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INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE PLANNED BY UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

The Department of University Extension of the University of Kentucky is planning an interscholastic league for the accredited high schools of the State. Announcement of the plans for such a league was made following a meeting of the committee on University Extension.

The league will include at present activities in debate and also in athletics. The accredited high schools of the State will be invited to join the League in these two activities. The plan calls for a series of contests among schools that are members of either group, and a final series of contests in an annual tournament held at the University in May.

The League as organized is under the direction of an Executive Committee composed of the Director of University Extension as chairman. The professor of public speaking at the University is a member of the committee and at the same time is director of debate. The director of

physical instruction at the University, who is also director of athletics in the League, is the third member of the State Executive Committee.

Schools accepting membership in the League will be grouped into districts and local committees appointed for each activity. Under the direction of these committees a series of contests will be held in both debate and athletics, and the winners of these contests will come together in a final tournament at the University.

Wellington Patrick, Director of University Extension at the University, is expecting to send announcements to the various high schools throughout the State in the near future. Professor W. H. Mikesell, director of debate, is making plans for the work of debate, and Professor S. A. Boles, director of physical education, is making preparations for the coming season in athletics.

Enrollment at Ky. Breaks All Records

Student enrolment of 1,194 at the opening of the fall semester at the University of Kentucky broke all former opening records at the University. Because of the heavy registration an extra day was required for enrollment and matriculation. There are 519 enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences, 223 in the College of Agriculture, 323 in the College of Engineering, 73 in the College of Law, and 19 graduate students.

A feature of the present enrollment was the large number of out of State students. It is estimated that approximately one-fourth of those enrolled are from New Jersey, Texas, Delaware, Oklahoma, California and other states. The large number of women students is also of interest. There are approximately one-third more co-eds than were enrolled last year or 400 in the University.

JUNIORS ARE CHAMPIONS.

The junior football team became the champions in the inter-class games when they defeated the sophomores Thursday, November 4, with a score of 14-6, at the University of Kentucky. In a previous game, they defeated the freshmen team, who in turn conquered the sophomores, thus winning second place. The seniors did not enter a team in the contest.

University Issues Important Monograph

The first of a number of monographs to be published under the auspices of the University of Kentucky and to be given over to the Department of Extension of the University for distribution, has made its appearance, and can now be obtained from Mr. Wellington Patrick, head of the Extension Department.

This monograph, which was prepared by Commodore B. Fisher, of the Department of Economics and Sociology, on the subject of the "Farmers' Union," gives an accurate and concise survey of conditions affecting development, organization and activities of the Farmers' Union throughout the country.

Department of Health and Hygiene Added

A Department of Hygiene and Public Health has been established at the University of Kentucky with Dr. P. K. Holmes, Ohio Wesleyan University, as head of the department. The United States Interdepartmental Social Hygiene Board has started a movement to establish departments of this nature in principal educational institutions of each state, and has given the University \$11,000 to promote this work.

Doctor Holmes has been head of the Department of Health and Hygiene at Ohio Wesleyan for several years. He has the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and in addition a medical degree from Bowden Medical School. As assistants to Doctor Holmes, the University has secured the services of Dr. Ireland from Bowden Medical School and Doctor Eva Locke, a practicing physician in New York. Miss Tillie Greathouse, who was a nurse with the Barrow Unit in England during the war, has been added to the Department as nurse.

The Department is housed in Neville Hall where the University Dispensary has been located.

Staff and Crown Pledge Two Young Women

Staff and Crown, senior women's honorary society of the University of Kentucky, entertained with a tea Wednesday afternoon, November 10, in honor of the women students of the University, the women of the faculty and the faculty men's wives. The feature of the affair was the pledging of Lucille Moore, of Marion, and Roberta Thornton, Newport, to membership in the society.

Additional box seats and eight hundred reserved seats in the bleachers were provided for the increased attendance and a block of seats was reserved for the alumni.

Former Kentucky Man Receives High Honor

Dr. Arthur S. Lovenhart, a graduate of the University of Kentucky, ranking student of Dr. Joseph Hoening Kaste, whose fame as a scientist was international, has been elected president of the National Pharmacological Society.

Dr. Arthur Lovenhart took his degree of Bachelor of Science at this University in 1898, his Master's degree the following year, and his Doctor's degree at Johns Hopkins in 1903. He was chief of the pharmacological section in the research division of chemical warfare research in 1918. He is a fellow in the American Association for Advancement of Science and is a member of Phi Delta Pi.

Kentucky 50-50 in the Football "Brush"

The last two games played by the football team of the University of Kentucky resulted in defeat by Vanderbilt at Nashville, October 30, with a score of 20-0, and victory over the University of Cincinnati at Lexington November 6, score 7-6. Both games were fiercely fought from beginning to end and it was only the crippled lineup of the Wildcats which caused the loss of the game to Vanderbilt. The Kentucky-Cincinnati game especially showed the fighting spirit of both teams and the victory of the Wildcats was well earned.
