

EDUCATIONAL AIM

The course in Military Science is designed to give the student a physical, mental and moral training which will be valuable in his industrial or professional career as it would be should our country need his services as a leader in the defensive forces of the Nation.

The course in Military Science has a real educational as well as a military value. It offers to each student an invaluable training in mental processes, an insight into the duties of a citizen in relation to his country, inculcates a higher respect for law and order, develops his reasoning powers, gives him a breadth of knowledge which will be of definite value to him as a citizen in any life work he may select.

PHENOMENAL GROWTH

The growth of this department at the university has been nothing less than marvelous. Previous to last year there had been three companies, forming one battalion. Last year the growth of the department had reached such a stage that nine companies were formed, making a complete regiment.

Twice the University Corps has been recommended for Distinguished College Classification, the first time they missed it by a slight margin and the results from the last inspection have not been made. This corps ranks with such distinguished groups as Illinois, Ohio and Tennessee.

Col. George D. Freeman, who was at the head of the Military Department during its rapid growth, was relieved as commanding officer last June and Col. Hobbs has been stationed in his place.

Freshmen and Sophomores are required to salute cadet officers.
