But what if UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton had not been able to lure Pitino from his beloved New York Knicks?



About 75 UK students, faculty and administrators assembled for a rally yesterday at 11 a.m. in the Free Speech Area outside the Student Center to speak out against racial violence.

Speakers representing the Black Student Union, the Alliance Working to Achieve Racial Equality, and Students for Social Justice began the rally and then opened the microphone to those in attendance.

"We need to let the administration, faculty and students know

the we can't forget about what happened last Monday," said Jude McPherson, a sociology sophomore and a leader of AWARE. "This is a direct result of racial issues on this campus."

The rally was organized as a response to the attack and threatening of a black female student, Tanya Marie Cole, a biology junior, last Monday morning by two unidentified white males.

Dawn Crutcher, one of the rally organizers, said she was shocked that an incident of racial violence could happen at UK but that the University should have spoken out against what happened sooner. She said was pleased to see turnout at the

pleased to see turnout at the event.
"People want to distance themselves from it (racial vio-lence)," Crutcher said.
Crutcher met last Friday with Zinser to discuss some possible steps the University can take to decrease the chances of future race incidents. One suggestion is integrating racial education into curriculum.

curriculum.

"Something needs to be done because this is an educational institution, something education-al," Crutcher said.

Robert Lawson, assistant to UK President Charles Wethington for administrative affairs, presented a statement from University administration.

Wallis Malone, BSU president, was one student who spoke during the open session of the rally. She said the rally helped bring the issue in to the public eye, but that it wasn't taken seriously at first.

Murder incited 'Home Alive'

Mia Zapata lived a happy life doing what she wanted to do. As lead singer of the Seattle band, The Gits, she brought happiness to herself and to those who listened to her music. Everything was going her way.
But all of that came to a terrible collapse when Mia was raped and murdered on July 7, 1993.
Her friends and family were devastated. Rape and murder were things of television, not of reality. And what was worse was the fact that the police weren't doing anything about it.

"We were being told by the cops that there was nothing we could do about it," Valerie Agnew, guitarist of 7 Year Bitch and friend of Zapata, said in a phone interview.

"I was really, really pissed off about that. We thought that if Mia had some self-defense train-ing then she probably could have fought herself out of the situa-

With this in mind, something onderful came out of an other-

Agnew started to have meet-ings at her house, talking to peo-

ple who were shaken up about the situation.

It came to mind that this group of artists and musicians should put together a self-defense program that would belp prevent situations like this from happening again.

"We had so much energy, we had to focus it, to put it somewhere," Agnew said.

This organization, named Home Alive." is a non-profit group that provides a wide array of self-defense classes, workshops and forums. All the classes are open to anyone wishing to get involved. Funding for Home Alive is done strictly through donations and benefit concerts.

That's where Home Alive: The Art of Self Defense comes in.
This new album by the Home Alive collective contains 45 tracks of music and spoken word on two compact discs.

What started out as a small benefit albums, soon turned out to be one of the biggest compilations of the year.
"We started out thinking that the album was just going to be a really local release," Agnew said.



They felt the title, "Immaculate Misconceptions," ridiculed the immaculate conception of the Virgin Mary.

Peter Hollister, vice president for university relations, said NKU received a letter from Sen. Dick Roeding, R-Ft. Mitchell, and Rep. Royce Adams, D-Dry Ridge, saying the school should change the name of the Oct. 4 show.

Hollister acknowledged that one consideration in dropping the

name is the fact that legislators help determine funding for NKU. The show's coordinator, Ellen Zahorec, an adjunct professor at NKU, said she never was given a chance to explain the title. They would have learned the name was not blasphemous, but simply described artists' depictions of their own understanding—and misconceptions—of Catholicism, she said.

"I understand the position of the administration. They are caught between a rock and a hard place," she said. "They want to continue to receive funding for the university. In this case, money talks."

The letter from Roeding and Adams was sent on behalf of the

Northern Kentucky legislative caucus, Hollister said.

"I can't tell you whether all 13 members of the caucus felt exactly the same way," he said.

Freeman rally draws eight

JORDAN, Mont. — A call for people sympathetic to the Montana Freemen to "ally in central Montana yesterday drew just eight people to a snowy campground in Lewistown.

The Idaho-based Freemen Patriots of the Northwest — who, despite their name, said they are not affiliated with the besieged Montana Freemen — were undeterred by the small turnout.

Organizer Edward LeStage of Kamiah, Idaho, predicted numbers would swell throughout the week as Freemen and their supporters see news of the encampment.

The word is going out, "LeStage said. We're here for the duration. We'll be staying until the FBI leaves Jordan. We're in the early stage of a long rally."

The rally was held at Lewistown, about 120 miles west of the remote Garfield County farm where the militants are holed up and surrounded by more than 100 FBI agents. Participants, far outnumbered by journalists, spent much of the rally gathered around a picnic table talking.

Dan Wooten, another organizer, said there were "literally hundreds of patriots right now en route to Lewistown."

Organizers earlier had predicted hundreds would join the demonstration.

"We want to let everybody know these people aren't alone. Many people think like they do," said Chad Erickson, another organizer.

