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

A free individual does not live without choice. A free society does not prosper without it. Consider, if you will, the personal


choices we make every day without intervention from others. Now consider how many we take for granted.

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
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
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The University of Kentucky. . .

Truly one of the leading land grant institutions in the nation, the University of Kentucky has a national and international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture.

More than 23,000 students are enrolled on the main campus in Lexington. Another 19,000 students are enrolled in the 13 community colleges operated by UK across the state at Ashland, Henderson, Cumberland, Hazard, Elizabethtown, Prestonsburg, Hopkinsville, Somerset, Louisville, Paducah, Maysville, Madisonville and Lexington.

UK has a graduate school and 17

academic colleges . . . Arts and Sciences, Agriculture, Engineering, Business and Economics, Education, Home Economics, Library Science, Social Work, Architecture, Communications, Fine Arts, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Dentistry, Allied Health Professions and Pharmacy.

The UK library, one of the finest in the nation, has some 1.7 million volumes and ranks 13th in the nation in its microform holdings.

The UK Honors Program for students who have shown a record of academic achievement has more than 600 students enrolled. The UK debate team consistently ranks among the top debate teams in the nation.

UK has an outstanding faculty with some of the top teachers in the nation.

The UK mathematics department has seven faculty members who have been awarded the prestigious Sloan Fellowship and the political science department consistently ranks among the top such departments in the nation in the number of scholarly papers published.

UK also is noted for its research efforts, especially in the fields of energy, tobacco and cancer.

In the arts, thousands of people attend the many art, music and theater productions at UK. The UK Marching Band is one of the best collegiate contingents in the country, and the UK orchestra, the chorus and the theater offer sterling performances throughout the year.

The Honorable John Y. Brown, Jr. Governor of Kentucky

John Y. Brown, Jr., became the 51st governor of Kentucky on

December 11, 1979.

Born on December 28, 1933,
Governor Brown graduated from
Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a
Bachelor of Arts degree from the
University of Kentucky in 1957. He
graduated from the UK College of
Law three years later.

The Governor served in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1959 to 1965.

Army Reserve from 1959 to 1965. He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International gave him an Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the Uni-



versity of Kentucky's Hall of Fame. This past summer, Gov. Brown was elected vice chairman of the Democratic Governors Conference and states' co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission.

He has three children by a pre-

vious marriage, John Y. Brown, III (18), Eleanor (16) and Sandra (15). He married Phyllis George on March 17, 1979 and they recently added a fourth child to the family, Lincoln George Tyler Brown, born in June, 1980.



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

OTIS A. SINGLETARY University President

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University. His tenure has been marked by rapid growth and a commitment to excellence.

"The University, with all its problems, is still the single most important institution in the state," Dr. Singletary has said. "Its network of influence is felt throughout the state, not just in the instruction of the state's young people but in the great pattern of research, the things we are doing to improve the quality of human life and the wide range of services we are providing throughout the state.

"Contrary to popular opinion, our institutions of higher education are not operated exclusively for students, or for faculty members, or for administrators, or for trustees — or, for that matter, for all of these. Historically speaking, universities have been created and supported by our society to perform important functions for the common good of society. This is the larger meaning of the term, 'the public interest,' as it applies to institutions of higher education."

Before being named UK president in 1969, Dr. Singletary served as executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and as director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The Gulfport, Miss., native holds

degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. He is a nationally recognized history scholar and is the author of two books and several monographs.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 19,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges. UK has gained an international reputation in such diverse fields as medicine, business, engineering, law and agriculture. The University also is noted for its research in the fields of energy, to bacco and cancer. The Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging is one of the first facilities of its kind.

The UK Alumni Association has recognized Dr. Singletary's special

service by presenting him its Alumni Service Award. It is an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is in the second year of his two-year term as president of the Southeastern Conference. As University President, he serves as chairman of the board of directors of the UK Athletic Association, the body which maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict, he is commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

Athletics Director



CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

The University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of next year and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985. The UK Relays were renewed this past spring.

