

# Cats legitimize themselves as threat with close win over LSU

BATON ROUGE, La. - The BATON ROUGE, La. — The Bayou Bengals were an angry team, backed into a corner by championship expectations and two straight losses. This was not the time to play LSU anywhere, especially in Death Valley.

The cagey Wildcat coach threw the kitchen sink at LSU quarterback Herb Tyler, and his Black Flag defense harassed Tyler from the dressing room to the showers, sacking him five times and hitting him more times than not

The UK offense held up its end of the bargain, and the Cats came away with a 39-36 upset.

"Our defense has been keeping us in this position all year,"
UK head coach Hal Mumme said.

"We've set goals all year, and they've met them."

Tyler got hit almost every play of LSU's first possession, but the Tigers took only 10 plays to reach the red zone. A big sack by senior safety Jeff Zurcher stalled the LSU drive at the UK 20-yard line, and there was hope.

LSU kicker Danny Boyd hit the upright on a 29-yard attempt, and the Tigers had nothing to show for Tyler's pain.

WASHINGTON — President Clinton is expected to announce a replacement for departing chief of staff Erskine Bowles in the next feadays, White House spokesman Joe Lockhart said yesterday. He would not give an exact date or reveal who Clinton has chosen for the job, but a senior White House official said Clinton could name deputy chief of staff John Podesta as Bowles' successor as early as tomorrow.

## Twin hurricanes inch toward Mexico

PUERTO ESCONDIDO, Mexico — Twin hurricanes lurked menacingly off Mexico's Pacific
coast Sunday, one creeping toward land and the
other veering slightly away after a narrow miss
with the crowded coastline.

800 miles of the
scenic coastline in the north and Hurricane

"If this persists, the system will slowly move
away from the mainland," the U.S. National
Weather Service said in an advisory, adding the
next 24 hours.

### Pakistan, India vow to meet again

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Negotiators from India and Pakistan merged yesterday from three days of talks without an agreement on the dispute over the Himalayan territory of Kashmir, the cause of two wars between the neighboring countries.

They promised to meet again in February.

"It's not that talks have failed ... this was just a beginning," said K. Raghunath, India's chief negotiator and foreign secretary.

The two foreign secretaries issued a brief statement that said they discussed confidence-building measures. They also talked about peace and security now that both India and Pakistan openly have the ability to make nuclear weapons. "Both sides underscored their commitment to reduce risk of a conflict by building mutual confidence in the nuclear and conventional fields," the statement said without elaborating.

### 300 die in Nigeria pipeline blast

WARRI, Nigeria — Up to 300 people scaveng-ing for fuel from a burst petrol pipeline might

have died in southern Nigeria yesterday when a fire ripped through the area, witnesses said.

"The death toll is rising by the minute; at least five people are dying every hour and no less than 300 people have died," a journalist who visited hospitals around the oil town of Warri told Reuters. No official death toll has been announced for the disaster, described by one oil industry official as an act of sabotage.

He said no proper rescue effort had been organized for the victims of the incident at Apawor, a village of an estimated 2,000 inhabitants.

"Hundreds of people rushed to the scene to scoop up petrol when suddenly there was a fire and all the people there got burnt," one witness said.

### No deal in China-Taiwan talks

BELJING — With pointed talk about democracy, rivals China and Taiwan wrapped up talks yesterday that failed to bridge wide differences but ended a hostile freeze in relations.

Taiwan's chief envoy to China, Koo Chen-fu, capped his path-breaking five-day visit by urging President Jiang Zemin to follow Taiwan's example as a democracy.

Koo said he spoke of democracy only in general terms with Jiang, and said he recognized Taiwan's version might not be a perfect fit, but "if the Chinese mainland wishes to promote its economic development in the future, it has to take a brave stride forward on the path to democratization."

### Serbs may be redeploying in Kosovo

PRISTINA, Yugoslavia — A Serb military convoy reportedly moved out of its barracks in Pristina on Sunday and headed toward the main highway through central Kosovo — a sign that Serb forces might be redeploying despite the contuning threat of NATO airstrikes.

A column of tanks, armored personnel carriers and trucks traveled through the Komorane police checkpoint, about 15 miles west of Pristina, the provincial capital, said western sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The exact number of troops was not known, but they reportedly came from a brigade normally stationed in Pristina. Their ultimate destination also was not known, but the sources said the redeployment might have been in response to recent attacks on Serb police.







## Mumme says program is improved with team's determination

Mumme Says program is Improved the Marton ROUGE, La. — Head coach Hal Mumme electrified the Commonwealth last season with high-wire anties and offensive wizardry, but his Wildcats finished a silent 5-6. Five games into this season, the once-promising Wildcats looked more likely bound for a belly flop than a bowl. Back-to-back road losses at Florida and Arkansas dropped UK from the rankings and almost from respectability. A sloppy home win over South Carolina did little to appease expectations, and the questions grew quite loud.

The team and its supporters were growing restless after coming so close against Florida, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Georgia.

But the tide turned blue Saturday, and Mumme's Wildcats (5-2, 2-2 Southeaystern Conference) stunned the college football world with a 39-36 upset of LSU (3-3, 1-3 SEC). Rather than winning his first big game in the friendly confines of Common-

wealth Stadium, Mumme took UK on the road less traveled and topped the Tigers in "Death Valley."

Wildcat kicker Seth Hanson's last-second field goal exorcised demons of closegames past and gave Mumme the break-through victory his program lacked.

UK's "Death Valley" revival was its first road victory over a ranked opponent since 1977, and the win was Mumme's first success against a SEC opponent with a winning record.

"It gets the monkey off our backs, with people saying we can't beat a good team, a ranked opponent on the road," Mumme said. "For our program, it's a huge win."

Success this season means that for the second time in two years, UK stands on the threshold of six wins, the benchmark for bowl eligibility. 
