Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, May 28, 1945.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at ,10:10 a.m., Monday, May 28, 1945. The following members were present: Governor S. S. Willis, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Judge R. C. Stoll, R. P. Hobson, Judge H. W. Walters, H. S. Cleveland, John Fred Williams, H. D. Palmore, T. H. Cutler, Robert Tway, Harper Gatton, John C. Everett, and Grover Creech. President H. L. Donovan and Comptroller Frank D. Peterson, Secretary of the Board, were present.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 3, 1945, and the minutes of the Executive Committee of May 3, 1945, were approved as published.

B. Report of Comptroller.

The Comptroller made the following written report:

May 23, 1945

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

I attach hereto copy of the financial report for the period ending April 30, 1945.

Income

The total estimated income for the University, College Division, for the current year is 104.8% received at the end of the first ten months of the fiscal year. This favorable budget position is accounted for by a larger student enrollment during the last three quarters of the year than was estimated. There has also been an increase in the number of students desiring courses in applied music. Receipts from sales and services have exceeded the estimate. The budget for the Residence Halls for Women was made and adopted with the understanding that an adjustment would be requested in case dormitory space was completely utilized. The income has exceeded the estimate, but no request has been made to adjust the budget in keeping with actual dormitory operations. The expenditures for these purposes will undoubtedly exceed the amount budgeted, thus requiring an

adjustment before the end of the fiscal year. It is anticipated that we will carry forward approximately seventy thousand dollars July 1, 1945, as an unexpended balance. This amount has been projected into the proposed budget for 1945-46.

The total of estimated income for the University Experiment Station is 114.9% received, as of April 30th. Receipts from sales and services, especially sale of fertilizer and feed inspection tags largely account for the favorable position, aided by a conservative estimate of receipts from these sources at the time of making the budget for 1944-45.

The total budgeted income for the Agricultural Extension Division is 100% received. Since all funds are derived from state and federal appropriations, there are no variations from the budgeted amounts.

Expenditures

The total expenditures and encumbrances to date for the University, College Division, are \$1,240,393.75, which is 78.5% of the budget appropriation. Departments have not exceeded budget appropriations, and some of them will underspend the amount authorized. The same is true for the University Experiment Station, and the Agricultural Extension Division. The University Experiment Station has spent and encumbered 80% of its budget and the Agricultural Extension Division 81% of appropriated funds.

Restricted Funds

The total available balances of restricted accounts, April 30th, amounted to \$951,796.23. Of this amount, \$630,448.00 is invested. The Army program account has a balance in excess of \$50,000.00 as of this date. The Haggin Fund has a free balance in excess of fifty thousand dollars as of this date, and it would seem prudent to invest a part of this balance. The balances to the credit of various restricted fund accounts of the University Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Division aggregate \$275,800.23. The Farm Labor and War Food Administration funds accounts have \$183,359.55 of this balance. It is uncertain as to the length of time these funds will remain with the University.

Recommendations

I recommend that thirty thousand dollars of the Army fund receipts and thirty thousand dollars of the Haggin Fund free balance be invested.

The report was discussed briefly. The Comptroller also made a report on the operation of the Student Union Cafeteria from January 6, 1941, to April 30, 1945. After a brief discussion, the Board took the following action:

* * * * * * * * * *

1. On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report of the Comptroller is accepted and made a part of the minutes.

C: Funds Invested.

The Comptroller, in his financial report, called attention to available balances in the Haggin Fund and the Army Account that might be invested at this time. The Board passed the following authorization:

* * * * * * * * * * *

2. On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the President and Comptroller are authorized, after consultation with a local banker, to invest \$30,000 of the Haggin Fund balance, and \$30,000 of the Army Fund balance in Registered Government Bonds.

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D. Sons of Mr. R. C. Tway and Dr. Lee Kirkpatrick Released.