Hagan, who has seen and over-

seen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III

He was named in 1972, assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975.

Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). He went on to star in the NBA with the St. Louis Hawks and in the ABA with the Dallas Chapparals as playercoach.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

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
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Head Coach

Fran Curci Enters Ninth Season At Kentucky Helm

With his second good recruiting crop in a row, Fran Curci enters his ninth year as University of Kentucky football coach with hopes of returning the Wildcats to



their fine back-to-back seasons of 1976, when they finished 8-4 and were Southeastern Conference co-champion and Peach Bowl champion, and 1977, when they finished 10-1 and were undefeated in conference play.

Curci's victory total at UK now stands at 44 (44-43-2), second only to the 60 victories registered by Paul Bryant (60-23-3, 1946-53) and ahead of the 41 by Blanton Collier (41-36-3, 1954-61).

Youthfulness, inexperience and injuries took their toll of the Wildcats last year, when four games were lost in the closing seconds, including two with no time left on the clock, en route to a 3-8 record.

During his tenure at UK, Curci has been named SEC "Coach of the Year" by both wire services—UPI in 1973 and AP in 1977—and has finished high in the national balloting (1977).

He has produced four All-Americans and three Academic All-Americans at UK, which did not have an All-American of any type during the

nine years before he came to Lexington. He also has produced 10 All-SEC players named 15 times to the honor squads.

Curci came to UK from the University of Miami, FL, where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after earning All-American honors as a quarterback for the Hurricanes in 1959 and playing QB for the old Dallas Texans in the AFI.

Curci went to Tampa as head coach in 1968, putting together a 7-3 season that included victories over Mississippi State and Tulane and earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association's "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 1969 team finished 8-2, while his 10-1 record in 1970 included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking. Curci was runner-up for the College Division "Coach of the Year"

He coached the Hurricanes in 1971 and 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, PA, Curci played his high school football in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At Miami, where he was known as the "Mite-y Magician," he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving All-America honorable mention in 1957.

He set Hurricane seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained passing. He was co-holder of the record for most passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity

career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades. He captained the Hurricanes his senior year and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset of Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year for the Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

Curci has been selected seven times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game five years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charlie McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America game and has also appeared at the North-South Game, Japan Bowl, East-West Game and Hula Bowl.

He was elected to the Miami Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

Kentucky Kickoff Spotlights:

Larry Kirksey

K receivers coach Larry Kirksey believes that the more things change in college football, the more they stay the same.

Kirksey was a standout wide receiver at Eastern Kentucky University from 1969-73 where he had 82 career catches for 1,1555 yards.

"There's been a lot of changes since I played," he says. "It's a matter of disguising, really. Basically, teams are doing the same thing, they're just using a different allignment, different looks.

"The biggest change in college football in recent years has been with college teams going to manto-man coverage. It's now a matter of the receiver just knowing what he needs to get done. You've got to ad lib a little bit because the defensive back, he's told to deny you

the inside or outside.

"There have been changes but it is still a matter of the receiver go-



ing out and competing one-on-one and the best guy is going to win," says Kirksey.

The Harlan native came to Kentucky in 1977 from Miami of Ohio where he was wide receiver coach and supervisor of scouting. Before that he was a graduate assistant at EKU. It's no secret coaching appeals to the handsome young man.

"I enjoy coaching. You know, I played the game. The kids now, well, I coach in the manner I would like to be coached. But at the same time they understand what their job is and what they have to get done. Coaching is enjoyable because I enjoy working with young people.

"My philosophy is, if you are prepared the right way and do the best you can, well, that's all we can ask of you."

Athletics Department

Larry Ivy, who came to the University of Kentucky as director of housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of the business operations of the Athletics Department. He helps to develop and initiate policies for accounting procedures and related financial management activities of the department also.

A native of Alabama, Ivy graduated in 1961 from Huntsville High School, where he lettered in four sports. He is a 1967 graduate of the University of Alabama and earned his MBA from Alabama in 1968.

