### PRINCIPAL CHANGES IN THE FOOTBALL RULES FOR 1926.

Change 1. What have heretofore been known as "Ground Rules" have been made to apply at the exact boundaries of the playing field.

This means that the ball becomes dead automatically (and no further play can result) whenever it crosses the side line, the side line extended, or the end line.

Change 2. A penalty of five yards (in addition to the loss of a down) is now imposed in each instance where a team makes more than one incomplete forward pass during the same series of four downs (Rule XVII, Section 4, Penalty).

Change 3. A team which has scored a safety will now put the ball in play by a kick from its own 20-yard line (Rule XIII, Section 12).

Change 4. The definition of "Crawling" (Rule VI, Section 17) has been clarified and the rule against "Piling Up" (Rule XXI, Section 3) has been strengthened so that there can be no possible excuse for further violation of either of these rules.

Change 5. Rule XXI, Section 1, has been broadened and now prohibits players on defense from striking an opponent in the face with the heel, back or side of the hand.

### PENALTIES COMMONLY INFLICTED

### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS-

- 1. Offside.
- 2. Holding, by defensive side.
- 3. Illegal use of hands and arms defense.
- 4. Illegal tackling by defense.
- 5. Roughing into kicker.
- 6. Starting forward of backfield men before ball is in play.
- 7. Interference with opponent before ball is in play.
- 8. Feint to snap ball.
- 9. Crawling.
- 10. Taking out time more than four times a half at captain's request.
- 11. Substitute failing to report to the official.
- 12. Taking more than two steps after a fair catch.
- 13. Player out of bounds.
- 14. Unfair play not specifically covered in rules.

### LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS-

- 15. Holding, by side in possession of ball
- 16. Interference by side making for ward pass.
- 17. Pulling, pushing, interlocking, interference, etc.
- 18. Roughing kicker.
- 19. Tripping.
- 20. Hurdling.

- 21. Unsportsmanlike conduct.
- 22. Substitute communicating before first play.
- 23. Man going on field without permission.
- 24. Interference on fair catch.
- 25. Coaching from sidelines.

### LOSS OF TWENTY-FIVE YARDS-

26. Clipping.

### LOSS OF HALF DISTANCE TO GOAL LINE—

- 27. Illegal return to the game.
- 28. Player disqualified for striking, kneeing, kicking, etc.
- 29. Foul within 1-yard line or from behind goal line.

### LOSS OF A DOWN-

30. Illegal or incomplete forward pass.

### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS AND DOWN-

31. Second, or third, incomplete forward pass in any series between first downs.

### LOSS OF BALL -

- 32. Interference on forward pass by defense.
- 33. Forward pass touched by ineligible player.
- 34. Illegal use of hands or arms on kick.
- 36. Failure to advance ball 10 yards in four downs.
- 35. Kicking loose ball.

On the field, never yield; win her Fame.


