LCC poll shows Fletcher winning governor's race

A new poll conducted by Lexington Community College students shows Rep. Ernie Fletcher narrowly defeating Attorney General Ben Chandler in the governor's race.

The survey has Fletcher beating Chandler 45 per-

cent to 40 percent with 15 percent of voters remaining undecided. The poll's margin of error is 2.9 points.

The semi-annual poll, now in its 15th year, was conducted Sept. 17-25 by students in LCC political science classes taught by Tim Cantrell and Don Ferris. The poll surveyed 1,142

registered voters in Fayette County and surrounding counties on issues ranging from the future of Kentucky-American Water Co. to President George W. Bush's approval rating.

Predictions made from this poll have been very successful in predicting winners in major political

races. It has predicted the Fayette County winner in every major race since 1988.

"It is not a scientific poll, but it has been accurate over the years," Cantrell said.
Cantrell started having his students do polls in 1972 at Western Kentucky University, and in 1988 he

FOR CI/RI parking permit holders, the relocation of the North Campus basketball courts may add to the list of parking woes.

The basketball courts that are south of Blazer Hall and facing Euclid Avenue are being relocated to a western portion of the CI/RI lot along Lexington Avenue. A total of 85 parking spots are affected by the project, according to a UK Parking and Transportation Services e-newsletter. Loyola president resigns after sexual allegations

Armed man sets fire to cathedral pulpit

Armed man sets fire to cathedral pulpit SAVANNAH. Ga. — An armed man who said he was "disturbed about the world's religions" used lighter fluid to set fire to the pulpit and bishop's chair in a historic Roman Catholic cathedral Tuesday, then surrendered after a brief standoff with police, authorities said. Nobody was injured. The flames charred the pulpit but caused no structural damage to the twinspired Cathedral of St. John the Baptist, which dates to 1873 and is a popular tourist stop. Stuart Vincent Smith, 31, was holding a handgun and lighter fluid when he entered the sanctuary shortly after morning Mass, police spokesman Bucky Burnsed said. Police evacuated the surrounding block and a nearby Catholic girls' school during the standoff, which last-ed less than an hour. Smith, who is from the Atlanta suburb of Marietta, was taken into custody without a detective that he was "disturbed about the world's religions." Burnsed said. Receptionist Pegy Baker said she approached the gumman as he walked to the altar. "He told me to stand back, he had lighter fluid." Baker said. "He threw it on a chair and started lighting a cushion. I told him he can't do that. He told me to stand back and pointed the gun at me. "Savannah Archdiocese spokeswoman Barbara King said a monsignor noticed the man on a security camera setting fire to the altar and ran inside the sanctuarry, yelling at him to put the fire out. "No one here knows him. No one here recognized him," King said. "The pulpit is burned, large chunks of the pulpit are destroyed. I would say if's totally gone." Helicopter crash may be hear; search suspended COLUMBIA, Mo. — Authorities suspended a three-day search for a helicopter that a 911 caller said went down with six people on board, and officials said the call may have been a hoax. The caller— at times sounding like he was sobbing, other times sounding disoriented—was a passenger and that the plot was dead. Seaters used helicopters, planes, dogs and horses to comb the dense terrain before suspending the operation Monday night. "We haven't found a thing, so we are suspending the search unless something new develops," said Bruce Piringer, assistant chief of the Boone County Fire Protection District. Radar images recorded at area air traffic control towers were being analyzed for the hour leading up to Saturday night's call, but the images yielded no immediate leads. Piringer said authorities were aware the call might have been a hoax, but he said he was not ready to dismiss it as a prank because wreckage from air crashes has sometimes been skoowered months later. 

A jump from the ordinary

Skydiving companies offer nearby places to live out your Superman fantasies and take to the skies

An afternoon jump from nearly 10,000 feet may not be a typical weekend activity for most students. But if that is the kind of distraction you need from a world full of midterms, then the Ken-tucky Skydiving Center is a local opportunity for adven-ture

tucky Skydiving Center is a docal opportunity for adventure

The Kentucky Skydiving Center operates on a runway at Capital City Airport in Frankfort. Center owner Murl Pitchford, along with wife and co-owner Elizabeth, educate their skydivers prior to jumps with the articulateness and ease of artists familiar with their craft. New divers are given anywhere from 30 minutes to 6 hours of training, depending on the kind of jump chosen, before they even board the plane.

