THE SAGA OF SGA

SGA without budget since July

Lack of funds: A budgetless SGA could mean an end to free tutoring, legal services and other SGA programs

The Student Government Association has had no budget since July 1, leaving SGA-funded operations, such as tutoring and legal services, at a standstill.

Without a budget, SGA cannot allot any monies to organizations or programs, including a tutoring service, legal services and child care grants.

"We've had to turn away countless students who want tutors and legal services," said Robin Harris, a political science sophomore and SGA senator at large.

SGA President Jimmy Glenn said he created a budget two months ago, but dis-

agreements between the senate and executive branch have kept it from being enacted.

The SGA constitution requires the president to present a budget to an interim senate during the summer. That senate would temporarily approve it until the full senate could review it at the end of the summer.

But this summer no budget was passed. Glenn contends that he drove to Lexington from Atlanta to present the budget to the senate but not enough senators showed up to be able to pass it.

Conversely, those senators said that Glenn did not present a budget at all this summer.

Senate chairman Edwin Orange, a political science senior, wants the budget first presented to committee on committees, a group that evaluates if a piece of legislation should be sent to a committee that would review the bill and make a recommendation whether it should be passed to the full senate.

Glenn said the budget is not a bill and therefore does not have to go through any committees but must be approved by the full senate. He wants to have a question and answer session with SGA so that all questions can be answered at once.

Orange and other senators disagree. "If he is concerned about questions, then I would question his motives," Orange said.

Both sides agree the budget needs to be passed quickly.

"If he were to call and want to present

it at 3 a.m., I would come," Orange said.

Glenn said is not a student problem. "This whole thing has dragged on entirely too long," he said.

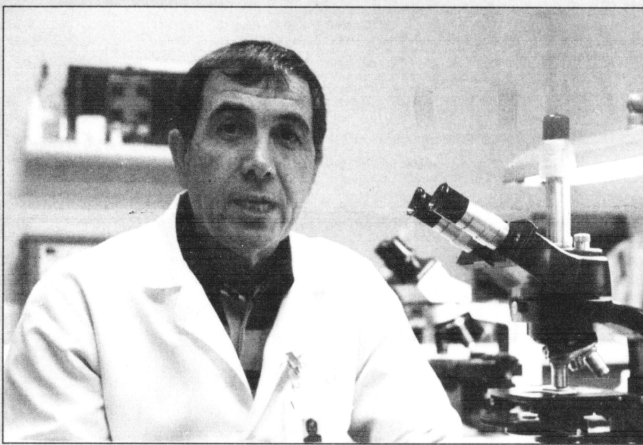
In related SGA news: The SGA Operations and Evaluations committee passed a resolution last night saying all purchases made with SGA money since July 1 will have to be returned. This includes two laptops and a desktop computer Glenn purchased July 7.

Glenn said he bought the computers because SGA needed them. Senators had asked for the desktop last year, but he vetoed their proposal because of budgetary concerns, he said. The laptops, one for himself and the other for vice president Amanda Holloway, were needed because they both sit on committees university wide, Glenn said.

"It would be a waste of time to send them back, but we have not yet had that discussion."

The price of life: Woman are finding egg donation to be an effective way to make money. But for women, what is the real "cost" of the procedure?

Editor's note: The name of the fertility donor in this article has been changed because the donor requested the Kernel do so.

When Kimberly Bannister was an undergraduate student, she picked up her college newspaper and saw an advertisement seeking egg donors.

When she moved to California for graduate school, she stumbled upon the same advertisement.

"Several years ago I read an ad in the paper in Georgia," said Bannister, a 29-year-old chiropractor in San Francisco, Calif. "The ad kept coming up."

Bannister said she initially had reservations about donating her eggs but personal experiences caused her to rethink her reservations.

"I have a very close family friend who has fertility problems," she said. "It made me a little more sensitive to the women who couldn't have children. That helped me to make my decision."

Two days ago, an advertisement similar to the one Bannister read ran in the Kentucky Kernel seeking females between the ages of 21-35 to donate their eggs.

