### Thetas threatening official complaint over response time

Residents of Kappa Alpha Residents of Kappa Alpha Theta social sorority house are considering filing an official complaint against the UK Police Department because of what they call "unprofessional" treat-

ment.

UK police received a phone call at 2:15 Monday morning from a Theta house resident after an intruder woke her by brushing against her back and then fled the room. House mother Mary Joe Fischer placed a second phone call a few minutes later.

Fischer and Theta president Page Bendel are asking authori-ties why it took almost 30 minties why it took almost 30 min-utes and two more phone calls for police to actually enter and search the house. They are also say they angered by "unprofes-sional treatment" of responding

officers.

### Clinton sends **GOP** scurrying

WASHINGTON — President Clinton's seizing the initiative on crime nd welfare reform has knocked Republicans off balance - suddenly or the defensive on issues that have been dependable GOP weapons agains

Democratis for a quarter century.

Clinton's efforts are causing considerable worry within a Republican Party already at odds internally over how to position itself in the coming health care reform debate, and concerned that GOP hopes for gains in this year's midtern elections could be undermined.

With Clinton promising to push three popular issues through Congress, Republicans find themselves in a quandary not unlike last year's North American Free Trade Agreement debate: They can help Clinton to victory and watch him get most of the credit, or try to block the president and run afoul of voters anxious for action on crime, welfare and health care.

For now, with Clinton still basking in favorable reviews of his State of the Union Address, Republicans promise to be partners provided Clinton sticks to the proposals he outlined Tuesday night.

"There's a potential, if this speech was sincere, for a remarkable coalition that could pass a lot of stuff," House GOP Whip Newt Gingrich admitted.

ted.

Behind such kind words is a belief in many GOP corners that Clinton's ambitious agenda will fall victim to liberals in his own party.

"He can try all he wants, but the Democrats in Congress are not going to let him take the issues of crime and welfare away because their special interest constituencies won't let them go in the direction the public is demanding," said GOP pollster Robert Teeter.

Yet after Tuesday night's speech, many Republicans were clearly worrired that Clinton might somehow pull it off, and Clinton loyalists piedged that he would.

"It won't be easy, but we'll get there," Democratic National Committee Chairman David Wilhelm said. After a White House meeting with Clinton, Democratic congressional leaders made similar predictions.

UK Hospital officials are hoping to expand pediatrics facilities in the near future.

The hospital's board of directors agreed Monday to a plan that calls for expanding pediatric care into unused floor space on the fourth floor and adding state-of-the-art medical equipment.

The plan would add only two beds to the facility's capacity, but several beds would be moved to private rooms, which officials say is necessary to care for children who have communicable diseases.

The pediatric ward currently has no private rooms, and a child with an infectious disease must be placed in a double room. As a result, the second bed cannot be used, and bed space is

"We want to make a major contribution to pe-diatrics," said Frank Butler, director of UK Hos-pital. "The hospital is 34 years old, and pediatric

health care needs to be updated to meet the '90s

health care needs to be updated to meet the '90s mode of care.' Vanderbilt University engaged in a similar venture 10 years ago when its pediatrics facilities were upgraded. Butler said the improvements UK is pursuing are quite similar. "Vanderbilt developed the hospital-in-ahospital concept and did considerable fundraising in the name of pediatrics, and we are emulating their model," Butler said.



The plan, if approved by the UK Board of Trustees, will be carried out in two phases. The first phase involves renovating the empty portion of the fourth floor and moving most of the pediatric care section to that space so that the second phase of the project, renovating the old portion of the pediatrics facility, may be completed.

The critical care section of pediatrics will be the last to be renovated.

# Positive signs emerge from PLO-Israeli talks

CAIRO, Egypt — Signs of optimism emerged yesterday from PLO-Israeli talks on achieving Palestinian autonomy in the occupied lands, with the PLO reporting progress and both sides breakfasting with Yasser Arafat.

The delegations resumed talks unexpectedly Tuesday night, a day after announcing that negotiations were being suspended pending a meeting this weekend in Switzer-land between the PLO leader and

The Palestine Liberation Organization and Israel signed an accord Sept. 13 calling for Israel to withdraw from Gaza and Jericho.



# Cats cruise by Gamecocks

During the announcement of the starting lineups before UK's 79-67 win ver South Carolina last night, Ray "Rock" Oliver was announced as UK's

Brassow, healthy at last, tied his career high 25 points to lead the Wildcast (15-3, 5-2 Southeastern Conference) past a determined USC (5-10, 2-4).

