BAGHDAD, Iraq — Six U.S. soldiers were reported to the control of the control of

Marshall Jackson, spokesman for the Army's 1st Infantry Division, responsible for the Baqubah region. In a speech Wednesday before the Iraqi National Council, interim Iraqi Prime Minister Ayad Allawi issued an ultimatum to the town of Fallujah. He threatened a large-scale military offensive unless residents handed over militant leader Abu Musab Zarqawi, who has claimed responsibility for a series of beheadings and has long been suspected of operating from the town. "We have asked Fallujah." We have asked Fallujah control to the series of t

major operations," Allawi said.

The military and political push for control comes as residents are bracing for another violent Ramadan—which will begin either Friday or Saturday, depending on when the new crescent moon is sighted.

One of the centerpieces of the Muslim calendar, Ramadan is typically marked by public celebration and religious introspection. Observant Muslims abstain from eating, drinking, smoking and sexual relations from dawn until sunseteach day of

the month. Many read the entire Quran or attend lengthy evening prayers at mosques.



Pennsylvania Court Keeps Nader off ballot

A Pennsylvania court struck a blow to Ralph Nader's presidential campaign on Wednesday, blocking him from the ballot there due to fraudulent signature. The campaign's 51,000 submitted signatures included names such as "Mickey Mouse" and "Fred Flintstone." according to Commonwealth Court President Judge James Gardner Colins' 15-page ruling.

Nader needed 25,697 valid names to qualify for Pennsylvania's ballot. Colins' 16-page ruling.

"I am compelled to emphasize that this signature-gathering process was the most deceitful and fraudulent exercise ever perpetrated upon this Court." Colin wrote in a ruling produced after at least 11 judges in four courtrooms pored over the signatures for about two weeks.

"Obviously he doesn't care very much for voter intent," said Nader spokesman Kevin Zeese of Colins. "This is a partisan judge trying to undermine a guy who has a history of credibility."
Zeese complained that the judge discounted more than 7,000 signatures of registered voters who had changed addresses or individuals who registered to tote after they signed the petition, which would have given the campaign enough authorized signaturals.

The campaign plans to file an appeal Thursday to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. The Bush and Kerry campaigns said the court's decision would have little strategic impact on their battle for Pennsylvania's 21 electoral votes. "Very little will change," said Bush-Cheney '04 spokesman Kevin Madden.







The funding reserved for promotion of academics along with the money pledged for the Singletary Scholarship program will help UK recruit the most gifted students in our state along with the most gifted athletes.

Thanks to administrators like Todd and Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart who helped secure the contract, the benefits won't just be financial.

Q. How is the Lexington Police de-partment working with UK Police to keep students safe?

A. I'm a former UK police officer. So I understand the relationship between the campus as it fits into our part of the community.

One thing that did happen is the mayor on the council did work on putting together what we requested was a step plan so that officers and firefighters would have a series of steps they could go through that would allow them to know throughout their careers what their salaries would be.

Has enforcing the smoking ban stretched forces thinner, or have police had to do much enforcement?

A a Minost none. We assisted the heath department on two different occasions when they had some problem locations, by that I mean businesses that would not comply with the ordinance.

On two different occasions we assigned officers to go out with enforcement folks because they were meeting some resistance. They had been threatened in a couple of situations and feared for their safety.

Q. What kind of practical steps can citizens take to keep themselves safe and secure their property?

Q. What has the police department done locally to prevent terrorism?

A. For us in law enforcement it's one of those drastic changes. It's a drastic change in how we focus. Now we focus more training on reacting to terrorists' is

More information about what you see, what you observe. Not just criminal stuff that we've been dealing with all our lives, but now might be a terror site. It might lead to something else; it might harm

lead to something else; it might harm someone.

Officers are now trained what to observe, how to react, how to key in on people and places and items that they're carrying. So it's a matter of having a lot more information to deal with threats that are posed to us.

In addition to that we have lots of intelligence that flows in now from other agencies, both state and federal, that we did not have before.

Loss, both state and federal, that we did not have before.

For example, we share lots of intelligence and information with the FBI now that we didn't before, lots of intelligence and information with the Secret Service now that we didn't before, lots of intelligence and information with the Alcohol To-bacco and Firearms and the Drug Enforcement Agency that we didn't before.

This is all post-9/11 and the idea of how terrorism affects daily living, It's a different environment now in terms of training. Lots of training now is on being first ersponders to a terrorist incident that we didn't have before.




