Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr.
Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.



Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been the hallmark of Cliff Hagan's nine-year reign as athletics director with outstanding attendance at football and men's basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball games, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

In the coming year, the University will host the 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championships and the Mideast Regional of

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the presitigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton,

also of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington; Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty; Amy, a senior at the University of Alabama; and Kip, a sophomore member of the Transylvania University basketball and tennis teams.

When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season.

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play: "Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players: "I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred
Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

Graduate Assistant Louisville, 1983

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.


LISA NEAL Manager



UK-IU WOMEN CULTIVATE THEIR OWN RIVALRY

Kentucky vs. Indiana.

The series has long been one that sets the blood boiling among the fans of these two border states. Traditionally, it has been the men's rivalry that has been so intense and competitive. But now, it looks as though the women are developing quite a series of their own.

The Lady Kats and Lady Hoosiers have met 10 times in the series that dates back to 1975. Eight times the Lady Kats have come away winners. But the most recent and most important contest went to Indiana. The Lady Hoosiers invaded Memorial Coliseum on March 18 of this year, and stunned Terry Hall's veteran squad 87-76 in the first round of the NCAA playoffs. The loss ended what was expected to be the most successful year ever for a Lady Kat team.

While some of the faces have changed, several of the principals return for tonight's rematch. Indiana has three starters back, including frontline players Rachelle Bostic and Denise Jackson, who scored 45 points on 17-for-27 shooting in the last game. They also combined for 21 rebounds. Also back is sophomore guard Linda Cunningham, who fired in seven of nine field goal attempts from long range to lead her team in shooting 64.6 percent from the field. Cunningham scored 22 points as she also hit 8 of 12 free throw attempts.

Back for Kentucky are starters Leslie Nichols and Lisa Collins, but gone are Valerie Still, Lea Wise and Patty Jo Hedges, who combined for 49 points and 22 rebounds in the loss. Nichols had 13 points and five rebounds, while Collins contributed six points and three rebounds in 39 minutes of action.

"We really lacked intensity the last time we played them," Collins said. "They wanted it more than we did. But I don't think that will be the case at all this time. We want every game we play really bad and I think that's going to be a big plus for us this year."

The Lady Kats have a 3-1 record after upsetting 16th-ranked Ohio State on the road Friday night. After dropping their opener 84-77 at Cincinnati, they bounced back for homecourt victories over Eastern Kentucky and Valdosta State in the Dial Classic Tournament.

"Although the team thought they were ready to play against Cincinnati, we weren't really ready," said UK Coach Terry Hall. "We made a lot of mistakes because of inexperience. But we've improved with each game we've played."

Indiana opened its season with victories over Pittsburgh and Ball State last week. Over the weekend, the Lady Hoosiers of Coach Maryalyce Jeremiah defeated Bowling Green and Arizona State in their own Converse Classic

In the few months she has spent at the University of Kentucky, freshman Lady Kat Sandy Harding has already stepped into the starting lineup and shown considerable signs of leadership at the point guard. At just 5-2, Harding's chances of becoming the next playmaker for Kentucky were in question at first, due to her small size and inexperience.

But Sandy Harding is used to overcoming obstacles bigger than herself

She proved that back home as a high school star at Auburn, N.Y. where she led her team to a 19-3 record her senior year, averaging 28.2 points, eight assists and six rebounds per game. Quite an achievement for someone who was, in most cases, the smallest player on the floor.

Harding makes up for her size with her exceptional speed, quickness and ballhandling skills. By combining these talents, she has become a versatile and exciting player to watch. Already, she has heads turning when she steps onto the floor.

"She's an explosive player and makes a lot of things happen when she's in the game," said Kentucky head coach Terry Hall. "I've been real pleased with her progress so far, and her hard work has already earned her a starting position."

Hall said she was surprised that Harding learned the offense so quickly. Her quick adjustment to the Kentucky game plan and her natural leadership ability became the primary reasons for her early starting spot. "I was especially impressed with her self-confidence," Hall said. "Sandy has enough confidence in herself to direct traffic on the floor, and usually freshmen don't do that right off."

