Placement service changes references to be more reliable

The Placement Center has implemented two changes in its student registration process that may lend more credibility to references according to Harry Jones, associate director of the Placemen service.

Studens now deliver their own "Rating and Opinion Sheets," to be completed by the faculty member, staff member or employer they have chosen as a reference. In the past the Placement Service sent the forms directly to the reference.

Also, students may now waive their right to review how they were rated by their reference.

Jones said the changes lend more credibility because hand delivery of

Jones said the changes lend more redibility because hand delivery of the rating sheets encourages the tudents and their chosen references to

review. Hand delivering the rating sheets also helps professors match students names with their faces.

"In recent years we've had a lot of flack from employees about references not being worth anything in that the references weren't accurate. Since it's open information, a student can remove an unfavorable reference from his file." In after waiving their right to review. Warmer temperatures and rain that began Saturday continued yesterday and then changed to sleet and snow as a cold front moved eastward across the state.

Some parts of Kentucky had received up to two inches of snow by late yesterday. As the snow ended from the west last night, additional accumulations of one to two inches were forecast for central Kentucky while the southeastern mountains were expected to get up to another four inches

The National Weather Service said Wednesday would bring another chance of snow. Temperatures later in the week are expected to drop to the teens and low 20s.

Temperatures yesterday held nearly steady in the upper 20% in the West to the low to mid 30% in the East. The same range was forecast for today, with slightly warming temperatures expected tomorrow before the arrival of the other storm sysem.

This weekend's snow is not expected to affect classes at UK, however. There are a lot of different factors involved in the decision to call off classes.

"Our situation isn't like that of the Fayette County Schools," Dean of Students Joe Burch said yesterday.

"The students are here. We don't have the same transportation problem."

"Normally I will survey the situation carly in the morning and talk with the vice president of business affairs, and decide if we feel it is necessary to after the University schedule," Safety Director Tom Padget said.

Day attack made by alleged rapist

Another female U.K. student became the third victim of an alleged rapist when she was "detained" Saturday morning near Blanding I ower, U.K. Police Chief Paul Harrison said last night.

On Jan. 7, a 21-year-old woman told police she was raped early in the morning, before dawn. She said she was walking from the Newman Center on Rose Lane whan a man approached

An attempted rape occurred around dawn Wednesday, when another 21ear-old woman was walking alone on Hillion Avenue, in front of the Kappa Alpha house. She said she was grabbed by a man and gave a description similar to 7the one reported by the first victim.

The assailant held a knife to her throat but she screamed and frightened him away.

"We're concerned the attacks are related because of the time of day they occurred and basic generalities," occurred and basic generalities, and though Saturday's assailant was not wearing an army jacket. Harrison said he believes the three attacks were committed by the same man. "Na far as we know the guy fit the description," the said. "There were some

Despite the fact the three victims did not get a good look at the man. Harrison said police believe he is a Caucasian and approximately 25 years old.

"We've beefed up the investigation," Harrison said, "We've worked on it pretty heavy since Wednesday, and we've checked out some suspects,"

Harrison said he will read the report Harrison said he will read the report of the third incident today and discuss the situation with the campus police department. "Sometime Monday morning we will probably have a good long meeting and decide what to do about it." he said.

violations of city building or housing codes, and the inspector said Boyd Hall wasn't in too bad condition—for a building its age. What no official has said is that they or their children would be happy living there

It is a tribute to the adaptability of college It is a tribute to the adaptability of college students that some Boyd Hall residents protested a new plan that will convert their home to a freshmen women's dorm next year. Evidently, the terrors that were already known were preferable to unknown ones. Or maybe they didn't want to move to the farflung new apartments somewhere in the nether regions beyond Commonwealth Stadium, or didn't want to live in soon-to-be-cood Keeneland Hall. Perhaps the change in dorm assignments will inspire more action on making Boyd Hall a decent

building. The parents of freshmen girls will doubtless be very circumspect about where their



children live. If Boyd Hall hasn't been improved by

August, the complaints will be many and loud.

The University should take steps to substantially renovate Boyd Hall this summer before opening next fall, paying particular attention to the problems cited above. So far, the repairs seem to have been limited to new coats of paint, and that's