The compensation for this type of donation — \$3,500.

Bannister, who has donated four times now, said Fertility Options provided her with nothing but a

rewarding experience.

"This has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. It has been very rewarding to me," she said. "I have experienced no pain, and almost no complications."

Although Bannister has donated to Options four times, she said this next one will be her fifth and final cycle.

Dr. Panos Zavos, a world-renowned male infertility specialist who collaborates with the Kentucky Center for Reproductive Medicine, also collaborates closely with Options and agrees that their program possesses a great deal of appeal, especially to younger women.

"It's a sort of fad. A lot of women want to donate their eggs for a lot of reasons," he said. "Among others, the three most dominate ones are, first, they are helping a fellow man and woman; second, they feel they possess superior genes and they can give those to someone who needs them and third, the money."

Zavos said there are other reasons women choose to donate their eggs, including the fact that the process is safe and the risk involved in donating is minimal.

Zavos does recommend that women donate their eggs no more than two or three times if they live in a small community such as Lexington, and the donation is made for a local couple.

"The known side effects that we know of are that there are going to be some children out there walking around that are theirs, (and the donors) don't even know it," Zavos said.

Rory McGlynn, assistant director of Options, a national registry of screened egg donors, sperm donors and gestational surrogates, said the ads receive a great deal of response from college students.

"We get a great response (from the ad) from Kentucky donors, and we have a history with college students," he said. "We expect about 100 replies for this one."

McGlynn said that after the donor makes the telephone call, they are briefly questioned about their sexual history, health status and medical problems, and then submitted to a review board.

The review board decides if the candidate qualifies, and if so, they receive a donor packet in the mail.

After a three-month process of submitting paper work, the donor is either accepted or rejected, and then forwarded to a physician of their choice for the donation.

Even though the program worked well for Bannister when she was in college, it doesn't appeal to everyone. Rebecca King, a pre-pharmacy junior, was intrigued by the ad, but isn't sure if Options is for her.

"I think it would be a tough thing to deal with emotionally," she said.

"But I don't think there is anything wrong with it. If someone has a strong desire for kids, then it's great."

Committee meets with WRC representative

Attempts to bridge the gap between the University and students concerned about sweatshop labor are underway.

A speaker from the Worker's Rights Consortium spoke Wednesday to the committee that was appointed last May by President Wethington.

The committee was formed after a student-organized protest against the University's involvement with the Fair Labor Association led to the arrest of 12 students.

The committee consists of four students, four faculty members and four administrators.

Emily Rigdon, an agricultural engi-

neering and Spanish junior and member of the committee, said the meeting was beneficial because it helped clear up misconceptions held by the student body.

"The only way to find out the truth is to actually talk to the organizations," Rigdon said. "Only through communicating with the people who represent these organizations can we understand the work that they are doing," she said.

This was the fourth meeting held by the committee. At a meeting that took place over the summer, the committee heard from a representative of the Fair Labor Association, Rigdon said.

At Wednesday's meeting the Reverend David Dyson explained to the committee

why UK should affiliate themselves with the WRC, Rigdon said.

Dyson, who is a Reverend at a Presbyterian church in Brooklyn, N.Y., has worked with indigenous workers, as well as negotiated with companies who employ these workers for over 20 years.

He described the primary goal of the WRC as working with workers and human rights groups in gathering information about working conditions and improving them.

He described some of the improvements as small but meaningful to the workers. Improvements like keeping bathroom doors unlocked, protecting women

from sexual harassment, providing sanitary drinking water and raising salaries by as little as a few cents.

Dyson cited The Gap as an example of a corporation that made great improvements through small changes.

"These are small changes that didn't hurt Gap's bottom line at all but they made all the difference in the lives of the people who make the clothing," Dyson said.

Rigdon said the committee must reach a decision by October, and they don't know when the next meeting will be scheduled.

"We have a lot of options," she said. "We need to figure out where we are going to go from here."

