Redwine, Logan, Frankel, Wilson Are Elected for the Year 1938-39

Active members of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association elected Marcus Redwine, '19, president, and Miss Lulie Logan, '13, vice-president, for the year 1938-39. L K. Frankel '00, and Dr. George H. Wilson, '04, were elected as members of the executive committee for terms of three years each.

Mr. Redwine, an attorney, of Winchester, Kentucky, was appointed as a member of the Alumni Executive Committee in 1934 and served as the Association's president in 1937-38.

Miss Logan, a life member of the Association, holds the position of Assistant State Home Demonstration Agent in connection with the Agricultural Extension Division at

the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Frankel, who has served on
the Alumni Executive Committee for many years and is its incumbent chairman, was at one time professor of machine design at the University. He is at present a partner in the architectural and engineering firm

of Frankel & Curtis, Lexington.
Dr. Wilson, who has been the Association's president and a member of the Alumni Executive Committee, served as Alumni Representative for the University Board of Trustees for six years. He is a practicing physician in Lexington.

Climaxed by the annual alumni banquet in the large ball room of the Student Union Building, at which 500 alumni and friends were in attendance, Alumni Day, June 2, 1938, proved to be the greatest in the history of the Association.

Registration started at 9 a. m. in the Student Union Building, where alumni had the chance to inspect and enjoy the comfort and beauty of the Alumni Office and the new building in general. Returning alumni met and talked with old friends and classmates and formed small parties to tour the campus and note the many changes.

Class luncheons for returning al-umni of classes ending in "3" and "8" were held at 12:30 p. m. Lunch-eons for the classes of '08, '18, '28, '33 were held in the ball room of the Student Union Building. Luncheons for the classes of '03, '13, '23. were held at downtown hotels.

Commencement Is Enjoyed By 5000

Over 5,000 persons attending the commencement exercises on June 3, 1938, enjoyed an innovation in its presentation. For the first time in many years commencement exercises were held on Stoll field instead of in the Alumni gymnasium.

The academic procession headed by the University Band formed at 6:30 p. m. on the walkway behind the south wall of Stoll field, proceded to the gate at Euclid avenue opposite the Art Center, and crossed Stoll field to the chairs and platform on the football field directly in front of the south side stadium.

Commencement exercises proper started at 7 p. m. with the invocation by the Reverend Robert W. Miles, D.D., pastor, First Presbyterian Church, Lexington.

CLASS OF 1938 JOINS ASSOCIATION

Joining the Alumni Association 100 per cent the class of 1938 has followed the example set before it by the graduating classes of '36 and '37. The class of 1936 was the first class ever to join the Association 100 per cent the year following graduation. Not to be outdone the class of 1937 did likewise.

Following two numbers by the University chorus, accompanied by the University Band, the commencement address was given by Dr. Walter A. Jessup, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. His subject was "You Can Take It With You."

Dr. Frank L. McVey, president of the University, presented the diplomas and Mrs. McVey was made the recipient of the Algernon Sydney Sullivan medallion for meritorious service to the commonwealth. Gov. A. B. Chandler of Kentucky was present to confer the medallion in behalf of the state.

Events of the day preceding the commencement ceremonies included the class luncheon in the Student Union Building for seniors, guests, alumni, and faculty members, and the open house at Maxwell Place from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. where Dr. and Mrs. McVey entertained with a tea for alumni, guests, and graduates of 1938.

1661 Benefit From '37-'38 Association Membership

During the year 1937-38 the number of active members in the Association was the largest in its history. Each year sees a steady increase in memberships, and this is expected in 1938-39.

The number one news interest of 1937–38 in which the Alumni Association took a leading part was that of the reorganization of the athletic department of the University. Through the help and guidance of the Alumni Association, meetings were scheduled in various parts of the state so that alumni could express their views and offer their suggestions as to the situation. As a result of information gained from these meetings a proposed form of reorganization was drawn up and submitted. The reorganization as finally approved by the Board of Trustees followed almost in detail that submitted by the Alumni Association.

Active members of the Alumni Association during the year of 1937-38 received several mailings from the Alumni Office. These mailings informed them of the various Kentucky Headquarters held in connection with football and basketball games, swimming meets, and other events of interest to Kentucky alumni. Active alumni also received mailings of basketball and football schedules, football K stickers, radio programs, maps of the University campus, and other information of various kinds.

During 1937–38 alumni headquarters were established at various places in connection with athletic events and other alumni activities such as Homecoming, Thanksgiving, and Alumni Day. Whenever possible the Alumni Office has endeavored to set up headquarters where it knows that many of the alumni will assemble, to supply them with K buttons, K stickers, and complete information about the University events.

Homecoming for '38 Will Be October 29

Homecoming for Kentucky Alumni in 1938 will be held October 29. Highlight of the day, of course, will be when the Wildcats play their traditional rival, the crimson tide of Alabama.

Closing the day's activities will be the annual Homecoming Dance which is always a delightful occasion for returning alumni.

A plaque honoring Dr. Franklin E. Tuttle, emeritus professor in chemistry, was placed in Kastle Hall, June 2, 1938.

Dr. Frank L. McVey, the first speaker of the program, talked briefly on various aspects of University life. In discussing the Student Union Building he stated that a more tangible thing than brick and mortar had gone into its making, these being the courage of the board of trustees in undertaking the obligations entailed by its construction; the ability of the architects; the supervision of Col. J. H. Graham; and the efforts of the furnishing committee.

Bernie Shively, '36, director of athletics, and Ab Kirwan, '26, head football coach described the set up in athletics and urged that alumni give their support in the "building period" which will be necessary during the next two years.

Principal speaker was Tom Underwood, editor of the Lexington Herald. Speaking of the time when he was a student at the University he told how the University had only the main building, a cannon, a steam whistle, and a pond. Traditions of the University were reviewed and tribute paid to several of its faculty.

Chester Silvers, '29, of Lexington gave greetings from the Law Alumni and Robert Stilz, '38, president of the graduating class reported 100 per cent membership of the class of 1938 in the Association.


