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FOREWORD

The Inventory of the County Archives of Tennessee is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Loudon County, is number 53 of the Tennessee series.

The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey Program attempt to do more than give merely a list of records—they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire county will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey Program, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized by Luther H. Evans who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child, who had been National Field Supervisor since the inauguration of the Survey. The Survey Program operates as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Community Service Programs of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

PREFACE

The Federal Historical Records Survey was inaugurated in Tennessee early in 1936; it expired, pursuant to an act of Congress, on August 31, 1939. By the provisions of the Emergency Relief Act of 1939, it became necessary for the project to become locally sponsored. The present project, the Tennessee Historical Records Survey succeeded the Federal Survey on September 1, 1939. It is sponsored by the Tennessee State Planning Commission and cosponsored by the counties and municipalities of the State, and several libraries. The Tennessee Survey is engaged not only in surveying county archives, but also municipal archives, church archives, manuscript depositories and collections, imprints, and preparing transcriptions of selected early county court minutes. A list of the Tennessee Survey's publications follows the indexes to this Inventory.

While the new order has in no way brought about a change in the standards of the Federal Survey, it has been partially responsible for certain revisions of editorial concepts. The Tennessee Survey, for example, has instituted a series of special publications to make available certain materials accumulated in the State Office editorial procedures which may be of general interest. Also, the county archives inventories are assuming a somewhat different form.

The Tennessee Survey is now engaged in preparing a comprehensive statement of the general law regulating county government in the State. It is expected that this book will serve as a handbook on the organization, structure, and evolution of county government in Tennessee, and will make it unnecessary to repeat certain items of general information in the various inventories. The essays in this Inventory are, therefore, limited to special legislation concerning Loudon County or an exposition of the manner in which the general law has been, in effect, altered, and only such considerations of the general law as are necessary to state the facts of existence of the offices, the dates of their creation, their present status, the manner in which filled, and the terms. The complexities of the school laws, however, have made it necessary for the sake of continuity that the discussion of education be more detailed. This treatment has also been followed, but not as fully, with regard to highway legislation.

The arrangement of offices and entries in this Inventory is a result of a process of trial and error and the pattern followed is one settled upon in earlier publications; however, the complex nature of some offices, particularly those with divergent functions, precludes an absolutely logical arrangement. In general, the arrangement of offices consists of grouping those of a similar nature. For example, the quarterly county court, the governing body, is followed by the county judge, the chief executive officer; the courts are placed together, followed by the jury commission and the law enforcement offices. Within the offices, related and similar records are grouped under appropriate subject headings. The records entries indicate the title,

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1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Loudon County, one of Tennessee's youngest and geographically smallest counties, lies in the heart of the historic valley of East Tennessee. Lenior City is the county's largest municipality, although the seat of government is the town of Loudon.

The creation of Loudon County followed the termination of post-Civil War Reconstruction in Tennessee and the restoration to power of the Conservatives. On June 2, 1870, the General Assembly created Christiana County from fractions of Roane, Monroe and Blount counties, but a few weeks later changed the name of the new county to Loudon. 2 Establishment of the county had been anticipated and provided for by the framers of the Constitution of 1870. That instrument, while prohibiting the establishment of new counties with a population of less than seven hundred qualified voters and an area less than two hundred and seventy-five square miles (larger than that of Loudon County), included an exception providing that a new county might be formed from fractions of Roane, Monroe, and Blount Counties with the consent of at least two-thirds of the qualified voters in the portions of the old counties to be affected, the boundary of such new county not to approach Maryville, Kingston, or Madisonville nearer than eleven miles, except that south of the Tennessee River the boundary line might approach within ten miles of Kingston. The constitutionally-required plebiscite in the fractions of the old counties forming Loudon County was provided for, 4 and the establishment of the county was approved by the required majority. 5 An election of county officers was ordered and held on August 5, 1870. 7 The actual organization of the county took place on September 3, 1870, in the Baptist Church of the town of Loudon. 8 Twenty justices of the peace were present at the organization meeting, and William Y. Huff was elected chairman. 9

While from time to time since the creation of Loudon County its boundaries have been altered by the General Assembly, the county is now delimited on the north-east by Knox County, 10 on the east by Blount, 11

on the south by Monroe 12 and McMinn, 13 and on the west and north by Roane. 14 Loudon County has an area of 219 square miles, 15 ranking eighty-seventh among Tennessee's ninety-five counties in area. 16

Much of the richest history relating to Loudon County antedates the creation of the county. The very name of the county and of the county seat stems from events constituting a significant chapter in eighteenth century American colonial history. In 1756 the English erected Fort Loudoun on the southern bank of the Little Tennessee River near the mouth of the Tellico River as protection against the French and their Indian allies. The fort was named for John, Earl of Loudoun, commander of the English forces in America at the outbreak of the French and Indian War. 17 Although its site was in present Monroe County, the memory of the fort has been perpetuated in Loudon County place names. Nearly a century after the fort was built, the name of the community then known as Blair's Ferry was changed to Loudon, 18 and that town was later designated as the county seat. 19 The original name of the county - Christiana - was changed by subsequent legislation to Loudon, 20 and

one of the Tennessee Valley Authority's major dams, now under construction near Lenoir City, is named Fort Loudoun Dam. 21

One of the earliest white frontier outposts in what is now Loudon County was Fort Grainger, erected by Governor William Blount during the territorial period of Tennessee's history. Designed to serve as protection against the Cherokee Indians pending the extinction of Indian title to the area, Fort Grainger was located on the north bank of the Tennessee River near the present site of Lenoir City. The fort was named in honor of Mary Grainger, Governor Blount's wife. 23

Indian title to the area including present Loudon County was extinguished by three separate treaties between the United States and the Cherokees. By the Treaty of Holston, or Blount's Treaty, of July 2, 1791, the Indians relinquished claim to that extreme northern portion of the present county which lay north of the Hawkins Line, surveyed six years later. 24 By the First Treaty of Tellico, of October 2, 1798, the Cherokees ceded the area lying below the Hawkins Line as far south as the Tennessee and Little Tennessee rivers, 25 and by Calhoun's Treaty of February 27, 1819, they surrendered the lands south of those streams. 26 The southern portion of present Loudon County was included in the Hiwassee District, created by the General Assembly in 1819. 27

White settlement of what is now Loudon County seems to have rapidly followed the extinction of the Indian title. One of the most prominent of the early settlers was William Ballard Lenoir, who in 1810 made his home at the confluence of the Tennessee and Little Tennessee rivers. 28 The land upon which Lenoir settled had been deeded to him in 1809 by his father, General William Lenoir, a distinguished North Carolinian, 29 although it is probable that the younger Lenoir purchased from Judge David Campbell

of Tennessee an additional tract adjacent to that deeded him. 30 At least a portion of the Lenoir lands belonged to General William Lenoir under an entry of 1788 made pursuant to a grant of the State of North Carolina.31 On the other hand, an exchange of letters in 1809 between William B. Lenoir and Judge Campbell relate to the prospective sale by Campbell to Lenoir of land "adjoining your [Lenoir's] other lands "32 Campbell also wrote that "My place added to yours will make one of the finest in any Country."33 This settlement, the site of present Lenoir City was early known as Lenoir's or Lenoir Station, and William B. Lenoir seems to have been its first postmaster. 34 There is abundant evidence that Lenoir engaged profitably in land, cotton and milling enterprises operations that were later continued by his sons under the corporate name of the Lenoir Manufacturing Company. 35 Among other early settlers in the region were James, William and Samuel Blair, Jesse and Simeon Eldridge, Henry Bogard, Jacob Gardenhill, John and Pomercy Carmichael and Benjamin Prater. 36 James Blair operated a ferry at what is now the town of Loudon, and the nearby community was known as Blair's Ferry until given its present name, about 1853.37