He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Huntsville. They have one daughter, Kim. Ivy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack F. Ivy of Huntsville.

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the athletic director's staff in 1972.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend. He then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1956 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Michigan. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, NC, and Craig, a U.S. Army Captain, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Casopolis, Michigan and Jennifer a 1978 graduate of UK.

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
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UK Receivers Look For The Big Play

arry Kirksey is expecting big things out of the Wildcat wide receiver corps and he thinks they will mature down the stretch this season.

"Talent-wise, this is probably the best group since I've been here at Kentucky," said the young assistant coach. He's quick to add, however, that these guys are not long

on experience.
"You have only Allan Watson who's actually played out there. He's a junior and has played since he was a freshman." The other starter, sophomore Rick Massie, isn't exactly a seasoned vet, says Kirksey. Neither are backups Joe Phillips and Eddie Simmons.

"These guys have more talent than guys here before, but I've had better players, such as Felix Wilson," adds Kirksey, a standout wide receiver himself at Eastern Kentucky University from 1969-72. Kirksey offered a brief description of each of his receivers.

"Al Watson is steady. He's a tough, hardnosed kid that will get open and catch the ball coming across the middle or in a clutch situation. His strength is, he works underneath, he won't get deep too often but he'll come across the

field and get the ball for you.

"Rick Massie: his strength is that he's a pretty intelligent kid and he runs well-disciplined routes. And that's what you have to do as a receiver. You have to get open before you can catch the ball and right now, he's the best at getting open and catching the football.

"Eddie Simmons: his strength is his speed. Great speed. He has more speed and quickness than the others but again, he's like a freshman out there. He's got to learn to adjust to the run. He'll catch the ball if he gets downfield. His biggest weakness right now is catching the underneath passes," notes Kirksev.

"Joe Phillips is a freshman and it's just a matter of time before he is a regular. He has more natural ability than all the guys put together. It's just a matter of playing him a little more, not throwing him into the fire too early. He catches the ball early in the season and, all of a sudden, he's not catching anything. Sometimes he loses confidence.

"Steve Liakos: he's just a freshman. He has decent speed but he's got a ways to go, too. In time he will be strong. He's not now but in time he will be.


"And there are a bunch of walk-

ons who give us a good look day in and day out and without those guys, we just couldn't make it," says Kirksey.

Kirksey certainly doesn't mind

"Rob Mangas is very good and

Todd Shadowen are a talented trio that have been able to make the clutch plays.

"Jimmy Campbell is the type of kid who will go out on game day and play hard. You have to hand it to him, the way he played against Alabama. He'd been hurt all week. We look to Jim for the big play, he's

consistent. He played quarterback in high school so he had to make the transition to tight end. He's going to be able to do the job for us.

'Todd Shadowen is back after a freaky accident this summer. He's probably our best blocker. He's tough and wants to play.
"Coach Greg Nord works with


the tight ends and he's just done a great job," adds Kirksey.

Kirksey is the Wildcat assistant coach who is constantly on the phones with the Kentucky staff in the press box. It oftens seems he is detached from the flurry of activity along the Kentucky sideline.

"I'm talking to (assistant coach) Mike Summers upstairs and what I'm getting from him is the basic secondary (lineup), what I see out there on the field. And at the same time I'm relaying a play to him upstairs and he's charting the plays

that we are running.

"While that's going on he's giving me the down and distance, saying things like, 'that's second and six in-between to go,' things of this nature. At the same time, we're trying to get right personnel into the ballgame," adds Kirksey.

Football is more than just block-

Football is more than just blocking and tackling. It is also a guessing game with the offense trying to throw a formation at a defense for

which the defense is vulnerable. You like to get receivers into a single coverage situation as often as possible.

"We have two or three games a week on our opponent (in practice) before we play them," says Kirksey. "We find out what their alignment is going to be and formation and we try to dictate to them and not let them dictate to us. We try to make sure we know where they are going to be and that's the whole key in

offense. As an offensive staff, we always, from week to week, go to the film, break down our formations versus their defense and try to make sure we know where they are going to be," he adds.