According to Pitchford, skydivers at the Center typically make jumps out of a Cessna 182 Skylane at around 9,500 feet, where they reach a top speed of 120 miles per hour while free falling. Jumpers are attached to a parachute capable of handling 500 pounds of cargo and gear that can resist that pressure several times over.

Recall vote draws high turnout

Polls say California governor may be second replaced; Schwarzenegger leads 135 candidates to fill position

LOS ANGELES — Voters streamed to the polls Tuesday to decide whether to recall Democratic Gov. Gray Davis, whose popularity plunged after the downturn in the economy and burst of the high-tech bubble.

From one end of the state to the other, lines seemed to be moving quickly in and out of polling places, despite one glitch in Hollywood when a polling place failed to open as scheduled at 7 a.m.
Voters were diverted to an adjacent polling place.
It was the heaviest early turnout Patti Negri said she had seen in 12 years as a polling supervisor.
"I've never been so bus, ever," she said. "We had to do a lot of paper-work but people seem ex-cited and ready to vote."

Republican Arnold Schwarzenegger created a stir when he arrived to vote with his wife. Maria Shriver, at a Pacific Palisades mansion. People were there, but most were reporters and photographers.

The same tracking polls showed Schwarzenegger leading the race to replace Davis by 8 to 9 percentage points.

Governor tries to intervene in feeding tube removal

Jeb Bush says brain-damaged woman needs therapy; lawyer calls action an 'unfortunate use of his authority'

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)
Gov. Jeb Bush is arguing that a brain-damaged woman should be provided therapy despite a state judge's order to remove the feeding tube that has been keeping her alive. In documents made public Tuesday, lawyers representing the governor argued that Terri Schiavo is entitled to therapy aimed at helping her swallow to determine if she can eat and drink on her own.

The brief, filled late Monday, argues that state law recognizes the persis-





Weather conditions so far have been ideal to create brilliant fall colors, said Robert Paratley, a botany professor in the University of Kentucky's forestry department.

cumstances for good fall colors," he said in a telephone interview Tuesday. All it takes, however, is a period of rain and wind to spoil leaf peaking by bringing down leaves in a mushy heap, Parattley said.

But he said, "if things more or less tay the same, then it should be a very good year for fall color."

State tourism officials are relishing the prospects of a picture-sque autumn season in the Bluegrass State.

Leaf spotters for the departments of travel and

parks also are predicting a good season for leaf watching, said Jayne McClew, spokeswoman for the Department of Travel.

Fall colors are expected to reach their peak during the third full week of October, though the timing hinges on weather, McClew said.

The statewide forecast through mid-October calls for near-normal temperatures and only a slight possibility of above-normal rainfall, according to the National Weather Service.

Autumn ranks as the state's second busiest travel season, whind summer. Mclew said People flock to state parks, especially on weekends, and it is away time for festivals, she said.

Kentucky's leaf season usually structures for a few weeks. McClew said.

"The fall moves east to west in Kentucky" she said.
"So you can enjoy a peak in the eastern part of the state one week, and maybe two weeks later see the peak in the west."

So far, student feedback seems to be positive concerning the travel agency, even among those who haven't tried it.





Black rocks with the kids in new School of Rock



School of Rock, starring Jack Black, is showing at Lexington Green and

Before the climactic performance in School of Rock, Jack Black tells his prep school band mates, "This isn't my band, it's our band." The band may belong to the kids, but the movie is all Black's.

Dewey Film (Black) has delusions of being a rock star, but his cleanant.

Dewey Finn (Black) has delusions of being a rock star, but his slovenly appearance and lifestyle intervene on the path to success. He gets kicked out of his band and soon finds himself on the verge of being evicted by his roommate.