It was reported to the Board that Lt. W. T. Tway, son of Mr. R.C. Tway, and Lt. John Lee Kirkpatrick, son of Dr. Lee Kirkpatrick, prisoners of war in Germany for several months, have been liberated by Allied armies. The members of the Board extended to Mr. Tway their expressions of joy at such heartening news, and directed the Secretary to telegraph their congratulations to Doctor Kirkpatrick.

E. Adoption of 1945-46 Budget.

President Donovan stated that he desired to present the proposed budget for the fiscal year 1945-46. A copy of the proposed budget was made available for each member. The President read the following statement:

COMMENTS OF THE COMPTROLLER on the ANNUAL INTERNAL BUDGET

Introduction

There is no particular change in the method used in the preparation of the budget for the ensuing year from that of previous budgets. A comparison between appropriations for salaries and other expenses for the year 1944-45 with the same information for 1945-46 is not shown for the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Division. The budgets submitted for these units did not give such a comparison. There is shown a comparison between appropriations for salaries and other expenses for the two-year period for all other departments and divisions. The appropriation for each unit is shown separately and referred to by a designated "account number". The length of employment, whether on a ten, eleven or twelve month basis, is recorded. In a few instances, however, the length of employment is shown as ten months, yet the employee has been designated to teach one or both terms of the summer quarter in which cases the employment is actually for eleven or twelve months, dependent upon teaching one or both terms.

The services of some staff members are used and budgeted by two or more units. A cross reference is given showing the total salary of each person and the amount drawn from each unit. The amounts drawn by some staff members from the Keeneland budget are handled separately.

A summary of estimated income and a detailed estimated income are shown. A summary of departmental appropriations and a detail of appropriations are also listed. A summary of appropriations for each college or separate administrative unit is shown preceding the detail breakdown of departmental or divisional budget appropriation. The general University operating budget is shown inthe first part of the overall budget followed by budgets for restricted and self-supporting funds.

Income

The income for the University budget is derived mainly from three sources; state appropriations, 46.6%; federal grants in aid, 29.8%; and revolving funds 23.6%. This is the second year of the current bi-annual state appropriation and there exists no material change in income derived from the state. The estimate for federal grants shows a small increase due to slight variations in programs subsidized with federal funds. Revolving funds refer to receipts of direct income collected by the institution, such as student fees, room and board fees, sales from the farm, service and inspection fees, rentals, etc. The estimate of income from revolving fund receipts is higher this year primarily due to

anticipated increase in enrollment. This budget is estimated on an expected enrollment of two thousand students. This expectancy has caused the estimate for student fees to be increased from \$93,390.00 in 1944-45 to \$152,000:00 for 1945-46.

There is included in the estimate of total income a projected revolving fund balance of \$70,000.00. We are, however, in a position to include, if necessary, funds received from the Army Specialized Training Program sime January 1945.

There will be a rather large revolving fund balance to the credit of the University Experiment Station which is not anticipated in this budget. The estimate of income for auxiliary enterprises; namely, residence halls and post office, reflects an increase of approximately \$50,000.00 which will be primarily due to (1) a slight increase in charges for room and board in the residence halls, and (2)complete utilization of available quarters. If the War Department continues to use the dormitories for men to house soldier trainees, these estimates will be altered accordingly.

Expenditures

The total estimated expenditures for all colleges excluding auxiliary enterprises for 1945-46 are \$3,030,949.49. The adjusted budget for these purposes for the current year is \$2,898,787.17. Thus, there is reflected an increase in the appropriations for administration and general expenses, and all colleges, including the Experiment Station, Agricultural Extension Division, Operation and Maintenance and related activities, of \$132,162.32. The budget for the Experiment Station was \$559,852.00 for 1944-45 and is \$569,000.00 for 1945-46. The appropriation for Agricultural Extension work in 1944-45 was \$835,869.49. The budget for 1945-46 is the same amount.

The recommended increases in the functional divisions are shown on page eight of the budget, where there is listed a summary of departmental appropriations for 1944-45 and the proposed budget appropriations for 1945-46.