Coach Kirksey admits that the receiving corps could be contributing more to the Wildcat offense. But if hard work were the only measuring stick, this group would be difficult to top.

"They are all working hard and it's a matter of time and a little more experience. We'll have a decent receiving corps before the year is out," he says.

Kirksey and the UK staff have pinpointed the problem and it applies to the entire offense.

"As yet, we have yet to make the big play, the spectacular catch. That's what we're going to have to do to have a good football team. We're young but we're going to have to get more out of our receivers to get this football team to come along. We haven't proven ourselves at this stage," he adds. "But in time, we will."

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


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



Richard lettered three years, playing guard and tackle on of-



fielder on the baseball team. He played on the 1981 conference championship team.


58 TONY CZACK LB 6-2 215 18 years old Padua Franciscan H.S., Parma, O.

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

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



Clemson Loaded With Talented Veterans

Coach Danny Ford is in an enviable situation. His entire offensive team from last season is back. In all, 50 lettermen return to a team that was 6-5 last season.

Quarterback Homer Jordan will run the pro-set offense. Last season, Jordan amassed more yards (1,683) than any sophomore in Clemson history, breaking the record held by 1978 Clemson grad Steve Fuller, now the starting quarterback for the Kansas City Chiefs (when not injured). The real spark on offense is senior wide receiver Perry Tuttle who should break every career receiving record at Clemson. "Tuttle is a very fluid athlete who is the fastest player on the team," says his coach, adding, "He catches the ball in a crowd very well and runs excellent pat-terns." The first team All-ACC last season led the conference in receiving yards and catches per game. Clemson has another big play receiver in three-year starter Jerry Gaillard.

The offensive line returns intact, headed by All-ACC selection Lee Nanney at tackle. Tony Berryhill

returns at center and will play next to Brian Clark. Three-year starter Gary Brown is solid at the other tackle.

The Tigers leading ground gainer last year, Chuck McSwain, re-

turns. The junior halfback was the ACC rookie-of-the-year in 1979. Fullback Jeff McCall is a devestating blocker and should help McSwain tremendously. JC transfer Braxton Williams will see action also at tailback. The deepest position might be tight end where Bubba Diggs (redshirted last year), Jim Wurst and Jeff Wells all could see action


Six starters return on defense for the Tigers but Ford is concerned about depth in the defensive line. Clemson ranked third in the ACC in total defense but sixth against the pass. The Tigers gave up an average of 20.3 points per game, fifth best in the conference. If defensive end Bill Smith stays

If defensive end Bill Smith stays healthy, it should help that potentially troublesome position. Another answer might be Andy Headen, a former quarterback and defensive back who was switched to de-

fensive end. Former fullback Edgar Pickett also will vie for the other defensive end position. "The defensive front line is big and aggressive this year," said Ford. "James Robinson (tackle), Dan Benish (tackle), Jeff Bryant (tackle) and William DeVane (middle guard) are all proven players." The addition of freshman William Perry can't hurt, either. The Tigers employ a five-man front.



Said Ford: "No linebacker I ever played with at Alabama or have coached plays as well or hits as hard as Jeff Davis." In the backfield, Terry Kinard, Hollis Hall and Anthony Rose return. The biggest problem for the Tigers is to find a replacement for the departed Obed Ariri, the NCAA's all-time career field goal bicker.

anny Ford is the youngest third-year coach in Division I of the NCAA, but the 33-year-old Gadsden, Alabama native has been associated with more winning teams and programs than many coaches come in contact with in a lifetime. Including his years as a player at Alabama under Bear Bryant, Ford has been associated with college football for the last 14 years. Thirteen of those clubs have had winning records and 10 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 14 teams have had a record of 111-47-3, a .700 winning percent-

Now in his third full season as head coach, Ford has led the Tigers to a 15-9 record and a pair of bowl games since taking over on December 10, 1978. That was a fine day in Clemson athletics because the University announced Charley Pell had relinquished the head coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired another gifted 31-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over perennial power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach.

