# Black law students engage in fight against Chandler

A group of black law students joined other campus and state groups yesterday in asking for former Gov. A.B. "Happy." Chandler's removal from the UK Board of Trustees.

"As a representative of the University of Kentucky and of our state, Mr. Chandler is speaking for us in a lot of ways, and personally I don't want him speaking that way for me and representing our state and University in that particular manner," said Julies Butcher of the Women's Law Caucus, "I just find it unacceptable."

Butcher also said more than 100 law students, faculty and staff have signed a petition asking for Chandler's remov-al from the board.

The requests for either Chandler's resignation or removal from the board came after Chandler used a racial epithet in an interview with the Kernel last week.

The resolution, which will be mailed to UK President David Roselle, Kentucky Gov. Wallace Wilkinson and Chandler, was proposed by the UK College of Law chapter of the Black American Law Student Association, the Christian Legal Society, the National Lawyeers Guild and the Women's Law Caucus, Butcher said.

The Senate yesterday rejected the nomination of John Tower as defense secretary, 33-47; handing President Bush a major defeat in his first high-stakes showdown with the Democratic-controlled Congress of the Washington of John Tower Tower was put down by concerns about his drinking habits, along with senatorial unhappiness that he left his government post as arms negotator and began earning hundreds of thousands of dollars as a defense industry consultant.

The vote was the culmination of a tumultuous six-day Senate debate and closely-followed party lines.
Howell Helfin of Alabama, Lloyd Bentsen of Texas and Christopher Dodd of Connecticut were the only Democrats to support the nomination. One Republicant Asiany Kasebaum of Kansas — voted against it.

# Preventing World War III ought to be everyone's business

In his column on Socially Concerned Students, C.A. Duane Bonifer heaped ridicule on Socially Concerned Students and four other student groups for daring to sug-restriction of the student groups for daring to sug-restriction of the student groups for a sugar state of the student crous. To say that world events can affect all of us and that the student voice should be heard.

Perhaps Mr. Bonifer is unaware that the Middle East is the region of the world most likely to act as the trigger-point for World War III. Both superpowers are deeply involved in the region — the United States is supporting Israel and the States is supporting Israel and the State Union allied with Syra. Soveral close calls. During the 1973 Arabisraeli war, the United States went on nuclear alert to prevent the Soviet Union from sending its troops

to Egypt to enforce a cease-fire that Israel was violating.
During Israel's 1982 invasion of Lebanon, Israel shelled the Soviet Embassy in Beruit and then occupied that embassy during its invasion of West Beruit, in violation of another cease-fire. Israel also killed 200 Soviet technicians near a Syrian air defense installation. Forfunately, the Soviet Union did not retaliate against Israel for these atlacks on Soviet citizens. Duane Bomiler states that "the United States foreign policy is not invade other countries unless Americans are in danger." Please Lake 60 seconds to imagine what would have happened if the Soviet

Union has been operating according to the Bonifer Doctrine in 1982.

What if they had invaded Israel because Soviet citizens had been killed and others were in danger? In my opinion, we would not be alive today to talk about it. The conflict between Israel and the Palestinians is at the core of the decades-long Arab-Israeli conflict. It has contributed to the out-break of a series of bloody wars over the past 41 years and threaters to do so again.

This time, however, certain Arab countries possess chemical weapons and long-range missiles to deliver them, while Israel has more than enough nuclear weapons and long-range aircraft to devastate all the Arab countries so and parts of the southern Soviet Union.

The main rationale for our proposed student government resolu-

tion is that a negotiated settlement of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict would greatly reduce tensions in the entire region, making the outbreak of disastrous war less likely. This would have beneficial effects on the security of Israel, the Arab nations and the rest of the world.

Bonifer erroneously reported that this resolution was on the agenda of the Student Government Asso-ciation Senate meeting of March 1. Recognizing that this issue is a complex one, we didn't attempt to push it through without adequate discussion and education.