Blair's Ferry envisioned a golden future of commerce. In 1852 it became the northern terminal point of the East Tennessee and Georgia Railroad, 38 with a daily train operating to and from Dalton, Georgia. 39 As a junction point of rail and river traffic, Blair's Ferry seemed happily situated to prosper and to achieve rank as a large community in East Tennessee - provided that it remain the terminus of the reilroad. Indeed, so appealing was the prospect that some of the town's more zealous citizens seem to have devised a plan to prevent the extension of the railroad. 40 But their dreams were shattered when in 1852 the General Assembly so arranged the system of state aid to railroads that the East Tennessee

and Georgia was virtually compelled to extend its tracts to Knoxville.41 The legislation provided for state aid to railroad construction at the rate of \$8,000 per mile, with the proviso that the benefits of the subsidy should not apply to the East Tennessee and Georgia Railroad Company unless that Company should extend its line from Blair's Ferry to Knoxville, and it also chartered a new company to build the extension in case the East Tennessee and Georgia Railroad should not elect to do so. Three years later the rail link from Blair's Ferry, now Loudon, to Knoxville was completed.42

Like the rest of East Tennessee, which was a stronghold of Unionism, 43 the region of present Loudon County felt the full force of the Civil War. 44 From the beginning of that conflict until the late summer of 1863 the region was in Confederate hands. During that period, loyal Unionists suffered indignities and harsh treatment at the hands of their pro-Southern neighbors. 45 They welcomed the occupation of East Tennessee by Union forces under General Ambrose E. Burnside in September, 1863,46 and meanwhile sought to do what they could for the cause of the Union. To this end there was devised a plan of destroying vital bridges along the rail route from Georgia to Bristol, including that at Loudon. Some of the bridges were burned, 47 but apparently the Loudon bridge was not among those destroyed. In the fall of 1863, the forces of General James Longstreet, moving from Chattanooga to oppose Eurnside at Knoxville, crossed the Tennessee River by the railroad bridge at Loudon. 48 While no major engagements were fought in what is now Loudon County, raids and skirmishes took place at Loudon, Lenoir Station, and Philadelphia.49 It is said that during his occupation of East Tennessee, General Burnside was so delighted with the lands of the Lenoir family that he tried, although in vain, to purchase them. 50

The physical characteristics of Loudon County help to make it a pleasant community in which to live. It is drained by the Tennessee

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River, which passes through the very heart of the county, by the Little Tennessee River, and by minor tributaries of those streams. The county's average temperature is approximately 60 degrees Fahrenheit, and its average annual rainfall is slightly over fifty inches. 51 Dolomite constitutes the chief soil formation. 52 There are large deposits of barytes in the western portion of the county, and there is some marble. 53 In altitude the county ranges from a minimum of 800 feet above sea level to 1,300 feet. 54

In terms of population, Loudon County's growth since 1880 has been steady, although in no sense phenomenal. The total population of the county in 1880 was 9,148, which rose to 9,273 in 1890 and to 10,838 in 1900,55 to 13,612 in 1910,56 to 16,275 in 1920,57 to 17,805 in 1930,58 and was counted as 19,909 in 1940,59 an increase of 11.8 percent in the last decade. In 1930 Ienoir City's population was 4,47060 and that of the town of Loudon was 2,578,61 while the population per square mile for the entire county was 81.3.62

Of Loudon County's total population of 17,805 in 1930, 7,048 persons were classed as urban population, and 10,757 as rural, 63 and of the rural population 7,591 persons were listed in the category of rural-farm population, 64 although by 1935, the county's farm population had risen to 9,389.65 A significant feature of the county's population pattern is the high proportion of native born citizens. Of a total of 17,128 white persons in 1930, only 11 were foreign born, 66 and of the native born whites only 17 were of foreign parentage and only 43 of mixed parentage. 67 Even more striking is the overwhelming numerical preponderance of the white race among Loudon County residents. As of 1930, the county's 667 Negroes constituted only 3.8 percent of the total population, 68 only 8 Negroes

lived within the corporate limits of Lenoir City⁶⁹ and there was not a single resident of the county of any other race than the white and Negro races.⁷⁰ These facts are the more remarkable in view of the situation only thirty years earlier when 1,360 of the county's 10,838 inhabitants were Negroes,⁷¹ constituting 12.55 percent of the total population.⁷² Thus, between 1900 and 1930, Loudon County's Negro population declined not only relatively but also absolutely.

Loudon County's economy is based primarily on agriculture, although industrial enterprise is by no means a negligible factor. In 1935, nearly 140,000 of the county's approximately 140,160 acres were in farm lands,73 with a valuation of \$4,317,870.74 The average size of all farms was 84.6 acres,75 and the average value per farm was \$2,611, or \$30.84 per acre.76 The chief cultivated crops of the county are corn, hay, tobacco, wheat, oats and barley.77 The leading types of industrial establishments in Loudon County are milling and the manufacture of textiles and furniture.78 Lenoir City, where an important car foundry is located, is the county's chief industrial community. The city experienced its greatest industrial impetus with the establishment there in 1890 of the Lenoir City Company.79 By its charter the Company was declared to be "a body politic and corporate," and among the lawful enterprises of the company were "The encouragement of emigration [sic] the locating, establishing and building of Towns, and Cities . . and the establishment and encouragement of industries . . . 80

The courthouse in Loudon was built in 1872 and the jail in 1874.81 Public educational facilities in Loudon County seem to be adequate measured in terms of the number of schools maintained. During the scholastic year 1938-39, there were 37 elementary schools in the county.82

and three four-year high schools. 83 During the same period total expenditures for public education in the county were reported as \$72,558.22 for county elementary schools. 84 \$48,416.61 for city elementary schools. 85 \$12,060.62 for the one county high school86 and \$29,943.91 for city high schools. 87 It may be of significance that in recent years there has been a decrease in both the number of schools in Loudon County and total expenditures for public education. 88 In the case of Lenoir City, public education has benefited from the policy of the Lenoir City Company of donating sites for school buildings. 89

Loudon County is served by two railroads and two main highways. The main line of the Southern Railway between Knoxville and Chattanoga passes through Lenoir City, Loudon, and Philadelphia, 90 and the Cincinnati-Atlanta line of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad serves the Greenback community in the southern portion of the county. 91 U. S. Highway No. 11 closely parallels the Southern Railway through the central portion of the county, while U. S. Highway No. 70, leading to Nashville, traverses the northern portion.