But Ford did not rest on his laurels after that landmark win over the Buckeyes. In the last two years the Tigers have won 14 games (including wins over nationally ranked Georgia, Notre Dame and South Carolina), gone to a bowl game, nearly upset the National Champion and set countless Clemson records.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant at Alabama as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant (including three wins against the Tigers), and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full-time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974 to 1976), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tigers'

When Clemson went searching for a new president to replace Robert C. Edwards, who retired in the summer of 1979 after 22 years at the University's helm, the selection committee found one candidate that stood above the crowd.

Dr. Bill Lee Atchley. He boasts a history of involvement that not only includes his professional career but also extends beyond the campus.

Dr. Atchley came to Clemson from West Virginia University where he was Dean of the College of Engineering beginning in 1975.

While at West Virginia, President Atchley served as the Chairman of Governor's Commission on Energy, Economy, and Environment as well as acting as the Science and Technology Advisor for the West Virginia House of Representatives and Senate. Atchley also served in a similar capacity for West Virginia Governors Rockefeller and Moore. Another committee that Atchley chaired was the state Environmental Committee.

President Atchley was named to the list of Who's Who in Engineering Education and is a member of the Academy of Sciences and the Outstanding Educators of America. He even found the time to serve as the chairman of the American Society for Engineering Education in the Midwest, become a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, and sit on the West Virginia Board of Registration for Professional Engineers.

Prior to his tenure at West Virginia, Atchley taught at the University of Missouri at Rolla from 1957-1975. He earned his undergraduate degree in Civil Engineering at Missouri in 1957 and finished his masters work in the same field in 1959 at Missouri. President Atchley then received his doctorate at Texas

A&M in 1965.

He played professional baseball in the fifties with the New York

BILL MCLELLAN

Athletic Director

It is not an easy task to follow Clemson legend Frank Howard in anything, be it as a banquet speaker, football coach or Athletic Director. But Bill McLellan accepted the challenge and has been one of the most successful A.D.'s in the country.


In the last five years Clemson's sports program has made a meteoric rise on the national scene. McLellan's administration is the major reason Clemson's sports program has been ranked in the top 25 in the nation the last five years, and twice in the top five in the land in the last three years.

Only the third man to own the

title of Athletic Director at Clemson over the past 47 years, McLellan was elevated to his present position in 1971, following what had been more than a decade of service to the University's athletic organization.

A native of Hamer, S. C., the 48year-old McLellan graduated from Dillon High School and entered Clemson where he earned a pair of football letters, and was a member of the Tigers' 1952 Gator Bowl team

He joined the athletic staff in 1958 from Clemson's Department of Agricultural Economics and Seed Certification where he had spent one year as assistant agronomist and two years as assistant economist.



In 1966, McLellan was named Assistant Athletic Director and two years later was appointed Associate Athletic Director.

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

Scholarships, Faculty and Student Awards

Alumni Programs Contribute to UK Mission

FACULTY

MEMBERS and volunteers make the alumni world go 'round. Right today more than 20,000 people support the effort of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association to serve the university and its alumni through their active participation in the Association.

Among the programs contributing to the mission of the university are the Association's scholarship, teacher recognition and student re-

lations activities.

SCHOLARSHIP

More than 30 students are attending school at the UK Lexington or community college campuses with the help of scholarship monies designated by the Alumni Association.

Seven marching band students—Kris Deeds, Kelly Harding, LaShele Montfort, Christopher Peterson, David Bay, Steven Wade and Michael Turner—have received \$700 scholarships this year. Four students—Anna K. Austin, Victoria Dee Riley, Thomas J. Hester and Marc E. Tissenbaum—hold the prestigious Alumni Loyalty Scholarships of \$1,000 each. All 13 of the community colleges receive \$500 which is often distributed to help two or three students each semester.