Last week, the sponsoring groups organized a series of free public education forums designed to highlight various aspects of the issue. In addition, we plan to be available during the next several weeks to meet with any and all of the SGA

Senators to explain the resolution and answer questions.

and answer questions.

In Mr. Bonifer's mind, such grass-roots activities conjure up images of the 1966s, "when student protests, burning the American flag and tearing down anything that resembled the evil establishment was in vogue." This is unfair, unsubstantiated and a cheap shot. I have never burned an American flag and never will. To my knowledge, none of the students in the five sponsoring groups ever has either.

If I were to respond at the same level of rhetoric, I might say some-bring like: "Al times, Bomifer's blind faith in the Secretary of State and other so-called 'experts' reminds me of those people who supported the napalming of children by the U.S. Air Force during the

Vietnam War." But I wouldn't stoop so low.

The people sponsoring the resolution on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict have a hope, possibly naive, that our efforts can help lead toward a peaceful settlement when combined with the efforts of thousands of other people across this deep and bitter, and won't be resolved in a day. We are in this for the long haul.

The attitude of cynicism is in vogue these days. It's easy to sit back and sneer at the idealistic efforts of others. I hope that in the future, however, Mr. Bonifer criticizes us for the content of our proposals rather than for the mere act of trying to get actively involved in the world was a member of soft of the content of the c

The Flaming Lips out to alter senses through their music and stage show

I remember the last time I saw
The Flaming Lips. It was less than
a year ago and my ears are still
bleeding.
"We play loud, so that it isn't
just music. It's a physical thing
when it's this loud," said Wayne
Coyne, guitarist/vocalist of The
Flaming Lips, in a recent phone in
review from his home in Norman,
Okla.
Wednesday. The Flaming Lips
embarked on a one-month tour of
the eastern United States in support of their new record, Telepa
the Coyne describes the new album
as "our version of what punk rock

"(Telepathic Surgery) ended up being a really experimental re-cord," Coyne said. "We went in the studio at the end of July for 12 days and recorded 10 songs. Some of them we had thought out, some of them we hadn't."

When the band found that the record would not be released until
after Christmas, they returned to
the Dallas studio, recorded a few
more songs and rearranged some
of the previous cuts.

The band's second album and third LP on Reckless Records follows in the same vein as its predecessor, 1987's Oh My Gawd!!!...The Flaming Lips, but differs, according to Coyne, in that it "rocks harder."

it 'rocks harder.' Although The Flaming Lips fall into the broad category of rock 'n' roll, comparisons to psychedelic artists of the early '70s abound, which are due in part to their stage show that includes a smoke machine, a bubble machine and a light show operated by bassist Mike Ivins.

"We don't take the whole stage-show thing as seriously as some people who want to hold up the sanctity of rock in 'roll,' Coyne said. "They say, 'If you took away those bubbles, and you took away those be be bored shitless. We get up and play and create this atmosphere. And that's the way we like it. Whether we get paid a lot to do it or we're dong it for nothing, it's still the same feeling for us.'

In addition to overloading the

In addition to overloading the senses with smoke, bubbles and sheer loudness, the trio recently added a laser.

"I remember going to a Blue Oyster Cult show when I was 11 or so, and the lasers were flying all around." Covne said. "A couple of

weeks later there was a big law suit about a laser damaging some body's eye. We thought that was so cool. And if we ever got a laser, we'd aim it right at the audience. The laser just makes it so fun that we can freak out and everything is perfectly acceptable."

Even with all the gadgets and experimentation, the band still manages to present interesting, and many times depressing, lyrics within the framework of Coyne's screaming guitar, Ivin's pulsating bass and drummer Richard English's overpowering beat.

"I think that when people see us live, and we're just a three-piece band, you get the gist that the band in front of you can make a lot of weird noise, but it all falls into the category of rock 'n' roll," Coyne said. "We're going to ruin your ears, we're going to ruin your ears, we're going to ruin your whole philosophy on life. All within an hour."




