I understand from Col. Hodges that you decline to receive the proposed appropriation of \$3120 from the Legislature to your College and, also, that you favor the Bill presented by the State Teachers' Association now pending and styled Senate Bill No. 100. He modified the statement by saying that you feared the sum asked - \$1500, was too small to secure the benefits desired.

Dear Judge:-

Senator Carroll advises me this morning that no questions were sent out to the County Superintendents for examinations of applicants who desire to attend the University under the provision of the law which allows them to attend free of certain charges. He further advises me that he has been advised that you have declined to follow the provisions of the law in other respects, basing your action upon my directions.

I am sure there is some mistake about this, as the case now pending in the Court of Appeals involving these questions was continued upon agreement between Senator Carroll and myself that you, as the President of the University, would follow strictly the provisions of the law in all respects until the Court of Appeals held that the law is unconstitutional, if it should so hold.

I trust that you will carry out this agreement between Senator Carroll and myself, as I thought it was satisfactory to you after having talked the matter over with you by telephone. In other words, the opinion of Judge Kerr was to be obeyed until the case was passed upon by the Court of Appeals. I hope that you will attend to these matters at once, so that Senator Carroll will have no reason to believe that I made an agreement with him which did not meet with your approval.



Dear President Patterson:--

Replying to yours of September 7. The salaries paid to professors in the Ohio State University areas follows:--

First. The law prevents us from paying more than \$2500.

Second. We paid \$2500. long ago but owing to financial stringencies there was a 10% reduction and since that time the salary of head professors is \$2250. In two or three instances we have moved up to the \$2500. point. We have the rank of professor, who is not head of the department, and these men usually get from \$1800. to \$2000.

Third. We have the rank of associate professor, who sits in the college faculties but not in the general faculty of the University and is not supposed to be doing independent work. This position pays as a maximum \$1600.


Fourth. The maximum for the assistant professor is supposed to be \$1200. although in one or two instances we have exceeded this amount.

All appointments of every kind are made by the Board of Trustees. All appointments can be cancelled by the Board of Trustees only. During my presidency since 1899 no appointment has been made except upon recommendation of the president. There is no rule for this last point but it is a kind of unwritten rule.

You understand that the experiment station is at Wooster and we are not able to make reply to question five.