The political and religious affiliations of Loudon County residents are such as one might expect to find among the people of a rural East Tennessee county. A majority of its voters are Republican, 92 and most of its people adhere to the Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian faiths, although there is one Congregation of Friends. 93

A significant impact on Loudon County's economy and society is involved in the program of the Tennessee Valley Authority in its construction of the Fort Loudoun and Watts Bar dams. The Fort Loudoun Dam is
being built in Loudon County a short distance up the Tennessee River from
Lenoir City. When completed, it will be 135 feet high, 4,835 feet long,
and its reservoir area will comprise 14,900 acres. 94 The twenty-nine
million dollar project will have an authorized hydro-electric generative

capacity of 64,000 kilowatts, with an ultimate capacity of 96,000 kilowatts. 95 Construction was begun in July 1940, and is scheduled to be completed in June 1944, although the first navigation and power operations will be possible some weeks earlier. 96 As a result of the building of the Fort Loudoun Dam, the 9-foot navigation channel of the Tennessee River will be extended 47 miles. 97 The companion Watts Bar Dam, being constructed about 70 miles downstream in nearby Rhea and Meigs counties, will have a greater generative capacity, and its reservoir area will comprise 41,600 acres. 98 Substantial portions of Loudon County will be included in the reservoir area of each dam.

Certain consequences of the TVA Program in Loudon County are evident. Several thousand acres of land will pass from private hands to government ownership, and thus beyond the reach of the taxing power of the county. The withdrawal from the tax rolls of such amounts of land would seriously reduce the county's revenue and impair its fiscal structure were it not for the policy of the Federal government of reimbursing counties for tax losses resulting from certain operations of the Tennessee Valley Authority.99

It seems probable, also, that the program of the Tennessee Valley Authority will affect the population of Loudon County, both as to its distribution and its size. Those persons whose homes and farms are in the reservoir areas will have to be relocated. It is not yet known precisely how many of the county's citizens will be thus affected, or how many of them will find new homes elsewhere in the county. Some may move out of the county altogether, while on the other hand, the work of building the dam is bringing outsiders into the county.

Finally, Loudon County's economy and physiography will be directly and materially affected by the transformation being wrought by the building of the dams. The withdrawal from cultivation of farm lands in the reservoir areas; the possible location in the county of new industries attracted by the availability of hydro-electric power; the use of the reservoir lakes for recreational and tourist purposes; the conservation and management of lands controlling the drainage of waters into the reservoirs these are among the factors that will impinge upon the county's material interests and development. To meet these problems, long-range planning

is called for, and to this end, Lenoir City, on July 8, 1940, created a Municipal Planning Commission, 100 The Commission was created by the Board of Aldermen of the city acting under statutory authorization of the General Assembly, 101 and is composed of seven members: the Mayor, one alderman chosen by the Board, and five citizens appointed by the Mayor.

2. THE PRESENT GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION OF LOUDON COUNTY1

Loudon County, a political corporation of the State of Tennessee. performs either itself or in cooperation with State and Federal agencies, the functions assigned to it or permitted by the statutes and the Constitution of Tennessee, such as the registration of property titles and the recordation of liens and leases, the registration and licensing of marriages, motor vehicles, and the participation in trades declared by law to be privileges, the registration of births and deaths, the maintenance of the peace, the administration of justice, the probation of wills and the administration of estates, the promotion of education, the provision for certain types of poor relief, the construction of roads and bridges, the assessment of property for State and county taxation, and the collection of county taxes and certain State taxes. To finance in whole or in part the activities of the county, the quarterly county court, composed of the justices of the peace assembled as the county's legislative body, may levy taxes upon property, privileges, and polls to create funds for specific purposes, such as for schools, highways, and debt service, or to maintain or add to the general county fund, out of which are paid a number of miscellaneous expenses, such as court costs and costs for the maintenance of the courthouse and jail, for which no taxes are specifically levied, and may, within limitations fixed by public and private laws, issue and sell bonds. To carry out some of the county functions, the quarterly county court of Loudon County appoints certain officials, namely, the superintendent of schools, the members of the board of education, the members of the board of highway commissioners, the county physician, the coroner, the members of the agricultural extension committee, the board of equalization, and the poor commission. Other county officers are elected by popular vote or are appointed, as in the case of subordinate county employees, by persons designated by the quarterly court or the statutes. The quarterly county court is required to approve the bonds of most county officials. By receiving reports directly from county officials or through the county judge, the quarterly court is informed of receipts and disbursements and the needs of various county offices and agencies. In addition, the quarterly court may have the county records audited by private auditors. The quarterly court is empowered to divide or to redivide the county into civil districts and to zone the county for the promotion of safety, health, and morals.

The county judge, aside from being the presiding officer of the quarterly court and ex-officio probate judge and juvenile judge, is the chief executive officer of the county and as such acts as general agent for the county, countersigns warrants drawn by the county court clerk, the chairman of the highway commission, and the superintendent of schools directing the trustee to pay obligations of the county and its agencies; receives reports from most county agencies and keeps a central

set of accounts and has custody of the county property not explicitly placed by law in the hands of some other agency or officer.

The county court clerk, in addition to serving as clerk of the quarterly, probate, and juvenile courts, collects State and county privilege taxes, issues licenses, and registers marriages, births, deaths, motor vehicles, and practitioners of those trades and professions declared by law to be privileges. The county court clerk of Loudon County issues warrants upon the general county fund, which are countersigned by the county judge, who, under the general law, issues these warrants.

The register, sometimes called the register of deeds, records papers evidencing property titles, liens, leases, and other written instruments entitled by law to registration.

The maintenance of the peace and the execution of court orders are duties of the sheriff, his deputies, and the several constables.

The coroner and the justices of the peace conduct inquests over the bodies of persons meeting death by violence at the hands of other persons.

The circuit, criminal, chancery, probate, and juvenile courts and the justices of the peace are charged with the administration of justice. The circuit court, of which the circuit judge and the circuit court clerk are the chief officers, is chiefly a court of law, having common law and statutory jurisdiction over civil matters and also possessing certain probate and equity jurisdiction. The criminal court, held by a special criminal judge with the circuit court clerk acting as clerk, has exclusive common law and statutory jurisdiction, original and appellate, over criminal cases arising in Loudon County. Jurors for the circuit and criminal courts are regularly selected by the jury commission, with the circuit court clerk as its clerk. The chancery court, of which the chancellor and the clerk and master are the chief officers, is for the most part a court of equity, but also holds a considerable range of jurisdiction concurrently with the probate court and concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit court in all cases except certain unliquidated damages. The probate court has jurisdiction centering, by and large, in the probation of wills, in the appointment and supervision of personal representatives, and in the administration of estates. Both the chancery and circuit courts hold jurisdiction in certain probate matters. Probably because the county judge is probate judge, the probate court has jurisdiction over the establishment and operation of special drainage, levee, and road improvement districts. The juvenile court, held by the county judge, has jurisdiction over juvenile delinquents. The justices of the peace are committing magistrates and have the authority to decide misdemeanor cases wherein the defendants plead guilty and in civil cases involving debts and demands of small amounts.

The tax assessor evaluates property and lists privileges and polls for State and county taxation, except property of public utilities which is assessed by the State Railroad and Public Utilities Commission. The The Present Governmental (First entry, p. 33)

tax assessor's property assessments are subject to review and adjustment by the county and State Boards of Equalization.