The unappropriated balance shown by this budget is \$5,877.37. This is an impossibly small cushion for a three and a quarter million dollar budget. It becomes extremely urgent that appropriations made for salaries revert to the unappropriated balance if not used for the purpose for which originally appropriated. Request for transfers from salary appropriations to other purposes should not be granted. In case staff members now on military or other leave return to their former positions, their salaries, in the main, are not included in this budget, and must be appropriated from the

unappropriated surplus. It is essential that the University have a sizable revolving fund at the beginning of each fiscal year from which to make purchases during the first quarter of the year. Student fees for the fall quarter are not received until the latter part of September and can not be made available for operating purposes until the first part of October. This is another fact which makes this budget a precarious one from the viewpoint of July 1, 1946.

I desire to state that, in my opinion, the University can be operated on this budget, satisfactorily, provided strict budgetary controls are maintained.

Restricted Fund Budgets

The budgets for those restricted funds for which reasonable estimates of income and expenses can be made are appended to the general University operating budget. Some staff members are employed to render services assisting in the general operation of the University; and also to aid in the functions for which the restricted funds are received. salaries are therefore necessary between general funds and restricted funds. The activities provided for by these budgets are financed from receipts received and restricted for such These monies are credited to separate accounts These accounts which are managed as self-supporting funds. are not allowed to be overdrawn. There is, however, one exception -- the Student Union, which is considered an integral It may not, due to a reduced enpart of the University. rollment, have enough funds to operate adequately during the coming year. If the receipts from student enrollment are not sufficient to operate adequately, additional funds will be requested for the Union from the current general operating budget of the University. A deficit from the operation of the Student Union may not materialize.

The restricted and trust funds included herein are handled in the same manner in which they have always been handled with the approval of the Board of Trustees. They are carried in separate accounts, showing receipts, disbursements, and available balances, and are not cleared through the State Treasurer. Board authorization for expenditures is required and all such funds are included herein so far as it is possible to anticipate. Expenditure of other restricted funds is approved at the time receipt of same is authorized.

The Hoard examined and President Donovan explained each section in detail. He called attention to the budgets for restricted funds which were included as separate parts of the general operating budget. After free discussion of estimated income and proposed appropriations, the Board took the following action:

* * * * * * * * * *

3. On motion, duly made, seconded and carried, it is ordered that the budget, as submitted for the year 1945-46, be accepted as a basis of maximum expenditures, and that inclusion of the name of any person in the budget shall not be considered as a contract of employment, and the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee shall be authorized to make such changes in the budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary or advisable. A copy is ordered filed with the Secretary of the Board.

The budgets for restricted funds submitted for the year 1945-46 are accepted as a basis for maximum expenditures, subject to available balances, and inclusion of the name of any person in any restricted fund budget shall not be considered as a contract of employment, and the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee is authorized to make any changes in the Restricted Fund budgets as may from time to time be deemed necessary or advisable.

Copies of all restricted fund budgets are ordered filed with the Secretary of the Board.

F. Recess for Luncheon.

The Board of Trustees recessed at 1:10 p.m. for luncheon in the Student Union Building, and reconvened in the office of the President, for resumption of their deliberations, at 2:10 p.m.

G. Room Rent for Kentucky Veterans under Section 164.480 K.R.S.

Judge Stoll called attention to an opinion by Eldon Durbit, Attorney General, concerning an interpretation of Section 164.430 K.R.S., and the action of the Board of Trustees on April 3, 1945, authorizing the President to take the necessary steps to obtain from the Court of Appeals in a declaratory judgment action an opinion as to the meaning of Section 164.480 K.R.S. A discussion followed, and the Board took the following action:

* * * * * * * * * * *

4. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is directed that

WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky held on April 3, 1945, a resolution was adopted authorizing the President of the University to take steps to obtain from the Court of Appeals in a declaratory judgment action an opinion as to the meaning of Section 164.480 Kentucky Revised Statutes on the questions presented in the resolution as appears upon the minutes of said meeting; and