Adding to the mind-boggling oddity of the game was the fact that, while throughout much of the game South Carolina was more efficient on offense and defense than was UK, the Cats used overwhelming rebounding strength to pull away.

UK, a team that had of late been crashing the glass with the ferocity of Spud Webb, outrebounded the Gamecocks 46-33.

Carolina kept the game tight by getting easy runaway baskets, tough driving layups and key three-pointers. And UK coach Rick Pitino said he wasn't baffled when the Gamecocks, 27-point underdogs, ended up within 12.

12.

"We did not expect to blow them out tonight," Pitino said, "People do not understand what this conference is all about.
"At this time of year, we should not be blowing teams out." Prickett, who replaced Walter McCarry in the starting lineup after coming off the bench in Sunday's game at Mississippi State, was keeping South Carolina's post players befuddled by hitting the glass with newfound intensity.

"When someone picks up 17 rebounds and 11 of them are offensive, he's working his tail off." Pitino said.

While Prickett and Brassow were the stars, UK had just enough balance to keep the Gamecocks off guard, particularly in an 11-2 run midway through the second half. Five different players scored during the outburst, with only Brassov

Five different payers source using scoring more than once.

The run, which was capped off by a Prickett free throw and featured a ferocious two-handed dunk from McCarty, pushed a 47-43 UK lead to 57-48 with 10:35 remaining in the game.

South Carolina looked more like North Carolina in the first half. The Gamecocks shot 452 percent in the first half and hit 5 of their 11 three-

Gamecocks shot 43.2 percent in the first half and hit 5 of their 11 three-point shots in the frame. It took McCarty's one-handed 8-footer at the buzzer to put UK on top 35.34 at halfitine. That was despite big first-half numbers from Brassow. The senior for-wardyguard replaced Tony Delk early in the half and proceeded to score 13 points by halfitine.

"I was just on tonight," said Brassow, who hit 6 of 12 three-pointers.

"When you're a shooter and you're in a rhythm like that, you just want the ball every time down the court."

Rodick Rhodes had an off shooting night, but continued to rebound strongly. The sophomore's 11 points and 6 boards gave him 75 points and 42 rebounds in his last five games.

UK extended in Rupp Arena record winning streak to 32 games. The Cast' streak is the second longest current home winning streak in the nation, trailing only indiana.



Formed in 1952 by 12 music stu-ents in Italy, I Musici is a chamber nsemble that continues to redefine ontemporary orchestra.

Composed of five violins, two violas, two cellos, a bass and a key-board, I Musici retains a worldwide reputation by performing without a

first music piece was Arcan-gelo Corelli's Concerto Grosso in D Major, Op. 6, No. 4. The ease and grace of the piece turned out to repre-sent merely a warm-up for I Musici.

The second selection, Gui-seppe Tartini's Concerto in A Major, Op. 3, was written for the principal cellist of the orchestra at Padua, but was honored last Saturday by Francesco Strano playing a

Venice in 1730.

With an occasional nasal flare and eyebrow twitch, Strano sang to the audience, mimicking the heart of baroque, as his cello poured out more riffs than Slash on a bad acid

A special highlight of the evening was Concerto in E Flat Major, Op. 3 by Alessandro Rolla, featuring violist Massimo Paris on a world-famous Pietra Guarneri viola crafted in Mantus in 1697.

Assisted by the Singletary Center's high-tech acoustics, Paris ridded his fiddle as if performing for the Bourbon court in Parma, which Rolla did in 1782.

After intermission, the evening rocketed to a climax as I Musici performed the world famous *The Four Seasons*, Op. 8, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, by Antonia Vivaldi.

Soloist and first seat violinist Mariana Sirbu performed the finish-ing touch to *Winter*, the final con-certo to *The Four Seasons*.

# Album benefits Greenpeace

You won't find another album to this anywhere under the sun.

The Alternative NRG compilation to benefit Greenpeace was recorded and mixed using entirely with solar

power.

For this unique project, Greenpeace designed and constructed a
mobile solar generator named Cyrus (Persian for "sun") that traveled
across the country recording
live performances by 16 artists. Cyrus generates 15
hours of power for a recording studio, cnough to power
an average home for several
days.