Clinton brings aid to Colombia

CARTAGENA, Colombia — President Clinton visited Colombia yesterday with \$1.3 billion in U.S. aid aimed at propping up the South American nation's fight against drugs, insurgents and recession. Clinton's trip to Cartagena, hundreds of miles from poppy and coca fields that yield much of the cocaine and heroin used in the United States, trip sought to boost Colombian President Andres Pastrana's \$7.5 billion initiative to ease the narco-traffickers' grip on his nation, make peace with insurgents financed by drug profits, rev up the economy and strengthen the justice system.

Bomb found before Clinton's visit

CARTAGENA, Colombia — Colombian police said they found a small bomb in a Cartagena neighborhood hours before President Clinton was to appear there yesterday. Carlos Perdomo, spokesman for the National Police, said a 4.4 pound explosive device had been deactivated. Perdomo said the device was apparently not designed to cause damage or injuries, but to spread propaganda of the leftist rebels of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia.

Bush proposes education package

HAMPTON, N.H. — Texas Gov. George W. Bush pledged yesterday to increase federal aid to college students and accused Vice President Al Gore of overseeing "seven years of stagnancy" in the nation's schools. Returning to New Hampshire, the state of his biggest primary campaign setback, the Republican presidential nominee appealed to education-minded swing voters in an effort to reclaim the offensive in his race against Gore. Bush suggested that the vice president has been "belittling people," and promised a more civil tone to his campaign.

Gore, Lieberman tackle Medicare

PORTLAND, Ore. — Keeping focused on health care, Al Gore demanded yesterday that rival George W. Bush say what he is willing to do to save Medicare and he promoted his own \$400 billion boost for the program. Bush, who plans to issue details of his Medicare plan next week, responded by contending that the Clinton-Gore administration squandered opportunities during the past seven years to shore up Medicare. Democrat Gore, at a town hall meeting at Portland State University, touted his plan to preserve Medicare and offer a new prescription drug benefit for senior citizens.

Researchers map genes of bacteria

NEW YORK — Researchers have figured out the genetic blueprint of a common but extraordinarily crafty germ that can be lethal in burn victims and people with lung-clogging cystic fibrosis. Armed with the information, scientists hope to develop new ways of fighting the germ within four to five years. The bacterium is called *Pseudomonas aeruginosa* and is known for its durability and adaptability. It can be found everywhere from home plumbing to vegetables but is harmful only to people with compromised immune systems.

Researchers identify caffeine gene

NEW YORK — Genetic engineering may hold the key to making decaffeinated coffee that doesn't taste like dishwater. Scientists have identified a gene in the coffee plant that is key to the synthesis of caffeine. They hope eventually to produce a genetically engineered coffee plant in which the gene has been shut down. The research was conducted by Alan Crozier, a professor of plant products and human nutrition at the University of Glasgow, and colleagues in Japan. It is being published tomorrow in the journal *Nature*.

Frankfurt exchange to vote on merger

FRANKFURT, Germany — Germany's stock exchange said yesterday it would go ahead with next month's vote to merge with the London Stock Exchange but was still prepared to sweeten its offer if hostile bidding for its cross-Channel counterpart persist. Shareholders from both the LSE and Deutsche Boerse were expected to vote Sept. 14 on merging into a new stock exchange called IX. London postponed the vote Tuesday to give its shareholders time to react to a hostile takeover bid from OM Gruppen AB, the operator of the stock exchange in Stockholm, Sweden.

Dow ends down 112; Nasdaq gains 32

NEW YORK — Shares of brokerage companies surged yesterday following news that Credit Suisse had agreed to buy Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette, but the overall market was mixed in lackluster trading. The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 112.08 at 11,183.01. The Nasdaq composite index was up 32.36 at 4,114.53.