WHEREAS, it may take months to prepare a suit and obtain a final decision from the Court of Appeals; and

WHEREAS, in the meantime and because thereof some veterans or ex-service men may be delayed in obtaining an education, as is provided in the statute, and may never be able to obtain an education; and

WHEREAS, the Attorney General of Kentucky has given opinions as to the construction of the Act in question,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the University

of Kentucky that the opinion of the Attorney General of Kentucky interpreting the said act be adhered to until and unless the Court of Appeals of Kentucky should construe the said act, in which event, of course the opinion of the Court of Appeals should be followed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that should any questions arise as to the construction of said act, upon which the Attorney General has not given an opinion, that the President of the University is authorized to request an opinion from the Attorney General upon such question and that the said opinion be followed until and unless the questions involved are fully determined by the Court of Appeals, and

THAT the Comptroller be authorized to pay to each such student the sum of \$11.00 per month or \$33.00 per quarter in lieu of free room rent, fuel and light, until this question is determined by the Court.

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H. Budget Amended.

President Donovan presented the following letter, with his recommendation:

May 15, 1945

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

The Board of Trustees, at the beginning of the current school year, appropriated the sum of five hundred dollars from College Collections to pay for meals of patients confined in the Infirmary. We now find that this amount has been exhausted and there will be needed an additional amount of approximately \$250.00 to pay for this service through June 30, 1945.

Actually, there has been expended to this time \$536.85. These bills have been amounting to between \$125.00 and \$135.00 per month.

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5. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller is authorized to transfer \$250 of any funds not otherwise appropriated to cover expenses of the Infirmary for the remainder of the fiscal year.

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I. Architect for Refrigeration for Meat Laboratory.

President Donovan stated that informal plans for installation of refrigeration in the Meat Laboratory have been drawn, and that Dean Thomas Cooper desired the services of an architect to complete the plans and specifications. He recommended that authority be granted to employ an architect.

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6. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Dean Cooper is authorized to employ an architect to draw plans and make specifications for refrigeration in the Meat Laboratory.

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J. Wrecking of Old Meat Laboratory.

President Donovan reported a request of Dean Cooper to wreck the old Meat Laboratory. He stated that it was now possible to abandon the old Meat Laboratory, which has not been used for the past three years, and which is in such condition that it will not be economical to attempt to repair it. He recommended that the request be approved.

7. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is ordered that the old Meat Laboratory be wrecked and that such materials as may be usable be salvaged.

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K. Request for Funds for the Dairy Barn.

President Donovan presented the following letter from Dean Cooper, setting forth reasons for request for appropriation for the construction of a suitable building, equipment, etc., for a dairy barn for the Experiment Station:

May 17, 1945

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

During the past five or six years there has been frequent discussion regarding the need for adequate facilities for dairying research and teaching, and housing the dairy herd. The present dairy barn, a frame structure built 42 years ago, is in a bad state of repair and so outmoded that it is not advisable to attempt to prolong its use or to expend the large amount of money required to put it in condition. The dairy industry in the state has grown to the extent that proper presentation of factual material to the dairymen, prospective dairymen and students requires a new and modern set—up. The dairy interests of the state, farmers, manufacturers, and others have called attention for many years to our inadequate facilities, both from the Experiment Station and teaching standpoint.

We have in mind a type of construction that should serve for many years - concrete block or tile, with complete metal equipment, subject to building costs at the time work on the Experiment Station dairy center is to be undertaken.

I recommend that these needs be presented to the Board of Trustees and an appropriation of \$50,000 to the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station be requested for the construction of a suitable building, equipment, lots, roadways, etc., so that the necessary operations may be carried out in connection with our research and teaching in dairying.

