#### Inspection, Certification, and Transportation of Nursery Stock in Kentucky With a Brief Report for the Year Ended June 30, 1943.

Shortage of labor has been the major problem encountered by Kentucky nurserymen this year. In most cases nurserymen have partially solved the problem by the use of boys and older men with very little experience in nursery work. A few nurserymen have employed women for lighter jobs such as weeding, potting, watering and packing. Difficulties have occurred in replacing men experienced in digging, balling, and planting landscape material.

Through cooperation and ingenuity, nurserymen have been able to cope with the problems of rationing and shortages of materials and still give excellent service and good quality nursery stock to their customers. The spirit of cooperation has made it possible to deal quickly and adequately with insect and plant disease problems which might easily have become serious.

General growing conditions throughout the year were favorable. There was adequate rainfall in most sections and landscape material "made up" well. The acreage replanted to nursery stock has been somewhat less than average because of a late wet spring and a shortage of available labor. The supply of certified strawberry plants was very short and the acreage planted to strawberries in the principal growing sections continues to be below average. All available small-fruit and tree-fruit stocks have been sold. Nurserymen report that most of the apple, peach, and small-fruit stock was sold in small orders to gardeners and farmers for home planting. All vacant blocks in the nurseries are being planted to vegetable and feed crops or sown to legumes for soil improvement.

#### "Nursery Stock" Defined

Nursery stock includes all trees, shrubs, and vines, whether nursery grown or native; roses; strawberry, raspberry and blackberry plants; herbaceous perennial plants and roots; ornamental bulbs, corms, tubers and rhizomes; and any other plants which may serve as a means for disseminating injurious insects and plant diseases. For regulatory purposes the list of plants classed as nursery stock must be changed from time to time, depending upon the introduction and distribution of certain insects and plant diseases.

#### Requirements of the Kentucky Nursery Inspection Law

- (1) It shall be unlawful to sell or offer for sale uninspected or uncertified nursery stock. A certificate of inspection indicates freedom from certain injurious insects and plant diseases but does not vouch for trueness to variety nor for grade and condition of any nursery stock.
- (2) Growers of nursery stock for sale or shipment shall apply in writing before June 1st of each year to the State Entomologist, Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, Lexington, for inspection services.
- (3) Every dealer in nursery stock shall secure a nursery dealer's permit. Before this is issued, however, he must furnish an affidavit that he will buy and sell only stock that is certified and will maintain with the State Entomologist a correct and complete list of all sources from which he gets his stock. Landscape architects and tree movers who handle nursery stock are classified as dealers.
- (4) Every person who solicits orders for nursery stock shall secure and carry an agent's permit which is secured only upon request of the nurseryman or dealer to be represented.
- (5) All packages or bundles of nursery stock shipped by common carrier must have attached a copy of the inspection certificate or permit.
  - (6) Certificates and permits may be revoked for cause.
- (7) Fees shall be paid as follows: Inspection certificate, \$5; dealer's permit, \$5; agent of nonresident nurserymen, \$5; nonresident nurseryman's certificate, \$5. Fees shall accompany application. Application blanks may be obtained from the State Entomologist.

- (8) Nonresident nurserymen shall file copies of their state certificates and secure nonresident permits. Every package of nursery stock coming into Kentucky shall have a valid inspection certificate attached to the package. Nonresident nurserymen, dealers, and agents shall carry their Kentucky permits when soliciting orders or delivering nursery stock in Kentucky.
- (9) All certificates and permits automatically expire June 30 following date of issuance.

#### Requirements for Shipment of Nursery Stock Into Other States

Nurserymen who desire to ship stock into another state should familiarize themselves with the requirements of that state before shipment is made. Correspondence should be directed to the officer in charge in the state concerned. For convenience a list of these officers is given on pages 6 and 7 of this bulletin.

The U. S. postal laws and express company regulations require that a copy of a valid certificate of inspection be attached to each package of nursery stock offered for shipment. South Carolina. Florida, Washington, and Louisiana require nurserymen who ship stock into their respective states to file duplicate copies of the invoice with the proper administrative authority. Florida, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California, Montana, Utah, Arizona, and Colorado have provisions for postal or destination inspection of incoming nursery stock. California and Arizona maintain border inspection. For destination inspection of incoming stock Washington, Idaho, and Montana charge \$10.00 per carload to licensed nurserymen and 10 percent of invoice with 50-cent minimum to unlicensed nurseymen. New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Georgia, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Nevada require special affidavits or statements of nurserymen or dealers within their respective states who receive out-of-state shipments of nursery stock.

#### Japanese Beetle

No additional infestations of Japanese beetles have been found in Kentucky since the successful soil treating of the infestation in Louisville during September 1938 (see Kentucky Regulatory Series Bulletin 19, 1939). In the 590 traps operated in Louisville by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine only one bettle was captured during the trapping period of 1942.

The infestations of Japanese beetles in states surrounding Kentucky have shown comparatively small increase or spread. There have been extensions of the area under Federal Quarantine in New York, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia. The area now under regulations of the federal Japanese beetle quarantine includes the entire states of Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Rhode Island, the District of Columbia, and parts of Maine, Maryland, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Vermont, Virginia and West Virginia.

Several states where infestations of Japanese beetle have been found are not included in the above list of regulated areas. It has been the policy of those in charge of administering the Japanese beetle regulations to withhold quarantine restrictions on an area where Japanese beetles were found if the state or local authorities would make satisfactory preparations for treating the infested area in order to exterminate the beetles or prevent their spread. Thus Kentucky, by treating the 45-acre infested area in Louisville in 1938, was spared the restrictions of a federal Japanese beetle quarantine. Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Ohio have had isolated infestations of Japanese beetle which have been treated or are being treated in accordance with provisions stipulated by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

#### Phony Peach Disease

The last phony peach infected tree was found in Kentucky in 1939. Inspections of orchards and nursery environs have been made for the past three years without finding the disease. Kentucky will be considered free from phony peach disease until such time as another tree is found infected with the virus.

#### White Fringed Beetle

White fringed beetles were found during the summer of 1942 in the counties of New Hanover, Pender, and Wayne in North Carolina. An extensive survey was made and the infested areas were brought under federal quarantine (No. 72) in December 1942. Additional areas in Alabama and Mississippi have also been brought under quarantine restrictions. The quarantined areas in Florida and Louisiana remain unchanged.

#### Elm Disease

The virus disease, *Phloem necrosis*, (for description, see Kentucky Regulatory Series Bulletin 32, 1942) has continued to take a toll of elms in Kentucky. Numerous complaints of dying elms have been received from Ashland to Paducah. The disease seems to be most prevalent in the Louisville and Lexington areas. The recommendation is to cut out and burn infected trees in order to prevent the disease from spreading to healthy elms in the vicinity.