Venus, Seles advance at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Showing off the game that took her to four consecutive titles, including Wimbledon, Venus Williams easily swept into the third round of the U.S. Open yesterday. With her high-power gear in gear, the third-seeded Williams rolled past Kveta Hrdlikova of the Czech Republic 6-1, 6-1. Earlier yesterday, No. 6 Monica Seles downed Anne Kremer 6-3, 6-4. In a men's first-round battle, Greg Rusedski defeated Magnus Gustafsson 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

SafeCats will watch over you

Pick up the phone: UK's safety escort service provides safety to students

If the thought of walking across campus at night has you a little spooked, the SGA and Air Force ROTC has just the service for you. SafeCats, a safety escort service offered by the SGA and AFROTC, provides safety to students on campus. "People complain about how it is unsafe to walk on campus at night, and we are offering a service of safety," said Cadet Allison Guillaume, a communications junior. The members of AFROTC

will escort anyone anywhere on campus between the hours of 8:28 p.m. and 1:31 a.m. Sunday through Thursday. You can also arrange to have a personal escort on a permanent basis. For example, if you have a class Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8 p.m. to 9:15 p.m., you can call the dispatch station, and they will have an escort there to escort you to your destination, Lutterman said. The Safe Cats program has been around for several years, said Cadet Eric Jagers, a theater senior. "This program is a way

your school is reaching out, because it cares about the safety of the students," Guillaume said. There are three locations on campus where a cadet is stationed: W.T. Young Library, Commons and Blazer Hall. By calling the SafeCats number (323-FREE), a dispatcher will notify one of the stationed cadets and they will come and meet you, no matter where you are located. Each escort carries a UK police radio and can contact the police if a problem arises. "On average right now, SafeCats will usually escort five to six people home a night," Lutterman said. They are looking forward

to increasing those numbers this semester. "No matter what the reason you want an escort, we are more than happy to walk with them," he said. Sarah Vanarsdale, a classics graduate student, used the program a few times while she was an undergraduate. "It made me feel safer," she said. "They were safe, nice and friendly." There are many people on campus who think SafeCats is a great idea, but many don't feel it is publicized well. "I get a little nervous walking to my car at night, but I have never utilized SafeCats, or seen it utilized," said Shannon Bowman, a finance senior.

PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH

Faculty, staff voice opinion on next president

Around 40 UK faculty and staff gathered in the Worsham Theater to give their input for UK's presidential search committee Wednesday afternoon. The group discussed a broad range of qualities and values they expect from the next president. Pat Cooper, a professor in the history and women studies departments, would like to see the next president be an individual that will be involved in both the academic and Lexington-area community.

"The next president should be a scholar and influential," Cooper said. "Also he/she needs a sense of humor, to be a part of the community and care about faculty morale. Other faculty and staff members agree that the next president needs to be involved outside the community. Dan Rowland, director of the Gaines Center for the Humanities and a professor of history, feels that in the past UK has taken for granted the relationship it has with the city. "I've seen universities

across the nation take a serious interest with the cities. We need a president that will take an interest in Lexington," Rowland said. Holly Salisbury, a staff member with the Singletary Center for the Arts, said she would like to see the next president support learning of cultural opportunities. "Students don't understand learning outside of the classroom, learning the arts," Salisbury said. Also staff members would like to see more recognition and rewards — not necessarily financial — from the next

president. Other issues faculty and staff would like to see in the process of selection for UK's next president are a diverse pool of semi-finalists, taking global perspective with the University and setting realistic goals that are not too high to achieve. Paul Willis, who has been a part of UK for several decades, stresses one quality that the next president should have. "Our next president..." he said. "Should be well ground in academics."

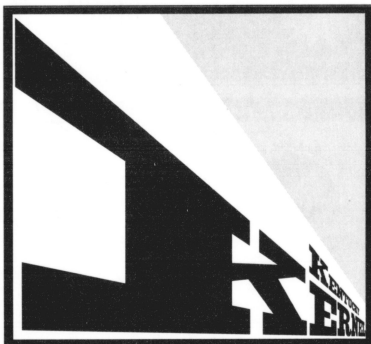

Men ready to avenge loss

Two years ago, the UK football team helped the Louisville Cardinals open up Papa John's Cardinal Stadium by beating them 68-34. This year, it's the UK men's soccer team's turn to help the Cards open another stadium as they begin their 10th season tomorrow night.

