MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE
October 9, 1939

The University Senate met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, October 9, 1939. In the absence of President McVey, Dean Boyd presided.

The minutes of May 9, May 31, and August 19, were read and approved.

Professors Amos Eblen and W. D. Valleau were elected to the University Council for two year terms, to succeed Professors J. H. Martin and Frank Murray.

Dean Boyd introduced to the Senate new members of that body and also members who were on leave during the 1938-39 school year.

Professor John Kuiper made the following report for the Curriculum Committee:

"The Curriculum Committee recommends to the Senate the approval (1) of the following new courses from the College of Arts and Sciences:

Bacteriology 250a-d. Seminar. (1 each) Geology 217a-d. Seminar. (1 each)

and (2) of the following change in course from the College of Agriculture:

Assembly 2. Sophomore Assembly. (.3) to be replaced by Assembly 2a,b. Sophomore Assembly. (.3, .3)

Minutes of the University Senate - October 9, 1939

The Committee wishes to announce to the Senate that it has adopted the following additional principle and rule to guide it in its deliberations:

"A request for the approval of a new course shall on submission to the Committee be accompanied by a statement of the need for the course, by a complete outline of the proposed course, including the approximate time to be spent upon each topic, and by a bibliography of source materials which are (or can be made) available for the teaching of this course."

The above report was approved by the Senate.

On motion by Prof. C. G. Latimer, the Senate approved the following governing regulations: "A vote on any motion or election shall be by secret ballot if requested before the vote is taken by one-fifth of the members present."

On motion by Professor Horlacher, the Senate approved the following recommendation from the College of Agriculture: "That the second half of Sophomore Assembly be required of the entering freshman class and that the requirement for graduation in Home Economics be 134 semester credits."