In a general way we would expect the dairy housing facilities on the Experiment Station farm to include (1) classroom for student judging, herd management demonstration,
and meetings of farm people which could best be carried
out in the building where the dairy cattle is housed or
where the various lines of work in cannection with the
handling of milk products are carried on; (2) adequate
housing for the dairy herd and space where dairy cattle
can be isolated from the main herd and used for experimental treatments; (3) provision for adequate feed
storage for grain, hay, corn, silage, etc.; (4) necessary
refrigeration and other facilities required for the continued production of the highest quality milk; (5) laboratory facilities for research problems that may be in force.

I request permission for the preparation of plans and specifications so that they may be presented to the Board and legislative committees and that they may be ready for early action when the war is over and new building may be undertaken. Attached is a blue print sketch which gives the present thinking of the requirements. May we have your approval to employ or appoint an architect, as you may direct, to draw up the final plans and specifications?

Some discussion concerning the advisability of requesting appropriation and the urgent need of a dairy barn followed, after which the Board took the following action:

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9. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is ordered that President Donovan, Mr. R.C. Tway, and Dean Thomas Cooper be appointed a committee to consider the request for a dairy barn, and they are authorized to have plans drawn for said building.

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L. Training Program for Farm Workers.

President Donovan presented request of Dean Thomas Cooper to establish a farm labor training center where boys would be given a week's training and experience before placement upon farms. He read the following letter:

May 19, 1945

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

As you and the Board of Trustees are aware, for the past two years the Agricultural Extension Division, under an Act of Congress, has been responsible for the farm labor program in the state. This legislation gives very broad powers, its purpose being to utilize all possible sources of farm workers so that the agricultural production of the state may meet the demands made upon it.

The conditions this year point to a more acute shortage of farm workers than in the past year. There is one possible source of farm workers which as yet has not been completely utilized; namely, boys, particularly those in Eastern Kentucky, who may be available for farm work but who require training and some experience before their services can be used effectively by farmers. Therefore, it is proposed to establish a farm labor training center where boys would be given a week's farm training and experience before placement upon farms. Such training and direction will provide more certainty that a boy will be a satisfactory worker and it will also enable the boy to receive wages appropriate for a trained worker.

It is expected that this experimental training center would be located in Clark County, about three miles from Winchester, in buildings and facilities owned by Mr. V. W. Bush of Winchester. Mr. Bush is interested in giving this assistance so that the boys from Eastern Kentucky may have the advantage of this training and he has offered to lend these facilities, rent free, for this use. The program of training, supervision of the center and placement of workers will be under the supervision of Mr. Poundstone, farm labor supervisor, and members of the staff.

The program will be undertaken and will conform with all provisions of state laws affecting the employment of minors. Parents' consent will be secured in writing, physical examinations will be given and each boy will be required to have an insurance policy covering

accidents from the time he leaves home until he returns at the close of his employment. Every precaution will be taken so that the young boys will be properly cared for and have opportunity to develop.

It is planned that the initial period of operation shall be for one month. If the plan does not seem to operate advantageously or if it appears that it is not effective or that the training program does not fill a worth while need, the project will be discontinued at the end of the month; otherwise the work will be continued as long as required.

All funds required in the operation of the training center and costs thereof will be paid from appropriations made by Congress for the emergency farm labor program, and allocated to Kentucky.

I am sure that you and the Board of Trustees will be much interested in this proposed program. I thought it important to present the proposal to you for your information and approval and I shall be glad to see it made a part of the record.

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M. Frankel & Curtis, Architect Fees.

President Donovan reported that Frankel & Curtis had not been paid architect fees for preliminary drawings of the Women's Dormitory and Food Service Unit, heretofore authorized. He also reported that detailed estimates of the costs of these buildings had not been submitted by architects.

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10. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is directed that the President and the architects agree upon the estimated cost of the two buildings, and that the architects be paid according to contract dated February 17, 1945.

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N. Contract for Sigma Nu House.

President Donovan submitted a contract for the lease of the Sigma Nu fraternity house located at the corner of Euclid Avenue and Harrison Avenue, Lexington, Ky., for a period of ten months, beginning September 1, 1945, and ending June 30, 1946.

