More than legal guarantees will be needed, however, before we can truthfully say that the minority groups of our country are accepted as fellow human beings. The mental illness that is the root of prejudice must be eliminated if we hope to cure the disease.

The object of prejudice varies from one part of the country to another, depending on the particular group in any one area that differs from the majority in respect to color, race, or religion. The biggest single cause seems to come from a feeling of inferiority, since prejudice is usually strongest among

social standing, or economic wealth

Education promises to be the answer to the problem. Of course it will have to be education that goes beyond the traditional three R's. Our schools will have to place more emphasis on how men are alike rather than how they differ. Also, we will have to give the insecure members of society a stronger basis for self-respect than an absurd claim

of superiority. Sear-respect uses an answer canning of superiority. Ultimate brotherhood will be achieved in the minds of men, not on the pages of the statute books. Until such time as that brotherhood is as wide-spread as we like to brag it is, however, our minorities will have to depend upon legal decisions to insure them at least some measure of equality, if only before the bar of justice.

Low-Cost Dances Aren't Wanted By A Majority Of UK Students

One of our readers recently suggested that low-cost dances in the Student Union would afford a needed social opportunity to a large group of UK students.

On the surface this sounds like a reasonable idea, but in light of past performances on the part of those students who would benefit most by such dances, the program would be doomed to almost certain failure.

Our Readers Speak: On Parking Fine Money

Dear Editor:

Answering 'Your Idle Query: Who Gets Loot?' published in the editorial column of the Kernel Friday, Nov. 2, 1 would like to speak for SGA in telling the student body, as well as said editorial contributor, who does get the loof from parking fines collected by SGA.

There's no mystery — no dusty money-vault absorbing this money. Nor does the SGA budget swell from the harves. The money collected from parking fines goes straight back to constructive student use in the form of a Student Loan Fund. Gifts and donations from administration of the University go into this fund, too. At present, this loan fund amounts to around \$89,000, but the policy is to lend only on the interest drawn from this total, an amount at present of \$25,000. This year some 60 to 65 students are benefiting from loans amounting to a total of \$10,000.

a total of \$10,000.

Any student is eligible to apply for a loan from this fund. A committee, headed by Dean Cecil Carpenter, reviews the applications. They consider the application from these angles. Is the money to go for use in furthering the student's education? Is the student good scholastic standing? If these requirements are filled, the student must sign and have an adult resident of Kentucky co-sign a promissory note. The loan is on a four per cent interest plan and is given for varying lengths of time.


