Mr. President, members of the Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations, ladies and gentlemen:

I thank Dr. Thompson, Chairman of the Executive Committee, for the kind invitation which he has given me to occupy a part of the unallotted hour of the program and for the broad discretionary margin which he has kindly allowed me. I think that perhaps I cannot do better than to give you some of my personal recollections of the movement of events within the last fifty years, covering a period of unprecedented activity in every relation of life.

When we look back over the years covered by a lifetime, it is difficult to realize the extent and character of the transition. My recollections go back with tolerable distinctness to 1842. Andrew Jackson was still alive and the signal triumph of New Orleans was still fresh in the