Ned (Mike White), a former "satanic sex god" turned whipping boy, used to be just like Dewey, but now he's now content to substitute teach and play yes-man for his irritating girlfriend. Ned may have moved on, but Dewey clings to his rock star ideals like a comforting blanket. "One rock concert CAN change the world!" is one of his oft-repeated mantras.

Desperate to avoid musical irrele-

concert CAN change the world!" is one of his off-repeated mantras.

Desperate to avoid musical irrelevancy, not to mention homelessness, Dewey casually borrows Ned's name and reputation to find a new gig as a substitute-teacher in an upscale fifth-grade classroom. Dewey is rude; the kids are prude. The clash makes for some easy jokes, but Black's energetic performance, which leaves him soaked in his own sweat, drags the movie up a notch.

While his pupils are in music class, Dewey overhears the youngsters playing the classics, but not the ones he's accustomed to. Since his ape-like intellect precludes him from teaching math or science, Dewey devises a new project create a rock band to compete against the forces that put him in the classroom to begin with.

From there, the movie is part Sister Act, part American Juniors, with a light sprinkle of Queer Eye For the Straight Cuy. Watching the kids assume aspects of Dewey's personality is at times delightful,

although the novelty does fade. Most importantly, the kids all stay likable. The only real antagonist in The School of Rock is "the Man," but he's no match for good old- fashioned rock and roll.

old- fashioned rock and roll.

Dewey lectures on Zeppelin, assigns
CDs as homework, teaches some kids how
to play new instruments, while turning
others into roadies, techies, backup singers
and groupies. The metamorphosis of
Howard Green Elementary into the School of
Rock produces several "Awww, that's
adovable" moments, but not too many.
The cute kid factor along with the implausibility of the plot could have cursed
the movie, but director Richard Linklater
doesn't once make Black relinquish center
stage for more than a moment to allow that
to happen. Even perennial scene-stealer
Joan Cusack, playing the role of uptight
principal, is engulfed by the wildfire that is
Dewey Finn.

principal, is engulfed by the witome that is Dewey Finn.
When she finds herself in a local dive with Dewey, Cusack's character takes 78 sluggish sips to drink a beer that he tornadoes through in a two gulps. Her prudishness is humorous, but restraint is no match for his spirit, meaning the spir-it of rock.

Other movies this season will be better. Others may very well be funnier too, but they will be as hard to look away from all the way through the end credits

Black's shtick in School of Rock doesn't really cover any new ground. He's obviously a ham and a skilled facial contortionist. His musical acumen (as part of fenacious D) is well documented. He's displayed his surprising agility on film before as well. Yet somehow it still seems fresh.

Like Dewey's rock-star idols, Black is building a body of work that, while it will never move anyone to tears, can at least bring a smile with each viewing. Black's shtick in School of Rock

The Grehan Recording Group, an independent, student-run organization, formed near the end of the 2003 spring semester

Getting it together
"We kicked around the idea for a "We kicked around the idea for a month or so and decided our sole purpose was to raise money to pour back into the studio," said the group's president, telecommunications senior Steven Agarkins. "No one in the organization gets a dollar. We put our own personal time in, doing our own booking, recording and mix-down with state-of-the-art equipment."

"Students were looking for more recording experience than they were getting out of my class," said John Clark, associate telecommunications professor and faculty adviser for The Grehan Recording Group and WRFL.

"And I was thinking about starting a new student group and ways to raise money because of budget cuts."

Making recording affordable "It was a group decision," said Clark. "We wanted to keep the cost as low as possible. (The group is) staffed

by students not only for their resumes, but also for their love of doing it. We want to attract as many people as we

what we love," said Pierce. "And we re-alize that most local bands don't have a


alize that most local bands don't have a lot of money to spare for recording time - we're poor college kids."

"We wanted to offer the lowest fee possible," said Jenkins. "We don't want to limit ourselves just to recording bands, either. We'll do voice-overs, recital tapes, anything. We're the cheapest option you're going to find anywhere."