This game is important to the Cats for two reasons. First, the Cats have the opportunity to avenge a disappointing loss to the Cards last season, the first time UK had lost to them. Secondly, a victory would be the program's 100th all-time.

This year's team returns only five starters from last year. However, one of those returning players is senior goalkeeper Brian O'Leary, who spent every minute of every game between the posts. His 0.96 goals against average ranked as the Cats' second best all-time - and a key to the Cats' success this year could rest heavily on his shoulders.

Assistant coach Mike Keeney said that a continuation of last year's dominance at goal would allow the team to take more risks offensively.

"He certainly is one of the best goalkeepers in America," head coach Ian Collins said. "We're counting on him for a

very big season." A daunting task for this team will be replacing last season's top two scorers, Jason Bell and Lee Baker, now a student assistant. These two players accounted for 35 percent of UK's total point production.

"What we lost was leadership," O'Leary said, "but we won't change our style - we can make up for the scoring loss."

The good news is that Collins will have 20 newcomers, made up of freshmen and transfers, to make up for those key losses.

"We have some good talent. We're not scraping from the bottom of the barrel here," Collins said. "We're replacing some good players, but we also have some good players here."

The Cats ended last season with a couple of firsts. The '99 squad won UK's first ever Mid-American Conference tournament championship, giving the Cats their first-ever NCAA bid.

However, they were knocked out in the first round

of the NCAA tournament in a double-overtime loss to Indiana, a team that went on to win its second straight national championship. The rematch is here Oct. 18.

As a result of last year's achievements, Collins was named the 1999 Coach of the Year for both the Mid-East Region and the Mid-American Conference. Collins also earned MAC Coach of the Year in 1997.

The Cats have high expectations for this season.

"Our goal this year is to repeat the success of last season," Collins said. "And at the end of the season be playing to full potential."

O'Leary said that they would like to win every game, but "getting off to a good start will help with confidence."

In order to do that they must win against a tough schedule. The Cats face Indiana, last year's national champ, Ohio State, Penn State and the top five MAC teams.

"We're definitely not trying to duck anyone," Collins said.

The Cats finished their exhibition season 2-0-1, shutting out all three opponents. They play their first two regular season games on the road at Louisville and UNC-Asheville before heading home on Sept. 8 for an 8 p.m. game with Vanderbilt.

Women set for trip to Minnesota

The UK women's soccer team travels to Minneapolis for an important weekend at the University of Minnesota Tournament.

The Cats will play a couple of Big Ten teams when they open with the Minnesota Golden Gophers Friday and take on Northwestern Saturday.

"We expect nothing but a hard and difficult weekend," said UK coach Warren Lipka.

Lipka stressed to his team the importance of staying focused and ready for their first road test of the season after two top ranked teams lost their first road games. No. 2 ranked Penn St. lost to No. 22 ranked Maryland and No. 14 ranked BYU lost to unranked Washington earlier this week.

UK is the only ranked team in the tournament and each team will be looking to upset the Cats.

Lipka said that UK and Minnesota have a short-term history in which the two teams

have exchanged wins. Two years ago Minnesota embarrassed UK 6-0 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, but got revenge with a 2-0 win in last season's UK home tournament. Lipka knows the Gophers will not have forgotten.

"We had a little incentive last year and I'm sure they're going to have a little incentive when we go up there," Lipka said.

Lipka said Minnesota is a very fast, transitional team that is organized, which could give UK, who he said had turned the ball over too much recently, some trouble.

"We need to make sure we are a little bit more cleaner and do not give the ball away," said Lipka. "I think we gave the ball away too much against Vander-

bilt, and also in the Cincinnati game."

Northwestern should be a different team than Minnesota. Lipka said they are a young squad that is rebuilding, but that Northwestern always presents solid opposition.

UK will have a chance to play for the tournament championship Sunday based on how they play in their first two games. Lipka said total points, goals scored and against head-to-head records are factored in to determine what teams play for the title.

