UK to hold forum on transportation

Problems facing Kentucky trans-portation will be discussed during a statewide conference on campus March 19 and 20, said Calvin Gray-son, director of the Kentucky Trans-

portation Center.
The 24th Conference on Transportation will consist of speakers and panel members who will address issues such as deteriorating bridges and the economic burden of road re-

sues such as deteriorating orioges and the economic burden of road repairs, Grayson said.

"The primary purpose of the conference is to provide a forum for all levels of government, academia and the private sector and to discuss how to provide a better transport system for the commonwealth of Kentucky, 'Grayson said.

Decreased federal funding for foad repairs and the por condition of bridges are two important issues facing Kentucky transportation, Grayson said. These problems, he said, 'could have a major impact on the whole economy.'"

All sessions will be held in the Student Center.

North's lawsuits against counsel are dismissed

WASHINGTON — A federal judge, declaring yesterday that the nation needs "expeditious and complete disclosure" of the Iran-contra affair, dismissed lawsuits by Lt. Col. Oliver North that sought to stop an independent counsel's investigation of his central role.

"Courts have almost never found that an ongoing criminal investigation imposes as sufficient hardship to the person investigated to warrant judicial review prior to his or her indictment," Parker said in his order.

"The plaintiff has not suffered an injury of sufficient keenness to warrant the court's intercession," Parker said. North, who was fired last November from his post as a National Security Council aide, had filed two lawsuits. Parker dismissed both.
The first contended the independent counsel was operating unconstitutionally because he was appointed by a three-judge federal court instead of by the president or other executive branch officials.
The second suit argued that Walsh's position was still unconstitutional even with the Justice Department appointment.

Parker said the the overall case presents issues of particularly grave constitutional importance? because North's challenge calls into question the constitutionality of vesting prosecutorial power in independent agencies and non-executive branch institutions.

But the judge said, "The strong policy against intervening in ongoing criminal investigations also persuades the court to refrain from reviewing plaintiff's substantive claim."

A similar legal challenge has been mounted by lobbyist and former presidential aide Michael K. Deaver before U.S. District Judge Thomas Pentfield Jackson, in denying Deaver a preliminary injunction Wednesday, said it is unlikely that Deaver's claim of unconstitutionality will ultimately be upheld. However, a federal appeals court yesterday temporarily blocked independent counsel Whitney North Seymour Jr. from seeking a grand jury indictiment against the lobbyist and former presidential aide. 



The galaxy, located 300 million light-years from Earth in the direction of the constellation Andromeda, is an oddly shaped mass of stars and gases that puts out tremendous amounts of energy, says a report to be published today in the journal Science. today in the journal Science

Researchers say the galaxy, called Markarian 348, is 1.3 million light-years in diameter. The Milky Way, in which the Earth's solar system is located, is about 100,000 light-

Soviets stage second nuclear test

MOSCOW - The Soviet Union detonated an underground nuclear explosion yesterday, the second test in the two weeks since the Kremlin ended a 19-month halt in nu-

clear weapons testing.

At the same time, a Kremlin spokesman rejected as "speculations and outright lies" American charges of Soviet cheating on arms accords.

But the spokesman, Boris D. Pyadyshev, expressed optimism that the superpowers could soon agree to rid Europe of their medium-range missiles. He said Soviet envoys to the Geneva arms talks had been told "to work for agreement in the shortest time possible."

Police list 3,500 prostitutes in Moscow

MOSCOW — Soviet police have a list of 3,500 Moscow prostitutes, aged 14 to 70, including three-generation prostitution "dynasties," but officials are virtually powerless to stop the sale of sex, a newspaper said yesterday.

The article in Sovietskaya Rossiya is part of a recent campaign in the Soviet press for laws against prostitution, which officials once maintained was a "capitalist viec."