State and county taxes on property and polls are collected by the trustee. Privilege taxes and license fees are collected by the county court clerk and turned over by him to the county trustee and the Competroller of the Treasury. The trustee is the treasurer of the county as well as its chief tax collector.


The board of education and the superintendent of schools are charged with the operation of the public elementary and high schools in the county, not operated by municipalities and special independent school districts. The county school system is subject to considerable control by the State Department of Education.

The county physician renders medical service to the inmates of the county jail and the poor home.

The highway commission has general supervision over the maintenance of the county road ${\rm system}_{\bullet}$

The poor commission and the poor home superintendent operate the poor home, an institution for those who cannot live elsewhere or otherwise.

The county agent seeks to educate the farmers in better agricultural techniques and performs certain duties in connection with the crop control and soil conservation activities of the Federal Government.

3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

Erected in 1872, the Loudon County courthouse is a two story brick and concrete building, in the center of the public square of Loudon. It is a T-shaped structure, 80 feet wide at the front, 44 at the rear, 86 in length, and 45 in height. It contains 244,800 cubic feet of space. The building is approximately 80 percent fireproof and has concrete vaults for storing 40 percent of the county's records. The offices are well ventilated, have normal temperature, and are free from dust and dampness.

The offices of the county court clerk, the trustee, the clerk and master, the register, the tax assessor, the department of education, and the farm agent are on the first floor. The circuit court clerk, the county judge, the sheriff, and the highway department are quartered on the second floor. A storage room for records from all bureaus is in the northeast corner of the basement.

The county court clerk's office, 17x16x14, is on the south side of the first floor. Fifty feet of steel shelving and metal file drawers along the west wall afford ample housing facilities. Ten feet of bound volumes and 30 feet of unbound material constitute 25 percent of the records in the custody of the clerk, 3 percent of the tax assessor's records, and 1 percent of those of the county judge. Two desks, a counter, and several chairs furnish accommodations in the office. No space or equipment is needed. Eighteen percent of the clerk's records, 1 percent of those of the justices of the peace, and all of those of the juvenile court are in the adjoining vault which measures 6x5x8. There are 81 feet of bound volumes stored on 84 feet of steel roller shelving along the west and south walls. Room for expansion, with or without new shelving, is available. Two percent of the clerk's records is in the trustee's office and the remaining 55 percent in the basement records room.

The register occupies an office, 20x16x14, on the northwest corner of the first floor. All of his records are kept in a vault, 9x5x8, which adjoins the west side of his office. One hundred and twenty-six feet of steel roller shelving, on the south and east walls, is sufficient for the care of 116 feet of bound volumes. Another vault, of the same size, connects with the south side of the register's office but is not being used at present. There is ample space for expansion with the installation of new shelving. The accommodations for users consist of three tables, a desk, and six chairs.

The office of the clerk and master, on the north side of the first floor, measures 17x16x14. There are 37 feet of unbound material, or 15 percent of the chancery court's records, in file boxes on the west wall. A vault, located on the west side of the office, contains 48 feet of steel roller shelving against the west wall. Forty-two feet of bound volumes, or 45 percent of the records of the chancery court, are stored here. The remaining 40 percent of the records is in the basement records room. The office and vault have good accommodations for users and room for expansion with additional equipment.

Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records

(First entry, p. 33)

The tax assessor and board of equalization share an office on the south side of the first floor; measuring 17x14x14, it affords plenty of room for expansion without additional equipment. One foot of unbound material is in a file box on a desk in the center of the room. Two percent of the assessor's records is here. Twenty-one volumes, or 5 percent of the current records are at the home of the assessor. Three percent of his records is in the county court clerk's office and 90 percent is in the basement records room. Since 1915, the board of equalization has used the tax assessor's books for recording its minutes and other purposes. Eight percent of this agency's records is in the home of the assessor, 3 percent is in the county court clerk's office, and the remaining 89 percent in the basement records room.

The trustee's office, which measures 20x16x14, is in the southeast corner on the first floor. Thirty-seven feet of steel shelving under a counter in the center of the room is adequate for housing 12 feet of bound volumes. Twenty-five feet is used for reference books and other publications. One percent of the trustee's records and 2 percent of those of the county court clerk are in the office. Twenty-four percent of the trustee's records is in the adjoining vault which measures 9x5x8. Ninety-six feet of bound volumes are in steel roller shelving along the north wall and 11 feet on the floor, in stacks $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet high. There is room for the addition of new shelving which is needed to house the records now on the floor. Seventy-five percent of the trustee's records is in the basement records room.

The superintendent of schools occupies an office, 17x14x14, on the southeast corner of the first floor. Ninety-eight percent of the department's records, consisting of 15 feet of bound volumes and 17 feet of unbound material, is housed here. Forty-seven feet of shelving, in steel cabinets and file boxes against the east and west walls, furnish ample storage space. No additional space or equipment is needed. Two percent of the superintendent's records is in the basement records room.

The county farm agent's office, measuring 17x14x14, is on the north side of the first floor at the east end of the hall. All of his records are kept here. Fifteen feet of unbound material and 54 feet of bulletins and pamphlets utilize the 69 feet of shelving in wooden cabinets and file boxes on the east and west walls. Accommodations for users include three desks, two tables, a counter, and chairs. The room is not crowded and no equipment is needed.

The office of the county judge, in the southwest corner of the second floor, is 20x12x12. Seventy-seven feet of shelving in book cases and file boxes is located along the north and south walls. Three feet of bound volumes and 5 feet of unbound material, or 33 percent of the judge's records, are kept here. Fifty-four feet of shelving is used for reference books.

Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records

(First entry, p. 33)

Fifteen feet of unused shelving is available for future records. One percent of the judge's records is in the county court clerk's office and the remaining 66 percent in the basement records room. Accommodations, including chairs and two desks, are adequate.

The circuit court clerk's office, measuring 20x16x12, is on the north side of the second floor at the head of the stairway. Sixty percent of the circuit court's records and 45 percent of the sheriff's records are housed here. Two hundred and one feet of bound volumes are on steel roller shelving under counters in the center of the room and 29 feet of unbound material in file boxes along the east wall. There is no need for additional space or equipment. The accommodations for users are two counters, a desk, a table, and chairs. Forty percent of the clerk's records is in the basement records room. The circuit court clerk has custody of the records of the criminal court and the jury commission.

The grand jury room, on the second floor, also serves as an office for the highway department. It is on the northwest corner of the building and measures 20x12x12. A wooden desk, against the north wall, is ample equipment for housing 2 feet of bound volumes and 1 foot of unbound material. Thirty-five percent of the department's records is here and the remaining 65 percent in the basement records room.

The records room, in the northeast corner of the basement, measures 27x9x8, and is used for storing records from several agencies. It contains 365 feet of wooden shelving and file boxes along the north, east, south, and west walls. There are 285 feet of bound volumes and 79 feet of unbound material stored here. The officers and agencies having records in the basement records room, with their percentages, are the county judge, 66; the county court clerk, 55; the chancery court, 40; the circuit court, 40; the trustee, 75; the tax assessor, 90; the highway department, 65; the department of education, 2; the sheriff, 30; the justices of the peace, 15; the board of equalization, 89; and the surveyor, 100. Accommodations for users consist of a desk and three chairs. The housing facilities are adequate at present but more space and equipment will be required if additional records are moved to the room.