My dear President Donovan:

I attach hereto a lease between the University of Kentucky and the Sigma Nu Pulliam Memorial Association for the use of the fraternity house located at 173 Euclid Avenue for a period of ten months beginning September 1, 1945, and ending June 30, 1946. This is, in reality, a continuation of the existing lease. We are certain that these premises will be needed as a dormitory annex for the Women's Residence Halls for 1945—46. I recommend that, if the lease meets with your approval, the Board order same executed.

No expenses are involved in the project which will take me away from the campus, since the conferences are financed by the General Education Board.

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Resolution on Death of Dr. T. F. Polk.

President Donovan reported the death of Dr. T. F. Polk, who has been on the staff of the University of Kentucky since 1921, and submitted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION ON THE DEATH OF DR. TASKER P. POLK

Dr. Tasker P. Polk, veterinarian in the Agricultural Extension Division, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, University of Kentucky, since 1921, died suddenly of a heart attack on April 22, 1945. In character, disposition and sincerity he was admirably fitted for agricultural ex-Devotion to duty and acceptance of and betension work. lief in institutional policies were deepseated in his na-All who knew him have spoken of his sincerity and his devotion to his work and his desire and determination to give his best in rendering a true and honest service to the livestock interests of the state and to adequately and truly represent the institution with which he was connected.

For a number of years after Dr. Polk became connected with the Extension Department, he carried on educational work on tuberculosis and Bangs disease of cattle and pullorum disease of poultry with conviction and enthusiasm. He had a firm belief in the good to come from the Extension Department's program of work with the boys and girls of the 4-H Clubs and with young farm men and women. During the last years of his service, Dr. Polk gave much time and thought to assembling and distributing information on animal health and disease control. This he put in a form which would be understandable, of practical application and thus of everyday use to the boys and girls of the state who were interested in animals and anxious to follow the best and most effective methods of maintaining animal health.

Dr. Polk was a member of the American Veterinary Medical Association, United States Livestock Sanitary Association, Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association, the Central Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association, the Calvary Baptist Church, and was a veteran of the Spanish-American War.

His associates will feel the loss of a kind, loyal and generous friend and the institution the loss of a faithful and enthusiastic worker.

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R. Fower of Attorney Given to Frank D. Peterson.

President Donovan explained that, in connection with receiving some books from foreign countries through the Treasury Department, Bureau of Customs, Louisville, Ky., it is necessary that the Board of Trustees grant to someone in authority at the University of Kentucky Power of Attorney, so as to properly authorize the Customs Office in Louisville to sign certain documents on behalf of the University. It was suggested that the Power of Attorney be given to Frank D. Peterson, Comptroller of the University of Kentucky.

14. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following resolution was authorized:

Now, therefore, be it resolved that Frank D. Peterson, Comptroller of the University of Kentucky, be authorized on behalf of the University of Kentucky to execute such power of attorney, appointing agents and attorneys with such powers as may be necessary and convenient to transact the business of the University of Kentucky with the Collector of Customs, regarding books and articles to be received by the University, and the University of Kentucky hereby ratifies and confirms whatsoever the said Frank D. Peterson may lawfully do by virtue of the authority herein granted to him.

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8. Personnel under the Supervision of the Dean of the University Given Academic Rank.

President Donovan stated that he had conferred with Leo M. Chamberlain, Dean of the University, concerning the classification of the personnel in theDepartment of University Extension, Office of the Dean of Women, Registrar's Office, University Library, University YMCA and YWCA, and the Department of Athletics. He stated that it was desirable to have a more definite understanding as to the classification of the personnel of these departments, and that he was recommending that the persons listed be officially recognized as belonging to the academic and administrative personnel, with the equivalent rank indicated in the list submitted. He stated that it was not his thought that these ranks would be listed in the catalogue, but that they would be assigned for the purpose of defining the privileges available. He submitted the following list with his recommendation.
