Napster's demise at the hands of the court and recording industry sped this weekend when the company voluntarily began blocking Metallica and Dr. Dre songs and 5500 other titles.

Napster attorney David Boles told a federal judge Friday that the move to exclude the songs from the file sharing community would begin during the weekend.

Millions of users rushed to the site on Saturday, On justone of Napster's 80 servers, 11,000 users traded nearly 2.2 million songs. Users freely traded songs like Metallica's "Unforgiven," which the bard requested be blocked from the service, according to an Associal Augster said on its web site that it isn't easy to block in list of the system of the site of the site of the site of the control of the site of

Football scandal shames program

Recent NCAA violations made by Mumme and Bassett are inexcusable, although profitable

How can anyone see writing a paper for a student athlete and then having an office employee type the paper for the student as permissible? Any type of assistance like the ones offered by Bassett is impermissible. In fact, it is down right wrong, No student, no matter how important they may be to an University-affiliated organization, should receive assistance with school work.

And the violations did not stop with academic fraud. The report revealed that Bassett took recruits shopping at Civic Center shops and war given these rife.

Perhaps one of the most disturbing elements revealed by the in-quiry is that former UK football coach Hal Mumme may have known about some of the violations. The Herald-Leader reported that Mumme denied many of the statements attributed to him

that Mumme denied many of the statements attributed to him through findings from the investigation, but it seems hard to believe that Mumme could have not known what was going on. After all, he was the head coach of the football team.

But what is even more atrocious than the findings of the inquiry is the severance package and benefits given to Mumme. Mumme's package includes payments totaling \$1 million, the law firm that represented Mumme is being paid off and he has been given use of a 2001 Cadillac Seville and a 2000 Toyota Celica until June 1. 2002. June 1 2002

It appears that resigning in the midst of a horrible scandal pays pretty well.

The two Buddhas, 175 and 120 feet tall, were damaged in fighting and defaced by Russian soldiers who carved their names in the statues following the Soviet Invasion of Afghanistan, which began in 1979, witnesses said.

One of the statues is thought to be the world's tallest of a Buddha standing rather than sitting.

The destruction of statues began after Omar ruled that they were idolatrous and against the tenets of Islam. Others argue that Islam does not ban images, only the worship of them.