The county jail, on Popular Street, is a rectangular two story structure, measuring 36x56x25. Erected in 1921, it is of brick, concrete, and steel. The sheriff's office, 16x16x10, is in the southwest corner on the first floor. One foot of bound volumes, or 25 percent of the sheriff's records, is kept on a wooden desk against the west wall. Forty-five percent of his records is in the circuit court clerk's office and 30 percent is in the basement records room at the courthouse. The sheriff maintains another office on the second floor of the courthouse, but no records are kept in this office. It measures 16x10x12.

Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records

(First entry, p. 33)

The justices of the peace, not having offices in the courthouse, keep 52 volumes, or 84 percent of their records, in their respective homes. One percent of justice of the peace records is in the county court clerk's office and 15 percent is in the basement records room.


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
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


Basement Floor Plan

Explanatory Notes

Throughout this book the arrangement of entries, each entry representing a record or records series, is by offices and other units of the county organization and by subjects within each of these divisions. The agencies themselves are arranged in related groups, judicial agencies, for example, being grouped together. A similar arrangement is followed for the administrative offices and the so-called public service group, including highway, education, and health. Within each agency related entries are grouped under subject headings and frequently thereunder by subheadings.

The actual record title as it appears on the outside of the volume or container is given in the entry in upper case letters, but if this exact title is vague, misleading, or otherwise inadequate, an assigned explanatory title is inserted in lower case letters enclosed in parentheses. If a record has no title and it has thus been necessary to assign one, the assigned title is in upper case letters and is enclosed in parentheses.

The years for which a record is available are shown immediately following the title. The use of a hyphen between two dates indicates the inclusive years for which a record is available. A single date followed by two hyphens indicates that the record is current and dates from the year given. Dates are broken to indicate years for which a record was not made or could not be located. If it was not conclusively

- 30 -Abbreviations, Symbols, and (First entry, p. 33) Explanatory Notes established that a record was actually discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, no statement of discontinuance is made. The absence of comment on missing prior or subsequent records means that definite information could not be obtained. The labeling of a record is described or shown by figures or letters in parentheses immediately following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other type of container. Since the vast majority of the records in Loudon County is housed in the courthouse, only the name of the office or room in which a record may be found is given. However, if all the records of an office, which are listed under that office, are in one place, that place being the office or vault of the officer having custody of the records, the location reference has been omitted. In all other instances, the exact location of each record is given. The location of each office and department is set out in the section entitled "Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records." Except in the section entitled "Housing, Care, and Accessibility of Records," in which measurements are given in feet, measurements are given in inches, unless otherwise indicated, and therefore the mathematical symbol for inches is omitted. Unless otherwise indicated, the record is in good condition.

An effort has been made to keep terminology uniform. However, the terms "justice of the peace" and "magistrate" are practically synonymous and in practice and throughout this book these terms are used interchangeably. The words "judge" or "clerk" in a record entry refer to the judge or clerk of the court under which the record is listed, or the judge or clerk named in the title of the chapter; exceptions to this are clearly indicated. If not otherwise indicated, the word "district" means civil district. As the function of the office of county judge is virtually identical with that of county chairman, there is no specific indication in the entries of the years each series was maintained by each officer.

Because so many justice of the peace records were, due to their location, virtually inaccessible to the field workers, the survey of these records was of necessity incomplete. Such information about most of these records as appears in this Inventory was obtained by mail through the cooperation and assistance of the justices themselves.

The purpose of the chronological index is to furnish the user a guide to the entries in which all records covering a particular decade or certain years thereof may be found. The closing date in the final decade corresponds with the date of the recheck.

The user's attention is directed particularly to the third paragraph of the Preface in which a forthcoming key volume on the evolution

and structural development of county government of Tennessee is indicated, and in which the office and governmental organization essays, appearing in this Inventory, are dealt with. Only so much information is included in the essays as to show to what extent local legislation has altered the pattern of the general law, i.e., the structure of county government in Tennessee as contemplated by the Constitutions, the Public Acts and the Official Codes of 1858 and 1932, and, also, only so much information on the general law as is necessary to identify and state the facts of existence of the several offices, agencies, and departments of the county organization.

The device (C 1932) immediately following a citation to a legislative act means that the substance of the legislative act is still in force and is reenacted in the Official Code of 1932. The numbers appearing immediately after C 1932, and separated from it by a comma, are the section numbers of the Code. A citation to the Code of 1932, placed in parentheses immediately following a citation to the Code of 1858, indicates that the provision first appeared in the earlier code and is reenacted in the Official Code of 1932. Individual citations within a footnote are unrelated if separated by a semicolon.

The name following a citation to a court case is that the Attorney-General and Reporter under whose name a volume of Supreme Court reports containing the case was published. The number preceding the name is the volume number; that following, the page number.

Not all of the codes and compilations listed in the Bibliography are cited in this Inventory, but all of them are used by the legal research unit of the Survey and are listed for the convenience and information of the users of this Inventory. For a complete listing of the titles, see Check List of Acts and Codes of the State of Tennessee, 1792-1939 (mimeo.), Nashville, 1940.

I. QUARTERLY COUNTY COURT (County Court Clerk as Clerk)

The quarterly county court, the legislative branch of the county court, is the county's governing body and dates from the establishment of the county, that is, from September 3, 1870.1

The court is composed of two justices of the peace from each civil district, except the civil district containing the county seat from which three are elected, and of one justice from each incorporated town choosing to elect one, all elected by popular vote for terms of 6 years. 2 At the present time the Loudon County quarterly court is composed of 13 members. 3 Although the quarterly county court functions almost entirely by virtue of statutory powers delegated by the legislature, the court is, nevertheless, a constitutional agency.4

The presiding officer of the court is the county judge, beleated by popular vote for a term of 8 years. 6 The clerk of the court is the county court clerk, elected by popular vote for a term of 4 years.8

II. COUNTY JUDGE
(As Administrative and Financial Agent of the County)

From the organization of Loudon County in 1870 until 1920, the county had a chairman of the county court; and since 1920 there has been a county judge. Il The office of county judge differs from that of chairman of the county court in that the county judge is elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years, 12 whereas the chairman is appointed by the quarterly county

court for a term of 1 year. 13 Also, the county judge is declared to be an inferior judge, 14 which the chairman is not, and the judge does not function in an independent capacity as a justice of the peace as does the chairman; normally either office combines the functions of probate and juvenile judges, presiding officer of the quarterly court, and general administrative, financial, and executive officer of the county, 15

Although the office of county judge is created by special legislation, the office is recognized by the Code and the public acts, in whose eyes the offices of judge and chairman are, at least functionally, practically synonymous. Nevertheless, the act of 1919 creating the office of county judge in Loudon County deals at length with the duties and structure of the office, but these sections are largely a repetition of general provisions and the office is, further, affected by general provisions not restated in the act. Under the act of 1919, the county judge, unlike inferior judges serving exclusively under the general law, must be "learned in the law."16

The bond of the county judge of Loudon County is fixed at \$2,000 and his salary \$900 a year. 17 The special act of 1919, unlike the general law, directs that the county court clerk, instead of the county judge, issue county warrants, but they must be countersigned by the county judge. 18 Also, the judge countersigns the school and road warrants issued by the superintendent of schools and the chairman of the highway commission. 19 The county judge of Loudon County, apparently in his capacity as probate judge, unlike the county judges functioning exclusively under the general law, has, as an inferior judge, the power, concurrently with the circuit judge and the chancellor, to enforce vendors' liens on land, to issue writs of injunction