Where most benefit compilations fall short, with tracks we've either already heard or that sound like leftovers from the artist's last album, Alternative NRG shines bright in its musical originality

The lineup features the sort of so-cially conscious artists we have come to expect for causes like the environment such as R.E.M., U2, Midnight Oil, L7 and Sonic Youth.

As for the tracks, all of them (except for ones by the Jesus and Mary Chain and Boo-Yaa T.R.1B.E.) are featured on previous albums by the artists, but are, for the most part, given a serious reworking in a live setting — often with more fire than the original recording.

For example, the album opens up

with R.E.M.'s "Drive," the first single from their latest album. Fans will recognize the new, more biting arrangement as the version they performed live on awards shows

last year.

James, a band that usually sounds like a cheap knock-off of U2, performs an acoustic version of its song "Ring the Bells" that transfuses new blood into a previously life-tess song, producing a soaring harmony over passionate guitars.

Two of the world's most sought after activist bands (as well as most cachaimed performers). U2 and Midnight Oil, turn in powerful performances of their tracks" Unful the End of the World" and "Tell Me the Truth," respectively. Truth," respectively.

The lack of innovation in these songs is made up for by compelling performance, demonstrating why these bands have both had as much success outside the studio as in it.

studio as in it.

The rest of the album features bands that offer a wide range of musical styles, a feature that makes this album so desirable.

In the raphip-hop department are Disposable Heroes of Hiphoprisy and Boo-Yaa T.R.I.B.E. two groups that are modestly successful commercially but deserve praise for innovative sounds and intelligent lyrics that uplift the subjects.

while this genre generally does not translate well to the stage, both bands give powerful performances. This is especially true for the Boo-Yaa track "Fam Bam," whose heavy base and heavier rapping is like a punch in the gut.

P.M. Dawn doesn't fare quite as well with its live version of the Top 10 hit "Looking Through Patient Eyes."

The band usually relies heavily on sampling for its musical accompaniment (the studio version of this track prominently features George Michael's "Father Figure"), and the technique falls flat live.

Tracks by other pop artists pro-vide a rare opportunity to hear them without their usual dose of studio

Flash-in-the-pan bands EMF and the Soup Dragons give amusing performances that aren't terribly gripping but are a lot of fun. At least EMF didn't totally ruin the leggy Pop classic "Search and De-stroy," which is to the band's credit.

UB40 has the credit of having the second of only two duds on the album. The track, "Sing Our Own Song," is just plain dull and uninspired.

## **Tables turned in Evers trial**

BATESVILLE, Miss. — A white supremacist's two previous trials in the 1963 killing of civil rights leader Medgar Evers both ended with all-white juries deadlocked. This time the jury of his peers is mostly black.

"I'm very hopeful that this time justice will be done," Evers' widow, Myrlie, said outside the court-house yesterday following completion of jury selection in 73-year-old Byron De La Beckwith's third murder trial.

Eight of the 12 jurors and the two alternates are black; four jurors are white. The 12 jurors ranged in age from 30 to 70, and four were old enough to remember Evers' killing. The oldest juror, a black minister from Batesville, said he shook hands with the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. in Memphis, Tenn, three days before King was assassinated.

Evers was 37-year-field secretary for the Mississippi NAACP when he was ambushed in the driveway of his Jackson home on June 12, 1963. One of a new generation of black leaders. Evers organized boy-cotts of some white businesses.

### Blacks finding power in new S. Africa

BARBERTON, South Africa — When Msuthu Timothy Khoza came to larberton Prison as a young guard, he was joining the iron fist of apart-

Barberton Prison as a young guard, he was joining the iron fist of apartheld.

Thirty-three years later, Khoza is the first black commander of a major South African prison. He believes his rise vindicates his faith that the systems can be reformed from within.

As South Africa faces its first multiracial elections in April and the prospect of a black-led government, the prisons and police — the institutions that formerly enforced apartheid — are scrambling to change with the times and shake their reputations as black oppressors.

Plans call for the army to merge with its erstwhile black guerrilla opponents, aligned with the African National Congress, in a new defense force. The correctional services staff of more than 23,000 is split almost evenly between while and non-white, but only 10 of 1,575 officers are black. And though blacks command two training colleges, Khoza, 53, became the first black officer in December to head a maximum security prison.

"Things are changing, but they will not change in one day," he said.

