Third Annual KY Gay Camp OUT

The Third Annual KY Gay Camp OUT will be held on Aug 24-26, at Sloydia, a private 14 acre retreat nestled on the banks of the Little South Fork of the Cumberland River in south Wayne County, Ky. Sloydia is approximately 20 miles south of Monticello.

The facilities available for campers include shady, level sites for tents and a limited number of sites with electricity for small trailers or R.Vs. There are outhouses, a swimming hole in the river, a stage for performances with lighting and electricity, a fully equipped weightlifting gym, and access to a rustic wood-burning hot tub.

Campers will have an opportunity to hike to the top of 1900 foot Eartheart Mountain. Evening entertainment may include singers and musicians, drag and fantasy shows, group campfires, and anything you would like to add to this mix. Some areas of the property are clothing optional.

This is out-in-the-woods, primitive camping, so come prepared for a unique experience! There is no cell phone service available anywhere on or near the property. You will need to bring in your own supplies of food, drinking water, camping and cooking gear. A limited amount of well water will be available. A donation of \$5 per person per day is requested to cover expenses.

Gender Neutral Bathrooms?

During my recent attendance at a national U.U. General Assembly, I talked to several people about gender neutral bathrooms. That is, bathrooms that are marked for use by individuals of any gender identity. These bathrooms are particularly useful for transsexual people who are transitioning and for anyone who's gender expression may cause confusion for others.

For example, I know a number of lesbians who are habitually mistaken for men. In addition, there are trans people who see themselves in the middle of gender and plan to stay there. Providing a gender neutral bathroom is welcoming to these individuals and helps educated people who attend or rent our church facilities.





Long-Term Care Insurance: The Basics Provided by Mohua Das

Long-term care, while not inevitable, is a possibility for millions of Americans. In fact, the American Society on Aging estimates that Americans who are age 65 and older have a 70% chance of requiring long term care.

Long-term care can be very expensive. A recent survey revealed that the average annual national cost for nursing home care is over \$70,000. Depending on where you live and what type of facility you choose, the cost may even be higher. Home healthcare, too, can prove to be a significant drain on resources. The national average cost of home healthcare is over \$52,000 annually.

The question becomes how do you pay for long-term care when you need it. One answer may be long-term care insurance. Long-term care insurance can provide you with the ability to meet a considerable portion of these costs over an extended period of time.

How does long-term care insurance work?

Typically, a long-term care insurance policy provides benefits if you require assistance for an extreme cognitive impairment such as Alzheimer's disease, and if you can not perform a specified number ((usually at least two) of what long-termcare policies refer to as activities of daily living, such as bathing and dressing.

Most policies pay a maximum daily (or monthly) benefit for a specified number of years, known as the benefit period. This maximum daily (or monthly) benefit is simply the maximum amount the insurance company will pay per day (or month) for nursing home or other long-term care costs.

Long-term care policies also include a lifetime benefit or the maximum total

amount the insurance company will pay. The lifetime benefit is typically calculated by multiplying the daily (or monthly) benefit by the benefit period.

If your long-term care costs are less than the maximum daily (or monthly) benefit, you may receive benefits for a longer period of time than the benefit period. But you will never receive more than the lifetime benefit. Most policies impose an established waiting period, called the elimination period, before any benefits are paid.

What does long-term care insurance cover?

Although some basic policies cover only nursing home costs, long-term care policies generally cover costs for skilled nursing care, intermediate care and custodial care.

You can typically receive this care at an assisted-living facility, adult-care center or at home. Coverage can vary greatly from insurer to insurer and policy to policy. Each policy has its own eligibility requirements, restrictions, and determination of benefits and cost.

How much does long-term care insurance cost?

The actual cost of the premiums you pay depends on several factors, including: Your age when applying for the policy Your state of health when applying for the policy

The length of the benefit period and the elimination period


The types of services offered
The Maximum Daily or Monthly Benefit
Other policy features such as inflation
protection

The features and the options of the policy can usually be customized to fit both your needs and your budget.