Alumni clubs in Christian, Union, Bourbon, Nicholas, Clark, Harrison, Jefferson counties, the Lake Cumberland and Cumberland Valley areas and Dayton, Ohio, and Houston, Texas, also sponsor scholarships, some to the main campus and some to community colleges. Alumni living in these areas raise funds often used to help prospective students in their hometown attend a UK college.

Additionally, several alumni have donated funds for the Association to administer on their behalf.

This year marked the 20th anniversary of faculty awards sponsored by the UK Alumni Association. Originally, the awards emphasized recognition of faculty for their research accomplishments. Since 1968, however, the awards have honored instructors of outstanding teaching ability. The faculty members selected for the 1981 "Great Teacher Awards" included three from the community colleges and two from the main campus.

The 1981 Great Teachers who were awarded a stipend of \$600 each are Dr. Charles Ellinger, a professor of prosthodontics; Dr. William Lubawy, associate professor of pharmacy; Dr. Robert K. Berry, chairman of the division of chemistry and agriculture, Maysville Community College; Alice A. Cleveland, assistant professor of English at Jefferson Community College Southwest; and Michael B. Coyle, professor of fine arts and humanities at Elizabethtown Community College.

Six professors have been designated Alumni Professors, an honor which carries with it a \$5,000 annual stipend so long as the teacher holds the alumni professorship. Currently holding this honor are Dr. Joseph Kuc, plant pathology; Dr. William L. Matthews, law; Dr. Jacquelyn Noonan, pediatric medicine; Dr. Charles P. Roland, history; Dr. Sidney Ulmer, political science, and Dr. Joseph L. Massie, business administration.

STUDENTS

A successful student program introduced last year is the now-annual Presidents-ODK dinner hosted by the UK Alumni Association. Invitations are sent to presi-

dents of all campus-recognized organizations to join in this special leadership activity. The dinner will be October 12. President Otis Singletary will address an expected crowd of 140 student leaders.

Two years ago students expressed an interest in revitalizing the annual student awards night which many of you will recall by the name "Stars in the Night." The UK Alumni Association now presents its "Great Teacher Awards" at the student program. In 1979, UK alumnus and pro football player Jeff Van Note was the speaker for the evening. Alumni director Jay Brumfield serves on the steering committee and is proud to say that attendance has been gradually increasing.

The Association also helps with such traditional campus events at Homecoming and the Little Kentucky Derby.

Today the University of Kentucky welcomes classmates from the classes of 1945, 1946 and 1947 who have returned to campus for a reunion. Following the game, this group will celebrate with an Oktoberfest at the King Alumni House.




AL GREEN Head Trainer





Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High, served with the U.S. Marines in World War II, attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951.

He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1969), and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriter of the Year" award.


As a newspaperman, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He reported the activities of



such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for Time-Life-Fortune magazines and was Kentucky editor of Tobacco Magazine and Religious

For the past 13 years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He authored "The Wildcats: A Story of Kentucky Football," and "The Big Blue Machine: A Story of Kentucky Basketball." a 400-seat recital hall, a 1,500-seat concert hall and the UK Art Museum which is open daily except Monday from Noon to 5 p.m.

UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical Center has a wide range of programs in education and research. The five colleges of the Medical Center - Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health have more than 2,000 students pursuing bachelor, masters and doctoral degrees in health-related fields.

Of major significance in the area of medical research is the Sanders-Brown Research Center on Aging, one of the first facilities of its kind in the nation.



UK graduates almost 6,000 students each year from the main campus and the community col-leges. The UK Alumni Association, therefore, continues to grow in number of clubs (64) and paid members (22,000). Besides the 34 clubs in Kentucky, there are 30 organized alumni groups outside the state from Los Angeles to New York.

For old alums and other visitors to the University, there's a tour of the UK campus any weekday on a double-decker bus, "Old Blue." The free, guided tour of the campus departs each Monday through Friday at 2 p.m. from near the Ad-

ministration Building.
The University of Kentucky has had only eight presidents since its founding in 1865. Dr. Otis Singletary, now in his 13th year as UK president, is a history scholar and nationally-recognized university administrator.







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
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
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