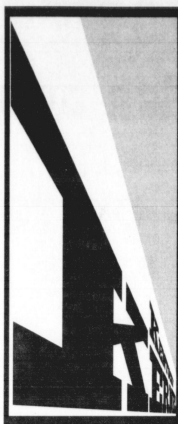
If UK does advance to the championship game they will face Minnesota, Northwestern or Iowa State. Iowa State will play Northwestern Friday.

The No. 15 ranked Cats have been preparing for this weekend after getting off to a 2-0 start, but still have room for improvement.

"We're getting sharper, but we're not there yet, by any means," said Lipka. "With each weekend that comes up, hopefully we just keep on seeing improvement."

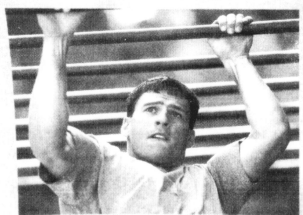

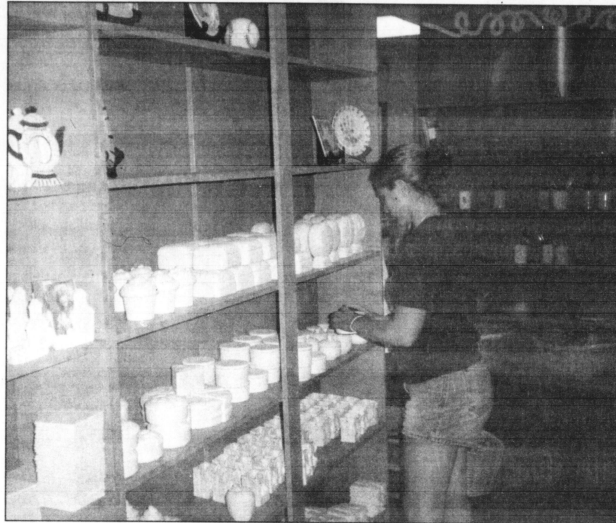

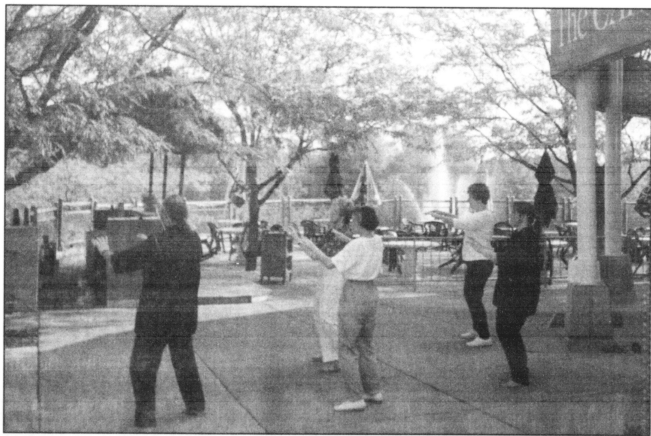

Hacker gets hired for cracking school code

GREENVILLE, N.C. - A former East Carolina University student who was arrested after hacking into the university's computer network has been hired by the school - for his computer expertise.

Nolan Walthe Grant was hired Aug. 16 to work at the university computer system's help desk at a salary of \$21,626. Three years ago, he pleaded guilty to hacking into the school's Unix computer network.

Jeff Huskamp, the university's director of computer and information systems, confirmed Tuesday that Grant was an employee. He would not say whether he knew of Grant's hacking history when Grant was hired.

Food finds a friend

AMAGANSETT, N.Y. - All the other lobsterists must be green with envy. A live 3-pound lobster was rescued from becoming a tasty dinner when a seafood market manager noticed something unusual: its shell was blue.

The rare royal-blue specimen was one of 50 Nova Scotian lobsters delivered to Stuart's Seafood Market last week. Owner Charlotte Klein Sasso was thrilled.

"Don't touch that lobster!" said Sasso, 39. "If I didn't spot him when I did, he would have wound up on someone's plate."

The genetic coloring variation occurs in about one of every 3 million lobsters, scientists say. Lobsters come in other colors, too, such as yellow, black and green.