An act passed at about the time of the organization of Loudon County combined the office of entry-taker, charged with receiving claims to and making sales of the State's domain, and the office of surveyor, charged with making surveys of the land entered with the entry-taker and with making such surveys as any court of record might direct and as any interested parties might require. 28 In accordance with this act, the quarterly county court, at its first meeting, appointed an entry-taker and surveyor. 20 In 1875 the office of entry-taker was abolished, but in 1879 the quarterly court was authorized to revive the office and appoint an entry-taker or to impose the duties of the office upon the register or the surveyor. 30 The register is now ex-officio entry-taker. 31 The quarterly county court still appoints a surveyor for a term of 4 years. 32 In Loudon County the surveyor does not have to be a resident of the county prior to his appointment. 33

VI. CIRCUIT COURT

VII. CRIMINAL COURT

An act of 1925 created the criminal court of the fourth judicial circuit, of which Loudon County was and is a part. 39 There is a separate criminal judge for this circuit, elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years. 40 The clerk of this court is the circuit court clerk. 41 The criminal court has exclusive common law and statutory jurisdiction, original and appellate, over criminal cases arising in Loudon County. 42 Under the general law, and in Loudon County prior to 1925, criminal jurisdiction is vested in the circuit court. 43

VIII. JURY COMMISSION

Loudon County's first jury commission existed from 1925 to 1927.44 The second and present commission was created in 1931.45 The present commission is virtually identical with its predecessor, with respect to functions, structural organization, and records requirements. The jury commission is charged with the selection of jurors for the courts of the county, a task which under the general law and in the absence of special legislation belongs to the quarterly court. 46 The commission consists of three "discreet" residents of the county appointed by the circuit and criminal judges, who designate one commissioner as chairman. 47 Practicing attorneys and county and district officials elected by popular vote are not eligible for membership on the commission and not more than two can be of the same political persuasion. 48 The circuit court clerk serves as clerk of the commission.49 Before the commissioners enter office, they and the circuit court clerk must take an oath to be impartial in the selection of jurors and to keep their selections secret. 50 Two members constitute a quorum. 51 The term of office is 4 years. 52 A jury commissioner

receives \$4.00 for each day of service and the clerk receives 5 cents for each name entered on the jury list. 53

It is the duty of the jury commission to draw up biennially from the tax books, election sheets, or other sources a jury list of from four hundred to eight hundred names. 54 The jury list must be recorded in a well-bound book.55 The clerk must write the names on the jury list upon slips of paper and place in the jury box, which is kept locked and is opened only by the circuit or criminal judges, the jury commission or the circuit court clerk. 56 Prior to each regular or special term of the criminal court, the commission meets, shakes the jury box, opens it, and instructs a child under ten to draw from the box enough names for the panel of grand and petit jurors. 57 At the time the jurors for the regular term of the criminal court are selected, the jurors for the circuit court are chosen also. 58 The panels, along with a list of the persons whose names are drawn but who are unable to serve, are reported to the proper courts. 59 The reports are preserved as part of the records of the commission.60 Upon the order of the clerk, the sheriff notifies jurors of their selection, cautioning them to tell no one of the selection.61 If some of the jurors selected are not qualified, the judge may have the box brought into court and names drawn from it until enough satisfactory jurors are obtained, 62 or, if the judge wishes, he may supplement the panels, without resort to the jury box, by directing the sheriff to summon other persons. 63 The slips of paper drawn from the jury box and containing the names of persons selected as jurors but who fail to serve are returned to the box.64

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IX. CHANCERY COURT

The chancery court is chiefly a court of equity and, also, holds some jurisdiction concurrently with the probate and circuit courts over the appointment and supervision of personal representatives and the partition and distribution of estates and concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit court in all civil cases at law except certain unliquidated damages. Loudon County has had a chancery court since the county was organized. Loudon County is in the second chancery division. Like other inferior judges, the chancellor, as the judge of the chancery court is legally known, is elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years. The clerk and master is appointed by the chancellor for a term of 6 years.

XII. JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

The office of justice of the peace is necessarily as old as the county, for the organization of the county could not have been completed until the justices were commissioned and met to organize the quarterly court. Individually, the justices of the peace are minor judges and committing magistrates. Severally, they make up the quarterly court, the county's governing body, but there is no relation in this duality of function. 77 The justices of the peace share with the coroner the power to conduct inquests over the bodies of persons meeting death "by unlawful violence at the hands of some other person. "78

There are two justices of the peace elected by popular vote in each civil district except the district containing the county seat, from which

The sheriff is the county's chief peace officer 83 and executive officer of its courts. 84 Until 1897 he acted as the chief election officer in the county. 85 The office in Loudon County dates from 1870. 86 Throughout the history of the county the sheriff has been elected by popular vote for a term of 2 years. 87

XIV. CORONER

The coroner shares with the justices of the peace the power to conduct inquests over the bodies of persons meeting death by "unlawful violence at the hands of some other person."88 He acts as sheriff when that office is vacant or when the incumbent is incompetent.89 The office of coroner dates from the organization of the county.90 The coroner has, from the beginning

of the county, been elected for a term of 2 years by the quarterly county court. 91 He is required to keep no records, and, apparently, has kept none.

XV. CONSTABLE

The constables are minor peace officers, 92 executive officers for justice of the peace court, 93 and servers of certain process for the other courts. 94 The office of constable should date from the organization of the county. 95 Constables are elected for a term of 2 years by popular vote, one from each civil district choosing to elect one, except the district containing the county seat, which may elect two. 96 Loudon County now has five constables. 97 They are required to keep no records, and none has been found.

XVI. TAX ASSESSOR

From the organization of Loudon County to date there has been either one tax assessor for the entire county or an assessor for each civil district, sometimes elected by the quarterly court and at other times by popular vote, serving for a period of 1 year until the late eighteeneighties, when the term of office was fixed at 4 years. 98 Since 1909, when the first assessor elected under the general assessment law of 1907 was to take office, there has been a county tax assessor elected by popular vote for a term of 4 years. 99 The tax assessor has always been charged with evaluating property and listing polls for State and county taxation, although public utilities have been assessed by State officials since 1875; since 1873 it has been his duty to enumerate persons engaged

XVII. BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The board of equalization's duties are to "examine, compare, and equalize the county assessments." 101 The machinery for reviewing and equalizing tax assessments has, like the original assessment of taxes, been the subject of much general legislation. The present board of equalization consists of five members elected by, but not from, the quarterly court for terms of 2 years. 102 Loudon County should have had a board of equalization of various compositions throughout its history.

XIX. TRUSTEE

The trustee, who serves as treasurer and, since 1876, as collector of property and poll taxes, is a constitutional officer. 106 The trustee

XX. REVENUE COMMISSION

Under the general law the revenue commission, an agency which has been allowed to lapse in Loudon County, is charged with making a quarterly examination of the records of county officers who collect and disburse public funds to see if the records of the various officials agree and with reporting its investigations to the quarterly court, 108 and, if the quarterly court so wills, with conducting the sale of bonds and investment of the sinking funds. 109 The revenue commission, in much the form it now has under the general law, should have been set up first in 1875. 110 If there was a revenue commission in Loudon County, it would consist of three persons, appointed by but not from the quarterly court for terms of 2 years. 111 The commission has custody of no records.