Lewistown was selected, Erickson said, because it is far enough away from the standoff that law enforcement officials won't be unduly concerned. FBI agents have twice stopped a pair of sympathizers trying to reach the compound.

The Washington Post reported Sunday that the FBI was considering an offer from white separatist Randy Weaver to mediate an end to the standoff. Weaver's wife and son were killed by federal agents in a 1992 shootout at Ruby Ridge, Idaho.

But Sen. Max Baucus, a Montana Democrat, urged Weaver and outside millitia groups to stay home and let officials here try to resolve the situation peacefully. People like Weaver tend to create division and "probably are going to create more problems than they are going to solve," Baucus said on CBS's "Face the Nation."

Decision on abortion drug could come by year's end

WASHINGTON — American women may know by the end of the year if they can buy the French abortion drug RU-486. The Food and Drug Administration confirmed yesterday that the nonprofit Population Council filed an application last month seeking to sell RU-486, based on its results of testing in 2,100 Ameri-can women.

FDA Commissioner David Kessler told Congress last year it would take about six months to determine if RU-486 is safe enough, and effective enough, to sell to Americans. However, the review could take up to a year, the time the agency typically spends on drugs that don't address life-threatening diseases.

The FDA is expected to approve the drug, based partly on records of its use on 150,000 European women, where it had about a 97 percent success rate.

The Population Council would not release those results yesterday, because it is awaiting publication of the data in a medical journal.

Almost all of the nation's 1.3 million abortions are surgical, although doctors last year began publicizing the fact that a drug already on the market to induce abortion.

Bur RU-486, known chemically as mifepristone, would be the first drug specifically approved by the FDA for non-surgical abortion.

Lifting ban on assault guns increases violence

n March 22, the U.S. House of Representatives voted overwhelmingly to repeal the much ballyhood ban on some assault weapons that had been passed in the previous Congress.

The Kentucky delegation voted along party lines with all Republicans supporting the repeal and Democrats Scotty Baseler and Mike Ward voting to leave the ban in place.

The floor debate was, at times, highly emotional. It reached its pitch during an exchange between Representatives Gerald Solomon, a New York Republican, and Patrick Kennedy, a Rhode Island Democrat.

Patrick Rennedy, a sensination of Democrat. Recalling the assassination of John F. Kennedy, the younger Kennedy stated that "families like mine all across this country know all too well what damage weapons can do." He went on to say that

those in the majority who "play with the devil, die with the devil." Solomon's response was incredible. I still cannot believe that he could even make his argument with a straight face.

argument with a straight face.

He claimed that a repeal of the 1994 assault weapons ban is good public policy because people need semi-automatic weapons to defend themselves. According to Solomon, people will be safer in their homes with more rather than fewer assault weapons in circulation.

Solomon wants free access to military-style assault weapons because, he said to Kennedy: "my wife lives alone five days a week in a rural area in upstate New York. She has a right to defend herself when I am not

Is that right, Mr. Solomon?
Well, if you think that liberal access to assault weapons will make your wife and others safer, why stop there? You are, after all, a sitting member of Congress.

If you are really convinced that putting more and more firepower into the hands of our citizens will make us safer, you should bring that about.

If your "firepower quals safery" argument is

should bring that about. If your "firepower equals safety" argument is valid, why not draft and introduce a bill that would allow Americans to be armed with weapons that are even more powerful than assault weapons. Following your logic, that would increase safety even more. Semi-automatic weapons are capable of massive amounts of

carnage, but machine guns are capable of even more. Put them back in circulation. If there really is a direct relationship between available firepower and public safety, this makes sense.

Of course, it doesn't make sense but it is the sort of fallacious reasoning that led the Kentucky legislature to pass and Gov. Paul Patton to sign into law a bill that allows almost any Kentuckian get a permit to carry concealed handguns. Proponents of this policy suggest that this will have a deterrent effect on crime by making criminals think twice before attacking someone who may be carrying agun.

However, two University of Maryland researchers who released a study of this issue demonstrated that in states where this policy has already been implemented, crimes involving guns,

including homicide, have gone up instead of down. This relationship is present even when variations in the general crime rate are taken into account.

Despite all evidence to the contrary, Solomon and organizations like the NRA continue to take positions similar to those mentioned above and others that are similarly indefensible. The NRA went on record a number of years ago in opposition to a ban on tellon-coated "cop killer" bullets. These bullets penetrate bullet proof vests.

The only purpose for such bullets is to kill people such as police officers or federal agents. But, since the NRA considers most federal agents the equivalent of Nazi storm troopers — remember the "jack-booted thugs" reference in an NRA fund-raising letter that prompted George Bush to resign is membership — why is this surprising?

enhance public safety. But, the weapons that were banned by the 1994 statute and others like them that are not affected by that law but should also be proscribed are not related in any way to self-protection.

They are weapons designed for use on a battlefield. If they are legalized again or if the ban is not tightened, our cities will continue to resemble war zones.

Instead of following the NRA's logic, let's ban weapons that have the ability to slaughter masses of people in an instant and restrict those who can carry weapons in public to those with a demonstrated need such as law enforcement and, for instance, stalking victims.

Congressman Solomon, purchase a shogun for your wife to keep at home.

That will increase her safety, not military weapons and not a concealed handgon in every purse or inside of every man's jacket.
