases signifi-cantly during pregnancy. When RU 486 is taken after fertilization, it blocks the progesterone and triggers menstruation and uterine contrac-tions, which initiates the abortion.

nons, which initiates the abortion.

"RU 486 could be used as a contraceptive that does not require daily activity from a woman," said Michael Vernon, director of Reproductive Endocrine Labs at Central Baptist Hospital and associate professor of physiology at UK.

He said using RU 486 three times a month or after intercourse could make RU 486 seem more like a contraceptive than a method of abortion.

There are some differences between the traditional birth control pill and RU 486.

When high doses of the birth con-trol pill are taken, ovulation does not occur and implantation cannot take place, Vernon said.

said. When using RU 486 for abortion purposes, Vermon said, trouble could arise. "Therefore, it is imperative that this only be administered under the supervision of a doctor." Vermon said RU 486 is administered under a doctor's supervision in the countries where it is being used.

While the ban on the drug has been lifted in the United States, RU 486 is not yet available to women in this country as an option for terminating a pregnancy.

"The principle side effect of RU 486 is prolonged bleeding similar to a heavy menstrual period, which



Harvard University professor Richard Lewontin will speak tonight on "The Ideology of Genetic Determinism," as part of Arts and Sciences Week at UK.

Lewontin, an evolutionary geneticist, is an expert on the determination of genetic structure in nature and has published several books on related matters. The lecture will begin at 8 p.m. in Memorial Hall. Arts and Sciences Week activities will begin earlier in the day, with a kick-off celebration planned for 9:30 this morning on the Patterson Office Tower mezzanine.

### **UK studies direct-injection chemotherapy**

Researchers at the UK College of Medicine are studying a unique method of giving chemotherapy treatments to cancer patients.

The method injects cancer-fighting drugs directly into malig-nant brain tumors through a cathe-ter implanted in the brain. The cath-eter is connected to a refillable reservoir under the patient's scalp.

Dr. Roy Patchell, chief of neuro-oncology at UK Hospital, said the method may offer hope to patients suffering from untreatable malig-nant gliomas, the most common form of brain tumor in adults. For-mer Republican National Party

chairman Lee Atwater died from a malignant glioma in 1992.

malignant glioma in 1992.

"Patients with these types of tumors have very few options," said
Patchell, who along with Dr. Paul
Ashton, developed the new technique. "These are people for whom
additional standard therapy will not
be helpful."

When first detected, malignant
gliomas usually are treated with
surgery, radiation therapy and intravenous chemotherapy. The chemotherapy agents, however, are not effective because they do not cross
the protective blood-brain barrier in
sufficient quantities to kill the malignancy.

after conventional treatments, only to reappear within a few months. A person's life expectancy after diag-nosis usually is less than one year.

The new method of treatment, which will be used initially for patients with recurring tumors that already have failed conventional treatment, is based on the hypothesis that continuous infusion of chemotherapy agents directly on the tumor will prevent cancer cells from replicating.

The initial study will involve 18 patients and eventually could in-volve more patients and institu-tions. Patchell estimates the project will take five years to complete.

### Once-familiar Kentucky beer beginning to make reappearance

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The red and black Oertels '92 beer logo, which vanished from Kentuck's billhoards and barrooms a quarter century ago, is making a gradual reappearance in Louisville's night-clubs.

clubs. The new Oertels beer, produced by a local entrepreneur and the brand's old brewmaster, made its public debut at a festival that drew 20,000 people in October. Since then, more than a dozen Louisville bars have put it on tap.

But company officials are waiting until this summer for a full-scale advertising blitz as Oertels' old brewing plant cranks up to put bottles and cans back on store shelves.

Louisville. The city's last brewery, Falls City, moved to Evansville, Ind., in 1978.

"I get calls every week from some distributor in eastern Kentucky or the southern Kentucky roin," said David Barborst, principal partner in the new beer venture. "They call up expecting the beer." In fact, Kentucky's beer drinkers have been expecting the new brew for more than two years.

Barborst and 79-year-old brew-master Friedrich Wolfgang "Fritz" Finger began work to resume retail beer production in Louisville in 1990, when they purchased the Certels name and trademark from the Joseph Huber Brewing Co. of Monroe, Wis.

They initially planned to begin

They initially planned to begin bottling beer at the old brewery on Louisville's near east side before the end of 1992 — a century after the brand was initially introduced.

ment from an Ohio manufacturer pushed startup plans back to this spring. Beef or the festival and the Louisville bars has been brewed in Wisconsin under the direction of Finger, who also was Oertels brew-master from 1939 to 1965.

Now, the full reintroduction of
Oertels in stores has been stalled
for yet another three months by the
initial success of test marketing.
Barhorst said.

"Because of the demand, it caused
us really to rethink our business
plan," Barhorst said. "We've gone
back to the drawing board."

The new plans call for marketing
Oertels statewide — the same as
the old brand was — and offering it
in cans as well as bottles.

In addition to the import-grade
Oertels CopperHead already on tap
in Louisville and a commercialgrade Oertels Premium, the company plans to offer Oertels Light. Barhorst said Finger, whose family

the light version down to 92.

