

Adelle Dalley, former Music Librarian here at UK, passed away recently. Cathy Hunt, current Music Librarian, has written a brief memorial for her. Adelle Dalley was a generous woman and an excellent librarian. She will be missed.

IN MEMORIAM Adelle G. Dailey, 1916 - 1987

Adelle Gensemer Dalley, born February 11, 1916 in Creston, Ohio, had strong ties to and a pervasive influence on the University of Kentucky and the School of Music for most of her adult life.

Adelle began her college education at Wooster College in Wooster, Ohio, where she studied plano. In 1936, she transferred to the University of Kentucky, continuing her music studies and graduating in 1937 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in History. From 1937 to 1942 she served as head resident of Patterson Hall, leaving this position upon her marriage to Dr. James S. Dalley, a local oral surgeon. In 1960, she decided to return to work and took a position as Record Librarian for the Music Department at UK. She managed the record library, which began with 3 listening booths in the Music Lounge in the Fine Arts Building, later moving to its present location. When she completed her Masters In Library Science in 1967, Stuart Forth, Director of Libraries, offered her a position as cataloger, which she accepted. Adelle gradually came to be the Music Cataloger and, in this capacity, worked closely with the music faculty in developing the music collection. In 1972, the decision was made to separate the music and art collections in the Fine Arts Library, whereupon Adelle became the first Music Librarian at the University.

Under her direction, the Music Library was organized and, by the time she retired in June 1981, it had attained the status of being one of the two most complete music libraries in the Southeast. During her tenure, the School of Music's record collection also became part of the Music Library, where it was developed to its current strength, supporting the needs of the School of Music and the community.

Adelle's contributions to the Music Library and the School of

Music did not cease upon her retirement. Through the School she established the of Music, Frances Arnold South and the Dudley E. South endowments, which provide scholarships for freshman students in voice and strings respectively. Her sizable donations to the Music Library have provided for the purchase of computer equipment for the Library, compact disc players for the Listening Center, an office for the Librarian, and other smaller items which have streamlined the procedures and improved services in the Music Adelle also served as Library. "mentor" to the current Music Librarian, listening to ideas and giving useful advice and guidance whenever asked.

Adelle Dalley died at 3:00 am on Thursday, January 8, after a long iliness. Though she is no longer with us, her influence on the Music Library, and on many individuals, will be felt for many

years to come.

The family of Adelle Dalley has asked that those wishing to give memorials make their contributions to the Adelle G. Dalley Music Library.