XXI. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

The office of superintendent of schools dates from or from soon after the organization of the county. In Loudon County the superintendent of schools is elected by the quarterly county court for a term of 2 years. 113

A series of Reconstruction acts culminated in 1873 in the creation of the office of district school director. 114 In each school district, usually a civil district, there were three directors, elected by popular vote for 3 year terms, charged with employing teachers, taking the annual scholastic census, drawing warrants upon the county trustee for the expenditure of the district's share of the school money, repairing the school buildings, and making annual statistical reports to the county superintendent. 115

A general education bill of 1907 abolished the office of district director, divided the county into five school districts, and provided for the popular election of board members, one from each district, to constitute the county board of education, which had general and detailed supervision over the county elementary school system. 116

During the time between 1899 and 1921 in which Loudon County operated high schools, there should have been a high school board consisting of the superintendent of schools and six persons selected by the quarterly county court which was charged with the management of these schools.

Three special school districts in Loudon County have been created by special enactments and removed somewhat from the control of the county education authorities. A special act of 1913, which has not been repealed, created the Meadow High School District, embracing parts of Loudon and Blount Counties. 118 The act directed that the three members of the board of district directors be elected by popular vote. 119 The board of directors was authorized to draw warrants on the county trustee for the disbursement of the district's share

of the school money. 120 A series of acts, the last of which is apparently still in force, created the Trizonia High School District out of parts of Loudon, Blount, and Monroe Counties, and directed that three directors for the district be elected by popular vote. 121 The part of Blount County was removed from the Trizonia District in 1919. 122 A special act of 1919, which has not been repealed, established the Loudon Special School District. 123 The act directed that the three members of the district school board be elected by popular vote for terms of 2 years. 124 The members of the board were to organize by electing from their number a president and a secretary and treasurer. 125 The powers and duties of the board as listed in the act were to maintain a high and elementary school in the district, to employ teachers for this school, to open and close the school and to determine the length of the school term, to build and repair school buildings, to expel pupils when necessary, to take the scholastic census of the district, to have custody of the district school property, to provide transportation for children living at inconvenient distances from the school, to spend the district school money, and to do anything else for the district that the county board of education and the high school board did for the county. 126 A special annual tax of 50 cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property and a poll tax of \$2 on each man between twenty-one and fifty were imposed in the district by the act. 127 In 1925 the property tax was increased to \$1 on the hundred. 128 These taxes were to be collected by the county trustee. 129 The proceeds of these taxes, together with the district's share of the State school funds, were to be disbursed by the trustee upon a warrant signed by the president of the board and endorsed by the superintendent of schools. 130 The secretary was to keep a record of the meetings of the board and of its official transactions. 131

. A general law of 1921 created a board of education to consist of seven members appointed by the quarterly court for terms of 7 years, and vested in it the control and management of both the high and the elementary schools of the county. 132

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The school system now operates under the general education act of 1925.133 The seven members of the board of education, with control over both the high and the elementary schools are elected by the quarterly county court for terms of 7 years.134 The bulk of the power of the board is delegated to the superintendent of schools.135

A number of special acts have been passed authorizing Loudon County to issue bonds and to take other special financial steps. 136

A special act of 1917 empowered the quarterly court to issue up to \$30,000 in bonds to bear interest at not more than 6 percent a year and to mature in annual installments of \$3,000.137 The proceeds of the bond issue were to be used to build a school building in or near the town of Loudon.138 The county judge and three residents of the first civil district, elected by but not from the quarterly court, were to constitute a committee to contract for the building of the proposed school.139

A special act of 1919 authorized the quarterly county court to levy a special tax of 10 cents on each one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in the county for the purpose of maintaining a high school for Negroes. 140 Another special act of 1919 authorized the quarterly court to levy a special tax in the town of Loudon for the purpose of erecting or improving school buildings or building streets and sidewalks to the school houses. 141

A special act of 1925 authorized, subject to a referendum, the district school board of the Loudon special school district to issue \$25,000

in bonds at an interest rate of not more than 5 percent and to mature in annual installments over a period of 13 years. 142 The proceeds of this issue were to be used to pay off the outstanding indebtedness of this school district. 143 The bonds were to bear the signatures of the secretary of the board and of the county judge. 144 Both the district school board and the trustee of the county were to keep registers of these bonds. 145 A special act of 1927 authorized the quarterly county court to issue \$50,000 in bonds to bear interest at an annual rate of not more than 6 percent and to mature in ten equal annual installments beginning in 1928. 146

A special act of 1929 authorized a referendum on the proposition of issuing \$205,000 in bonds, of which \$75,000 was for the purpose of building a high school at or near Loudon, \$75,000 for building a high school at Lenoir City, and \$55,000 for repair or construction of other school buildings in the county. 147 If a majority of the votes cast in the election favored the issue, the quarterly court was to issue the bonds to bear interest at not more than 6 percent and to mature within 50 years. 148 If the bonds were issued, two high school building commissions, the high school building commission at Loudon, made up of five appointees of the county board of education from within and/or without its membership; and the high school building commission at Lenoir City, to consist of the Lenoir City board of education, the county superintendent of education, the chairman of the county board of education, and two members elected by the county board of education from its membership were to be set up. 149 Each commission was to have supervision of the expenditure of the proceeds of \$75,000 of these bonds. 150 Disbursements of the proceeds were to be made by the county trustee upon the warrants drawn by the secretaries and approved by the chairman of the commissions. 151 Each commission was required to keep, in a well-bound book, the minutes of its proceedings and a book of accounts of all expenditures, and to "report" at least once every 3 months to the quarterly court "all minutes, books, statements, records, papers, plans, specifications, contracts, bonds and data declared to be the public records of the County of Loudon. 152 The proceeds of the remaining \$55,000 in bonds were to be spent by the county board of education. 153

XXII. COUNTY PHYSICIAN

The office of county physician was not definitely created until 1885. 156 Before that time if the inmates of the jail or poor home had to have medical attention, a physician was called in by the officer in charge of the institution and paid by the quarterly court. 157 Since 1885 a county physician attending the inmates of the jail and the poor home should have been and is now elected by the quarterly county court for a term of 4 years. This officer, apparently, has kept no records.