But the biggest change is a plan
Barhorst disclosed last week to include a 14,500-square-foot restaurant in the brewery complex.

"Because of their needs, we've
had to redesign the brewery." Barhorst said. "But we will be brewing by this summer in Louisville."

The microbrewery, restaurant and already-completed "Fest Hall" will surpass the size of the Olden-berg brewery in Fort Mitchell, which currently is believed to be the largest microbrewing complex in the nation, Barhorst said.

An all-out "advertising attack" is planned this summer featuring peo-ple who have offered to share nos-talgic stories of the old Oertels and

The average startup time for the 105 microbreweries currently in existence is between 15 and 21 months, said Edgar, who called the revised Oertels business plan "a tall order."

Nevertheless, Oertels is entering a booming field and will have no microbrewing competition other than Oldenberg.

The craft-brewing industry — which includes brewpubs, micro-breweries, regional brands and contract brewing companies like Oer-

tels is now — produced a record1.2 million barrels last year, up from 854,000 barrels in 1991, Edgar said. A barrel is 31 gallons.

And although it's not available in, stores, Oertels already is making a good impression.

"I'm not a beer expert, but 1 thought it had a good flavor to it," said Doug Gossmann, owner of the Bristol Bar & Grill, where Oertels will be on tap soon. "It has a little more flavor than your typical American beers do."

Tim Cain, owner of Shenanigans

Tim Cain, owner of Shenanigans Pubs, said Oertels has been a hot seller since it went on tap at his two establishments.

Barhorst said tap sales have been "exceptional" but declined to pro-vide specific figures.

"All retailers are happy," he said.
"In fact, the biggest problem we've had is selling out of beer."

SANTA MONICA, Calif.

President Citinon, stepping up an attack on critics who say his economic plan doesn't contain enough spending reductions, said yesterday his opponents should offer more cuts and "not talk about doing better."

"It's one thing to talk like a conservative and another thing altour gether to live like one," Clinton said as he brought his sales show for his economic program to the West Coast, where defense-related industries are particularly suffering. Clinton told several thousand students at a community college that he would stress increased high-technology partnerships between government and industry to help convert lost defense jobs to civilian employment.

He also amounted the way release.

employment.

He also announced he was releasing \$500 million in federal funds to help defense industries convert to

civilian projects. Aides said the money had been held up by the Bush administration.

Clinton said his new technology proposal includes more job retraining programs for laid-off defense workers and a shifting of government research and development from defense purposes to civilian causes like environmental protection.

"Unless California is revived, the nation cannot recover economically." the president said.

Speaking with students in the gymnasium of Santa Monica College, Clinton cited his steps in cutting the White House staff by 25 percent, government administrative costs by 14 percent over foru years and advocating a one-year freeze in the salaries of government officials. "Every time I go someplace, they say cut more and tax less," Clinton said, referring to criticism from conservative lawmakers and many conomists that his plan designed to reduce the federal deficit by \$325 billion in four years is weighed too



### Experts respond favorably to state ethics reform law

The beauty of the Kentucky law, authorities say, is it creates a board that is independent of the legislature to investigate problems and issue advisory opinions.

"That isn' 1 a standard feature" in other states, said Alan Rosenthal of Rutgers University, who is writing a book on legislative ethics and advised Kentucky lawmakers.
"I think it's a very solid beginning," said Joyce Bullock, staff di-

Some parts of the Kentucky law are strong, while others are stan-dard, she said.

As the Kentucky House and Sen-ate negotiated their ethics bill last week — in the wake of a federal sting that has led to the convictions of seven former legislators and a lobbyist — Democratic leaders pro-claimed it the toughest in the na-tion.

Byars said apathy and lack of commitment in some colleges has kept the number of blacks low in all areas at UK. However, UK President Charles Wethington said he wants to focus on hiring blacks and women, which Byars said is a step in the right di-rection. "It would be to your advantage to be a black female seeking a position at UK," she said.

have a negative experience. I think if they would read their history, it would better prepare them" for the challenges of University life.

Eighteen-year-old political sci-ence freshman Monica Berry said stereotypes and ignorance about other cultures are big problems at UK.

In a basic public speaking class last semester, she said there were students who argued that words like humankind as opposed to mankind are incorrect because "it's a man's world and always will be."

"And when black issues came up, I had to sit up and say something. (As if) I was the consensus," Berry

"When you're the only black per-son in the class, everybody looks at you, stereotyping. All black people

are different just like all people are different," she said.

different," she said.
Knowing there may be no other black students in class and having to deal with stereotyping and fear of the unknown on a daily basis deters black students and educators from coming to UK, Byars said.

"We tend to want to go where there are more people just like us," And UK is not where the majority can be found.

Of the 24,197 undergraduate stu dents at UK last fall, 998 were black. Five of the 239 graduate stu dents were black.

"Historically, in the black family "Historically, in the black tainty, there is strong family and community support," Byars said. "But at a university such as ours, if there are one or two black people in a college, it makes it more difficult to establish those kinds of connections."

Biology freshman Adriene Byers Biology Ireshman Adriene Byers said she has had problems connect-ing with resident advisers in Bland-ing Tower, where she lives. "I don't know if it's been more because I am a woman or because I'm black. RAs are scared to say
