MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE
Oct. 12, 1931

The University Senate met in the lecture room of McVey Hall, Monday, October 12, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of August 19 were read and approved.

The secretary reported that at the meeting August 19 the Senate had recommended Joseph B. Campbell for the degree Bachelor of Arts as of the year 1912. On further examination of the records it was found that Mr. Campbell completed his work in 1913, and the secretary asked the privilege of correcting the minutes and the commencement program. This was approved.

President McVey announced that Mr. Finley, Chairman of the Board of Student Publications had asked permission to appear before the Senate and request a ruling on some points of eligibility that had arisen in the conduct of the business of the Board. Both sides of the controversy existing in the Board were presented. The question was referred to a committee composed of Messrs. Graham, Melcher and Portman.

The Senate approved the recommendation from the University Council that graduate students be exempt from the rule requiring that incomplete work be made up within thirty days after the student reenters the University.

Minutes of the University Senate - Oct. 12 - con't.

The Committee on Duplication of Courses reported on the following courses, which were approved:

History 100a. The Diplomacy and Foreign Policy of the United States to 1860. A survey designed to acquaint the student with the principles of American foreign policy and their historical evolution in practice. Three hours per week. Three credits. Prerequisite: Course 10a, or equivalent.

History 100b. The Diplomacy and Foreign Policy of the United States since 1860. A continuation of course 100a. Prerequisite: Course 10b, or equivalent. Three hours per week. Three credits.

History 190a. The Expansion of Europe. The Portugese, Dutch, French and British colonial and trading empires in the Central East (India, Burma, Indo-China and the East Indies). Prerequisite: Course 4a, or equivalent. Three hours per week. Three credits.

History 190b. The Expansion of Europe. The contacts of Europe and America with the Far East (China, Japan, Korea and the Phillippines) in the 19th and 20th centuries. Prerequisite: Course 4b, or equivalent. Three hours per week. Three credits. A continuation of course 190a.

History 200a. Graduate Seminar in American Diplomatic History. A specific topic for investigation will be assigned by the instructor. Two hours per week. Two credits.

History 200b. Graduate Seminar in American Diplomatic History. A specific topic for investigation will be assigned by the instructor. A continuation of course 200a. Two hours per week. Two credits.

Chemistry 210, a, b, c, d. Seminar. Reports and discussions on recent research and current literature. One hour per week. One credit per semester.

Political Science 202. Scope and Method. Three hours per week. Three credits. (To replace P. S. 202a and 202b, each three hours per week. Three credits.)

Political Science 203. Public Administration. Three hours per week. Three credits. (To replace P. S. 203a and 203b, each three hours per week. Three credits.)

Changes:

- A. I. 201, 3 credits, to A. I. 201a, 3 credits and 201b, 3 credits.
- A. I. 202, 3 credits, to A. I. 202a, 3 credits and 202b, 3 credits.
- A. I. 203, 3 credits, to A. I. 203a, 3 credits and 203b, 3 credits.
- A. I. 205, 3 credits, to A. I. 205a, 3 credits and 205b, 3 credits.
- A. I. 207, 3 credits, to A. I. 207a, 3 credits and 207b, 3 credits.
- A. I. 208, 3 credits to A. I. 208a, 3 credits and 208b, 3 credits.

October 12, 1931

TO THE UNIVERSITY SENATE:

The Committee on Duplication of Courses wishes to recommend to the University Senate:

1. That any college having courses to be submitted for approval have a list of the courses mimeographed and sent to the members of the Senate at least five days before the meeting of the Senate.
2. That any department raising questions of duplication should refer such questions to the Committee before they be submitted to the Senate.

The following recommendations from the College of Education were approved:

TO THE SENATE: October 12, 1931

The College of Education recommends:

1. That Education 186 be raised from 2 credits to 3 credits.
2. That the rule limiting students doing their practice teaching to 16 credits in general education and 18 credits in vocational education be changed to allow not to exceed 17 credits in general education and 19 credits in vocational education. It is recommended further that the deans of the separate colleges be allowed to make exceptions to this recommendation this semester provided the exceptions are within the limits that the Scholarship and Attendance Committee would allow.