What about inflation protection?

increased coverage over time. The options vary by policy.

What about Medicare, Medicaid and other medical insurance?

Some consumers decide against purchasing long-term care insurance because they mistakenly believe that their medical insurance or Medicare or Medicaid will cover them. Unfortunately, these assumptions are generally not true. Traditional medical insurance typically does not cover long-term care expenses.

Medicare may cover medically necessary care at home or at a skilled nursing facility on a part-time or intermittent basis but, generally, Medicare covers these expenses only after a required minimum hospital stay of three days and coverage for an extended period is limited. Medicare coverage for provides certain types of coverage only after people have depleted most of their assets.

Between the Worlds Alternative Spiritual Gathering for Bisexual and Queer Men

The Green Faerie Grove is pleased to announce that registration is now open for the sixth annual Between the Worlds (BTW) Men's Gathering, which will be held in southeastern Ohio on September 11-16, 2007. The setting is a private campground in the lushly-forested hills of southeastern Ohio. The cost to attend currently ranges from \$85 to \$100. Scholarships are available. Registration closes August 17th.

Queer men have, for many years now, sought spiritual alternatives to mainstream religious paths that have historically condemned their very existence. While New Age, Pagan, and Earth-centered paths and gatherings generally welcome queer

spiritual seekers, they are often heterocentric in outlook and seldom address issues specific to the needs of these men.

With this in mind, the BTW Men's Gathering was designed to provide a safe place for men who love men to explore alternative spiritual practices and paths, to empower themselves, and to plant the seeds of spiritual renewal within the gay community. The Positive View By Dr. Sherry and Dr. Skippy

Part 7: Personal insight and sense of self

Being authentic and honest in one's life (a topic we discussed last month) requires insight into one's being. It has been suggested by the work of other authors (Fassinger, 1998; Abes and Jones 2004) that identifying as gay man or lesbian may enhance the complexity of our understandings of self. That is, having a lesbian or gay identity may provide opportunities, for example, for a better understanding of our self in relation to others and the world.

Participants in our survey reported feeling that they enjoyed deepened insight and a stronger sense of self and identity. This was sometimes connected with their ability to be compassionate and empathize with others (which we will discuss next month). Participants often saw their ability to achieve personal insights as a critical skill that was derived from being a gay man or lesbian and extended to other parts of their life. For example, one gay male participant explained,

"...because homosexuality is often taboo - even recently illegal - it has made me examine other social and legal bans and decide for myself whether they are good or bad. Whether [the topic] is marijuana or Christianity, being gay has given me a critical eye and sharp sense of irony in the double standards of society."

A gay man wrote, "The impact of deepening my own insight and positive development as a whole-person, [has given me a] richer, deeper meaning of the real masculine."

Another offered,

"Coming to terms with being gay, admitting that I am not in the majority, has

given me a greater depth of self knowledge -- knowing that I have explored my own identity and not simply inherited one from society and the media."

Lesbian participants expressed similar insight and strength gained as a result of their lesbian identity. One lesbian wrote.

"Being a lesbian and dealing with homophobia (internal and external) has made me a stronger, deeper person. I really like the way my life is going and it feels like I actually have more control over it (as much as possible) than what I hear other straight peers say about their own lives."

Another lesbian offered,

"Accepting myself as a lesbian also has made me better able to see all aspects of myself. I have been able to accept all the good and not-so-good parts of myself and learn to work with what I have been given."

Finally, another lesbian participant wrote, "... being gay encourages one to really search within for self-understanding and acceptance. Since society is largely not very supportive of gays or gay rights, a gay person needs to find inner sources of strength and confidence."

What personal insights do you feel you have gained from your identity as a gay man, lesbian, bisexual, queer, or transgender person? How have those insights helped you to achieve a positive sense of self? How can you share those insights with others to help them achieve a positive sense of self?