Harding's basketball ability was recognized at an early age when she won the national Hot Shot competition in the eighth grade and was runner-up the following year. Even then, her size did not stand in her way.

"A smaller person is harder to guard because the defensive player has to bend down lower," Harding said. "A small person is also quicker and it's easier to dribble the ball low since you are so close to the floor. In high school, I was a lot quicker than most of the other players so I could set open for the shot. And my teammates would set picks for me which made it a lot easier."

Since coming to Kentucky, Harding has realized a new responsibility on the floor, that of playmaker. The change has lessened the pressure she faced in high school of coming up with the big plays and scoring most of the points.

"This has been my biggest adjustment since coming to Kentucky but it hasn't been a problem for me," she said. "In high school, I was the big point-setter for our team and everyone depended on me to score. Here, I don't have to play that shooting role and it has taken a lot of pressure off." However, Harding said she wouldn't pass up a good opportunity to score. After only three games into the season, she had connected on eight of 14 shots from the field for 57.1 percent. "I can still put the ball in the hole if I have to, but I know I have four other players out there whom I can dish the ball off to."

Harding had wanted to play basketball at Kentucky for a long time but was not recruited at first. Hall explained that she had watched her play but that her size was a major concern. In fact, Kentucky recruiters didn't give Harding much thought. "Really, she found us," Hall said. "We saw her play in the Empire Games in New York and it never really went any farther than that. But she contacted us about her desire to come to Kentucky so we took the chance and, so far, it has worked out very well.



Harding said she chose Kentucky mainly because of the academic program and the fan support that the basketball programs receive. "It's great to know that even when you play on the road there will be some faithful fans up there in the stands cheering for you."

According to her teammates, Harding's cheerful personality and determination to excel gives an added lift to each day's practice. And she had optimistic words for Kentucky's season: "We have started out playing pretty good and if we continue to play well and progress over the season, I think we'll surprise a lot of people."

She has already surprised her coach and teammates. Even with her small size, Harding has worked her way into a starting position with the Lady Kats. After all, she doesn't take up much room.

Cats Plan to Peak at Right Time This Year

In recent years, the UK men's basketball team has been accused of peaking early in the year only to suffer disappointing losses in conference and post-season play. That should not be expected of the 1983-84 edition of the Wildcats, however.

One reason is that, despite an impressive 21-point victory over sixth-ranked Louisville, in their season opener, the Wildcats cannot possibly reach top form until some key players are able to go full speed. Since preseason conditioning began, the Kentucky squad has been faced with numerous injuries, often leaving it with too few players to scrimmage.

Seniors Sam Bowie and Dicky Beal are both returning from layoffs due to surgery and aren't expected to play up to their full potential until at least mid-season. Additionally, starting forward Kenny Walker has been forced to sit out practices and lose game time due to back spasms, and more recently, thigh cramps. Junior reserve Bret Bearup was sidelined early with mononucleosis and is just now getting his strength back. And sixth man Winston Bennett has been hampered by two serious ankle sprains since practice began.

Experience is another reason this team should reach its top form later in the season. Senior forward Tom Heitz thinks the maturity of this team will prevent a post-December slump.


"This is a very mature team with five seniors, especially since Sam and I are fifth-year seniors," said Heitz. "Hopefully, this maturity will carry over into a national championship. But that takes a little luck, too."

The defensive intensity the Cats displayed in forcing Louisville into 20 turnovers and 35.6 percent shooting should also improve as the season progresses.

"We have the potential to be a very good defensive team, but we're not there yet," said Bennett. "I think my talking on defense carries over to the team. Coach Hall says it is something they haven't had here in the past. I think it helps the team be more alert on defense."

Sophomore guard Roger Harden, who has taken over starting duties for the injured Beal, has also noticed a change in the defense.

"We've worked on the same basics as we did last year, but I think our mental attitude towards defense has changed. We know defense can win games. I just think we have the will to prepare to win more this year."




Social, Cultural and Recreational

pportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available-and there's someone to share it.