"I had that dream that one day the whole correctional service although many blacks consider it a betrayal, enforcing laws that once denied them basic rights.

"I had that dream that one day the whole correctional service would change its color," Khoza said. "A man does not simply run away from the work that he loves simply because things were not the best they could be."

Barberton rarely held political prisoners, and Khoza has little patience with suggestions that many blacks were forced into crime because they were denied deucation and opportunity.

"One cannot run away and say, 'Maybe it's because they were underprivileged,' "he said." I don't run away from the truth."

Khoza was bom in the farming community of Nelspruit, just over the ridge from Barberton in the northeast corner of the country. As a boy, he saw black prisoners on work gangs being guarded by whites armed with bats and spears. He decided them that working in a prison would give him a chance to 'try to convince my people that crime does not pay.'

Khoza oversees about 2,800 prisoners, most of them black, with the help of a staff of about 700 from an office decorated with a large photograph of President F.V. de Klerk and a statuette of a Zulu warrior.

"Him and me, we've been brothers for a long time," said Lt. Col. J.C. Hall, a white officer who took over as head of the maximum security division at Barberton when Khoza was promoted to commander.

As he strolls around the prison, whites address Khoza as "meneer," or "str." an Afrikaans title rarely directed from white to black.

The prisoners greet him with shouts of 'Com Khoza!" when he enters the exercise yards or walks past their cramped cells. He greets them in Zulu or his native Swazi. Khoza also speaks English and Afrikaans.

Reform in the prisons included desegregation — two years ago, whites and blacks began mingling in Barberton's exercise yards.

From outside, the prison's cream walls and red tiles are as picturesque as any sight in its namesake town, which is surrounded by dramatic rocky hills. But the bleak prison interior — slick gray walls, gray concrete floors, cold bars — reflects the notoriety Barberton gained for its brutality.

A few years ago, men working on the prison farm reportedly died from heat exhausting prisoners by denying them food or visits from their relatives also has ended.

Khoza said he wants to give prisoners opportunities to learn trades or further their education. When he was head of the maximum security division, he started a choir and sewing and carpentry workshops.

"I've always believed that a prisoner is a human being. That's been my philosophy, 'Khoza said.

### Letter carriers fill new niche to stop crime

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — They move quietly down your street almost every day. They know where you live. They know what kind of car you drive.

kind of car you drive.

For postal carriers, it comes with the territory, so why shouldn't they use their unique positions as looks for crime?

"Who better than mail carriers to eo out there as concerned citizens with their eyes and ears open," said carrier Bill Pick, who began a Postal Crime Waich five months ago.

"Most certification have been on their works."

"Most carriers have been on their oute for years — they know when hings aren't normal."

things aren't normal."

Two months after St. Peters-burg's crime watch began in Sep-tember, Las Cruces, N.M., started equipping its 64 carriers with donat-ed cellular phones to report suspi-cious activity.

cious activity.

Cab drivers, telephone installers and utility workers in some other citations are participating in the war on crime, encouraged to use radios in their vehicles to report suspicious activity.

Not everyone is excited. Lamonth, Scott Witzke filed a federal lawsuit asking that the voluntary St. Petersburg program be stopped because the mission of the Postal Service is delivering the mail — not police work.

"The Postal Service should stick."

vice is delivering the mail — not police work.

"The Postal Service should stick to what Congress authorized it to do," said Witzke, who is studying to be a paralegal." Anyone should report something if they happen to see it, but these carriers don't need to be receiving briefings on what people and cars to look out for."

The idea in St. Petersburg was born of a personal scare. Pick's children were approached last summer by a man who tried to lure them into his black pickup truck.

The children backed away and the man sped off, but Pick began keeping an eye out for the stranger and the truck while delivering mail. He soon began asking other carriers to do the same.

The man was never found, but what evolved through months of meetings and planning was an arrangement with police that uses carriers as a citywide network of tip-sters.





### RICO law won't put freeze on free speech

RICO is short hand for the Racketeering Influenced and Cor-rupt Organizations Act, which congress passed in 1970 to com-bat organized crime.

The new decision allows the National Organization of Women to proceed with a national class action suit against several abortion protestors.

The lawsuit alleges that abortion protestors have engaged in a conspiracy to shut down the nation's abortion clinics through a pattern of illegal activity, ranging from arson to extortion.