XXIII. HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Except for certain bond issue acts, the highway system of Loudon County operated exclusively under the general law until 1919. 159 In 1919 all powers and duties hitherto belonging to the district road commissioners were vested in a single road superintendent, an office existing until 1938,160 The road superintendent was appointed annually by the quarterly county court from 1919 until 1923 and from 1927 until 1930 and annually or every 4 years between 1923 and 1927; 161 from 1930 to 1938 he was elected biennially by popular vote. 162 The road superintendent was required to be skilled in road construction and maintenance and to be a resident of the county unless it were impossible to find a competent person in the county. 163 Between 1927 and 1929 he was required to be a certified civil engineer. 164 Before he entered office, the superintendent was required to make a bond of \$5,000 and to take an oath to perform his duties with all possible skill. 165 The salary of

the superintendent was \$1,000 a year. 166 The superintendent could be removed by a two-thirds vote of the quarterly court for improper performance of duty. 167

The road superintendent had control of all roads and bridges and of the road tools and machinery of the county and power to build and repair all public roads in the county. 168 Applications to open, close, or alter any road in the county were to be addressed to the road superintendent, who was, if the change were desirable, to assess damages, with appeals lying to the quarterly court and from the quarterly court to the circuit and the Supreme Court. 169 The superintendent and the county judge were authorized to contract with State and Federal agencies for the repair, improvement, or construction of any road or bridge in the county.170 Annually the quarterly court was to levy upon each one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property outside incorporated towns a tax of between 30 and 50 cents. 171 Special privilege taxes were to be imposed upon the ownership and operation of motor vehicles. 172 When necessary, the road superintendent was to request the quarterly court to make special appropriations or to levy special taxes for roads and bridges. 173 Disbursement of the county's road money was to be upon the warrant of the county judge, acting upon the written order of the superintendent. 174

The road superintendent was empowered to purchase essential tools. machinery, and materials. 175 One of the first duties of the road superintendent was to classify the roads in the county, to divide them into road sections, and to appoint a foreman or overseer for each section. 176 A foreman was not to receive more than \$2.50 a day. 177 The foreman could employ laborers at a wage not above \$2 per day. 178 All physically able men between the ages of twenty-one and forty-five, presumably with the exception of residents of incorporated towns, were required to work upon the public roads at least 5 days a year or to pay \$1.50 for each day of failure to work. 179 The road superintendent was given charge of the county workhouse and the power to work persons under workhouse sentences upon the public roads, 180 with the result that the workhouse commission functioning

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under the general law ceased to exist; 181

The road superintendent was required to keep a record of disbursements of the county road money and to make to the county judge a quarterly report on disbursements. 182 By inference, he was to keep the records required by the workhouse commission and superintendent under the general law. 183 By an amendatory act of 1921 he was required to keep a perpetual inventory of the county's road machinery and equipment. 184

An act of 1937, to become effective in January 1938, replaced the road superintendent with a board of highway commissioners. 185 This board consists of three persons, each 21 years old and having a good moral character and competence for the job, elected by the quarterly county court for a term of 3 years under the act of 1937 and for terms of 2 years under an amendatory act of 1939. The board elects from its membership a chairman and the county judge appoints the secretary of the board, who is presumably not a member of the board. A commissioner receives \$25 a quarter. 188 To the board is assigned essentially the powers and duties formerly belonging to the road superintendent. The road funds are disbursed by the trustee upon receipt of warrants drawn by the chairman of the commission and countersigned by the county judge. 190 The board is required to keep a complete record of its official acts and a record of disbursements. 191 At the beginning of each calendar year the board must submit to the quarterly court a budget for the ensuing year. 192

There have been a number of special acts authorizing the quarterly county court of Loudon County to issue bonds for highway purposes and to take other special financial steps. 193

If a majority of the votes cast in a general election favored the proposition, an act of 1907, to remain in effect for 10 years, authorized the quarterly county court to issue \$100,000 in road bonds to mature in 30 years but redeemable in 10 and bearing interest at a rate not more than 5 percent a year. 194 If the bonds were issued, the quarterly court was to levy taxes to provide an income to pay interest and to create a sinking fund to retire the bonds and to set up a sinking fund commission to administer it. 195 Also, if the bonds were issued, the quarterly court was to appoint three persons to serve for 2 years as pike commissioners196 and, before he entered office, each commissioner was required to take before the chairman of the county court an oath to perform his duties impartially and well and to post with the chairman a bond of \$20,000.197 A commissioner was not to receive more than \$2.50 per day. 198 This commission was to be charged with the sale of the bonds and with contracting for carrying on contemplated construction and improvement. 199 The commission was to keep records of all contracts for road construction and of all orders issued by it upon the chairman of the county court. 200 The commission was further to make quarterly reports to the quarterly court showing the progress of the work, the money spent, and the amount of money on hand and its place of deposit, 201

A special act of 1911 empowered the quarterly court, subject to a referendum, to issue up to \$100,000 in road bonds to bear not more than

subject to taxation. 5 percent interest a year and to mature in 30 years. 202 If the bonds were issued, the quarterly court was to levy a tax to pay interest and to create a sinking fund for the retirement of the bonds and to appoint three sinking fund commissioners to lend or deposit the sinking fund. 203 Five persons were designated by the act to be pike commissioners, apparently for a term of good behavior, with much the same powers as those provided for in the 1907 act. 204

A special act of 1913 authorized the quarterly court, apparently without a referendum, to issue \$150,000 in road bonds to bear not more than 5 percent interest and to mature in 30 years. 205 A sinking fund commission was to be set up by the quarterly court, and three pike road commissioners were to be appointed by the quarterly court, apparently to serve during good behavior. 206

A special act of 1917, essentially identical with the act of 1913 except for the amount of bonds authorized, empowered the quarterly court to issue \$100,000 in road bonds. 207 In 1921 the authorization under this act was increased to \$250,000 and the county judge was charged with keeping a register of the bonds. 208 An amendatory act of 1925 permitted these bonds to be issued to mature in 30 years or to mature in annual installments of \$5,000. 209 A private act of 1919 authorized the quarterly court to issue bonds to bear interest at 6 percent, the proceeds to be used to build bridges across the Tennessee and Little Tennessee Rivers. 210

Also in 1919, the quarterly courts of Loudon and Monroe Counties were authorized to levy a tax to create a joint road fund for the construction and maintenance of a common road. 211 A resident of Monroe County and a resident of Loudon County were appointed by the act as commissioners in charge of this road. 212 Each commissioner was to post a bond of \$2,000.213 The commissioners were required to report quarterly to the quarterly court of each county. 214

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Another special act of 1919 authorized Loudon, Monroe, and Knox Counties to issue, for building bridges to connect State highways, 20 year warrants or bonds in the amount of \$1 on each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in these counties.215

In 1927 two issues by the quarterly court of Loudon County of \$150,000 and \$480,000 to bear interest at 4 3/4 percent were validated, "notwithstanding any non-compliance with statutory provisions."216

XXIV. POOR COMMISSION (Superintendent of the Poor Home)

The poor commission consists of three members elected by the quarterly court for terms of 3 years.217 The superintendent is elected by and serves at the will of the commission.218 As their names suggest, the poor commission and the superintendent of the poor home are charged with the operation of the poor home.219 There are no records of the commission to be found.

XXV. RANGER

The office of ranger, although constitutional, 220 is now defunct in Loudon County, apparently being abandoned when there was no longer the need for an officer to receive and take up stray livestock. If there were a ranger, he would be appointed by the quarterly court for a term of 2 years. 221 This officer has, apparently, kept no records.

XXVI. AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT

A general law of 1913 authorized the quarterly court to appropriate money for "Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work."222 Under a general law of 1929, Loudon County should have an agricultural extension committee elected by and serving at the will of the quarterly court to assist in the annual selection of the county agent, 223 but the Loudon quarterly county court now appoints the county agent annually. 224 The county agent seeks to educate the farmers in better agricultural techniques and performs certain services in connection with the crop control and soil conservation programs of the Federal Government.
