MINUTES OF APRIL 16, 1928

The University Senate met in the Little Theatre Monday, April 16, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of March 12 were read and approved.

The following recommendations from the Rules Committee were approved:

"That the words underscored be added to the rule on dropping a subject so that the rule will read as follows:

A student who drops a subject without the permission of his Dean shall be given a semester grade of E in that subject. After the first week of the semester, no student will be permitted to drop a subject until he has first presented to his Dean a recommendation from his instructor stating whether he should or should not be permitted to drop the subject. During the first two weeks of the semester, a student may be dropped from a subject with or without a grade of E at the discretion of his Dean. If a student is dropped from a subject later than the third Monday of the semester, he will be marked a grade of E for that course, unless he is excused by the Committee on Scholarship and Attendance. A student who drops out of the University before the end of the semester shall be marked E for the semester in those subjects in which he is reported as failing at the time he leaves."

Senate approved the following recommendations concerning courses which have been approved by the Committee on Courses of Study:

- ✓ History 181. European Historiography. One credit.
- ✓ History 182. American Historiography. One credit.
- ✓ History 183a. Historical Criticism. One credit.
- ✓ History 183b. Historical Criticism. One credit.
- ✓ Psychology 117. Psychology of Language. Two hours Laboratory and 2 hours Lecture. Three credits.
- ✓ Psychology 154. Psychology and the Law. Two credits (Passed with Understanding that the final agreement should be made between Dean Boyd and Dean Evans as to allocation of the course).

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- ✓ Journalism 8a,b. Copy Reading, Proof Reading, Typography. One hour lecture and four hours laboratory per week. Three credits.
  - ✓ Journalism 106. Ethics and Principles of Journalism. Prerequisite Journalism 105a. Three credits.
  - ✓ Physics 226a,b. Research in Physics. Three credits per semester.
  - ✓ Physics 227a,b. Research in Physics. Five credits per semester.
  - ✓ Geology 20a,b. Laboratory Work in Elementary Geology. One credit per semester.
  - ✓ Music 19a,b. History and Appreciation of Music, 2 credits per semester.
  - ✓ Music 25a,b. Elementary Harmony. Three credits per semester. (To replace Elementary Harmony, two credits per semester.)
  - ✓ Commerce 135 - Problems in Marketing - *3 credits (see letter)*
- On recommendation of the Council, the University Senate approved the following new organizations:

1. Phi Delta Kappa - honor fraternity for graduate students in Education.
2. Local organization, having the purpose of later petitioning a national fraternity. Name of Local organization to be Tau Epsilon Pi.

Senate also approved the recommendation of the Council that the following rules be interpreted as not applying to graduate students:

1. The rule penalizing absence before and after holidays.
2. The rule requiring written excuses for absence from classes.
3. The rule requiring all students to carry at least twelve credit hours each semester.
4. The rule requiring students to be present for 75 per cent of their classes in order to take the examinations.

The following recommendation of the Graduate Committee was approved:

"That the Department of Political Science be added to the list of departments which are permitted to offer work for the doctor's degree."

The Senate approved the following recommendation from the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences:

- "1. Changes in the requirements for the degree B.S. in Music-  
Substitution of Music 19a and b (History and Appreciation of

of Music\* for Music 5a and b, History of Music. Two credits per semester. Freshmen.

Substitution of Music 25a and 25b (Elementary Harmony) for Music 3a and 3b, Elementary Harmony. Three credits per semester.

Dropping as requirement Music 2a and b, Music Appreciation. One credit per semester.

Total credits remain unchanged.

2. Changes in requirements for the degree A.B. in Journalism-

Drop English, Elective (Numbers above 100) Three credits.

Add English to History of Pol. Sci., Elective (Numbers above 100). Three credits.

Add Journalism 8a --Copy reading, Proof reading, Typography, one hour recitation, four hours laboratory, three credits.

Second Semester

Drop English, Elective (Numbers above 100) Three credits.

Add English to History or Pol. Sci., Elective (Numbers above 100). Three credits.

Add Journalism 8b - Copy Reading, Proof Reading, Typography, One hour recitation, four hours laboratory, three credits.

Senior Year

First Semester

Drop Journalism 5a - Law of Press, Editorial, Music, Dramatic Criticism, Book Reviewing. Three credits.

Add Journalism 105a --Law of Press, Editorial Writing. Three credits.

Drop Art 57 -- Principles of Art Criticism. Three credits.

Add Journalism 6 --Critical Writing. Three credits.

Second Semester

Drop Journalism 105b --Copy reading, Proof Reading, Headlining. Three credits.

Add Journalism 106 --Ethics and Principles of Journalism. 3 credits

Add Journalism 7--Community Journalism. Three credits.

Drop English of Commerce (Numbers above 100). Three credits.

Total credits unchanged."

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The following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences was also approved:

1. A.B. or B.S. with Department Honors

The degree of A.B. or B.S. with Honors in the student's major subject will be conferred upon the student who in addition to having completed the requirements for the degree, shall have (1) attained high standing in his major subject; (2) passed with distinction a thorough comprehensive examination in his major subject; (3) been recommended for the said degree by the faculty of the department in which his major work was done.

This honor is to be recorded in the commencement program and on the student's diploma.

This action sets aside former requirements for the degree with honors."

The Senate approved the recommendation of the Graduate Committee that the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws be conferred on Sir Leslie McKenzie at the June convocation.

President McVey announced that Dean Anderson had obtained from Henry Ford a set of the old McGuffey Readers and had presented it to the University Library.

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE MAY 14, 1928

The University Senate met in the Little Theatre Monday, May 14, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of April 16 were read and approved.

The special committee on Examinations and Cheating made the following report, which was approved:

"Your Committee on Examinations and Cheating begs to report as follows: The Committee, after careful study of the situation, has undertaken to assemble the observations of the faculty and students regarding the extent and causes of cheating in the University, as a basis upon which to formulate recommendations. To this end questionnaires have been filled out by both faculty members and students, none of whom were required to sign their replies. Student questionnaires were so distributed as to get a representative cross section of opinion in the student body.

The results of 119 faculty replies and 363 student replies have been tabulated and studied by this Committee. Among the out-