If the lawsuit is successful, the abortion rights groups would be entitled to triple damages as well as reimbursement for attorney's fees, as provided for by RICO.

The decision gives abortion rights groups a powerful new tool by making violent abortion protests more risky.

But anti-abortion groups, as well as other active protest groups like animal rights, environmental, and gay and lesbian activists, have charged that the decision will have a "chilling effect" on their free speech rights.

A proper understanding of the awsuits RICO allows shows that

RICO makes it illegal to interfere with interstate commerce by engaging in "a pattern of racke-teering activity."

Section 1961(1) of RICO defines "racketeering activity" as conduct that violates certain state and federal laws. RICO specifi-cally lists the types of state and federal laws that could be con-

Environmentalist groups that routinely spike trees or bomb industrial facilities will probably be next on the RICO hit list. But such conduct is more like vigilantism than free speech. Political motivations do not excuse conduct that violates the law.

strued as racketeering.

The state laws include murder, kidnapping, gambling, arson, rob-bery, bribery, extortion and deal-ing in obscene matter or narcotics.

The federal laws listed in RICO mainly deal with counterfeiting, obstruction of justice and various types of fraud.

Most importantly, RICO does not construe trespass or distur-bance of the peace as "racketeer-ing activity."

groups who use marches or public demonstrations to communicate their political beliefs.

Justice David Souter even filed a concurring opinion that empha-sized that even if protest groups are found to violate RICO, lower courts still can dismiss the suit if there are First Amendment viola-tions.

Certainly, will RICO now be used against violent groups besides abortion protestors.

But such conduct is more like vigilantism than free speech. Polit-ical motivations do not excuse conduct that violates the law.

Only groups that choose to use violence and other strong-handed techniques to accomplish their goals would open themselves to RICO lawsuits. The Supreme Court's decision does not allow RICO lawsuits to be filed against protestors who merely hold signs in front of abortion clinics or scream at women on their way inside. Nor does it penalize Groups that work to reform pub-lic policy outside the established channels of political change only lessen the likelihood of real re-form by giving their movement a bad name.

On the same day the Supreme Court announced the RICO deci-sion, it also agreed to review a law that would bar abortion protestors from holding signs within 36 feet of the entrance to an abortion clin-

on its face, the law appears to be a clear infringement of free speech rights. If the court wants to draw a bright line between violent and non-violent protest, this case would provide the opportunity.

But the effect of the RICO deci-sion is not to chill free speech. Rather, it should curtail the activi-ties of protestors who do not hesi-tate to use intimidation and scare tactics to accomplish their objec-



All that left Republicans in the odd position of endorsing Clinton's oals but predicting he really didn't mean what he said.

But that strategy only reinforced the view of those within the Republican ranks who believe their party has lost its course — and that Clinton could well infringe on traditional GOP territory.

"Clinton's speech isn't going to be one of the great ones in history, but he was pretty effective in positioning himself more solidly than he was before in the eyes of the middle class by linking the three issues of health care, welfare and crime," said Kevin Phillips, a GOP theorist often critical of heapth careful the party leadership. "It hink Republicans have gotten themselves in some real trouble here."

While hedging their bets on welfare and crime, most Republicans felt free to whack away at Clinton's health care plan as too liberal.

"He doesn't have the votes on the Democratic side," said Senate Republican leader Bob Dole. "He's going to have to from a lot of these price controls, mandates, the mandatory health care alliances, before we make any

Yet even Dole conceded in an NBC interview that in the end, "we can probably accommodate most of what the president is talking about."

Shaking his head at the prospect, a prominent Republican pollster who asked not to be identified said Democrats could defy the history of mid-tern elections if Congress passes credible health care, welfare and crime legislation this year.

The pollster suggested Democrats could keep their losses to one or two enate seats and in single digits in the House, below average losses for the

The pollster lamented that GOP leaders were not responding to a major shift in attitudes about crime. For example, Republicans sat silent for the most part Tuesday as Clinton called for an assault weapons ban. Yet the pollster said the position enjoys broad support, and that even a handgun ban is supported by 40 percent of Republican primary voters.

Phillips said such reluctance to respond to changing middle class attitudes has led the GOP to its current predicament.

"Each program executive has only so many slots to fill next season," Turner said.

"From plant closing legislation to day care to parental leave, the national a Republican Party has not been attuned enough to middle America on these serious economic issues and what I call their socioeconomic cousins," he said.
