Student ID troubles: Occasional glitch, overdue accounts culprits when IDs won't scan

It's an experience that many students have had. They get really psyched for an event and go to purchase tickets. However, when they go to pur-chase tickets, there's just one small problem. small problem

They can't get them. "It tried to buy football tickets, but the card came up inactive when it was scanned," said Sarah Stoll, a political science and history freshman.

A number of UK students have experienced problems of this nature when trying to buy tickets for UK sporting events with their UK ID card, which must be scanned.

"The way this system works is that it will access a student's account and verify if they are able to use the card for a particular activity," said Karen Doyle, an employee at the UK ID Office.

If the card isn't magnetized or a student has some unpaid bills, the card may not work.



Churchill Downs sets aside hundreds of highly coveted kentucky Derby tickets for the governor and lawmakers each year.

Some ethics watchdogs questioned that practice, especially since the track is lobbying those same people to get electronic slot machines.

That "puts them in a very compromised situation," said Chuck Lewis, director of the Center for Public Integrity, a nonpartisan Washington research group that tracks money's influence in government.

"They're ostensibly, objectively, setting policy in regard

six seats each at face value, Churchill spokesman John Asher said.

Asher said Churchill offers the tickets to promote the Derby, not to curry favor.

Still, some legislators think they are intended to buy goodwill.

"I don't think it buys their vote, but it certainly gives them a strong leg up, because no one has the ability to be nicer to a legislator than Churchill Downs," said Rep. Tom Riner, D-Louisville, Riner donates his Derby tickets to charity and said the tickets buy influence with both Patton and lawmakers.

Derby tickets are sold for far more than their face value by scalpers. Otherwise, reserved seats such as those set

Peace hits roadblock

Efforts to bring together two sides in Kosovo stifled by vast amounts of illegal arms

PRISTINA, Yugoslavia — Although NATO insists the Kosovo Liberation Army handed in its weapons before it officially disbanded last month, peacekeepers suspect both Serbs and ethnic Albanians mainian stocks of weapons, hampering efforts to restore peace in the troubled province. The NATO-led peacekeeping command has been careful to avoid any public sugestion that the KLA, which the United Nations is transforming into a civilian organization, may have held back significant stocks of weapons. And neither have the province of maintaining a stockpile of arms.

province of maintaining a swidespread arms.

But weapons remain a widespread problem. During rallies in the Serb-con-trolled part of the town of Kosovska Mitro-vica, athletic men can be seen wandering through the crowd with hand-held radios and sidearms bulging discreetly beneath

and sidearms bulging discreetly beneath their jackets. Hardly a night goes by in this over-whelmingly ethnic Albanian provincial capital without the occasional crackle of ri-fle fire. Hardly a day goes by without NATO reporting weapons seizures and ar-rests.

NATO reporting weapons seizures and arrests.

No figures are available on how many weapons have been seized since NATO-led peacekeepers arrived June 12 or since the KLA was officially disbanded Sept. 21.

However, a spokesman for the peace-keeping command, Maj. Roland Lavoie, estimates that troops have been confiscating llegal weapons, ammunition and explosives at the rate of 100 per day.

Days before the KLA was supposed to demilitarize, NATO officials said the former rebels had turned in more than 10,000 weapons and declared them in compliance

But in a statement Sunday, the peace-keeping command said Italian troops searched a former KLA building in Djakovica on Saturday and seized 10 rifle grenades, a 30mm gun, an anti-tank rocket, three grenades, three rifles and other weapons.

"An investigation is under way to determine if illegal activities were conducted from this location," a NATO statement said.

Under U.N. regulations, it is illegal to hold any weapon without written permission from the NATO-led Kosovo Force, KFOR, or U.N. civilian police. Permits issued by the Yugoslav government are not valid.







If there is any whining and complaining at the end of this year when UK, in all likelihood, slices a few tickets off, it will be completely unjustified.

This is not basketball. The issue is not poor seating—the allotted football seats are good, unlike the situation at Rupp Arena (which we will address at

Some argue that this campus is more diverse than a traditional college campus, and not everybody enjoys going to the football games. If this is the case, then don't worry about losing some seats that wouldn't be used anyway.

One possible remedy may be to allow part-time students to purchase football tickets. When thousands of tickets are being unused, why not allow students who can't carry a full-time load to buy them? Athletics should not be first at an university

We've all seen it: one of our revered and internationally renowned demigods—a men's basketball team member—steps out of his mysteriously acquired SUV, expresses concern over an upcoming remedial math exam, and rushes off to the complimentary tutoring of some brilliant but anonymous engineering dork, Have we considered the irony of that situation?

UK has a semi-religious fasci-

In fact, UK devotes a larger percentage of its operating budget to sports than any other school in the nation, and our president, Dr. Wethington, is the chair of the NCAA Executive Committee.

A proposed NCAA eligibility policy, commonly known as Proposition 16, states that all incoming freshman Division Lathletes must complete 18 core classes with a cumulative GPA of 2.5, score at least an 820 on the SAT or a 18 on the ACT, and receive a high school diploma. Considering the fact that UK, hardly an ultraselective institution, requires a 21 ACT or 1000 SAT and 3.3 GPA for normal students, the demands on freshman athletes hardly seem unreasonable. Lax, even.

But athletic advocates cried foul, denouncing the standards as being unduly harsh and blocking could be standards as being unduly harsh and blocking and the standards as being unduly harsh and blocking could be standard be seen to the standard standard for proposition 16 had been in effect in the 1984-85 season, 47 percent of African-American and 8 percent of White potential athletes would have been rendered ineligible. According to Fairtest, an athletic policy group that favors abolishing the standards, "GPA and test cutoffs would lead to a negative and disproportionate impact on minority students."

They're complaining that they did not receive scholarships to a university because they didn't meet looser-tran-normal minimum scores?

Any non-athletic student bringing such a suit would have been laughed out of court.

The point is that we, both as a specific university and as a class

of universities (the Division I schools) have seriously misunderstood our raison d'etre. We are the University of Kentucky, not the Pre-NBA Franchise of Kentucky. We come here to study, to learn, to earn degrees, to be prepared for the work force and to expand our horizons, not to throw a ball through a hoop.

Test scores show we are prepared to face the rigors of collegate academic work (which even athletes encounter), athletics is a supporting activity to the primary function of UK, that being academics.

function of UK, that being academics.

We should be much more excited that UK was recently named a Tier-2 National University by U.S. News and World Report than we ever have been about a Final Four appearance or a bowl game.

The University of Cincinnation's basketball program has a graduation rate of 0 percent. The fact that "student-athlete" is a near oxymoron demonstrates the necessity of equal standards for application — both students and athletes must be held to expectations of academic performance. Remember: there are 12 embers of the Men's basketball team, and 24,988 "normal students."