White lobsters, one out of every 30 million, are the rarest. The blue lobster, named Frank after blue-eyed crooner Frank Sinatra, was stored in a tank. It was headed Tuesday to the Marine Science Institute in Montauk, N.Y.

It will be studied, not eaten, promised marine biologist Anthony D'Agostino, the founder of a privately funded 30-year-old research effort called the Blue Lobster Project.

Hatred in politics

The question arose: Who's the bigger hate-monger? The Rev. Al Sharpton or Pat Buchanan? The debate grew out of a discussion regarding the politics of hate, an exchange rendered timely by the current presidential campaign.

Both Buchanan and Sharpton have left their mark on the present political landscape: the former is himself a candidate for the nation's top political post, while the latter exercises his influence through "back alley" meetings with candidate Gore. Both are men of stature who receive attention from the national press. Both seek not to unite, but to divide. Both are extremists.

The writers of this column find the political muscle of both men deplorable and a sad commentary on the nation's electorate.

Consider Buchanan. How can a man who has clamored for a "cultural war" pose as a viable candidate for the presidency? How can a public figure who has refused to acknowledge the great tragedy of the Holocaust hold himself out as representative of the populace? (It's too bad Pat isn't running on a vice-presidential ticket, as it would be interesting to witness a Lieberman-Buchanan debate.)

But the question is moot. Buchanan continues to work the anti-abortion crowd into a frenzy and to play into xenophobic fears by assailing America's "loose borders."

In at least one respect, Buchanan has proven worse than Rev. Al: he has successfully manipulated America's campaign finance system to receive \$12 million in taxpayer money to fund his clearly futile presidential campaign. (Buchanan's chances of winning the general election are, perhaps, only slightly greater than his chances of winning a seat in the Israeli Knesset.)

That's \$12 million that will fund Buchanan's message of exclusion. Perhaps it comes down to this: Buchanan has been a talk show host for a number of years. He is a side attraction. He is not, however, harmless. Rather, Buchanan's anti-immigrant, anti-feminist, homophobic and racist utterances find support among his minions and - though his style is subtle - one must take seriously the implications of his views.

Buchanan panders to the extreme right, and in so doing profits from the public's worst social instincts.

And so there you have it: Buchanan, the anti-Semite,

must go.

But wait. Perhaps just as alarming is the fervent clamoring of New York's own Rev. Al Sharpton. Sharpton's record is long but hardly distinguished. Indeed, where does one begin? Tawana Brawley? The fire at Freddy's?

Perhaps we should begin with why Sharpton is so dangerous. If Sharpton were simply a fanatical leftist, we're not certain that he is, but that's the side that courts him) encouraging a small group of easily influenced, yet non-influential radicals, his identity would be unknown. But that is not the case.

Somehow, Sharpton has risen to the national stage. He has met with Al Gore, Hillary Clinton and Bill Clinton.

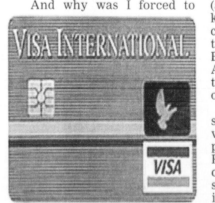
Moreover, he has met with Justice Department officials regarding ongoing federal investigations. (In his role as an activist, we find this to be entirely unacceptable.) His rancorous shouts emanate from the megaphone of any racially charged event.

Consider this: Sharpton actively endorsed the picketing and boycott of a Jewish business in Harlem, a protest that resulted in eight deaths after a street vendor set fire to the store.

Consider further: Sharpton lost the defamation suit brought by former district attorney Steven Pagones regarding Sharpton's repeated, unfounded and ill-advised accusations concerning the alleged rape of Tawana Brawley (note: proving actual malice is virtually impossible in defamation suits). While Sharpton is arguably more vociferous than Buchanan, he is just as exclusive.

To us, such hatred is all too familiar. And frightening. The message is clear - we don't care if you're black, white, red, yellow, purple or blue - when you needlessly defame public officials and encourage protests that end in the loss of innocent lives, the public has no time for you. Such behavior is irresponsible and destructive and is no answer to racist innuendo. In fact, Sharpton's shenanigans are borne of the same hateful instinct. Take it from the top - both men need to go.
